PROSPECTUS



THE School, which is one of the handsomest educational edifices in the City, is situated on the heights of Darlinghurst, at the corner of Liverpool and Darley Streets, and commands delightful panoramic views of City and Harbour. The locality is especially suitable for a scholastic establishment, as its surroundings are of an attractive character, and it provides that quietness so necessary for earnest study. Moreover, its position is exceptionally convenient to the tram, being only two minutes' walk from Taylor Square, while Bellevue Hill and Woollahra trams pass close to the School, and buses from Central pass in the next street.

The object of the Brothers is to give the pupils such a complete Christian education as will enable them to fulfil their duties as Catholics and citizens in after life. Boys of undesirable character are not retained at the School.

The pupils are prepared for the various Public Examinations:—Public Service, Clerical and Professional, for both State and Commonwealth; Bursary, Intermediate and Leaving Certificates, and Matriculation Examinations. The full Secondary Section is a five years' course, and includes English, French, Latin, Mathematics, Science, History and Geography. Practical Science is done in all the classes.

Special Notice

Beginning in 1945 there will be added to the ordinary curriculum of the High School, the subject of Technical Drawing.

Teaching will begin in the 4th Year in 1945, and a full Leaving Certificate course will be provided.

This will enable the School to provide for those boys who have begun their Technical training and who desire to continue it to the Leaving Certificate Standard with a view to commencing Diploma Courses.

Technical Bursaries and Scholarships are awarded on the results of the Leaving Certificate. In this regard the following extracts from the Official Handbook for Year 1944 are relevant:—

Technical Education Bursaries

Bursaries, tenable for four years, are offered to students who wish to enter a Diploma Course at a Technical College. Conditions are in general similar to those governing the Award of University Bursaries.

The following Scholarships, carrying exemption from payment of College fees, are offered:—

Scholarships admitting to Diploma Courses; valued at £21 to £33.

Fifteen Scholarships open to students who wish to enter a Diploma Course, and who have passed in the qualifying subjects for a Diploma Course, viz., English, Mathematics I, Mathematics II, and either Physics, Chemistry or Mechanics. A pass in a Science other than Physics, Chemistry or Mechanics may be accepted from a student proceeding to a Science Diploma Course.

Holder are entitled to attend a Diploma Course in the Technical Colleges at Sydney, Newcastle, Broken Hill or Wollongong.

Applicants must be employed in a calling associated with the course they propose to follow or be able to obtain such employment in the event of gaining a Scholarship.

Parents are asked to note that all this time is not devoted to written work. Study is essential, and can be done only in the quiet of home surroundings. School hours being so short, home study is more imperative.

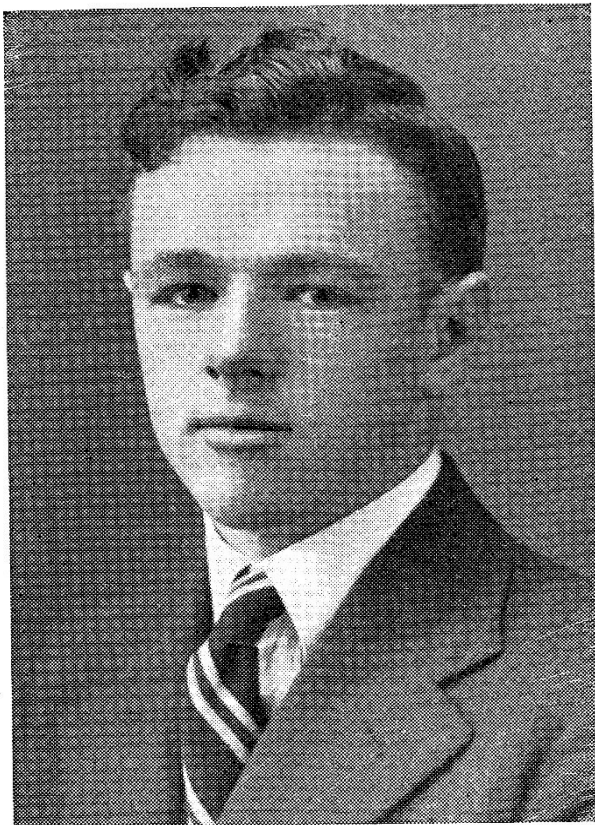

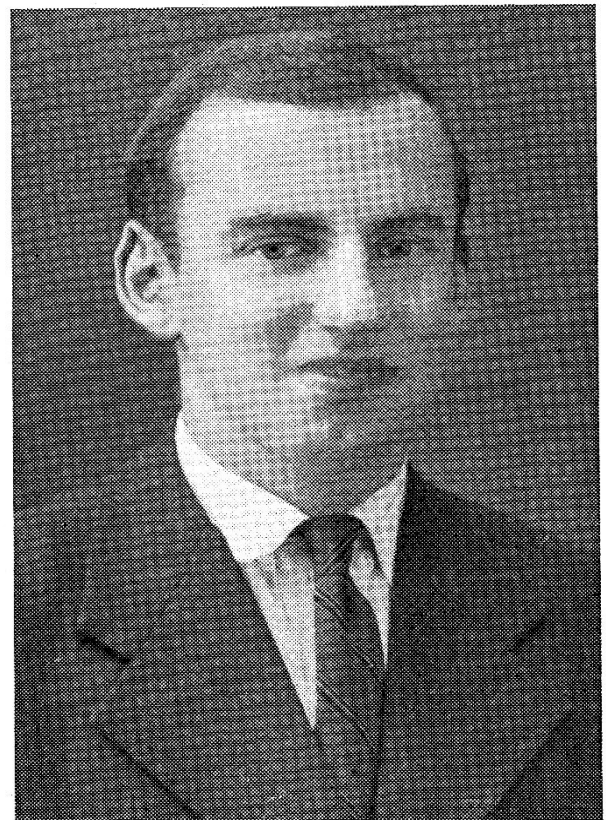

Results, 1943

ALWAYS awaited with interest by those connected with the school, the results of the Leaving Certificate have in recent years acquired an importance far greater than they had in pre-war years.

By them now, more than ever before, the career of the boy is largely determined. With quotas for the University fixed at comparatively low numbers, passes have to be of high standard if a boy is to go on to tertiary education.

In reviewing the 1943 class we find the results quite gratifying. Twenty-four of those who passed the Leaving Certificate left school. Seventeen are continuing some form of tertiary work—University 10, Teachers' College 3, Pharmacy 2, Hawkesbury Agricultural College 1.

L. Macinante entered the Junior Seminary at Springwood, prior to commencing his studies for the priesthood.

The following summary shows results of which the school is rightly proud. While congratulating the members of the class on their successes we recommend as an example to future classes the results that these boys have gained for themselves and the school.

THE MOST REV. JOHN PANICO, D.D., J.U.D., Apostolic Delegate

Silver Jubilee of His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate

"Ecce sacerdos magnus qui in diebus suis placuit Deo"

For the past eight years Australia has been honoured to have for its representative of the Holy Father, the Most Rev. John Panico, D.D., J.U.D.

This year, on the 14th March, His Excellency celebrated the Silver Jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. The whole Catholic population from members of the Hierarchy to the youngest school children united on the occasion to congratulate His Excellency on the happy event.

As we record here briefly the year's activities, we take pleasure in conveying to His Excellency through the pages of "Blue and Blue" the sincerest felicitations of the Brothers and pupils, past and present.

His Excellency brings to his present position a background of diplomatic service of outstanding quality. Beginning at Colombia as Charge d'Affaires, he carried out diplomatic services for the Holy See in South America in 1926, and in Prague in 1931. 1932 found him in Munich and when the Nazi party took control of Germany he was the Pope's representative in the capital. A special mission to the Saar in 1933 required all the tact and strength of character that had characterised his previous diplomatic work. Back in Czechoslovakia, he organised a Congress that did much to unite the young state. It was from Prague that he was called to be Apostolic Delegate to Australasia.

Since his arrival in Australia in 1936, His Excellency has endeared himself to the hearts of Australians. His wide ex-

perience made it easy for him to accommodate himself to people in a land so distant from his own.

The full significance of his work in Australia will of course remain hidden from the public eye. But years of war have set problems which His Excellency has settled with such understanding that makes him a worthy representative of His Holiness whose interest in suffering humanity has been so great. Very soon after we heard of the Pope's work for prisoners of war, we learnt too, of a similar Bureau established by His Excellency for a similar work on behalf of Australian prisoners. Comfort has been brought to many anxious relatives through the efforts of His Excellency in this matter. Australians will remember this with gratitude when much else has been forgotten. His visits to prisoner of war camps in Australia are constant reminders of similar visits to our own soldiers, prisoners in various parts of the world, and should emphasise to all that the one way to peace lies in mutual charity.

Australia is thus privileged to have as the Holy Father's representative one who so closely emulates his own capabilities and fine personal qualities of humility and charity.

We wish His Excellency many happy years in God's service for Australia and beg that God will grant to him His choicest blessings for a work so important for the Church and Australia.

Centenary of Our Lady's Patronage of Australia

(Rev. Father R. Coughlan)

In the spring of 1844, Australia was placed under the patronage of Our Lady, Help of Christians.

The Australian Bishops, Archbishop Polding of Sydney, Dr. Wilson, Bishop of Hobart, and Dr. Murphy, Bishop of Adelaide, met at Sydney in September, 1844, along with clergy from Moreton Bay to Port Philip, in the first Provincial Council on Australian soil. It was at that Council that Our Lady, Help of Christians, was chosen as Patroness of Australia.

