# PROSPECTUS



Darlinghurst, at the corner of Liverpool and Darley Streets, overlooking City and Harbour. The locality is especially suitable for a scholastic establishment, as it provides that quietness so necessary for earnest study. Moreover, its position is exceptionally convenient to the tram, being only a very short walk from Taylor Square, while Bellevue Hill and Woollahra trams pass close to the School, and buses from Central pass in the next street.

The object of the Brothers is to give the pupils such a complete Christian education as will enable them to fulfil their duties as Catholics and citizens in after life. Boys of undesirable character are not retained at the School.

The pupils are prepared for the various Public Examinations:—Public Service, Clerical and Professional, for both State and Commonwealth; Bursary, Intermediate and Leaving Certificates, and Matriculation Examinations. The full Secondary Section is a five years' course, and includes English, French, Latin, Mathematics and Science. Practical Science is done in all the classes. **Technical Drawing** has now been added in Fourth Year, for boys who have begun their Technical Training and who desire to continue it to the Leaving Certificate standard with a view to commencing Diploma Courses.

#### Home Work-


Primary: No more than I hour.


# \*\* EDITORIAL





### VOCATIONS

May we again remind parents and boys. of the urgent need that there is of religious vocations? The demands upon our Congregation are many and heavy. New schools must be opened, existing schools maintained at full strength, and the work of Catholic education furthered by every available means. Darlinghurst has, during the years, supplied excellent candidates both for the priesthood and for the Congregation of the Marist Brothers; but the School has only two representatives at present in training for the Brothers, and, considering the importance of the School and its excellent reputation, more are needed. There are, we are very pleased to know, two or three very fine prospective candidates under consideration; and we earnestly request the prayers of all who have the welfare of the School at heart, that these boys may be enabled to attain their expressed desire to join our ranks, and that their number may be increased.

How can you help in this noble work? In one or more of several ways. First, there is the all-powerful aid of prayer. "Lord, we pray Thee, send labourers into Thy field, for the enemy ravages the harvest. Raise up men who will tend and garner it." These opening words of the Ven. Father Champagnat's "Prayer for Vocations" should become familiar to all true friends of the Brothers. Another valuable means of promoting vocations is encouragement and good advice given to those who manifest an attraction for the religious life. Parents and friends can do an enormous amount of good in this direction. Unfortunately, side by side with really wonderful courage and generosity shown by parents in freely offering their children to God, we often find a very different spirit—one in which the claims of the world are put first, with the result that good and promising vocations are endangered and sometimes completely lost. The specious argument is used that if a vocation is a genuine one it will not be lost. That is a damnable error. Equally false is the idea that a boy cannot have a genuine vocation if he is very young. But surely we cannot limit in that way God's action on souls!

A third means of helping vocations, for those blessed with this world's goods but without children to offer to God, is to supply money for the upkeep and training of boys who are preparing to become Brothers. This upkeep and training is a heavy burden on a Congregation's resources—a burden which they gladly shoulder in view of the supreme importance of the work. Any assistance to bear it is always most welcome; and those who supply such assistance will certainly draw down God's choicest blessings on themselves.

We are all pleased to hear good reports of his progress from both Priests and Brothers at the Seminary. In the last term examination he topped his class, many of his marks being near 100 per cent.

Brother Gerard, a former Director of Darlinghurst, has been Director of the Brothers at Springwood since they went there. On his staff are Brother Lambert, a former teacher at Darlinghurst, and Brother Salvius (Kevin Glass), an Old Boy of Darlinghurst.

# ANNUAL REPORT, 1947


Once again it falls to my lot to present an Annual Report on the religious, scholastic and sporting activities of the High School.

The year 1947 has been one of satisfactory though moderate success in some departments, of outstanding success in others. We have much reason also to be thankful to God for having brought us safely so far through material trials of which we cannot yet see the end. cannot conceal from ourselves, and I see no reason why I should try to conceal from you, our friends, that this oldestablished School is passing through a critical period which may affect its whole future. In saying this I do not wish to alarm you unduly, still less to cause any feeling of panic. The numerical strength of the School has indeed suffered a sharp decline; but with the great number of fully registered High Schools that have sprung up around us in the last few years, that was only to be expected, since our main supplies of pupils have thus been rather drastically cut off at their very source. Nevertheless, our accommodation space is still fairly well filled, and I think, moreover, that the downward trend of numbers has perhaps reached its limit. Reduced numbers, however, in these days of mounting costs. mean financial stringency, unless we make up our minds to increase fees and thus place a further burden on Catholic parents. This I am most unwilling to do; I prefer rather to make an appeal to all our Old Boys and friends to keep the claims of the old School in mind, and direct prospective students to us whenever possible. The School is as worthy as ever it was of the loyal support of its ex-students, and no boy who comes here determined to work hard at his books and do the best for the School will ever regret that he came.

