

The High School

Death of Pope Pius XII

The late Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, died at the age of 82 years on Thursday, October 9th. He was the 261st successor of St. Peter and had reigned for 19 years.

Amid universal expression of mourning and sympathy, one fact emerged with startling clarity: By the holiness of his life, by the love of his paternal heart for all humanity, by his utter devotion to the cause of world peace, Pius XII had won for the Catholic Church an esteem and admiration unequalled in the past 700 years. The feelings of over 400 million Catholics were expressed in an outpouring of prayer for the repose of the Sovereign Pontiff. Many prayers and Masses were offered for the eternal repose of his soul by the pupils and Brothers at Darlinghurst.

Tribute to His Holiness Pope Pius XII

Rt. Rev. Monsignor T. O. Wallace, Parish Priest of Darlinghurst, paid tribute to the late Holy Father while preaching at Sacred Heart Church on the Feast of Christ the King.

"Weak Catholics became stronger and all Catholics immensely proud of the obviously sincere and noble tributes paid by Press, Radio and TV to the late Pope Pius XII. Jews and men of every religious belief and of none joined in a genuine tribute.

Pope Pius XII had many gifts. Wherein lay his greatness?—the Pope of Peace; his diplomatic missions; his work for prisoners of war; his work in Germany? I doubt it. I think it lay rather in the sanctity of his life.

Last year I had the opportunity of seeing him at four audiences at St. Peter's and the Vatican. I had heard of these things. I was not to be carried away—and then I met him and talked with him for about three minutes asking for a blessing for Darlinghurst, its people, the Nuns and the Brothers. The tall thin figure with his arms outstretched replied: "Tell them I Give them all the Blessings that Christ, Himself, would give them." The effect could not be described. Millions had met him as I had and hundreds of millions had heard about him and read what he said.

In the final analysis true greatness consists in devotion to the will of God. In a word all the world acclaims him because he was a saint. Next Saturday is November 1st, Feast of All Saints. That to me is his feastday."

Election of Pope John XXIII


On Tuesday, October 28th, His Eminence Angelo Giuseppe Cardinal Roncalli was elected Pope and took the name of Pope John XXIII. His Holiness's election meant that for the second time in this century a Cardinal Patriarch of Venice had succeeded to the See of St. Peter, recalling the election of St. Pius X in 1903.

The New Pope has had a distinguished career. Ordained in 1904 he spent the years 1905-1914 as Private Secretary to the Bishop of Bergamo and professor at Bergamo Seminary. During the Great War he was a Chaplain in the Italian Army. In 1925 he was consecrated Archbishop and became Apostolic Delegate to Bulgaria,

which post he held for ten years. Between 1935 and 1944 he was Apostolic Delegate to Turkey and from 1944 to 1953 he was Apostolic Nuncio to France. The late Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, created him Cardinal in 1953 and appointed him Patriarch of Venice.

The summary of the Life of Pope John XXIII, given in the previous paragraph, shows that he brings to his new post a vast knowledge of Church affairs and a wealth of experience in Church administration. Once again the Catholics of the world can rejoice in that Divine Providence has given them an outstanding man as Vicar of Christ.

New Superior General for Marist Brothers




Rev. Bro. Charles Raphael

A recent General Chapter of the Marist Brothers elected Very Reverend Brother Charles Raphael as Superior-General. The Reverend Brother was born at Arlon (Belgium) in 1900. The Chapter met at Grugliasco, near Turin (Italy), where deputies from 52 different provinces came together to elect the eighth successor to Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, who founded the Marist Brothers in 1817. Brother Charles Raphael has had considerable experience in the administrative side of the Order. He has been Visitor to both the Grugliasco area and the Piedmont area — the latter during World War II. For many years he has been connected with the Exercises of the Second Novitiate. In 1949 he became one of several Assistants to the Superior-General. Australia sent six delegates to the Chapter and three of them—Brothers Hilary, Maurus and Egbert-have been on the staff at Darlinghurst. The Brothers and pupils of the High School extend to the new Reverend Brother Superior-General congratulations and sincere sentiments of filial loyalty.

