

The Year at a Glance

ROTHER DEMETRIUS spent most of his year at the Second Novitiate of the Marist Brothers at Saint Paul-Trois-Chateaux in Southern France. Returning to Australia at the end of second term, he took charge of our High School at Newcastle. We wish him as much success there, as he experienced here.

From the 12th to the 17th of July, we were visited by Rev. Brother Hilary, Assistant General of the Marist Brothers, on his triennial visit. He expressed satisfaction with all that he saw. Brother Assistant taught at Darlinghurst from 1927 to 1930.

Two Old Boys were raised to the priesthood, Michael Hogan and Kevin McNamara, S.J., the former at St. Mary's Cathedral, the latter in India; four boys entered the Marist Brothers' Juniorate; four others became postulants in the Novitiate. Rev. Father Paul Murray (L.C. '46) became one of the first priests to gain a Doctorate in Sacred Theology from St. Patrick's College, Manly, with his thesis, "Newman and Our Lady's Meditation." An Old Boy of the Marist Brothers could choose no other thesis so significant.

Results in the 1959 public examinations were outstanding. Thirty-two boys passed the Leaving Certificate with an average of 2 A's and 3 B's. Seven students gained Commonwealth Scholarships: Kerry Cavanaugh, Anthony Codd, Anthony Craven, Paul Crea, Patrick Fahy, Barry Trembath, and Robert Edwards. Fifty-five boys passed the Intermediate, while the following either gained or retained State bursaries: Christopher Grygiel, Robert Wilson, Ewen Finnane, Andrew Herscovitch, and Noel Pye.

The spirit of study and general co-operation has been creditable, and the boys have shown a friendliness found in few schools.

All secondary classes have made retreats at Kensington under the guidance of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. These recollection days have been fervent and impressive. We thank the Sacred Heart Fathers,

We sincerely thank the various subsidiary organizations whose help has always been invaluable: O.B.U., P. and F., Ladies and Men's Auxiliaries.

The Junior Conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society has carried out zealous work under the capable guidance of School Chaplain, Father Grew, of Darlinghurst Parish. Thank you, Father.

The Cadet Corps functioned vigorously and efficiently, both in its weekly parades and in its annual camp at Singleton.

In the Metropolitan Catholic Colleges' Competitions, both A and Under 14 grades were cricket premiers, A grade being joint-premiers with Randwick. Congratulations. Marcellin College. In football, Darlinghurst won the A grade and aggregate trophies, and were runners-up in B and Under 14 grades. The 10-stone team was champion team in the State Knockout Competition. In the Eastern Suburbs Competition we entered nine teams, eight of which were champions. In Swimming, we won the M.C.C. Senior trophy. Tennis and Golf tournaments were organised within the School, and in each case unearthed promising talent.

A word of thanks to Rt. Rev. Monsignor Wallace, P.P., of Darlinghurst, and his assistant priests, Rev. Fathers Fay, Hannan, Grew, and McAlary, for their spiritual ministrations and personal kindness; to the Sisters of Charity at St. Vincent's Hospital and at Sacred Heart Convent.

Finally, may we point out that next year marks the sixtieth anniversary of the School on its present site. The late Archbishop Kelly officially opened the School building in July, 1911, on Darlinghurst Hill, its second site since its inception at Church Hill in 1875.

We sincerely hope that all will read with interest and enjoyment this record of School events for 1960, written in the following pages.

Brother Demetrius

It was a fortunate day for the High School when Brother Demetrius was transferred from St. Patrick's Technical School to Darlinghurst. The new Principal was experienced in every phase of study provided by our Sydney schools. Numbers at Darlinghurst were growing rapidly and the firm hand of Brother Demetrius saw to it that quality was not sacrificed to quantity as our small assembly area became crammed to capacity.

On his arrival at the High School, Brother Demetrius found that his first major task was the implementation of plans for remodelling the Brothers' House, of which the years had taken heavy toll. Faced with great expenditure Brother Demetrius arranged the necessary loan, running into thousands of pounds, and within three years had almost paid it off; then to renovating the school building now approaching its golden jubilee of erection. For this he organised the Men's Auxiliary into painters, carpenters, plumbers, etc, who brightened up the whole school building within three years. Still it was not only Brother Demetrius's organising ability that stood him in good stead, but also his personal ability to wield a hammer, paint brush or other tool as the need arose.

Although of a scientific bent of mind himself, Brother Demetrius was able to perpetuate the work of Brother Osmund, Brother Gerard and Brother Michael, under whom the boys of Darlinghurst learnt to treasure the humanities. Few schools excelled the standard of our English results at last year's Leaving Certificate Examination.

