THE SCHOOL, a lofty and well-built edifice, with spacious classrooms, is situated on the heights of Darlinghurst, at the corner of Liverpool and Darley Streets, overlooking City and Harbour.

It is convenient to trams and buses from the City, the Quay, Bellevue Hill, Woollahra, Maroubra, Malabar and Matraville, Mascot, Elizabeth Bay, Watson's Bay, etc.


The School is non-parochial. It accepts pupils from anywhere within the Metropolitan Area. Boys of undesirable character are not allowed to remain at the School.

The pupils are prepared for Intermediate, Leaving Certificate, and Matriculation examinations. Courses lead to the various University faculties, the Public Service, and Diploma Courses at a Technical College.

The curriculum includes a systematic study of the Catholic Religion, English, Latin, French, Mathematics, Mechanics, Physics, Chemistry, Technical Drawing, History, Geography. Under the guidance of the Brothers the pupil makes a selection from these subjects.



EDITORIAL


Nineteen hundred and fifty-one has been the Jubilee Year of the Australian Commonwealth. In surveying with pride our national development during the fifty years since the inauguration of the Commonwealth in 1901, we think, too, of the indispensable work for the nation which has been done in that period by our Catholic schools. As part of the Catholic Education system, the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst, has, year by year since 1875, sent forth young men to play their part—a glorious part—as Catholic gentlemen in the building of our nation. May we claim to have done our part in fulfilling the hopes of 1901?

Speaking at the distribution of prizes for our school on December 16, 1901, His Eminence Cardinal Moran said:

"A great foundation has been laid in the century just closed for religious education, not only in New South Wales, but throughout the Commonwealth. The Australian people have shown a heroism of devotion in that cause which I think cannot be surpassed by any Church in Christendom. Their devotion to religious education is to be seen in the schools spread over the length and breadth of the land, in the various religious communities whose whole life is given up to forming to piety the hearts and minds of the children committed to their care. But we must not look only to the past; we are to look more eagerly to the future. 'Progress' is our watchword. We must make every success of the past a stepping stone to future development. The new century will see a marvellous development in Catholic schools. I hope that those opposed to Catholic education will at length recognise that our schools are destined to impart that enlightenment which Christian education alone can give, and without which civilisation would be an empty name."

After fifty years, His Eminence's words are even more applicable. The great work goes on, and this magazine records the results of another year in the School's history.



On April 14, the Parents and Friends' Association entertained Brother Edmundus at a function in the School Hall and made a presentation to him as a mark of their gratitude and esteem.

The High School owes a great debt of gratitude to Brother Edmundus. One of the most obvious signs of his effective work here was the increase in numbers—there were almost twice as many boys here at the end of his term as there were at the beginning of it. A splendid tone amongst the boys was maintained during his term of office. Brother's ability and success as Headmaster were evident to all observers; but few outside the Community perhaps realised how intensely Brother worked.

Praise of Brother's qualities as a religious, as a scholar, as a teacher, and as a headmaster, would inevitably prove both inadequate to the reader and distasteful to Brother himself.

NEWLY ORDAINED PRIESTS

Three former pupils of the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst, were ordained to the Priesthood during 1951, and three also received the Habit of the Marist Brothers at the Novitiate at Mittagong.

On Thursday, January 4, Rev. Denis Sheridan, S.J., was ordained to the priesthood at St. Mary's Church, North Sydney, by His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy.

Father Sheridan is the son of the late Mr. D. Sheridan and Mrs. F. Sheridan of Lane Cove. He was educated at the Loreto Convent, Kirribilli, at St. Joseph' College, Hunter's Hill, and at the Maris Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst After leaving school he attended the University of Sydney, graduating in Economics. He was an active member of the Campion and Newman Societies

As a scholastic he taught for a short time at the Xavier Preparatory School, Burke Hall, for one year at St. Patrick's College, East Melbourne, and for two years at St. Louis' School, Perth.

Father Sheridan returned to his former school for the Old Boys' Reunion and Communion Breakfast on Sunday, March 4. Father was the Celebrant of the Mass on that occasion, and preached an excellent sermon to the Old Boys during the Mass. At the subsequent Communion Breakfast, the congratulations of the Brothers and the School were extended to Father Sheridan by the Brother Director, Brother Michael, who also expressed the wish for a long and fruitful apostolate for the young priest, and assured him of the support of their prayers. The President of the Old Boys'

Union, Mr. Syd. Cusack, spoke in a a similar strain on behalf of the Old Boys' Union.

Father Sheridan again obliged us on June 1, the Feast of the Sacred Heart, when he visited the school and gave a special instruction at the meeting of the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

On Saturday, July 21, two more names were added to the long list of Darlinghurst Old Boy Priests, when His Eminence ordained to the Priesthood at St. Mary's Cathedral Rev. Paul Cahill and Rev. Ronald Harden. Many former classmates of the two young priests, and several Brothers who had taught them at Darlinghurst, were present in the Cathedral, and received their blessings.