There is a remarkable coincidence associated with the early Church in Australia which links us with the Church in England and which throws light on the choice of the Blessed Mother of God as our national Patroness. England had received the Catholic Faith and had learned devotion to the Mother of God as far back as the sixth century. Because of her great devotion to Our Blessed Lady, England had earned for herself the title: Our Lady's Dowry. From this land came Archbishop Polding to Australia.

The coincidence is this: it was a Pope Gregory, St. Gregory the Great, who began the organization of the Church in England. In the year 596 he sent to the island a Benedictine monk named Augustine, who became the first Archbishop of Canterbury. After a space of over 1200 years, when it became necessary to organize the Church in this off-shoot of Britain in the South Seas, there was another Gregory Pope in Rome. This other Gregory, Pope Gregory XVI, in 1835 sent to Australia another Benedictine monk, John Bede Polding, who became the first Archbishop of Sydney. The similarity between himself and the first Archbishop of Canterbury must have impressed Archbishop Polding. We can well imagine how his devotion to the Blessed Mother of God added ardour to his hope that his Australia would one day earn for herself a reputation like that of Augustine's England. At the first opportunity he placed Australia under her pat-

ronage, choosing her under the title: "Our Lady, Help of Christians."

The feast of Our Lady, Help of Christians, had been instituted in 1815 by Pope Pius VII as an act of gratitude to God and Our Lady for his deliverance from his enemies. He ordered the feast to be observed on 24th May, because it was on that day in the previous year, 1814, that he had entered Rome after being detained a prisoner for three years at Savona by the orders of Napoleon.

In 1844, Victoria was Queen of England. She was to remain Queen through the long years of Dr. Polding's Archiepiscopate and on even into the present century. Her birthday happened also to be 24th May. That day, therefore was for Archbishop Polding a holiday on two counts—firstly on account of the feast of the day, and secondly, on account of its being the birthday of Queen Victoria. There is a relevant entry in the Benedictine journal of St. Mary's Monastery as follows: "May 24, 1857. Festival of B.V.M. sub titulo Auxilium Christianorum. There was Solemn Pontifical High Mass to-day. His Grace officiated. He also preached. His Grace robed in cappa magna, and Rt. Rev. Abbot Gregory in rochet and mozetta attended the levee held in Government House to-day to do homage to Her Majesty in the person of her representative."

One final thought on the Provincial Council of 1844. It was the first Council held in British dominions since the Reformation. The age of faith, which made England Our Lady's Dowry, had given way to a long winter of bitter persecution, but a spring day dawned in another clime when the Bishops and priests of Australia, unmolested, gathered together and entrusted Australia to the care of Our Lady, Help of Christians."

"The winter is now past, the rain is over and gone,

"Flowers have appeared in OUR land."

Priest Ex-Student Honoured by King

In one of the lists of awards by His Majesty the King published early this year appeared the name of Chaplain N. Earl, a well-known ex-student priest.

Father Earl was a missionary in New Guinea when the war came to that area and not wishing to leave, he became a Chaplain and went with the Australian Forces over the Owen Stanley Range and on to Kokoda, Buna and Sanananda.

Those who have known Father Earl from his youth will not be surprised to find singled out for the praise of the Australian Commander in Chief, his "keen sense of duty, untiring effort, loyalty, and cheerful acceptance of the most trying conditions."

We take this opportunity on behalf of the Brothers and Students, past and present, to congratulate Father Earl on the high honour bestowed upon him.

We are indebted to Father Earl's father, Mr. H. Earl — himself an ex-student of the High School at St. Patrick's—for permission to print the citation and congratulatory letter from Sir Thomas Blamey. We congratulate Mr. Earl on the merits of so fine a son.

"To a MEMBER of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (M.B.E.) (Military Division)."

"Chaplain EARL was attached to 39 Aust. Inf. Bn. during the KOKODA-OWEN STANLEY Campaign (Aug.-Sep. 42) and the GONA-SANANANDA campaign (Dec.-Jan. 42).

On Aug. 8 and Aug. 20, Chaplain EARL

carried out his duties among forward troops at DENEKI. He risked his life to recover bodies forward of our position; and inspired all ranks by his complete disregard for danger, when he accompanied attacking troops. On Aug. 26 at ISURAVA, a strong fighting patrol left 39 Bn. perimeter to break through the besieging ENEMY. The officer commanding the patrol was wounded and missing; the sergeant acting as guide lay helpless with his thigh shattered by a burst of machine-gun fire. Accompanying the R.M.O. out with a stretcher Chaplain EARL helped him to carry the wounded sergeant back to our lines through jungle and creek, while the

battle still raged around them. Throughout these actions and subsequent fighting to the end of the SANANANDA campaign, Chaplain EARL'S devotion to duty was an invaluable aid to the battalion's morale.

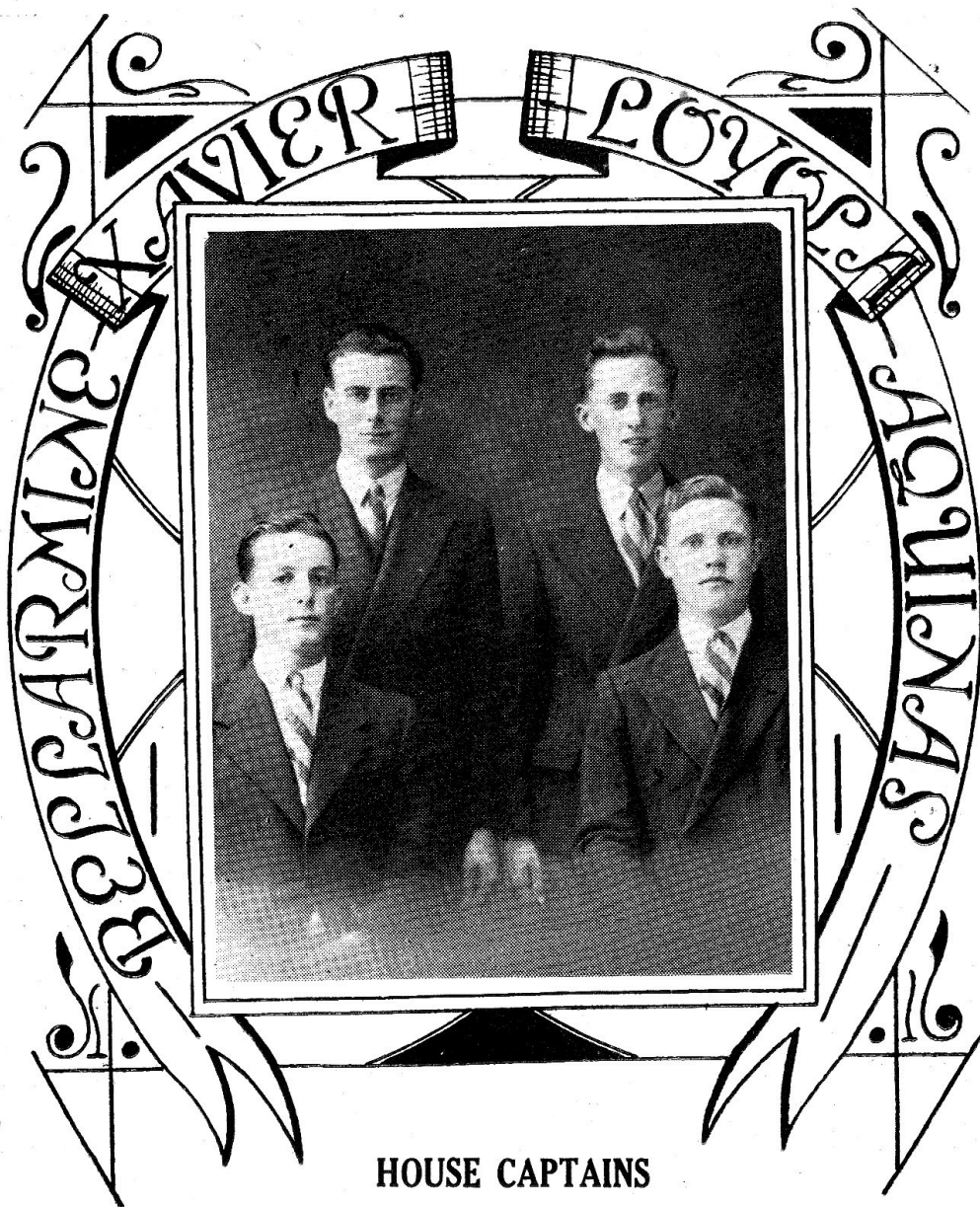
Your keen sense of duty, untiring effort and loyalty have singled you out for recognition among a very gallant company.

The School Houses

At the beginning of the year it was decided to arrange the members of the School into Houses under the patronage of Saints who would be models not only of virtue but also of scholastic attainment. For this reason were chosen St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Robert Bellarmine, St. Ignatius Loyola and St. Francis Xavier.

St. Thomas Aquinas whose outstanding virtue won for him the title of "The Angelic Doctor" combined supreme gifts of intellect with the most ardent piety. Prayer, he said, had taught him more than study. When asked from where he derived his great knowledge, he replied by pointing to his crucifix. His singular devotion to the Blessed Eucharist is revealed in the office and hymns of the feast of Corpus Christi. His devotion to Our Lady was no less and the vigour with which he defended his purity won from God the gift of perpetual chastity.

