

## The Year at a Glance



HIS EMINENCE CARDINAL GILROY

THE teaching-staff at the re-opening consisted of Brother Fergus (Principal), Brother Cloman (Vice-Principal), Brother Cassian, Brother De Sales, Brother Patrick (Sportsmaster), Brother Samuel, Brother Gilbert, Brother Athanasius, Mr. Hugh Connolly and Mr. Leonard Everingham. It remained unchanged throughout the year.

The effective roll reached 430; at the end of the year it was 414, of whom 202 were in Primary and 212 in Secondary. We have nine classes: Third Class to Leaving Certificate.

Results obtained in last year's public examinations were of good standard. 31 candidates presented for the Leaving Certificate, of whom 29 passed, 24 matriculated, seven won Commonwealth Scholarships, three obtained cadetships and one a University Bursary. Six members of the class returned to school to secure better passes in the L.C., while of the remaining 25, no fewer than 20 are pursuing more advanced courses of study at the University of Sydney, the University of Technology, the Ecclesi-

astical Seminary, Teachers' College or Military Academy.

For the Internal Intermediate 30 candidates were presented, of whom 29 were successful. One boy won an Intermediate Bursary and one a State Bursary.

Under the guidance of Brother Samuel and Brother Gilbert and the vigorous instruction of Sergeant-Major Irwin, the Cadet Corps sustained its reputation for precision and efficiency. At the Passing-out Parade on Rushcutters Bay Oval the Cadet Band was highly commended by Brigadier Hinton who reviewed the unit and presented the trophies.

In the Metropolitan Catholic Colleges Cricket Competition our teams won both the A-Grade and B-Grade premierships, and in addition, the Aggregate award. Under-Fourteen Team were runners-up. In M.C.C. football our boys won the A-Grade premiership, B-Grade premiership, Eight-stone premiership, Six-stone premiership, the Brother Raymer Cup for the weight teams, and the Aggregate award, while Denis Ryan was awarded the Rugby League blazer for the best M.C.C. back of the season. In the Swimming and Athletics carnivals, our representatives put up some record individual performances, but they did not win any of the championships. In the realm of sport, the year has been the most outstanding in the school's long his-

At the end of each term the senior boys held a dance in St. Canice's Hall at Elizabeth Bay. The value of such functions in the social training of the students will be evident to all.

After their Mid-year Examination, the Fourth and Fifth Years made a short retreat at the Sacred Heart Monastery, Kensington. The Retreat-Master was Reverend Father E. Kelly, M.S.C., the Superior of the Monastery and an Old Boy of our own school.

On the last Sunday in July a large number of boys from our Fifth Class, Sixth Class, First Year and Second Year received the Sacrament of Confirmation in St. Mary's Cathedral at the hands of His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy. An Old Boy of the school, Patrick McAuliffe, was raised to the priesthood at this year's ordinations in St. Mary's

Reverened Brother Justinian, an Assistant General of the Order, paid us a two-

days' visit in September.

The school has received valuable assistance during the year from three organisations: The Parents and Friends, the Ladies' Auxiliary and the Old Boys' Union. All three have identified themselves with the school and made its interests their own. We are grateful to them.

The work of Catholic schools is at base a spiritual work. No one helps us more in the carrying out of this work than the

Priest. Rev. Father Cyril Hatton, the chaplain to the school, has given us generously of his time and interest. When not prevented by urgent and unforseen calls from other people in the parish, he has given a weekly instruction to each of the three senior classes. We are deeply appreciative of his interest in all that we do, of his devotedness to our spiritual welfare, of his wise counsel in times of perplexity and doubt. We offer our thanks likewise for their spiritual ministrations to Reverend Fathers Roberts, Marley and Muldoon, and above all to Right Reverend Monsignor Wallace. the Parish Priest of Darlinghurst, who has been a good friend to both past and present pupils when they called upon him.



### Bishop Joohey Succeeds to the See of Maitland




WE offer our sincere congratulations to the Most Reverend John Toohey, D.D., on his accession to the See of Maitland. He is the first ex-student of the school to govern a diocese.

John Toohey came up to Darlinghurst at the beginning of 1918 to commence his secondary studies, and he remained for three years. In 1921 he went to St. Columba's College, Springwood, to study for the priesthood, to which he was ordained in 1927. When His Eminence became Coadjutor Archbishop of Sydney in 1937, he chose Father Toohey as his secretary. Made Papal Chamberlain in 1941 and a Domestic Prelate four years later, he was consecrated Coadjutor Bishop of Maitland on April 4, 1948, and resided at St. Mary's Presbytery, Newcastle. On the death of Dr. Gleeson this year, he became the fifth Bishop of Mait-

The See was established in 1848. Its occupants would seem to have enjoyed notable longevity. We pray that His Lordship will share that distinction and that his labours in the Hunter Valley will be crowned with the manifold blessings of Heaven.