Brother Demetrius's success as a Christian educator speaks for itself in the boys who have gone out from the School during his years and in the large number of vocations to the priesthood and the religious life. It

was during Brother Demetrius's time that the St. Vincent de Paul Society was inaugurated at Darlinghurst.

At the end of three years Brother Demetrius was selected by the Superiors of the Marist Order to perform the exercises of the Second Novitiate in France. During his absence he was transferred as Headmaster to our high school at Hamilton, a suburb of Newcastle. We trust that the boys of the coal city will make the best of their good fortune and that God's blessing will accompany Brother Demetrius back to the scene of his early labours as a Brother.

Senior Boys' Retreats

ATE in May this year Fifth Year "A" class went on its first enclosed Retreat at the Sacred Heart Monastery, Kensington.

This was a solemn occasion for the boys, as previously the Retreats had been held during school hours and the boys had slept at home.

When we arrived on the Monday night silence was observed immediately and kept until Thursday morning, with the exception

A Visit to Rome

(Written by Brother Demetrius for Blue and Blue, 1960)

OWARDS the end of last year it was my good fortune to be one of the group of Australian Marist Brothers sent each year to follow a course of religious studies known as the Second Novitiate. For us Australians this privilege is doubly attractive as it means a visit to Europe with a chance to see many of "those far away places" which for most do not come any closer than "that book on the shelf." Many happy memories flood my mind as I think over the past twelve months: Rome, Northern Italy, beautiful Southern France which made willing captives of the Popes for nearly seventy years, Lourdes, Paris, the British Isles. For this brief article I shall confine myself to a few impressions of Rome.

In Rome we stayed with two of our Australian Brothers who, with twenty-four other Marists from various countries, are doing Doctorate courses for Religious Brothers through the Lateran University. January 21st being the feast of St. Agnes they suggested a visit to her Basilica. This is built over the catacomb where the early Christians buried the Roman virgin Agnes who suffered the cruel death of martyrdom rather than be unfaithful to her heavenly spouse. On her feast day each year during High Mass, the abbot blesses two lambs whose wool will be used to make the palliums with which the Pope invests archbishops.

We arrived just as some little girls dressed in white were carrying the lambs into the church. The lambs were suitably impressed with the dignity that was theirs and lay quietly in their boxes. I have no doubt that the pretty ribbons with which the good Nuns had decked the boxes were not purely for decoration.

This was my first experience of an Italian feast day. To me the familiar attitude of the crowds in the church seemed irreverent, but further experience showed me that this was perhaps an illustration of how these good people feel quite at home in God's

house. No doubt our traditional silence in church would seem strange to them.

After Mass we found a guide who provided each of us with a candle and took us to inspect the catacomb. This one is similar to the many others scattered around Rome. Originally they were mines dug by the Romans for sand for building. During the persecutions the Christians used them as hiding places and burial grounds. This gave them added protection as the Romans had a considerable respect for and a superstitious fear of the dead. However, we do read of the catacombs being raided by Roman soldiers on several occasions.

The Christians extended these mines considerably and cleverly concealed the many secret entrances. After the persecutions the catacombs were no longer used and as time passed people forgot about them. Less than a century ago they were rediscovered and over one thousand miles of them have been explored. The tunnels are about three feet wide and in many places the sides are lined with tiers of rectangular openings in which bodies were buried. Martyrs' graves are easily recognised as their tombs are in the form of an arch. Frequently they have a palm branch carved in the rock.

During our visit a priest was saying Mass at an altar which the early Christians had erected over the tomb of St. Agnes. It is usual to find an altar in the catacombs in a slightly enlarged area at the lower end of a long tunnel, thus enabling the large crowd in the passageway to see the Priest. It became customary to bury a martyr's body beneath the altars. The Church today requires that the relics in our altar stones be those of martyrs. The walls with their oil lamps and lighted tapers, and the people fervently singing hymns, and the tinkling of the bell warning us of the Consecration seemed to link us close to those frightened but brave Christians of nearly two thousand years ago.

"All roads lead to Rome," and the great attraction for most who tread these roads

is St. Peter's. The Pope lives in unpretentious quarters at the right hand side of the great Basilica. We had the privilege of an audience with the Holy Father and to be in the presence of the Pope is an experience that words cannot describe.

St. Peter's is huge but all is in such excellent proportion that you do not realise just how enormous everything is. Many a visitor, as he blesses himself with holy water on entering the Basilica, does not realise that the two chubby "little" angels who present a holy water font as big as a bath are each seven feet high. Perhaps he has been too engrossed in Bernini's massive canopy, more than the length of a football field away, resting on its twisted bronze columns high above the main altar. which in turn covers the tomb of St. Peter. Incidentally, this canopy, which could comfortably straddle the Darlinghurst High School, reaches only half way to the ceiling of the dome.