A further source of anxiety during the past two years has been the shortage of Brothers. Our staff of Brothers has had to be reduced in consequence. We have had to employ secular teachers, and there seems no immediate prospect of a return to normal conditions. In this matter

again, Old Boys and friends can render most valuable service to the old School, by praying for, encouraging and assisting prospective candidates for the Congregation of the Marist Brothers, and by being on the look-out for suitable boys. Unfortunately, this is usually the very last thing most people think of, and yet it is a vital matter, for a School cannot be staffed unless there is a good supply of Brothers to draw from. To have staffed a School like this for nearly 40 years has been in itself a mighty task, and the Marist Brothers may reasonably expect in return that there will be boys coming forward to be trained to carry on the good work in future years.

Beginning now with the religious and moral tone of the School, I am happy to be able to say that during 1947 the conduct of the boys has been well up to the standard expected of them as members of a Catholic School. This is all the more pleasing because, as every seriousminded person knows, wrong principles




JOHN HALLINAN (University Exhibition).

and bad examples are so rife in the world about us, and our young people require more than ordinary courage to react against them. The various aspects of religious activity in the School have been kept up during the year, and have been fully entered into by the boys. There is no need for me to go into details about them here—they are familiar to all who know the normal life of a Catholic School. I should like to express once more, as I did last year, how grateful I am for the generous assistance rendered to us by visiting priests: Fathers J. Ferrari, J. Kennedy and J. Ross, of Elizabeth Bay; Father H. Law; Father J.

Golden, S.J.; Dr. P. J. Ryan, M.S.C.; and Father M. Scott, S.J., who conducted the Annual Retreat.

Passing on to the scholastic achievements of the School, I have to report that 25 boys passed the Leaving Certificate Examination, 1946. With the exception of John Hallinan's pass (5 A's and one B, with First Class Honours in Mathematics), there was nothing particularly spectacular about our results. Three boys, however—J. Brassil, J. Hallinan and P. Murray—obtained First Class Honours in Mathematics, which were not plentiful anywhere, and B. Driscoll obtained Second Class Honours. The most




T. Ryman (Loyola), J. Wright (Bellarmine), M. Trainor (Aquinas), W. Kirwin (Xavier).

meritorious pass after J. Hallinan's was that of P. Murray (4 A's and one B, with First Class Honours in Mathematics).

In the Intermediate Examination, 1946, eighteen boys passed. Judging by In-Tests (as the Department examines only three subjects externally, and awards only simple passes), the best pass was that of B. McMaugh, who passed in all seven subjects, with no percentage lower than 74. He was awarded an Intermediate State Bursary, as was also B. Wilkinson (seven subjects). Others who passed in seven subjects were E. Hynes and F. O'Connor.

I would like to reiterate what I said here last year on the subjects of home study and of the complete curriculum from First Year to Intermediate. While realising the difficulties of quiet study

under modern housing conditionscramped quarters and noise all around— I must insist on the supreme importance of earnest individual study outside class, and on the duty of parents to make every possible provision for it and see that it is carried out. Too many boys this year gave no indications of having so much as opened a book outside class. On the question of curriculum in First, Second and Third Years, my policy remains unchanged: I want every boy, whatever his particular abilities or likes or dislikes, to study the full balanced course of languages, mathematics and sciences. As I said last year: "I want to see all our boys taking an interest in all their subjects; all the better for their character training and their mental training if they stick at a subject in spite of diffi-


culties and dislikes." I must add that I share the uneasiness already voiced this year by members of the Catholic Secondary Teachers' Association at the increasing neglect of Latin in Secondary Schools, including Catholic Schools. It has always been my conviction that, in a Catholic School at least, Latin ought to be the last subject to be dropped, not only as representative of that liberal culture which is becoming more and more despised by a purely materialistic world, but also on account of the intimate part it has played and still plays (as her official language) in the history, doctrine and liturgy of the Church. The influence of this widespread neglect on the development of vocations to the priesthood also needs to be emphasised.