## Ordination of Father P. Mc Auliffe

FOUR members of our 1947 Intermediate Class entered the Priesthood or the Religious Life. Kevin McGuire and Noel Dennis became Marist Brothers under the names of Brothers Brendan and Arnold respective-

ly. Paul Finnane entered the Friars Minor and is to be ordained next year. Patrick McAuliffe went to St. Columba's College, Springwood, at the beginning of 1948 to commence his studies for the Diocesan Clergy. Having completed his Leaving Certificate and the first year of Philosophy there, he proceeded in 1951 to St. Patrick's College, Manly, where he continued his ecclesiastical studies. On Saturday, July 21, he was among those ordained to the priesthood in St. Mary's Cathedral by His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy.

Father McAuliffe is the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. McAuliffe of 44 Tramway Street, Rosebery. He came to M.B.H.S.D. from the St. Patrick's, Church Hill, at the beginning of 1945, for he was even then thinking of the priesthood and wished to include Latin among his subjects of study.

On Friday, July 27, he said Mass at the Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst, in the presence of the boys from his old school. After Mass he came with Rev. Father Hatton and Rev. Father Marley to visit the school and address the assembled students.

Stan Browne made a presentation on behalf of the boys. Father McAuliffe thanked the boys for their kind thought, recalled some incidents from his time at the school and told them of the means he had taken to ascertain his vocation and follow it. He asked that the school be given the remainder of the day off.

### Father Patrick Murphy, S.V.D. in Rome

Reverend Father Patrick Murphy, S.V.D., spent a few days in Sydney last year on his way from Marburg to Rome, where he has been sent by his Superiors to pursue post-graduate studies at the Gregorian University with a view to taking a doctorate in Theology. Although his stay in Sydney was very short, he found time to call on the Brothers at Darlinghurst and say Mass in their chapel.

The scholastic year in Europe extends

from the beginning of September to the middle of June. Father Murphy has completed one year of his course, obtaining the Licentiate in Theology "cum laude." After a holiday in Switzerland, he resumed work in September last and is now well into his second and final year. He is immensely fond of Rome and University life there. He studies at the Gregorian, and lives with the members of his own Order at the Collegio del Verbo Divino.

JOHN SHEEHY, a member of the 1955 Leaving Certificate Class, entered St. Columba's College, Springwood, at the beginning of this year, to commence his

studies for the priesthood.



## Visit of Brother Justinian, Assistant General

THE Superior General of the Marist Brothers is helped in the government of the Order by ten men called Assistant Generals. Each Assistant General is responsible for a group of Provinces. Brother Justinian was elected by the General Council of the Order in 1951 to take charge of the Provinces of Great Britain and Ireland, South Africa, Australia and New Zealand. He came to Australia with the Reverend Brother Superior General late in 1952, and in May, 1953, he visited the school at Darlinghurst.

Brother Assistant visited Darlinghurst again in September of this year. As his time was short, the schoolboys saw little of him. In spite of the shortness of time, he very graciously attended the meeting of the Parents and Friends being held in the school, and gave an informal and most interesting talk on State-Aid to Catholic Schools in the British Commonwealth of Nations.

The parents were so taken with Brother's address on the finance question that they asked him to come again if at all possible. Having visited the schools in the Solomon Islands, Rabaul and Queensland, he was back in Sydney for Dundas Day on November 4, and again he honoured our P. & F. by coming to the meeting of November 9. This time he provided the programme in

full, showing films on the Beatification of the Founder and on the work of the Order. His own whimsical commentaries added greatly to the interest and value of the films.

### Champagnat College

Blessing of Foundation -Stone of Marist Brothers' Scholasticate.

On Sunday, November 4, His Eminence laid and blessed the foundation-stone of a new Teachers' College for the professional training of Marist Brothers. The new college, a large two-storey red-brick building in the beautiful Dundas Valley, is named in honour of the Founder of the Congregation — Blessed Marcellin Champagnat. It will accommodate 120 students from the Provinces of Sydney and Melbourne. The cost of construction will be £225,000. It will be ready for occupation before the end of 1957.

A choir of 1000 voices sang an ode of welcome to His Eminence, who addressed the gathering of about 5000 people. The appeal was made by Monsignor Thomas, Director of Catholic Missions, and realised £2,500. Brother Hilary, Provincial, was chairman of the gathering and Brother Justinian, Assistant General, spoke on behalf of the Marist Brothers, Mr. Eric Miller, Q.C., spoke for the Catholic laity, and Mr. Inspector Brown for the Department of Education.