It takes some time to take even a quick look through St. Peter's. It is capable of holding 80,000 people. The sides of the Basilica are broken with many beautiful side chapels, each as big as an average church. Perhaps the best known is that containing "the Pieta" of Michael Angelo. "Flesh turned to marble, not marble turned to flesh" is an apt description of this priceless treasure completed when the sculptor was only twenty-four years old. Behind the various altars are beautiful mosaics so expertly laid that unless you look carefully you do not realise that the picture is made from many small pieces of coloured stone. Most of the original paintings from which these mosaics were copied are in the Vatican Art Galleries.

We paid several visits to St. Peter's. One of them took us to the dome. On this day we were accompanied by an old boy of Darlinghurst, Brother Fabian Hynes (St. John of God), who is in charge of the Vatican Pharmacy. We climbed to a height of over four hundred feet. Part of the way was on an inclined path which spiralled between the roof and ceiling of the dome. The climb was hard, but our efforts were well rewarded by the view we received.

The first sight to catch our eye was the impressive Piazza San Petro, an area larger than the Sydney Cricket Ground. This Piazza is bounded by two huge semi-circular colonnades which extend from the facade of the Basilica and represent the arms of the Prince of the Apostles stretched out to embrace the world. Surrounding the Basilica is an area of about 200 acres which forms the Vatican City, the smallest independent state in the world. The entrance to this state is through the Piazza and is attended by the Pope's own army, the Swiss Guards. These soldiers dress in colourful orange and blue striped uniforms and wear breast plates and helmets of metal armour. They carry no guns but wear swords and hold effective looking halberds.

The Vatican Gardens looked beautiful in spite of the winter. The lawns were meticulously trimmed and beautiful fountains splashed into artistic ponds set among the flower beds and shrubs. Close to the papal apartments are the extensive buildings housing the Vatican Art Galleries and Libraries. These are real treasure houses of paintings, sculptures and ancient manuscripts.

On another day we were among a lucky few who were permitted to explore the recent excavations under the High Altar. You can imagine the feelings we experienced when we stood beside the tomb of St. Peter. This was discovered only recently during excavations commenced a few years ago. As yet the tomb has not been opened. St. Peter's was built on the site of an old cemetery containing both Christian and pagan tombs. Many of these are still intact. This cemetery came to light when Pius XII appointed men to excavate the pagan tombs. Many of these are still intact. Students who live in Rome for six years or more say that, no matter how much they have seen, each day brings new surprises, in this ancient city. We had but a mere ten days in which to try to drink in all the glories of Rome. They were most interesting and enjoyable days and it was with considerable regret that we eventually forced ourselves to say "Arrivederci" to our Aussie confreres and to head for France.

REV. FATHER PAUL MURRAY, D.D.

Another distinguished Old Boy we should like to congratulate this year is Rev. Father Paul Murray, D.D., who was awarded his Doctorate in Theology at St. Patrick's College, Manly, in October.

Paul Murray passed the Leaving Certificate at Darlinghurst in 1946. From 1947 to 1952 he followed courses at the Massey Agricultural College of the University of New Zealand, graduating Master of Agricultural Science in 1952. The following year he entered the diocesan seminary at Springwood to begin his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained in 1958.

It was yet another milestone in Paul Murray's brilliant career when he received the title of Doctor of Divinity at a gathering presided over by His Eminence the Cardinal and in the presence of the Apostolic Delegate, their Lordships Bishop James Freeman, D.D., and Thomas Muldoon, D.D. Also present were the Professors of the Faculty, representatives of the Clergy, and Dr. Murray's family and friends.

MR. G. I. DAVEY, K.C.S.G.

We cannot let this year's issue of "Blue and Blue" go to print without reference to an illustrious Old Boy of Darlinghurst. This year Mr. Geoffrey Davey was decorated by His Holiness Pope John XXIII with the title of Papal Knight.

Geoffrey Davey completed his secondary education at the High School in the midtwenties, winning an Exhibition to the University and later graduating as Bachelor of Engineering. Geoffrey Davey has always kept in touch with his Alma Mater either by his activities in the Old Boys' Union or by his provision of the Geoffrey Davey science prizes each year.

After his early days with the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board and in Papua, he commenced private practice as a consulting engineer and is now the governing partner of the firm Gutteridge, Haskins and Davey. He has been responsible for engineering work throughout Australia and the Pacific on behalf of the Government and local authorities. He has also planned numerous ecclesiastical buildings. Geoffrey Davey is a member of the advisory board of St. Vincent's and the Mater Misericordiae Hospitals, and is honorary consulting engineer for the Poliomyelitis Society of N.S.W.

His married life has been singularly blessed by God, as his son is a student for the priesthood with the Dominicans, and one daughter is a professed nun in the Dominican Order.