Rev. Brother Hilary has been appointed an Assistant-General of the Marist Brothers. He was Provincial of the Province of Sydney and had been a teacher at Darlinghurst back in the late 1920's. He will reside at the Mother House in France and will exercise jurisdiction over all the communities of Marist Brothers in Australia, New Zealand and the dependent missions in the Solomons and New Guinea. His appointment was made at the General Chapter of the Order held recently in Turin. The Brothers and boys of Darlinghurst offer Brother Hilary congratulations on his new position and promise him remembrance in their prayers.



Rev. Br. Quentin, Provincial

One of the first official acts of the new General Council of the Marist Brothers elected at Turin recently was to appoint Rev. Bro. Quentin as Provincial of the Province of Sydney. Brothers and boys of Darlinghurst offer Brother their congratulations on his new position. Brother Quentin knows Darlinghurst quite well as he was on the staff here during the early

1940's. While on the staff here Brother completed an Arts degree with Sydney University. In recent years Brother has held many important Directorships in Sydney schools including St. Joseph's College, Hunters Hill, and Marcellin College, Randwick. Prior to his new appointment Brother was Vice-Provincial of the Sydney Province.

Senior Boys' Retreats

This year as usual Fifth Year had the benefit of a retreat at the Sacred Heart Monastery, Kensington. However, this time, helped by the generosity of the Parents and Friends' Association, we made an enclosed retreat during early March.

We spent from Monday night to Thursday morning on retreat. Fr. E. Kelly, Super-

ior of the Monastery and an Old Boy of Darlinghurst, together with the assistance of three other priests conducted the retreat showing and helping us to achieve its purpose.

For these two short days we, in effect, lived the monastic life and in doing so realised how different it is from the false ideas many Catholics have of it. Many fellows in the class were particularly impressed by the Lay-Brothers. I don't think any of us had previously realised the amount of work they do in running a monastery. We came away from the retreat refreshed physically as well as spiritually.

Having experienced both types I consider that the majority of the boys received more benefit from the enclosed retreat than they did from the previous type in which only the school hours were spent at the monastery. In the enclosed retreat it is much easier to enter into the spirit of the exercises. During this retreat most of us had our first experience of a Dialogue Mass.

Later in the year both Fourth Year and Third Year did retreats during two school-days while Second Year and First Year had a Day of Recollection at Kensington. We are very much indebted to Fr. Kelly and the priests and brothers of the Sacred Heart Monastery for the guidance they have given us.

Ordination of Father Murray

Jim outlined for all present Fr. Murray's career while a student at the School. He informed us that Father had played in several Premiership winning teams in the years 1944-46 but perhaps his greatest achievement was the winning of the Senior Conduct, Study and Sport Prize.

After this address Father made his reply. He said he was quite surprised at the number of incidents that Jim had mentioned and he went on to tell the boys of the debt that he owed to the old School. At the end of this speech Father was presented with a hand-carved statue of Our



Lady by the House Captains on behalf of the whole School, while Mrs. Murray was presented with a plaque of Blessed Marcellin Champagnat. Finally, the traditional half-holiday was given by Father Murray, to a tumult of cheers.


OUR SEMINARIANS

Pilgrimage to Lourdes, 1958

· N the days when public penances used to be imposed, a sinner would sometimes be ordered as penance to make a pilgrimage to some holy place. I have not, however, heard of a priest in Australia giving as penance a pilgrimage to Lourdes! Such a "penance", above all in 1958, would indeed be a sweet sorrow, and the priest's confessional would not lack penitents. Even if, in making a pilgrimage, the millions of pilgrims to Lourdes this year were not influenced by any such penalty, they were, nevertheless, faithful to a devotional practice which is enshrined in long centuries of Christian tradition. Is it only a flight of fancy to see the first Christian pilgrimage taking place on the first Easter Sunday morning? "At the hour when dawn broke on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary came near to contemplate the tomb . . . But the angel said openly to the women, . . . Come and see the place where the Lord was buried." (Matt. 28:1-7.) For all Christians the "Holy Land" has been the great place of pilgrimage. It is helpful to recall that when pilgrimages to the Holy Land became extremely difficult, and the faithful were no longer able readily to visit the very places hallowed by Christ's Life and Passion, there was developed the devotion of the Way of the Cross, by which the Christian could pass from Station to Station, contemplating the scenes of the Passion as if he were visiting the very place where they had occurred. To make the Stations of the Cross is to make in spirit a pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