At the end of the first term Mr. Kelaher, because of pressure of work and indifferent health, resigned from the Committee. At the next meeting Mr. Akhurst was asked to undertake the responsibilities of the treasurership, while Mrs. J. Murphy was elected to the vacant position of Vice-president. This Committee then held office until the end of the year.

The Association met at the school on the second Friday of each month. # Death of Monsignor Giles

Joseph Reverend Monsignor Giles, D.D., Ph.D., Parish Priest of Croydon and Director of the Fatima Apostolate, died in Lewisham Hospital on June 26 of this year at the age of 52. He was a former pupil of our own school and one of the best-known priests in the Archdiocese.

Born in Fremantle, W.A., in 1904, Joseph Giles received his early education from the Sisters of Mercy at Broken Hill and the Marist Brothers at Kogarah. He came into our Second Year Class at Darlinghurst in 1919, where he had as class-mates John Toohey (now the Bishop of Maitland) and John Mulheren (now a priest in the Diocese of Wollongong). He passed the Intermediate in 1920 and the Leaving Certificate in 1922, and commenced his ecclesiastical studies at St. Columba's Seminary, Springwood, in 1923. The following year he was sent to Propaganda College, Rome, where he had a distinguished scholastic career, gaining doctorates in both Philosophy and Theology. He was ordained in the chapel of the Propaganda in December, 1929.

From 1930 until 1939 Dr. Giles was Secretary to the Apostolic Delegation. In 1937 he was made a Privy Chamberlain by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, and early in 1940 he was appointed Priest-in-charge of St. Michael's parish at Mittagong - a position he held for eight years. From 1948 to 1954 he was Parish Priest of Tempe, and for the last two years of his life, Parish

Priest of Croydon.

# Death of Brother Oswin

In St. Vincent's Hospital, on Thursday, November 22, Brother Oswin died. Solemn Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated at St. Joseph's College, Hunter's Hill, on the following Saturday morning at half past nine, and the funeral left after Mass for the Field of Mars. Rev. Dr. Duffy, the College Chaplain, sang the Mass and

officiated at the graveside.

It was while umpiring a football match in the Darlinghurst Colour Competition in 1951 that Brother Oswin had a serious heart attack. He never recovered his health. Much of his time he was forced to spend in hospital, and when not in hospital, he cared for the sick in the infirmary at St. Joseph's College. He was kindness personified. He never spared himself when others were in need of help. Those who knew his own serious condition marvelled that he could remain on his feet and find the energy to serve others.

No matter how sick he was, no matter how acute his pain, he never complained. When people visited him in hospital, he always spoke of their interests, never of himself. He offered his illness and his life for those who were active in the work in which

he could no longer be active.

Born in 1913, he joined the Brothers in 1928 when he was a boarder at St. Patrick's College, Sale, and made his first vows in 1932. He taught at North Sydney, Lismore, Cairns and Darlinghurst. He was Director of St. Augustine's College, Cairns. Intensely loyal to his Congregation and always cheerful, Brother Oswin was a man of wide talent and refined tastes and exercised a strong influence for good on all with whom he was associated in life. R.I.P.

### THE LATE DR. JOHN WITTON FLYNN

SOME readers of the "Blue and Blue" will remember the 1935 issue, which contained pictures of six brothers, the Flynns, all Old Boys of the school and all doctors. All reached eminence in the medical profession. Dr. Frank later entered the

Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. Dr. John, the second eldest, died rather suddenly at his home in Bellevue Hill on December 6 last year.

John Witton Flynn passed the Senior Examination at M.B.H.S.D. in 1913 and went up to the University of Sydney, where he took an Arts degree.

During the First World War he enlisted as a private, went overseas and was appointed a lieutenant in the Thirtieth Battalion. He was twice wounded, was mentioned in despatches, rose to the rank of captain, and was awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry and skill.

Returning to Australia at the end of the war, John Flynn studied Medicine at the University of Sydney and did a post-graduate course in Dermatology in London. He took up practice as a skin-specialist in Macquarie Street. In the Second World War he served with the R.A.A.F. Throughout his medical career he was closely associated with Lewisham Hospital, which he regarded as his spiritual home. He was a distinguished doctor and a colourful personality. To his wife and daughter we offer our sincere sympathy. R.I.P.