St. Robert Bellarmine, a recently canonised saint is perhaps not so well-known. He was canonised in 1931 by Pope Pius XI. A man of high intellectual quality, he won from Pope Clement VIII the praise—"the Church of God has not his equal in learning." But like all the saints he set little store on learning for its own sake. His spirit of prayer, his singular delicacy of conscience and freedom from sin, his spirit of humility and poverty, together with the disinterestedness which he displayed as much under the Cardinal's robes as under the Jesuit's gown, his lavish charity to the poor, and his devotedness to work combine to make him a model for many walks of life. His associations with St. Aloysius as the latter's confessor, as well as his outstanding devotion to Our Lady, are added incentives to young men to be devoted to so great a saint.

The Annual Retreat

The Annual Retreat held at the school this year was, as usual, a great success. Its success may be attributed to three factors:

Firstly, the untiring zeal of our retreat master, Father Tierny, M.S.C., to whom every retreatant's gratitude is due. There is no doubt that in everyone of us his inspiring words and his good advice produced a profound spiritual effect.

Secondly, the efforts of the retreatants themselves, whose sincere participation in the exercises is worthy of mention. Those who could, would assist at early Mass in their own parish churches at no little personal sacrifice. Then throughout the day they would keep a practically unbroken silence, concentrating — and how difficult that really is — on higher things.

Lastly, the Children of Mary and the Legionaries of Mary attended to the practical side of the occasion. The former saw to it that acolytes with full equipment were present to serve at Benediction, and that a supply of C.T.S. pamphlets was at hand. The latter arranged the altar with linen, flowers and candles, and were ever-present at emergencies.

The Retreat opened at 9.30 on Monday, April 3rd, Holy Week. Father pointed

out during the first instruction the spiritual benefits accruing to a well-made retreat. Thereafter the retreatants — the bigger boys from Second Year upwards — availed themselves of the opportunity, kindly provided by the Brothers, of visits to their chapel, of making the Stations of the Cross there, and of meditation, aided by the C.T.S. pamphlets, in the open.

The Rosary was repeated three times a day, this being followed either by another instruction or by a period of Spiritual reading for each class.

Of the instructions, which dealt with the general aspects of our holy faith, the most noteworthy were the ones on the Passion of Our Lord, which was appropriate to Holy Week, and those on Our Lady, in which, as Marist Brothers' boys were particularly interested. At all times the pervading atmosphere of silence was present. After each day's retreat Benediction was imparted to the whole school.

Before the final Benediction on the last day, the 5th April, Father gave us his blessing and praised all, particularly the bigger boys, for their edifying conduct and co-operative spirit, which made the 1944 Retreat a most successful one.

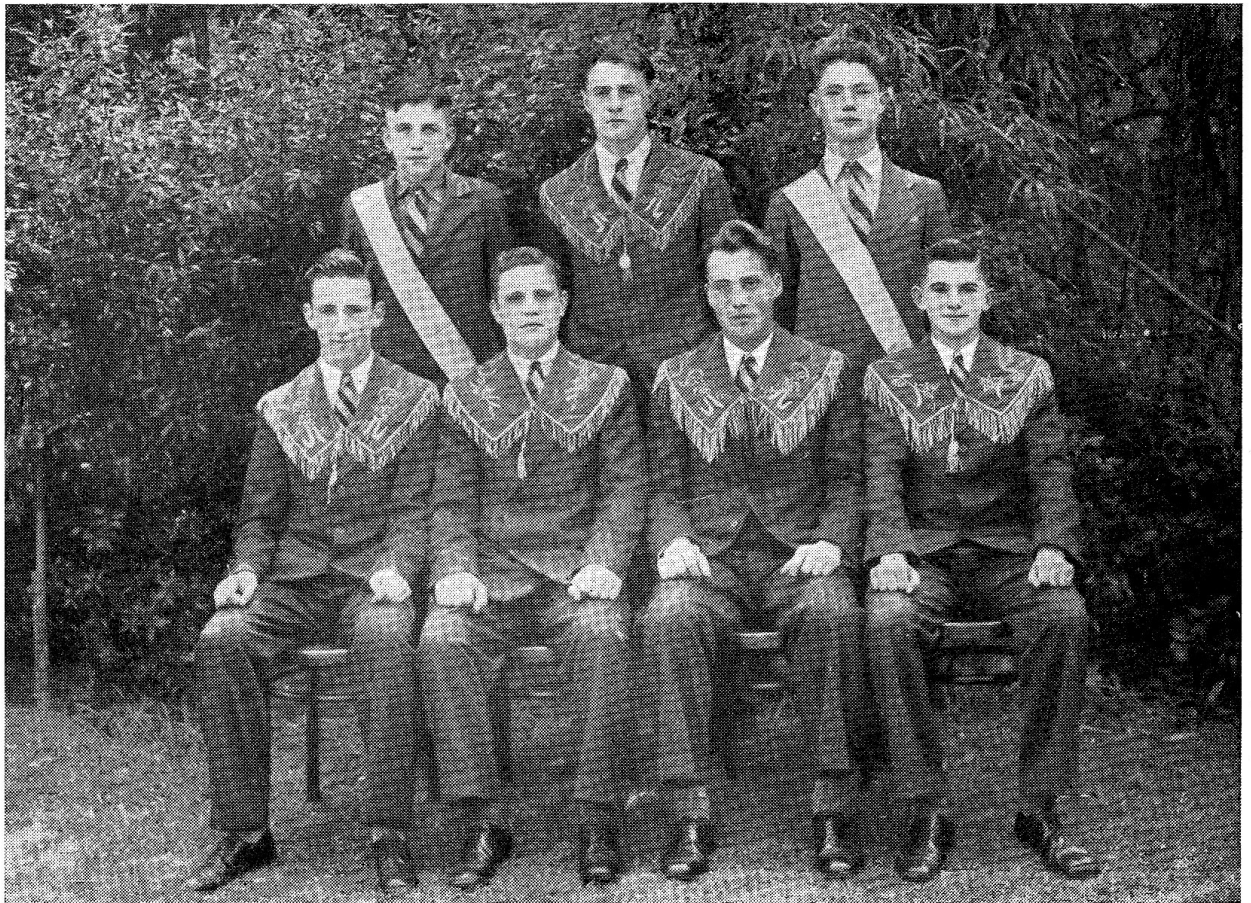
The Sodality of Our Lady

Many Old Boys who were members of the Legion during their school days are still connected with the Legion. Peter

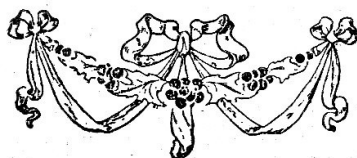
Murray, one of the foundation members, is now President of the University Praesidium.

Each year the interest taken by the boys in Debating has increased. This year there were more debates than in previous years.

