# **PROSPECTUS**

HE SCHOOL, a lofty and well-built edifice, with spacious classrooms, is situated on the heights of Darlinghurst, at the corner of Liverpool and Darley Streets, overlooking City and Harbour.

It is convenient to trams and buses from the City, the Quay, Bellevue Hill, Woollahra, Maroubra, Malabar and Matraville, Mascot, Elizabeth Bay, Watson's Bay, etc.

The School is non-parochial. It accepts pupils from anywhere within the Metropolitan area. Boys of undesirable character are not allowed to remain at the School.

The pupils are prepared for Intermediate, Leaving Certificate, and Matriculation examinations. Courses lead to the various University faculties, the Public Service, and Diploma Courses at a Technical College.

The curriculum includes a systematic study of the Catholic Religion, English, Latin, French, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Descriptive Geometry and Drawing, Modern and Ancient History, Geography. Under the guidance of the Brothers the pupil makes a selection from these subjects.

#### School Uniform:

The School suit is dark grey with monogram on pocket; grey shirt; grey socks to match with blue and blue tops; School tie. Steel-grey felt hat with hat-band; School cap to be worn by pupils in the Primary Classes.

These include cricket, football, swimming and athletics. All are expected to take part.

#### Cadet Corps:

All boys over the age of 14 are eligible for membership. All Senior Boys are urged to join, although membership is voluntary. Parade each week. Annual camp.


#### Telephone:



### SENIOR CADET UNIT

No account of the Cadet Unit for 1954 would be complete without a tribute to the memory of Rev. Brother Norbert, whose death occurred during the year. Our Cadet Unit, and indeed the Cadet movement in general in schools, owe much to Brother Norbert. In recent years he had accompanied our boys into camp, and had endeared himself to all by the care and thoughtfulness he showed in helping every boy His interest in the Cadet movement never flagged, and his knowledge of military matters and his unbounded enthusiasm made him invaluable. He personified those soldierly qualities of manliness, courage, loyalty and cooperation which he strove to inculcate in his cadets. May he rest in peace.

Our Unit can report a very successful year's work. A general improvement in all departments of the Unit's work has been noticed. A feature of the year has been the enthusiasm of all cadets, and the interest they have shown in their training, and willingness with which they co-operated in every move to improve the Unit. This reflects credit on the O.C. of the Unit, Rev. Brother Venard, and on his Adjutant, Cadet Under-Officer Adrian Nesbitt and the Company Sergeant - Major, W.O.II. Ronald Antoine.






Edmundus for preparing such a stimulating address.

### **OBITUARY**

#### REV. BROTHER NORBERT, B.A.

Brother Norbert died on the 18th August this year in the 62nd year of his age. His death took place at the Marist Brothers' Monastery at Eastwood, where Brother Norbert had been stationed for the past few years. The crowded congregation at his Requiem Mass and the large number of people who attended his funeral were evidence of the great esteem in which Brother was held.

Brother Norbert was very well known amongst the Old Boys and the present boys of M.B.H.S., Darlinghurst. He had taught at Darlinghurst for many years, and had maintained a deep interest in the School and in his Old Boys. He was very proud of "The High School" and the boys he had taught there. Always a popular figure at Old Boys' functions, Brother Norbert will be sadly missed and, I feel, will never be replaced.

Brother was always a champion of the School Cadet Movement. For 30 years or more he had been actively interested in the Cadet Units both in our own and in other schools. Many messages of condolence were received from other Cadet Units and from Officers of the Regular Army who had come to know and value Brother Norbert's worth. Our own Cadets remember with gratitude the kindly and paternal way in which Brother watched over their interests in camp, for it had always been a pleasure to him to accompany the Darlinghurst Cadets into camp whenever possible.

Everyone has kindly memories of Brother Norbert. His great-hearted-ness and friendliness to all he met, and his unquenchable cheerfulness, combined with a striking and forceful personality, made him beloved by all. May his many friends pray for the happy repose of his soul.

#### REV. BROTHER REGINALD

Brother Reginald died on June 28th this year, in the 70th year of his age. Brother had been stationed in our Queensland schools during recent years.

Brother was an ex-student of this school; he was one of the first students from this school to enter the Marist Brothers. For well over fifty years he has laboured as a Marist Brother in various schools throughout the Commonwealth, and has now gone to his reward. May he rest in peace.

#### DESMOND FRANCIS HOWARD, LL.B.

The late Des. Howard was a most loyal Old Boy with long years of association with the Old Boys' Union.

The following obituary notice is from "On Service," the official organ of the N.S.W. Public Service Professional Officer's Association:


The untimely death on 11th February last of Mr. Desmond Francis Howard, Examiner of Titles, at the age of 56 years, deprived the Registrar-General's Department of a most capable officer and the Association of an esteemed member and former Councillor.

Mr. Howard completed his secondary education at the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst.

After studying law at Sydney University, he graduated, at an exceptionally early age, as a Bachelor of Laws in 1921.

For several years he was on loan to the Legal Aid Office and to the Department of Public Works and, during the last war was seconded for service to the Commonwealth Government where he efficiently carried out the difficult tasks assigned to him in the Department of Manpower.

After return to the Legal Branch of the Registrar-General's Department, he was appointed an Acting Examiner of Titles in October, 1953. Mr. Howard was widely known throughout the legal profession where he was regarded as a sound lawyer, particularly in the field of Real Property.