### ACCIDENTAL DEATH OF RICHARD STOYLES-O'GRADY

It is with regret that we record the death by road-accident of Richard Stoyles-O'Grady, who with his brother Percy was engaged in inter-state road transport. As he was driving through Gunning on November 4, the security-pin between cabin and trailer broke, and he was crushed against the steering wheel by the forward lurch of the trailer. Rushed by ambulance to Yass Hospital, he was anointed on arrival and died a few minutes afterwards. He was 41.

Richard came into our Third Class in 1924 and passed the L.C. in '32. He played lock-forward in the First XIII for three seasons. Enlisting on the outbreak of war in '39, he was mentioned in despatches in the Middle East and again in New Guinea, and was awarded the American Silver Star. He did not marry. To his mother and his brother Percy we offer our sincere sympathy.

### THE LATE FRANK McGRATH

Frank McGrath, an Old Boy of the School, who practised as a Chemist in North Sydney for many years died recently. Rev. Fr. Stone, S.J., a fellow Old Boy, officiated at the graveside. Many of Frank's fellow

students were present at the funeral; these included Same Ogg, Greg. Bondietti, George McCarthy, Ted Goodwin and Jack O'Connor. Deepest sympathy is extended to his wife and children.

#### THE LATE CECIL HISSHION

On January 9, 1956, there occurred in St. Vincent's Hospital the death of Cecil Vincent Hisshion, Deputy Headmaster of Yanco Agricultural High School.

Son of the Chief Engineer of Woollahra Council, he came into our Second Year Class in 1931 and won a University Exhibition in his Leaving Certificate in 1934. Joining the Education Department the following year, he graduated from the University of Sydney as Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and spent his life teaching in country high schools.

At Quirindi, Nowra, Temora and Mul-

lumbimby he was Part-time Supervisor of Junior Farmers' Clubs.

As Deputy Headmaster of Yanco Agricultural High School, he assumed responsibility for the management and administration of a very large school farm under most difficult conditions.

In spite of difficulties from without, and in spite of his own seriously deteriorating health, he did remarkably effective work there. A heart condition brought his promising career to an end just before school resumed this year. He was only thirty-nine. To his wife and daughter we offer our sincerest sympathy. R.I.P.

### THE LATE JOHN BLACKBURN

JOHN BLACKBURN was twenty when he died, yet it is difficult to think of him otherwise than as a schoolboy. He did his early schooling at St. Mark's Convent, Drummoyne, his primary at the Christian Brothers, Burwood, and came to Darlinghurst for his secondary studies at the beginning of 1947. He passed his Intermediate in 1949 and was about to do his final examination in Fourth Year when he contracted poliomyelitis in an acute form. He spent more than three years in hospital: sometimes at Balmain, sometimes at the Coast. The last two and a half years he spent at home, where his parents and his sisters provided ideal

hospital conditions for him. He had a private iron lung and had to spend at least three hours of each day in it.

He sank into unconsciousness on the morning of Monday, August 27, received Extreme Unction from Reverend Father John Power, and died at half past six on the following morning.

John was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Blackburn of 5 Lyons Road, Drummoyne. He was a fair student and a keen tennis-player, winning the junior and senior trophies at the school tournament in 1950.

#### DEATH OF MRS. McKENNA

It was with great sorrow that we heard of the serious illness of the wife of our President early in the third term. Her condition improved but the improvement was not lasting. Sports organiser has been Mr. Sam Ogg. He did a devoted an efficient job, often against the heavy odds inherent in distance apart, full programmes, family cares and the host of conflicting interests claiming the time of Old Boys and their friends. We

One of the driving forces in the Balmain club's great season was its secretary, **Mal Fallon**, who enhanced the Darlinghurst Old Boys' reputation for enthusiasm and sportsmanship.

**Ron Thornton** hit the headlines as fiveeighth with the Canterbury-Bankstown first grade team. Thornton is an outstanding prospect.

Martin Jackson, who last year represented the State, did not have the best of luck this season. Nevertheless, he played some fine games for Manly-Warringah.

In the ranks of Junior Cricket we find many Old Boys. In the N.S.W. Catholic Young Men's Cricket Association, Jack Dennis is a member of the Executive and this year has been appointed a Selector and the Association's Publicity Officer. In addition, he captains the Drummoyne "A" Grade team, which has as its colours Blue and Blue; and no wonder, as the team includes four other Old Boys: Kevin Dennis, who qualified for the Association averages last season, Les Brennan, who won the Association's cup awarded to the best wicket-keeper, Bill Brennan and Max Butel.

In the same competition Les Woodley plays for Mt. Carmel "A" Grade, while this season a new team, Maroubra Bay, has entered the "C" Grade Competition and this team is led and inspired by Father Paul Cahill of the 1944 L.C. Class.