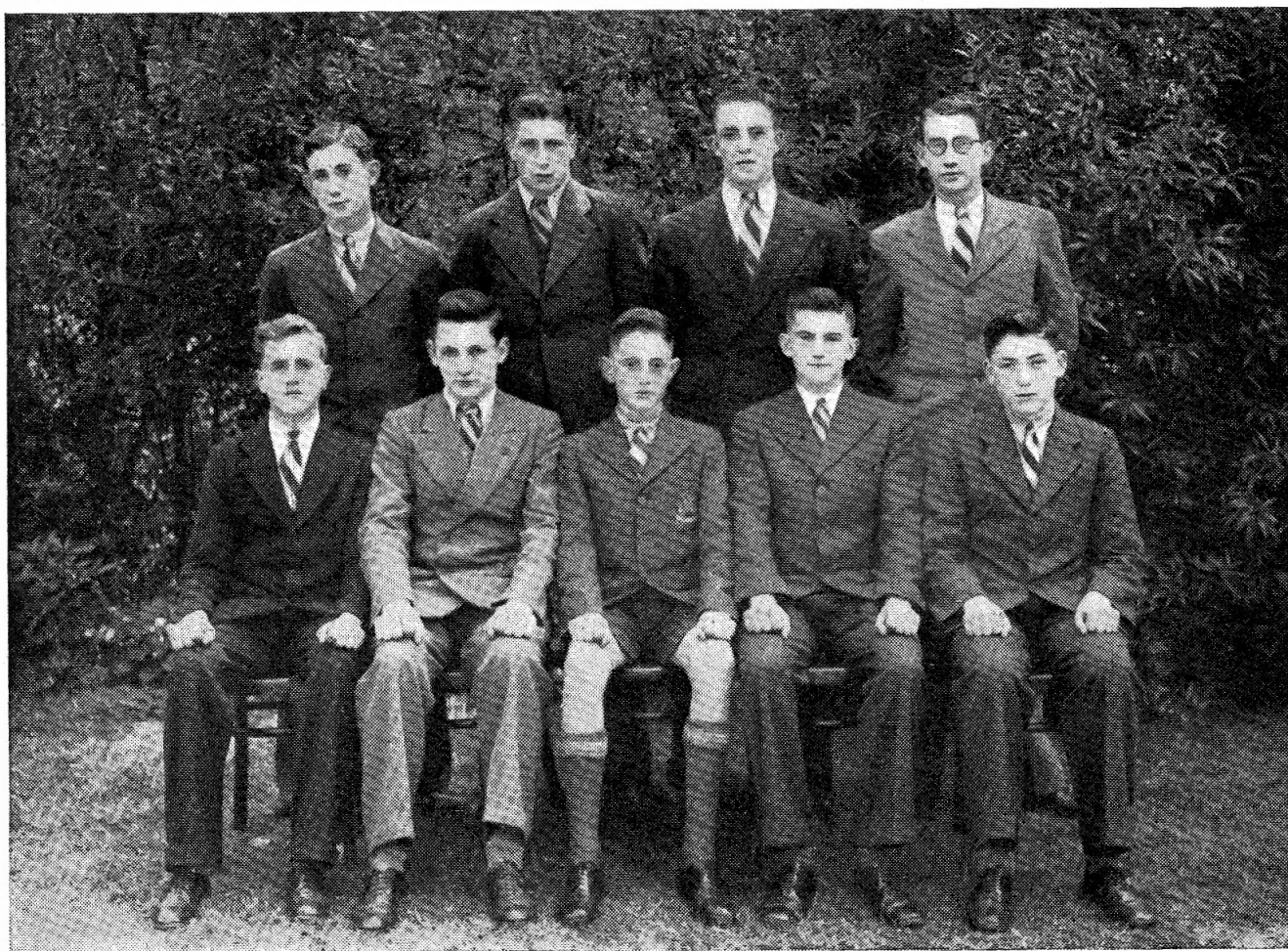

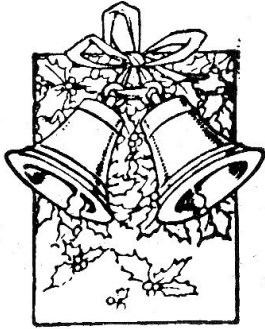
Our Junior team, comprising J. Hal-

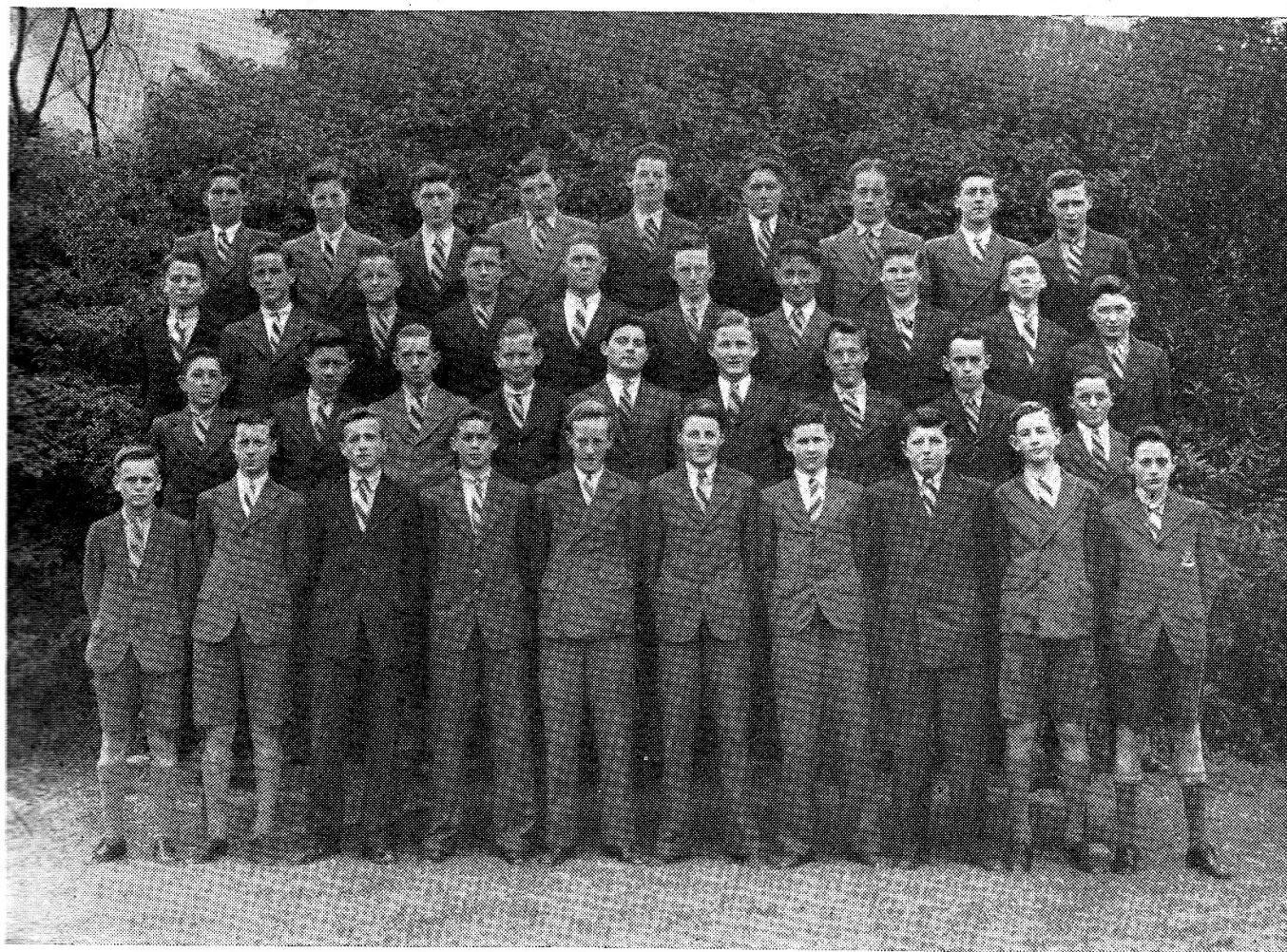
To the new Staff Officer, Capt. McKenzie and his staff, we offer our heartiest co-operation.