From the earliest centuries, also, pilgrimages were made to the tombs of the martyrs, especially to the tombs of St. Peter and St. Paul at Rome. At Rome, too, the pilgrim saw not only the tomb in which was the dead body of St. Peter, but saw also the Pope, the Vicar of Christ, in whom the authority and primacy of St. Peter lived on in every generation. No wonder, then, that in all centuries pilgrims have travelled to Rome.

The third great pilgrimage was also to the tomb of an Apostle, namely, to the shrine of St. James of Compostela, in Northern Spain. What numerous bands of pilgrims traversed Europe on their way to Compostela! Quite apart from their primary religious significance, the pilgrimages of the Middle Ages were of the greatest social and economic importance. By them communications by sea and land were developed; great roads arose where pilgrims trod, from the Channel to Canterbury, from Germany and Paris to Compostela, and, of course, "all roads led to Rome". The pilgrimages encouraged circulation of ideas, in art and architecture and literature. There was a close relation between pilgrim traffic and growth of trade. Men and women of all ranks of society were given opportunities of travel. Necessary means for the protection and sustenance of the pilgrims were organised; we know of the hospices conducted by the monks in the Alpine passes for the straggling pilgrim; we read of the "armed pilgrimages" of the times of the Crusades.

No doubt there were possible abuses in pilgrimages, and there have not been wanting critics to speak of the dangers. But it is not the practice itself, but the abuse of the practice, which should be condemned. St. Jerome stressed that while it was a great act of faith for a man to offer his prayers in the very place where the feet of Our Lord had stood, yet it was not the fact of living in Jerusalem, but of living there well, that was worthy of praise. St. Jerome also, (in making a contrast which seems to suggest that people had a rather unflattering view of Britain!) pointed out that the gates of Heaven are equally open in Jerusalem or in Britain. St. John Chrysostom claimed that there was "no need to cross the seas or fare upon a

long journey; let each of us at home invoke God earnestly and He will hear our prayer." And the experienced observer of human nature who wrote the "Imitation of Christ" summed it up by saying, "So also those that go about much, seldom become holy".

The worth of pilgrimage depends largely upon the motives with which one makes it. For what reasons have ten million or more people visited Lourdes in the past twelve months, in this year of the centenary of the Apparitions at Lourdes? Are they idle tourists, travellers who seem to find a certain pleasure in merely being displaced from point A on the earth's surface to point B, and as quickly as possible? I have met this class of globetrotter elsewhere, but not at Lourdes. Are there pilgrims at Lourdes because their guide-book says that one "must" see such a painting, or sculpture, or building, or ruin? Such people crowd the Sistine Chapel at Rome, and pass interminably through St. Peter's, but Lourdes has no artistic masterpieces to attract throngs of tourists. (How significant it is that in Paris, the yearly attendance at the wonderful and world-famous Louvre with its priceless artistic treasures, is given at 631,500, while the yearly attendance at the Chapel of the Miraculous Medal, in Paris, a chapel not even mentioned in my guide books, is over 900,000. And how easy it is not to notice the humble entrance to the Chapel at 140, Rue du Bac!) And why do pilgrims return so frequently to Lourdes? I have spoken to a blind Catholic man in London who has just returned from his tenth pilgrimage to Lourdes. He would understand the attitude expressed by a drawling voice from Texas that I heard behind me in Lourdes: "Say, honey, I just can't get this place out of my system.'


The attraction of Lourdes is not just the fascination of seeing people from all nations assembled together. To see such a variety of races is becoming commonplace; it exists in almost any carriage of the Paris Metro

or in any London bus.