Finally, I would once again urge all parents to make every effort, even at the cost of great sacrifices, to keep their boys at school for the full five-year course. The extra two years are well worth the sacrifice, for during them a boy's expanding intellectual activity is just at the stage when he can profit most from what he is learning and make it a permanent possession.

In the realm of sport, 1947 has been a year of remarkable success for the School—indeed it must rank high on the School's sporting records, and this despite the decreased number of boys on the Roll. A brief summary, without comment, will make this abundantly clear.

Football:—Premiers, A and B grades, Metropolitan Catholic Colleges. Champions, A grade, All Schools' League Carnival.

Cricket:—Premiers, A grade, Metropolitan Catholic Colleges. Runners-up in B grade, and for the Aggregate Shield.



Another department of School activity, all the more meritorious for being purely voluntary, must not be overlooked in this Report: the Senior Cadet Detachment. Under the capable direction of the O.C., Brother Alexius, it has a very successful year's work to its credit: weekly drills and instructions, a period in annual camp at Ingleburn, and an

annual field day at Glenfield. It is good to see the interest all ranks take in their work. I highly commend the spirit of these young soldiers, and hope their numbers will be still greater next year.

With this brief summary I bring to a close my Report for 1947. It is a particular pleasure for me to place on record my gratitude to all who have helped me in the onerous task of guiding the School through one more year: the Brothers and other teachers of the staff—Brothers Alexius, Chanel, Cassian, Jude and Michael, with Mr. J. J. Dennehy, Mr. J. Gallagher and Mr. J. Radford; the parents of the boys; the Ladies' Committee; the Old Boys' Union and Club; and many other individual benefactors. I wish them, and all our pupils, Old Boys, friends and benefactors, a very Happy Christmas and New Year.

Sodality of the Blessed Virgin






The Annual Retreat





### THE MISSIONS

In the cemetery attached to the Provincial House of the Marist Brothers at Mittagong, a marble slab was erected during the year, with the following inscription:

Sacred to the memory of
Brother John William Roberts,
Brother Augustinus Mannes,
Brother Donatus Joseph Fitzgerald,
who lost their lives in the performance of
duty during the Japanese invasion of the
North Solomons, 20th August, 1942.
R. I. P.

Any hope we had of the survival of these Brothers was fading fast as the months passed by; finally the announcement was made officially after careful enquiries by the Australian Government, that the Brothers must be presumed dead, probably drowned at sea when the Japanese prison ship on which they were travelling was sunk. We must continue to pray for them, although we are confident that they are now enjoying the reward of a life given in the cause of the Catholic Missions.

We recorded in the last issue of "Blue and Blue" that Brothers Ephrem and Ervan had returned to the Solomons in March, 1946, to start again their work which had been destroyed by the war. This year we are again happy to record that two more Brothers have undertaken this most apostolic work. Brother

Borgia (who had been Director of our College at Cairns, Queensland) and Brother Simeon (from the staff of St. Benedict's Technical School, Sydney) left by plane for the Solomons in Oc-We publish a photo of the four Brothers now in the Solomons. Much hard work must be done by them before the school for the native boys is on a sound footing. It was difficult before the war; it is even more difficult now. Through contact with soldiers during the war, some of the natives have been induced to join a Communist-inspired Nationalist movement, "Marching Law," and this Communist influence is threatening to interfere with religious liberty. Prayer for the work is urgently asked.

It is necessary that the school be selfsupporting. This means Brothers have to grow the food for themselves and the natives who attend the

school. At present a very large portion of the Brothers' time is spent in farming. Fortunately they are not without considerable mechanised aid. Nevertheless, they anxiously await the arrival of each boat from Sydney. Very large shipments of groceries have been made from our Sydney schools during the year, and the Darlinghurst boys have been second to none in generosity in contributing goods for the Missions. At least £25 worth of groceries have been sent by the boys of the School to the Brothers in the Solomons this year. Letters from some of the boys attending the school in the Solomons have indicated how gratefully our contributions have been received. We can assure the Brothers and boys in Guadalcanal that there will be no slackening in our assistance to them, by prayers and donations, during the coming years.