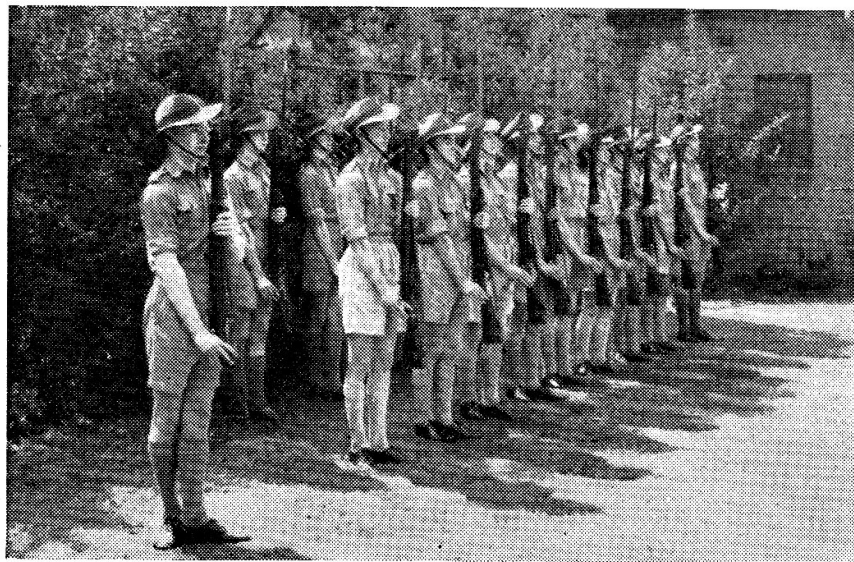

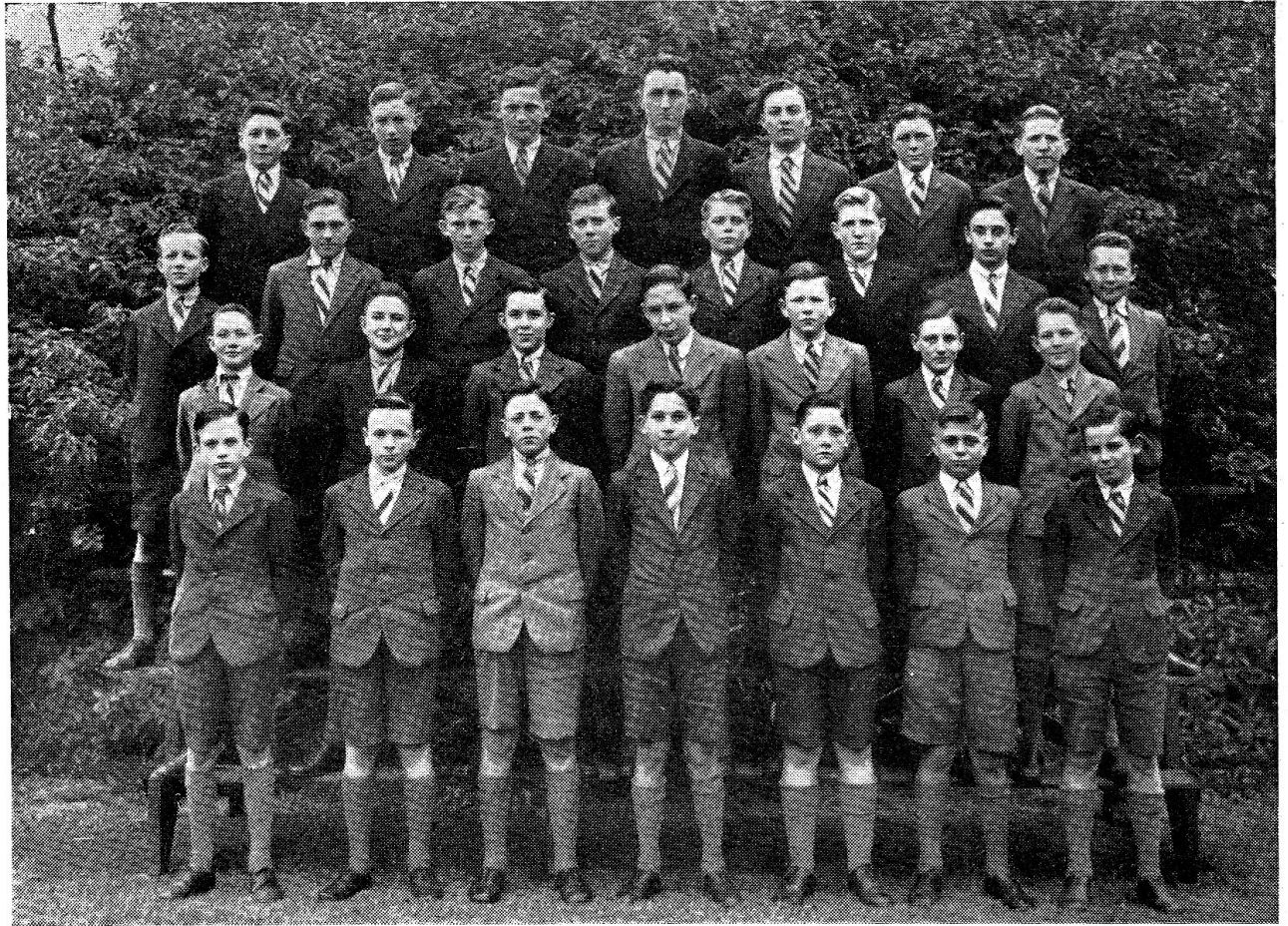

The first big work of the year was the

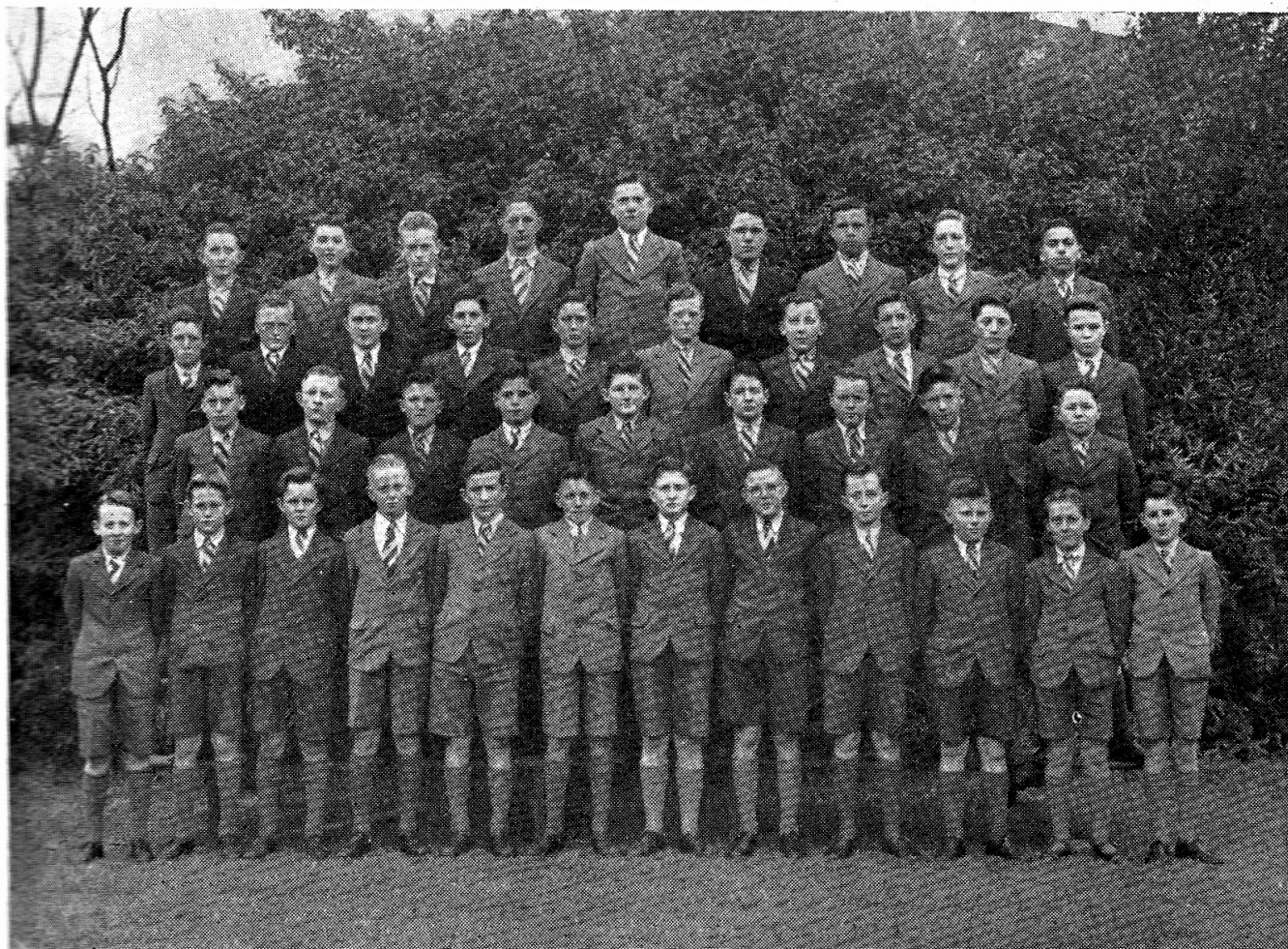

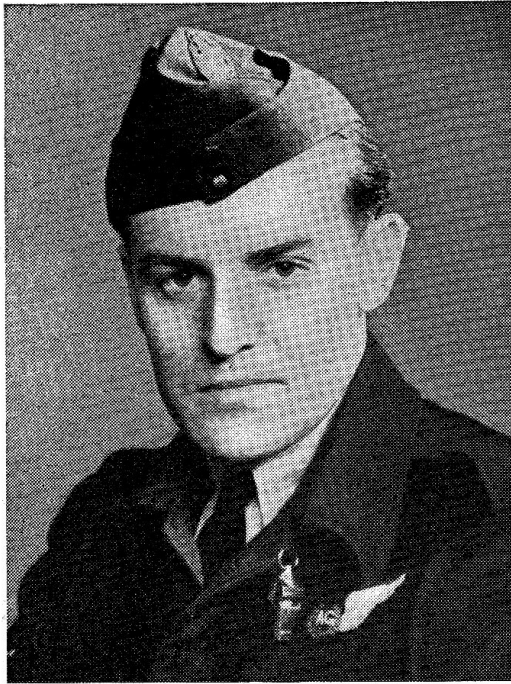

Last year's Leaving Class was well represented at the Breakfast by BILL CROCKER, FRED JAMES and others, and we look to those of the younger gen-

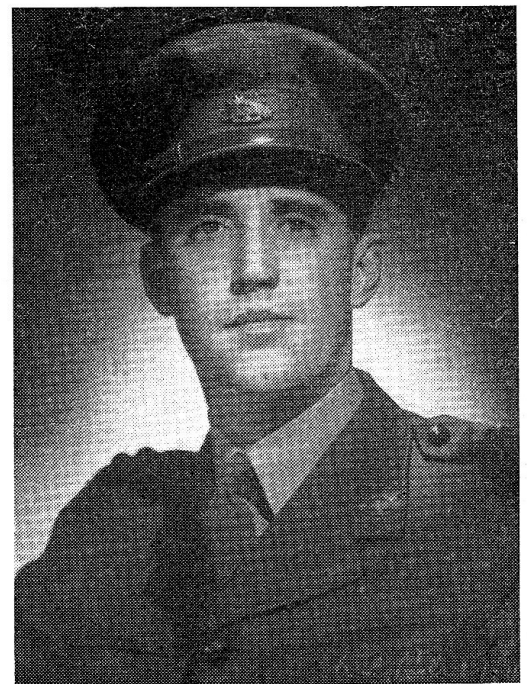
eration to keep the Union alive by solid support of its activities.