Pilgrims come to Lourdes in their millions because God, Who knows the instincts of the human heart, Who indeed created them in the first place, has deigned to satisfy those instincts in our own times as well as in all centuries of Christianity, by showing forth His power and goodness in a place of His choice; and, moreover, God Himself has willed that we should honour Mary, the Mother of God, whom He Himself so honours. When one reads of the events of 1858, and above all when one reads the whole life of St. Bernadette, it is clearly evident that the power of God acted, and continues to act at Lourdes. This truth has blinding clarity when one stands in the one small, low, unhealthy, crowded room-it had been a prison-cell—in which the Soubirous family was living on February 11th, 1858, the room from which Bernadette made her way to the banks of the Gave to gather wood. The events of that day one hundred years ago, were God's way of giving us a special means of expressing publicly our Faith in Him, our trust in the Blessed Sacrament, our devotion to the Blessed Virgin, our loyalty to Christ, His Church and His Vicar on earth. At Lourdes one feels a common spirit of faith and prayer and of love for Mary in all the pilgrims; it is a consolation that one does not feel so strongly elsewhere. One sees the unity of the Church, and is helped by it. There is a unity in prayer and devotion; one prays with the father who kneels beside his crippled son as the Blessed Sacrament is raised in blessing above him; one is happy, hour after hour, to join with the Church in praising the Blessed Mother of God, to visit the Grotto, to touch the stone where Our Lady stood and spoke to Bernadette. It is easy to pray at Lourdes Perhaps that is a reason why pilgrims return. And they return, too, because it is a very deep joy for a child to see his Mother honoured, as the Mother of us all is honoured at Lourdes.







Judge G. Donovan

Early this year the sixth Old Boy of Darlinghurst was appointed to the bench. He is Judge Gerald Donovan. Judge Donovan came to the High School from St. Patrick's after winning a State Bursary. His record shows that he was a brilliant student passing the Intermediate with eight A's and the Leaving Certificate (1926) with First Class Honours in Latin and Greek and Second Class Honours in English and French. He took up residence at St. John's College within the University and graduated in Arts in 1930 with First Class Honours in Latin and Greek. In 1934 he graduated in Law with First Class Honours and was admitted to the Bar. In recent years Judge Donovan has lectured in Mercantile Law, Torts and Contracts. Since 1951 he has been President of the Special Work in the St. Vincent de Paul Society dealing with the Rehabilitation of Prisoners. The 'Blue and Blue' would like to congratulate our newest judge on his appointment.

Our Old Boy Judges

Judge William J. Coyle attended the High School in 1879 when it was at Harrington St., City. Before being appointed to the bench he was the Crown Prosecutor.

Mr. Justice Clancy was at Darlinghurst in 1910 having come on to the High School from St. Benedict's, Broadway. Before being raised to the bench Mr. Justice Clancy was an officer of the Education Department and councillor of the Public Service Association.

The Honourable Sir Edward McTiernan, K.B.E., P.C., Justice of the High Court of Australia. He attended the High School in 1909 when it was situated at St. Mary's

Cathedral. Before being appointed to the bench Sir Edward was a Cabinet Minister in the N.S.W. Parliament (1920). He held the portfolios of Attorney-General and Minister of Justice.

Mr. Justice Gallagher was at Darling-hurst in 1919. Before becoming a judge he was on the Coal Tribunal.

Mr. Justice Kelleher attended Darlinghurst in 1926. In 1955 he was appointed to the Bench of the Industrial Commission.

The Religious Life

(Written for the 'Blue and Blue' by Brother Quentin, B.A., Provincial, and a former teacher at Darlinghurst.)

Within the Church there are recognised (as expressed in Canon 107) two classes of persons, Clerics and Laymen. The same Canon goes on to say: "each of these may be Religious."

The Sacrament of Baptism incorporates us all as "Laymen" into the Church. By his Ordination the Priest, called by his Bishop, is raised to a sublime vocation whereby he is empowered to offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, to administer the Sacraments and to preach.