Wednesday, July 25, was a memorable day for the boys at the High School,

when Father Cahill and Father Harden returned to their Alma Mater. High Mass "to invoke God's blessing on the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst," was celebrated in the Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst, at 9 a.m. The full school and many Old Boys and parents were present.

Father Cahill was Celebrant Father Harden Deacon. The Sub-deacon and Master of Ceremonies were Father Basil Rosen and Father Vincent Marley, two recently ordained Old Boys of the The Parish Priest, Very Rev. School. Mgr. T. O. Wallace, who was so very helpful in arranging the High Mass, presided in the sanctuary. Rev. Fr. J. Weaver and Rev. Fr. E. Barrett were also present. The choir included Marist Brothers from Darlinghurst and neighbouring communities. A classmate of the young priests, Rev. Brother James Cox, S.M., from Toongabbie, assisted in the choir.

The singing of the newly ordained priests and of the choir was warmly commended afterwards by many members of the congregation. Father Harden especially is in his element with ecclesiastical music; he has been the conductor of the Manly Seminary choir during the year for the Holy Week ceremonies and on other occasions.

After the High Mass, Father Cahill and Father Harden were given a welcome in the School Hall. Mr. and Mrs. Harden and Mrs. Cahill, and other relatives and friends of the young priests were present. Brother Michael expressed the pride felt by the School at the ordination of ex-students to the priesthood. All rejoiced that two more Old Boys had accepted the call to the sacred work of the priesthood; it was the fervent wish of all present that Father Cahill and Father Harden would spend long and fruitful lives in the fulfilment of their apostolate. John Vickery, the President of the Sodality in the school, in a fine speech, very adequately expressed the congratulations and good wishes of the

present boys. A presentation of copies of Fortescue's Roman Ritual was made to each priest. Souvenir ordination cards were distributed amongst the boys by the newly ordained, who also imparted their priestly blessing to each boy individually.

Rev. Fr. Paul Francis Cahill is the youngest son of Mrs. A. C. Cahill and the late J. H. Cahill, of Redfern. He is a brother of the late Brother Remigius, of the Marist Brothers. He received his early education from the Sisters of St. Joseph at Rockdale, whence he passed to M.B.H.S., Darlinghurst. In 1942, he entered the Minor Seminary at Springwood.



KNIGHTHOOD FOR EX-STUDENT



THE HON. SIR EDWARD McTIERNAN, K.B.E.
Justice of the High Court of Australia.

Sir Edward Aloysius McTiernan, Justice of the High Court of Australia, whose mighthood was announced in the 1951 New Year's Honors List, received his secondary education at the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst, and as always been outstanding for his loyalty to his old School.

We congratulate Sir Edward McTieran on the distinction he has been ranted. It is evidence of the esteem in which he is held in this country. For many years he has filled important positions in the parliamentary and legal life the Commonwealth. It is with particular pride that the "Blue and Blue" reords this distinction, and extends again a Sir Edward the sincere congratulations the Brothers and students, present and past of his old School. We appreciate much his thoughtfulness in visiting a several occasions this year.

After completing his secondary studies at Darlinghurst in 1909, Sir Edward entered the Faculty of Arts at Sydney University, becoming an evening student. He joined the Commonwealth Public Service. Soon after graduating in Arts he resigned from the Commonwealth Public Service in order to proceed with his studies in the Faculty of Law. He gained the degree of LL.B. with First Class Honours. Copies of the "Blue and Blue" of those years contain references to his success at the University and his participation in Catholic activities.

He obtained practical experience of the law in some of the leading legal firms in the city, and was appointed Associate to Mr. Justice Rich of the High Court of Australia. He was admitted to the Bar of New South Wales, and practised as a barrister before being elected to the New South Wales Parliament in 1920 for

the constituency of Western Suburbs. He was given Cabinet rank in the Government of the late Mr. John Storey in 1920, as Attorney-General and Minister of Justice. At the time he was the youngest man ever to have held these offices, and the manner in which he carried out his duties soon broke down the prejudice of critics who regarded youthfulness as incompatible with ability.

He was re-elected to Parliament in 1922 and 1925; he was Attorney-General in the Lang Government from 1925 to 1927. He was sent on a diplomatic mission to Europe and America in 1926, and for a period represented the N.S.W. Government in London as Agent-General following the death of Sir Timothy Coghlan.

Resigning from the State Parliament in 1927, Sir Edward resumed practice at the Bar and became a Challis Lecturer in Law at Sydney University Law School. He was elected to the House of Representatives as Member for Parkes in 1928.

In 1930 he was appointed a Justice of the High Court of Australia. His work as a High Court Judge for the last 20 years is well known.

When the Old Boys' Union was reorganised in 1911-12, Sir Edward was a foundation member, and each year afterwards found him filling some post on the Executive, and being very regular in his attendance at Old Boys' functions. On many such occasions did he speak with warm appreciation of the Marist Brothers and their work. For several years he was President of the Old Boys' Union.

In such an active public life, Sir Edward still found time to show his interest in his old School and the Old Boys' Union. There was scarcely an annual Speech Night at which he did not appear on the platform. It was he who on a memorable occasion in 1919 proposed the vote of thanks to Archbishop Mannix, who had that year presided at the Prize-giving.