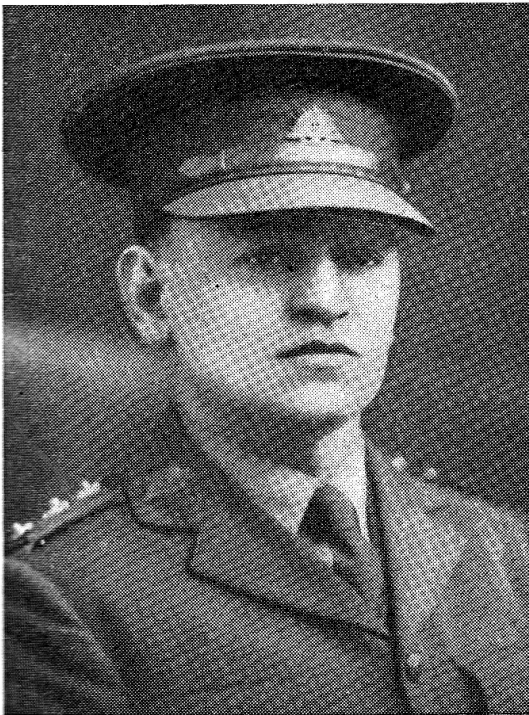

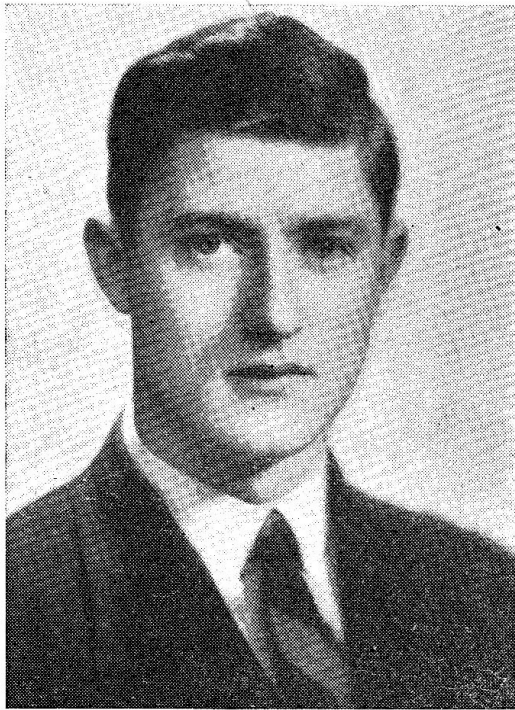

MURAL PAINTING AT UNIVERSITY

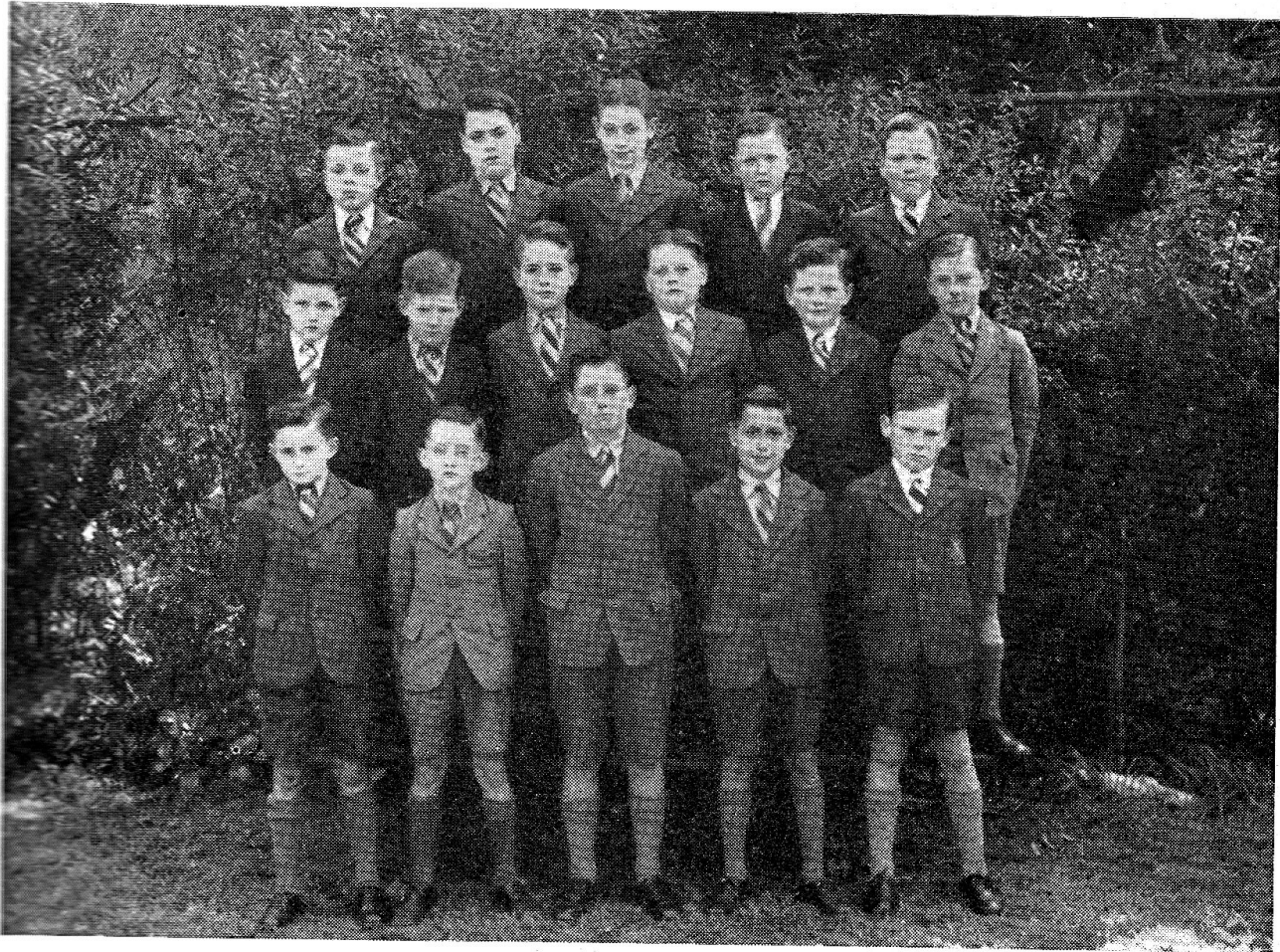
The following extract from "Sydney Morning Herald," Thursday, October 26, 1944, will be of interest to Old Boys:—

stantly recurring we know we have a nucleus.

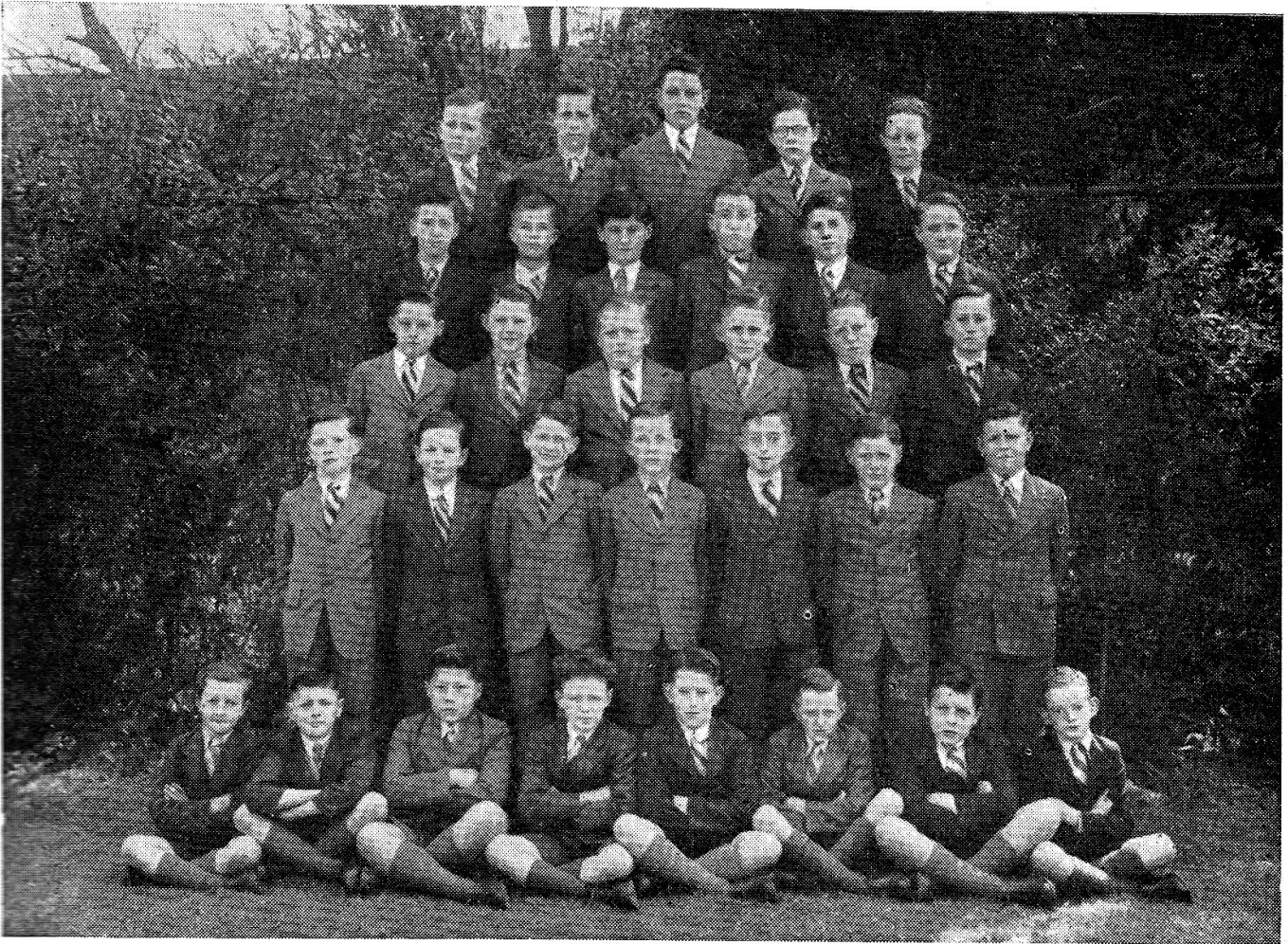

Federation of Old Boys' Unions

NEW MOVEMENT STARTED

It is beyond doubt that the great majority of boys who spend the most impressionable years of their lives at a school pass into adult life with a warm affection for their old school.

For many men the Old Boys' Union is a means of maintaining a definite link with the old school and with other men of all ages who have passed through the school. Unfortunately only a minority of ex-students become and remain active members of their respective Old Boys' Unions. Some Unions are flourishing and some are languishing and there may be some schools that have no Old Boys' Union at all.

Co-operation between all the Unions of Marist Brothers' Schools would be of immense mutual advantage and a definite means of strengthening individual Unions as well as unifying thought and action on matters that concern Catholic laymen in all walks of life.

Thoughts such as the above have stimulated some old boys of Marist Brothers' Schools to "do something about it" and the result has been the formation of a Marist Brothers' Old Boys' Federation.