In this article it is not proposed to discuss the Clerical or the Lay state as such, both of which may lead to the perfection of charity and sainthood, but only the Religious State. The Religious State is not a new division distinct from the clerical and lay divisions of the faithful; on the contrary it is recruited from both.

The late Holy Father speaking in 1951 used these words: "The Religious State is in no sense reserved to either one or the other of the two types which by divine right exist in the Church, since not only the clergy but likewise the laity can be Religious."

From this it may be observed that women, belonging as they do to the "lay" division of the church, may become Religious. They cannot become Priests.

"HERE is nothing so harmful to Christian Wisdom," declared Pope Leo XIII, "as that it should not be known." Nothing leads so readily to misunderstanding and misrepresentation as does ignorance.

True as this is of Christian Wisdom in general, it is equally true of the subject of Religious Vocation. Many Catholics, otherwise well instructed, have failed to grasp the true significance of the Religious Life. Is it, perhaps, that they have become familiar in Australia with those forms of Religious Life which show the Religious at work in Schools and Hospitals? Have they come to think of Religious merely as teachers or nurses? Whatever be the cause, few, apart from the Religious themselves, have an appreciation of the place of Religious in the life of the Church and of their apostolic vocation.

To understand the Religious Life we must first understand the Christian life. In the revised Liturgy of Holy Week, Our Holy Mother the Church now gives us an annual reminder of our Christian—our Baptismal promises. "My dearest Brethren," the Priest says on Easter Saturday Night, "now that the Lenten observance is over, let us renew the vows of our Holy Baptism, by which we have of old renounced Satan and his works, and also the world, which is the

enemy of God, and promised to serve God faithfully in the Holy Catholic Church."

To be a Christian then, we must first renounce Satan, that is, sin. When the child is brought to Baptism he has no contact with God. Baptism brings him Supernatural Life, the very life of God Himself. Sin is the very negation of this, for mortal sin destroys our Supernatural Life. Hence to be a Christian, to keep our Supernatural Life, we must renounce sin.

Secondly we must renounce the world. "The world" is anything that is not God. Just as we renounce our Christian Life if we are satisfied to remain in sin, so we renounce our Christian Life when we make anything else besides God the goal of our life. The people of the parable who were invited to the great supper had other things to attend to; the one his farm, the other his oxen, the third his wife. How many things there are we can seek after that are not God! We must use the things of this world; for this they were created by God; but a Christian must use them only as a means to go to God.

Finally a Christian must serve God faithfully in the Catholic Church. Not just in any way, not just as we think fit, but in accordance with the directives of the Church. Nor does this service of God rest merely in leading a good life ourselves. It involves also

the teachings of Christ and of His Vicar the Pope, it is wrong for even the layman to main inactive in God's Church. Each and every one has a duty and a right, arising the base of the Church.

Such is the basis of the Christian Life to which we are all vowed by our Baptism. But there is in human nature a natural tendency to improve, to do better. Man, unlike the animals, is never satisfied. No doubt it a natural tendency towards God, the ultimate and perfect Good. Such a tendency exists also on the spiritual level and it is this which forms the basis of the Religious Life a tendency towards perfection of the Christian Life.

Christ Himself held out this prospect to in answer to the young man's query: What good must I do to obtain eternal Life?" Christ replied that he must keep the commandments . . . the ordinary requirements for a Christian Life. Finding in his soul that inclination that so many have answered since that day, the young man declared: "All this have I done since my youth. What more is wanting to me?" Here indeed s the essence of the Religious Life . . . What more can I do?" The Religious Life is for those who are not satisfied with living a good Christian Life . . . they want to do more. Such is the generosity which touches the Heart of Our Divine Lord, for we are told that Christ "looked on him and loved him". And because He loved him He gave him that wonderful invitation: "If thou wilt be perfect, go sell what thou hast, give it to the poor, and come follow Me, and thou shalt have treasure in Heaven." Unfortunately this young man, although he had felt the urge to do something more than he had been doing, lacked the generosity to make the sacrifice that Christ asked of him.