#### THE LADIES' COMMITTEE

Once again we have great pleasure in placing on record our appreciation of the work of these devoted ladies. At their monthly meetings, held at 2 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month, the dominant impression one received was of perfect harmony, good spirit, cheerfulness—and always something of practical value accomplished or arranged for by the time the meeting ended at 4 o'clock with a refreshing cup of tea! Fleming (President), Mrs. Hartcher (Secretary) and Mrs. Dignam (Treasurer) again guided the destinies of the Committee during 1947.

The monthly dances in the School Hall were continued until September, but were unfortunately not so successful as had been anticipated. It is hoped, however, to revive them in 1948 with more success.

At the Annual Athletic Meeting at Rushcutter's Bay Oval on September 26th, members of the Committee undertook the task of supplying lunch and other refreshments to the boys and the All were delighted with the result of their efforts. Nothing could have been more pleasant or more satisfying.

The culmination of the Committee's labours was, of course, the Féte, held in the School Hall during the afternoon and the evening of Wednesday, October 22nd, and closing at 11.15 p.m. It was an outstanding success, of substantial financial assistance to the Brothers. The ladies excelled themselves on this occasion: the lunches and refreshments they supplied were of first-class quality and the stalls did a very brisk trade. The various games of skill (to say nothing of chance) attracted enthusiastic crowds. forts of the ladies to make the Fête a success were well seconded by the members of the four School Houses, whose friendly rivalry resulted in generous contributions of groceries and other goods for sale at the stalls. Nor must we forget the yeoman service performed by the Old Boys, Messrs. Ryan, Dignam and Phillips. The first two showed remarkable skill as auctioneers; the third performed a quieter but equally efficient service as a game director.

Many thanks to the parents and friends who came in such numbers during the evening, and thus contributed to the happiness as well as to the financial success of the Fête.

We would like to add, in conclusion,

that the Ladies' Committee will welcome with open arms any new members mothers or relatives of present and past pupils, or any friends interested in the welfare of the Brothers and the School. The first meeting of the New Year will be held at the School at 2 pm on Thursday, February 12th, 1948.

Two outside practice debates were held





### Darlinghurst v. Randwick. Lost on first innings.


Randwick batted first and made 176; E. Hynes 5-76.





We again this year record our thanks to the Managers of the Savoy Theatre, who invited our winning football teams




## PRESENTATION OF CARNIVAL TROPHIES



The Senior Challenge Cup was won by D. Ferguson, who annexed practically all Senior events, though still only a Junior.





#### Athletic Meeting



## THE OLD BOYS' UNION

At the General Meeting, held after the Annual Communion and Breakfast at St. Mary's early in the year, the energetic President of 1946, Mr. Tom Timmins, was re-elected for 1947, with W. Wall as Secretary, J. Davies Assistant Secretary and T. Murphy Treasurer. About 90 members had been present for the Communion. His Eminence the Cardinal addressed them afterwards in the Chapter Hall on the importance of the part played by Catholic Schools in Education. He paid a tribute to Darlinghurst's fine record of achievements and stressed the importance of loyalty to one's old school, "a quality for which Darlinghurst has always been famous."

The incoming committee was directed by the General Meeting to launch an appeal, on the lines of the Air Raid Shelter Appeal, for funds to modernise the School, to endeavour to provide it with class libraries, and to begin publication of a monthly digest concerning the activities of the School and the associated bodies

The last-mentioned aim has been at-

tained by the appearance of the monthly "Darlo Digest," founded and edited by Committeeman Jim Ryan. The other two aims have not so far been attained, but plans are well in hand to provide sorely needed financial assistance to the Brothers. Chief of them is the Ten-year Building Plan, of which some details were given in the "Darlo Digest" for August, and of which full details will eventually be sent to every Old Boy that the Union can reach. Briefly, it is a scheme by which endowment policies for 10 years are effected with the Australasian Catholic Assurance Co., and are transferred to the Brothers, the quarterly premiums being paid by the Old Boys concerned. The policies are for one or more units of £25 each, the quarterly premium for each unit being 12/9.

The social highlight of the year for the Union was, of course, the Blue and Blue Ball, held at the State Ballroom on May 3rd. It was a great success, and, if anything, even better than pre-war standards.

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
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