At a meeting held on August 15, 1944, representatives of 11 schools decided to form a Federation and the first meeting of delegates was held on September 19, 1944. A provisional executive consisting of the President, T. A. Herbert (Darlinghurst); Vice-President, J. G. Stephenson (Kogarah) and Hon. Secretary, J. T. Byrne (Nth. Sydney) was appointed, and these officers together with Messrs. J. P. Vale (St. Joseph's College) and R. K. O'Sullivan (Randwick) were commissioned to prepare a draft constitution to submit to a general meeting of the Federation.

The Constitution is in draft form only

and is yet to be approved, but some inkling of the objects in view may give a clearer meaning of what the Federation stands for. Some of the proposed objects are:—To encourage the formation of an Old Boys' Union at each Marist Brothers' School in New South Wales; promote the regular exchange of ideas between affiliated Unions for their mutual benefit; present to affiliated Unions and stimulate their interest in the Catholic viewpoint on moral and social questions; receive from affiliated Unions recommendations for action by the Federation on matters too wide in scope for individual Unions; provide vocational advice and information on post-school studies to members of affiliated unions by means of a central bureau or otherwise; establish central club-rooms and maintain a journal of the Federation.

It should be emphasised that the Federation does not attempt to interfere with the complete autonomy of any Union but rather to give added strength to individual Unions. At the same time the Federation seeks to obtain the backing of every Union so that it may act on important matters delegated to it as the representative of a very large number of Catholic men in every walk of life. The Federation is non-political but in terms of its Constitution it will take all necessary steps to keep the Unions and their members informed on social questions, particularly those on which the Catholic Church has a point of view.

If every ex-student of a Marist Brothers' School were an active member of his Old Boys' Union and every Union were a member of this Federation then we would be a very powerful "public opinion" on all matters for the good of our schools and for the safeguarding of our Catholic heritage.

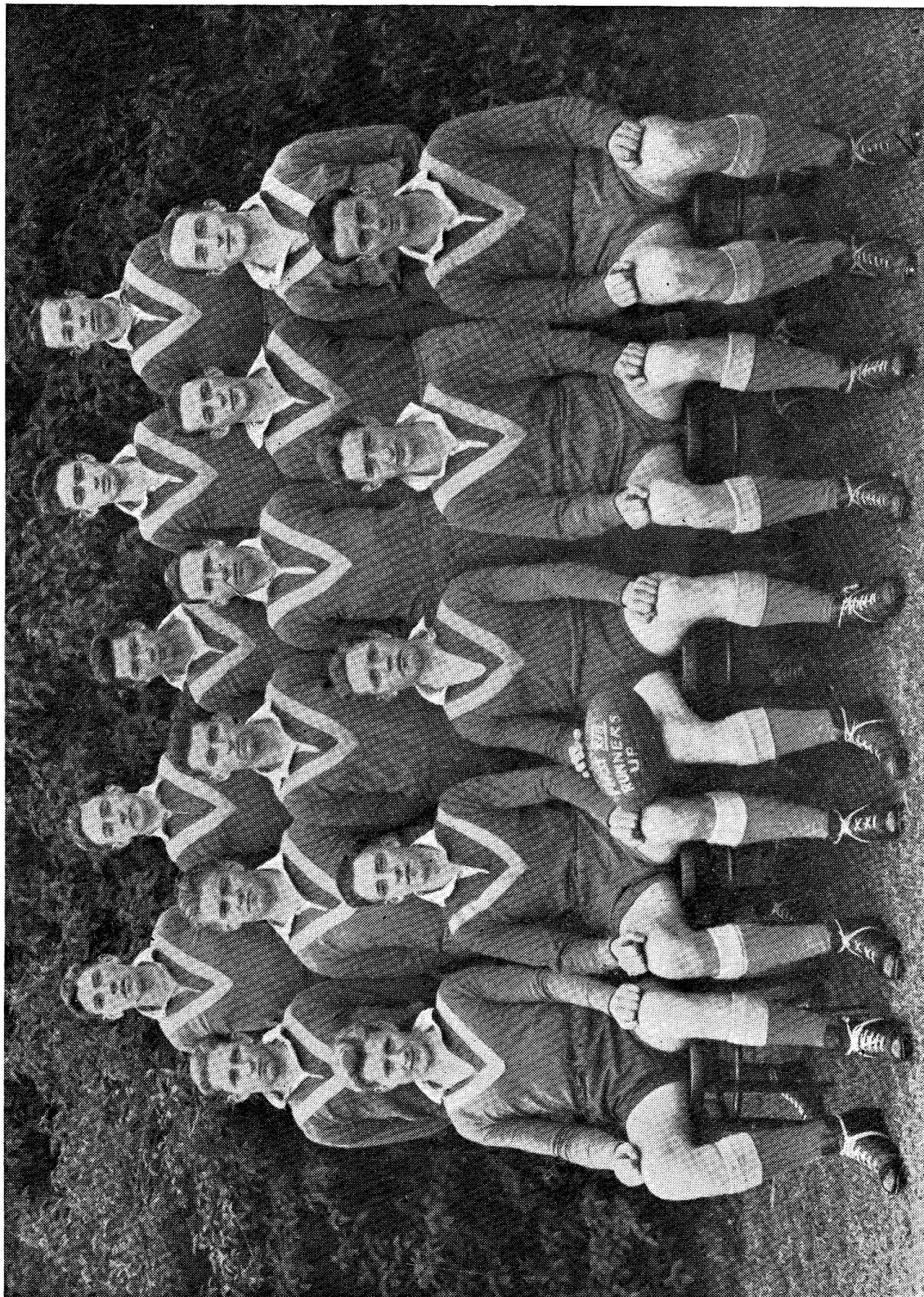
For several months the Brothers were privileged to have with them Chaplain Major Whelly of the U.S. Forces. Father

Credit is due to the Coach, Jack Arnold. Eastern Suburbs First Grader, whose long experience proved an asset to the side.

Peter Dignam, who won the N.S.W. R.F.L.'s Blazer for the best and fairest forward in the Premiers v. Combined game, was a tower of strength to the team and throughout the season gave his side a magnificent share of the ball. Besides this, Peter excelled in both the rucks and in the open.

The other front-rowers were Nev. Egan and Harold O'Neill, both non-stop 80-minute players, always determined on doing a good job in everything from "go to whoa." Besides this, they were a considerable help to hooker Dignam, in winning the ball from the set scrums.

"B" GRADE

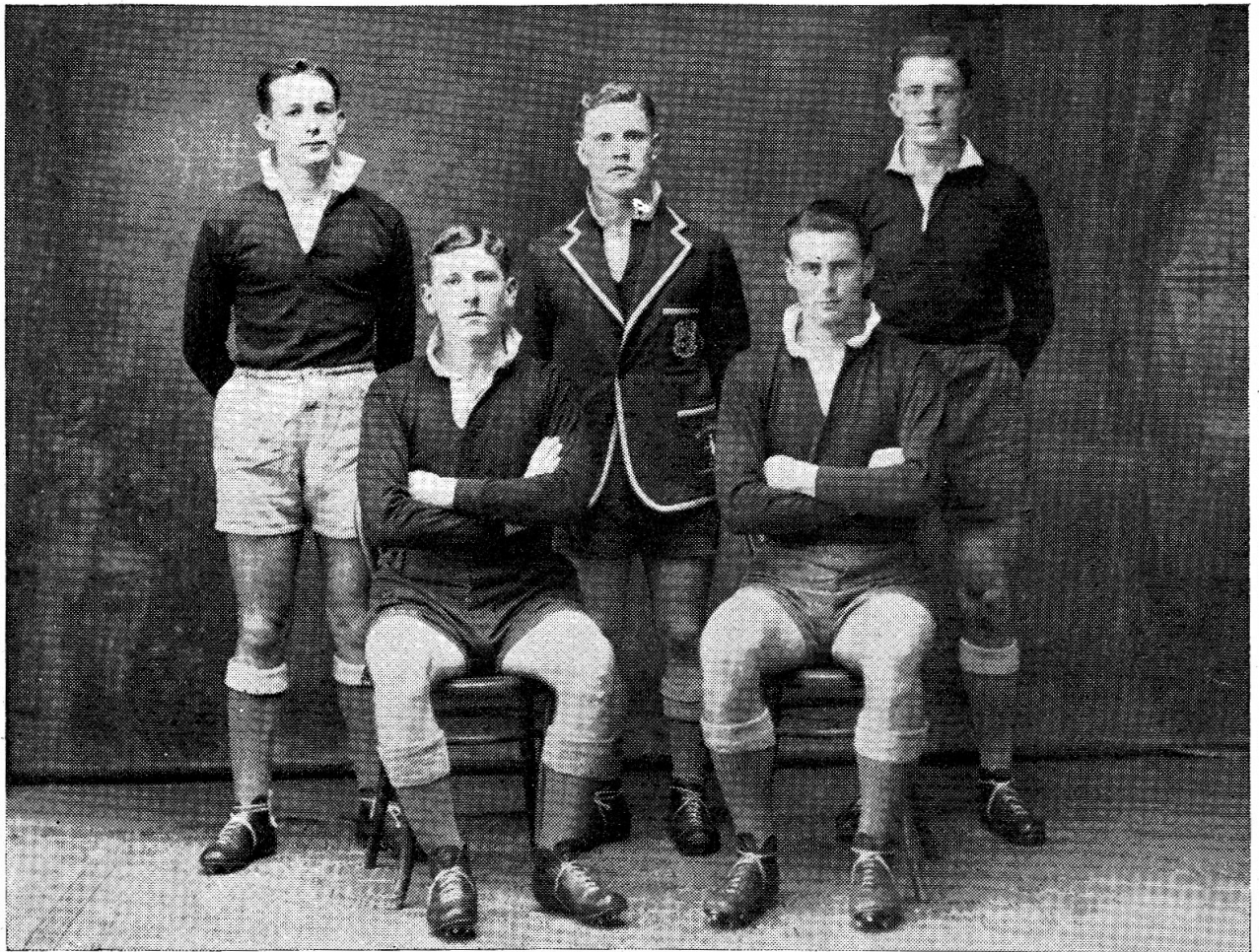
The "B's" failed to make the semis, not

John Clarke shaped well as a custodian, handling well and frequently saving with well-judged kicks.