True to Her Founder's commission to lead souls to God, the Church not only provides the way of ordinary Christian living, but also the higher path indicated by our Saviour, the way of Christian Perfection. For those who like the young man in the Gospel, have tried and succeeded in the Christian Life, the Church provides the Religious Life with its vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience, as the way for those who wish to do more. Lest the goods of this

world should stand between him and God the Religious vows never to use them independently but always to seek the permission of his legitimate Superiors. Mutual love and family life he sees as wonderful gifts of Almighty God for bringing souls into this world to be saved for God. By his vow of Chastity the Religious forgoes these privileges in order to give himself directly to God, to be more free to serve Him and to work for the salvation of those souls for which He died. By his vow of obedience the Religious dedicates to God that freedom and independence of action which is his greatest natural gift. With Christ in the garden he says to Almighty God: "Not my will but Thine be done." On the Apostolic side the Religious shares in the official apostolate of the Church. Pope Pius XII has declared that even lay Religious, Brothers and Sisters, have a special, divine vocation and can labour, and very effectively, both for their own salvation and that of others. He adds: "Let no one lack esteem for the members of these Institutes . . . or think that their apostolate is less fruitful."

Such is the noble dignity of the state of life to which every Religious aspires.

On the basic principles of the three vows a wide variety of Religious Institutes has been established by the Church. Having decided to become a Religious, to serve God in a more perfect manner, a person is still free to choose one of the many "vocations" by which he may serve God. He must choose that Religious Institute that will provide him with the best outlet for the use of the talents that God has given him. Just as the young man faced with the prospect of a professional career must choose between law, medicine, dentistry, engineering etc.; or for a trade course, between carpentry, pattern making, electronics etc.; so the young man deciding on the Religious Life must make a choice. He might answer that greatest of all vocations, the Priesthood; if he has the requisite qualities he might choose to be a teacher; others will choose medicine, science, engineering, trades and so on. In the Religious Life there is scope for all talents. No talent that God has given need remain in use on the simple Christian level. It can be put to better service in the Religious Life.

We sometimes see reference to what a person must leave to become a Religious. Young people get the idea that they must sacrifice a career; that being "dead to the world" their life will be stunted and their personality repressed. This is the misunderstanding and misrepresentation bred of the ignorance of which we spoke at the outset.

In the true picture of the Religious Life there is no such thing. Ample scope is provided for all talents. There will be sacrifices, that is true. Even the Christian Life presupposes the cross. The way of Christian Perfection calls for sacrifice. Sometimes perhaps of those very interests that we personally might feel could be very useful. But there is no sense of repression, but rather of expansion, of total dedication to the work of the salvation of souls, a work that is so great that when we have expended our whole life at it we must feel we have achieved so little.

As Our Lord Himself said, "the fields are white with the harvest", and the "harvest indeed is great and the labourers are few". When we give all we have, it is but little. In this work there is no place for burying talents. They can all be used to the full. No one can feel that he has lost anything in this life when he works for God at the salvation of souls.

But Christ is satisfied with the very little

that we can do. He will reward us in this life with that sense of satisfaction of sharing in a work that is of the highest order, for it is the work of God Himself. In the next life He will reward us as He promised His disciples: "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has left house, or brothers, or sisters, or lands, for My sake and for the gospel's sake, who shall not receive now in the present time a hundredfold as much . . . and in the age to come life everlasting."

Finally a word to Parents. It is your great dignity and privilege to have children and to bring them up to serve God. If they should be generous enough as a result of your training, to be ready to serve God in this more perfect way, do not stand in their way. Rather rejoice that you have so succeeded in the work that God has entrusted to you, that your children are ready to rise above what is merely good to do that which is better. Pray for them, encourage them.

To all who might read these pages we recommend most sincerely those words of Our Lord Himself: "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He send Labourers into His harvest." A Religious Vocation is a great grace. It is the fruit of prayer and sacrifice; a precious gift held out to those who have a generous heart.





DEATH OF GEORGE McCARTHY





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
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