The Wyndham Report

(A brief summary for parents)

In September, 1953, a Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. H. S. Wyndham began a survey of secondary education in New South Wales. Its terms of reference were:

- 1. To survey and to report upon the provision of full-time day education for adolescents in New South Wales.
- 2. In particular to examine the objectives, organisation and content of the courses provided for adolescent pupils in the public schools of the State, regard being paid to the requirements of a good general education and to the desirability of providing a variety of curriculum adequate to meet the varying aptitudes and abilities of the pupils concerned.

The Committee considered evidence submitted by two hundred and twenty-six persons and institutions and submitted a comprehensive report to the Minister for Education in October, 1957. The main recommendations of the report are summarised here:

1. Transition from Primary to Secondary School.

In general, on the completion of the primary school course at about the age of twelve years, all pupils should proceed without examination to secondary schooling. The report suggested further that, to aid in the transition, First Year Secondary Classes should be taught as far as possible by a class teacher, the use of specialised subject teachers being kept to a minimum.

2. Secondary Education for All.

The organisation of the High Schools should be so designed as to provide a secondary education for all adolescents and should cover four years to the age of about sixteen. This necessarily means that the normal High School would be large (probably more than 600 pupils) and provision should be made for breaking the school up into houses, each limited to a number that one housemaster could get to know personally. This type of school, to which all the

children of one area go, irrespective of ability, is called a "Comprehensive" High School

3. Subjects to be Studied:

All should study a basic core of subjects, including English, Social Studies, Science, Mathematics, Music, Art, Crafts, Physical and Health Education and Religious Education. The teacher would be free to adapt these subjects to the needs and abilities of the pupils and to the conditions of the particular school. After the first year the pupils may, with teacher guidance, elect to study, more deeply than others, some subjects for which they have shown greater potential.

The following list indicates the general range of electives, most or all of which a comprehensive secondary school would be expected to provide: Art, Commercial Principles and Practice, Geography, History, Home Science, Languages (Ancient and Modern), Manual Arts (e.g., Drawing, Metalwork, Woodwork), Mathematics, Music, Science (e.g., Agriculture, Biology, Botany, Chemistry, Geology, Physics).

After the first year, the time devoted to the "core" should depend upon the ability of the pupils, but might normally be in successive years about 75, 65 and 60 per cent. of the total school time. The opportunity for choice of courses should be kept as open as possible. There should be no objection to a pupil's attempting an elective course and then changing it or reverting to the core subject if his first choice proved to be unsuitable.

4. The School Certificate Examination:

There should be an internal examination at the end of the fourth year. As far as core subjects are concerned, the examination should be set at the level of the pupil of average ability. In the case of elective subjects, account should be taken of the fact that the standard of work should provide opportunity for the most able pupils. The fact that some will continue their studies beyond this stage should not mean that the

examination will be pitched at their level of ability. The examination would be conducted by the Department of Education and successful candidates would be awarded a school certificate by the Director-General of Education,

5. Early Leavers:

There should be no external examination nor any certificate of general status issued before the School Certificate. Early leavers should be given only a formal statement of their attainment, attendance, and conduct. The reason for this is that the Committee wishes to build up a system of education which would encourage all pupils to remain at school until the School Certificate Examination.

6. The Higher School Certificate.

Pupils who wish to proceed beyond the School Certificate level, including those who wish to go on to the University, should remain at school for two more years to follow specialised courses leading to a further examination known as the Higher School Certificate Examination. This stage of schooling should be designed to meet the needs of the most capable adolescents between the ages of sixteen and eighteen, but is not to be regarded merely as a preparation for matriculation. Provision should be made

for school activities which are essential for education but which do not involve preparation for examinations.

The number of subjects studied should be fewer than at present prescribed for the Leaving Certificate but due regard should be paid to the need for balance in the choice of subjects. It is to be hoped that the selective nature of this group of pupils, and their greater maturity at the age of eighteen, should make possible a provision of courses which will afford them better prospects of success in the early stages of University study.

7. Aid for Students.

The problem of helping the pupil who might otherwise be forced, largely because of economic circumstances, to leave school early, should be met by a review of the number and conditions of the award of bursaries. The special problems of the country school were also taken into account. It was suggested that the needs of the majority of children in country areas could be catered for in the four years of the school certificate course and that fifth and sixth year students could be concentrated in the bigger towns. Such a solution would necessarily be associated with the awarding of bursaries, the establishment of hostels and subsidised travel for the pupils.








Men's Auxiliary

Jim Lynch has completed almost a full circle of the Public Service Engineering Departments and now works for the Water Conservation and Irrigation Commission.


Kevin Torpy is the family chemist out Villawood way. Kevin is always willing to sell matrimony to any of his bachelor associates.