Sir Edward was the first President of the Newman Society at Sydney University. For many years he had been secretary of Lewisham Hospital, and his work for the Church was recognized in 1929 when he was honoured by His Holiness Pope Pius XI with the Papal decoration of Privy Chamberlain.

In 1936 he delivered a paper—Christian Tradition in Education—at the Catholic Educational Conference in Adelaide.

His outstanding work has been recognized and rewarded by a Knighthood. May his example be an incentive to the present boys of this school to do their part also in the work of their Church and their Country.




UNIVERSITY MEDALLIST

Those who knew John Hallinan during his Secondary School course at Darlinghurst from 1942 to 1946, expected that his University course would be a brilliant one, and their hopes have been amply justified. The award of a University Medal to him is an official indication of the outstanding nature of his talents and ability. The congratulations of the Brothers and boys of his old School are extended to him through the pages of the "Blue and Blue."

John is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Hallinan, of 65 Dunmore St., Bexley. His secondary education at the Marist Brothers High School, Darlinghurst, concluded with a splendid pass in the Leaving Certificate in 1946, and the winning of an Exhibition.

He entered the Faculty of Science and shone particularly in Mathematics and Geology. Every year of his four-year course saw him at the top of the list in Geology, and on each occasion he won the special award for that subject. He graduated at the beginning of this year as Bachelor of Science with First Class Honours in Geology, being placed first on the Honours list. He was awarded the University Medal for Geology and the Deas Thompson Scholarship for Geology.

John's name was frequently mentioned as the likely Rhodes Scholar for N.S.W. for 1951. Although this honour did not come his way, he was one of the final five from whom the successful applicant was chosen.




JOHN HALLINAN, B.Sc. (Hons.).

John is now a Teaching Fellow in the Geology Department of the University of Sydney, and has begun a three years' course leading to a Ph.D. degree. His research work is on reaction between igneous rocks and limestone north of Tamworth, and his field trips often bring him to that area of the State.

John keeps fresh his happy memories of the Brothers and the School. "From the Brothers at Darlinghurst," he writes, "I learnt the joys of study, and any success is due largely to the training at the old School."

We feel confident that there are great triumphs ahead for John in the academic world, and we wish him every success in his work.

Commonwealth Jubilee Celebrations

The Catholic contribution to Jubilee celebrations was magnificent. It exceeded the dreams of the most optimistic, and opened the eyes, not only of many of but even non-Catholics, Catholics, to the extent of the Church's work, particularly in the schools. Of the many memorable items, two stand out very vividly-the March of the Children from Catholic Schools through the streets on Thursday, April 19th, and the concluding ceremonies at the Showgrounds on Sunday night, April 22nd.

Our celebrations began on Wednesday, April 18th, with the Flag Ceremony. High Mass was celebrated in the Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst, by Monsignor T. O. Wallace, P.P. The Australian Flags presented by the Common-


wealth Government were blessed, and the Cadets formed a Guard of Honour at the Sanctuary. His Grace, Archbishop McKeefry, of Wellington, N.Z., preached on the significance of the Flag. Their Lordships, Bishop Liston, of Auckland, and Bishop Kavanagh, of Dunedin, were present in the Sanctuary. After the Mass the Cadet Corps, accompanied by their band, marched to the school grounds where the breaking of the flag took place.

We were privileged to have with us on this occasion Brigadier F. Hinton, M.C., E.D., a distinguished ex-student of the School. He inspected the Cadet Unit and, after a fine speech to them, presented the Jubilee medals.

Another ex-student, Rev. Fr. E. Paine, was on the dais, representing the Parish Priest, Mgr. Wallace, who was unable to attend. The President and Treasurer of the Old Boys' Union, Mr. S. Cusack and Mr. G. McCarthy, were also present.

We cannot here adequately describe the March of about 20,000 Catholic children on April 19th. It was a triumph of organisation and a glorious spectacle. After careful preparation, the boys of M.B.H.S.D. acquitted themselves splendidly. His Excellency the Gov-Lieutenant - General Northcott, took the salute from a raised Macquarie Street. in Eminence Cardinal Gilroy, His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate, and Archbishop Masterson, of Birmingham, were with the Governor on the dais. On the balcony of Parliament House, behind the dais, forty Archbishops and Bishops were accommodated. The procession, led by Mounted Police, took an hour to pass the







saluting base. Both boys and girls marched with splendid precision, and the bearing and the neat uniforms of all schools brought loud applause. side of the Cenotaph and saluting. All this was done with excellent precision. A temporary downpour caught some of the girls' contingents at the rear of the procession, but was not sufficient to interfere seriously with the march nor to spoil the general effect.


The members of the Sodality are most grateful to Rev. Father Buist, C.S.S.R., for his excellent lectures and advice given in the course of the annual retreat.

As much of the success of the percussion section depends on the Bass Drummer, Cdt. Thornton is to be congratulated on the capable manner in which he bore this heavy burden.


APPRECIATION