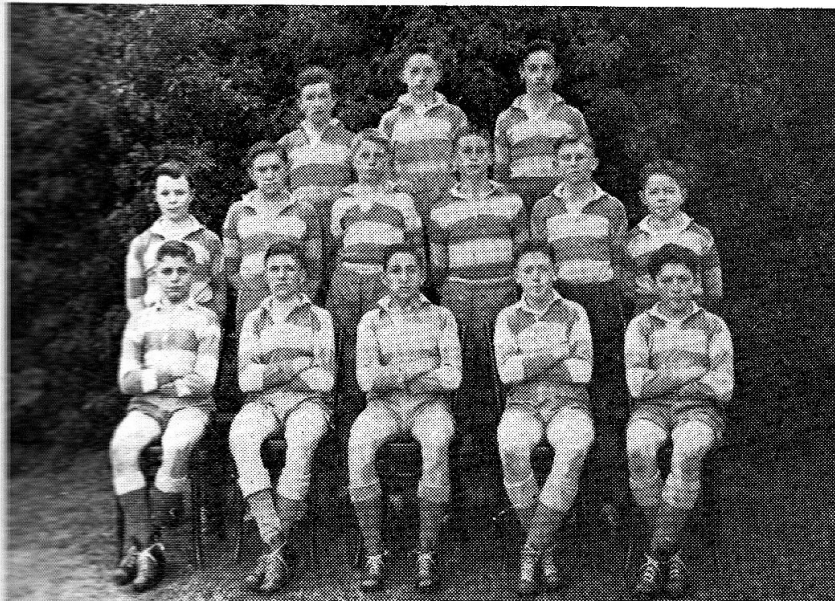
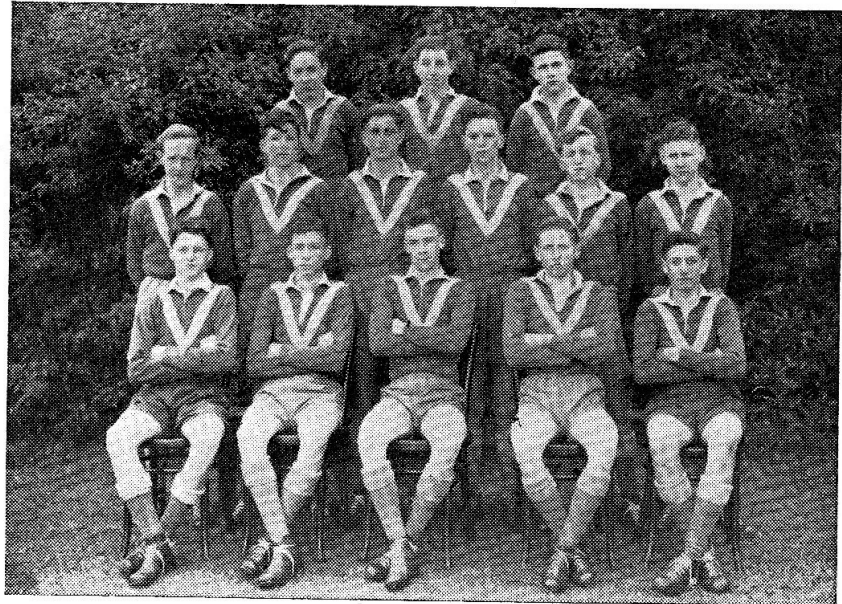

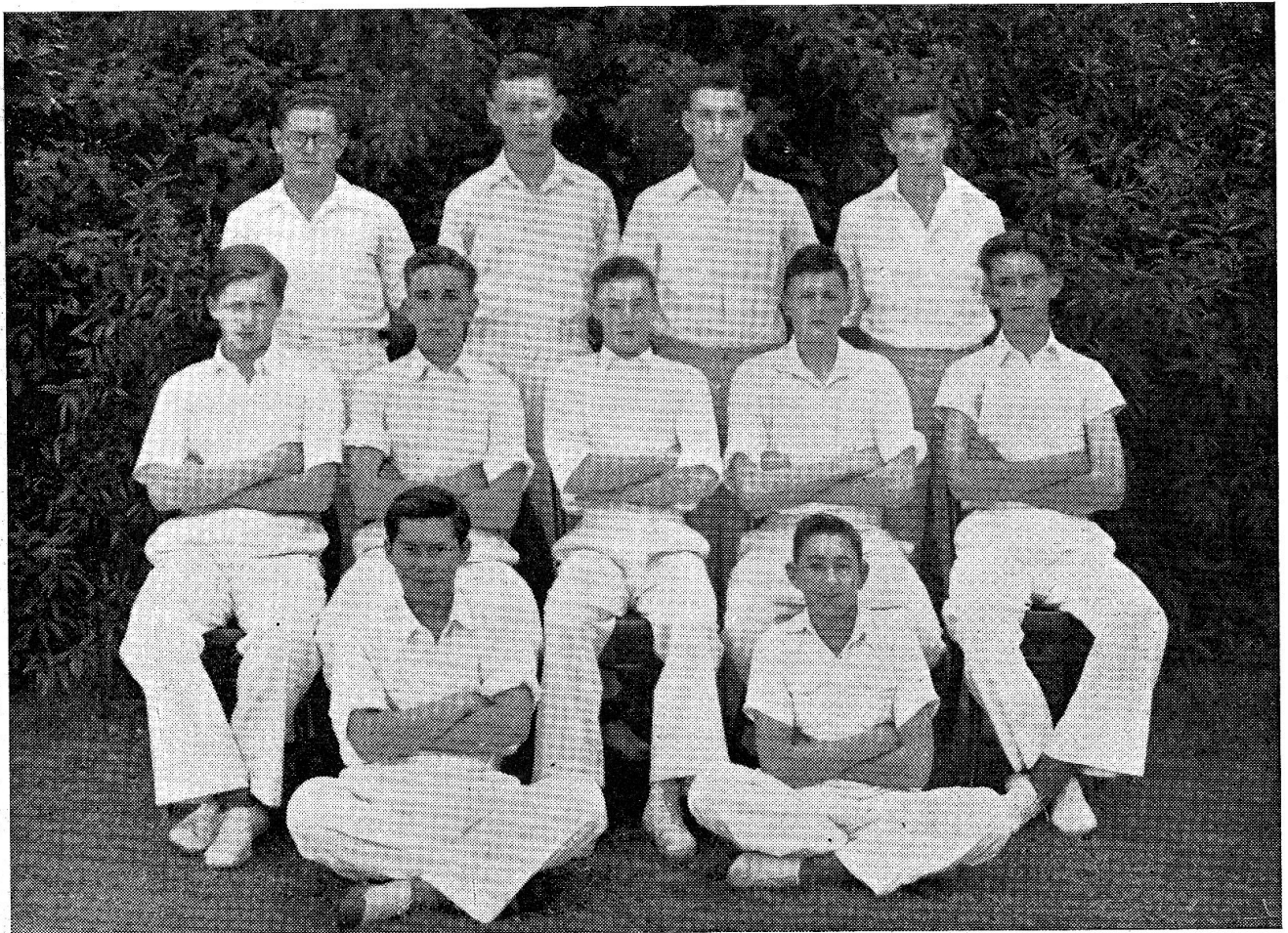

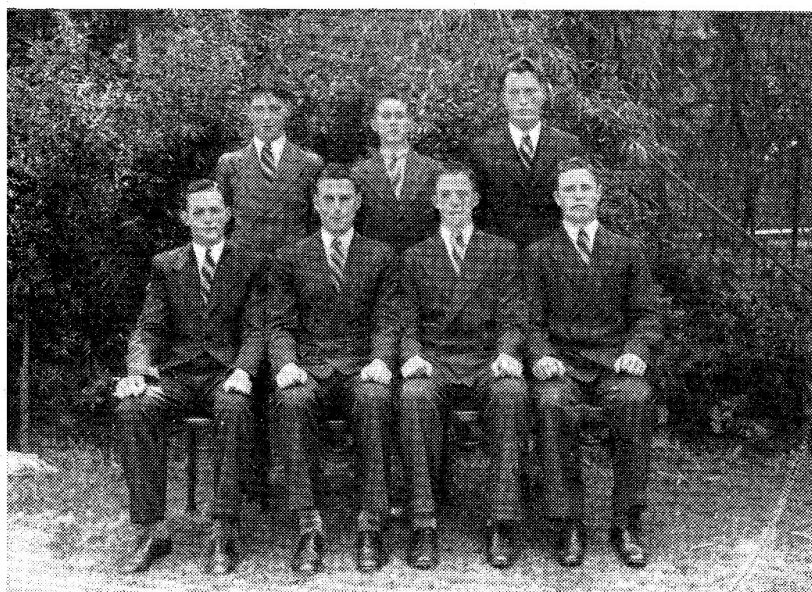
