Foreword

With each successive edition of "Blue and Blue," one's thoughts return naturally to the tradition-filled span of the School's eighty-seven years' existence, characterized not only by notable achievements but also by men of learning and renown. But of all those years one, in particular, 1911, requires our attention in this edition, for on April 9th of that year, the late Archbishop Kelly, fondly revered as "Michael the builder," solemnly blessed and opened our present building.

That auspicious day held great promise for the Marist Brothers and for Catholic education, which induced the editor of the inaugural number of "Blue and Blue," of July, 1911, to write: "The new building on, perhaps, one of the finest sites in Sydney, overlooking the whole extent of the harbour, from the Heads to Lady Macquarie's Chair, and towering above its surroundings, is a fitting crown for past labours and the Marists' gift to Christian education . . . The School now enters its third era of prosperity and we confidently predict that the records of the past will be more than maintained in the new building crowning the heights of Darlinghurst."

Vicissitudes there have been in the fifty years since then: two World Wars, the depression, and shrinking enrolments, at times so low that many foretold the closure of the "School on Darlinghurst Hill." Fortunately, prophets of doom have judged wrongly. In November, a record of 62 candidates sat for the Leaving Certificate, aspirants are not wanting for the priesthood and religious life, a strong spirit of study prevails, the Parents and Friends' Association has provided a magnificent science laboratory, the Old Boys' Union flourishes, while our teams have acquitted themselves with great credit on the playing field.

It is, therefore, confidently hoped that our 1911 Editor of "Blue and Blue" will indeed be right, that "records of the past will be maintained," nay bettered in years to come.

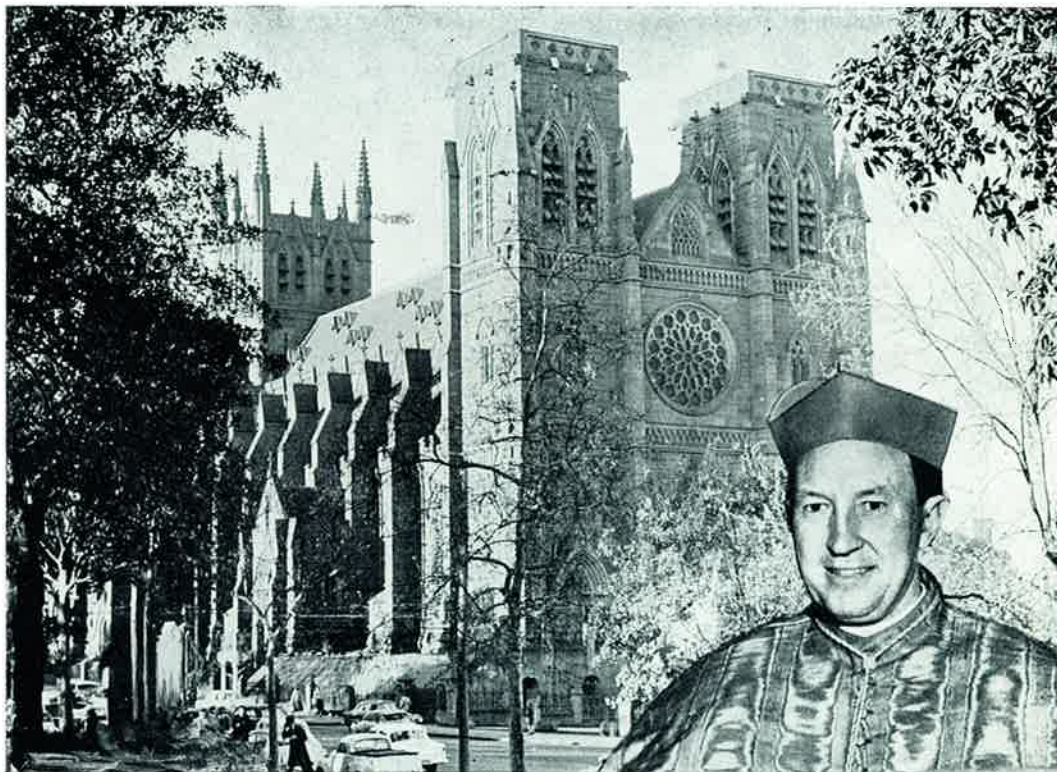

In Retrospect

(Reprinted partly from 1935 "Blue and Blues")

LOOKING back over the last sixty years—from the pioneer stage to days of final success and fruition—it is with a sense of justifiable pride and satisfaction that one reviews the achievements of what may be called the first Catholic Day High School to be founded in Sydney—the Marist Brothers' High School. The current year marks the completion of fifty years of fruitful work on the part of this pioneer school at Darlinghurst, which has developed a tradition and a history of which we may well be proud.

The history of the School coincides, we may say, with the story of the development of the Marist Brothers in Australia, who first set foot on our shores in 1872, at the request of the Australian hierarchy, who desired to promote a system of Catholic education entirely divorced from the secular system of State school teaching which had been lately introduced by Sir Henry Parkes. Founded in France in 1817, the Marist Order purposed, as its primary object, to teach the children of the poor villages of France, but in accordance with the progressive needs of the times, it was clearly foreseen by the superiors that the cause of secondary Catholic education would, of necessity, eventually form part of the programme of such an extensive teaching order. Hence it was that after the first few years of foundation work at the Primary School of St. Patrick's, the Brothers, at the request of clergy and parents, decided to open a High School at the same site, in order to give Catholic boys the secondary education which, at that time, could be obtained (in the metropolitan area) only under the State system of education and in a State school. Accordingly the year 1875 saw the beginning of the first actual Catholic Day High School in Sydney. The revered Brother Augustine, so affectionately remembered by numerous Old Boys, was given charge of the new venture and, enlightened by the experience of the previous arduous years of pioneering work, he brought to the position entrusted to him, all the zeal and industry which characterised those early, devoted teachers. Such a modest beginning—a doubtful step in those uncertain times—was of deep significance in the his-

tory of Australian Catholic education. That fine, indomitable spirit of Catholic zeal, which had the courage to answer the politics of the day with a determined resistance, was just beginning to rejoice in the success which attended its first steps. Encouraged by this initial success, nothing was thought beyond the ability of our religious teachers and the fortitude and co-operation of our Catholic people, and it was the policy of our militant campaign to be inferior to none in our Catholic education; "just as good" even, would not be "good enough," and Henry Parkes, in debarring Catholic youth from the State school system, actually gave us a system of our own which more than recompenses us for our apparent loss.

Those early days at St. Patrick's—the cradle of Catholicity in Australia—were days of hard toil and slow progress. In his diary, Brother Augustine has left us graphic details of the hardships of the time and we may thank God for the courage and confidence in His Goodness which inspired those indomitable pioneers who laid the foundation of a most fruitful and progressive work. On the first day, the enrolment for the High School section reached 22, among those presented being E. J. Dwyer, later to be Sydney's leading Catholic bookseller. Within a short space of time the number reached 90 and already the need of further accommodation was being felt. In August, 1875, after seven months at the High School, Brother Augustine took charge of the school at St. Benedict's, to be replaced at St. Patrick's by Brother Joseph. Seven months' actual connection with the High School may seem but a weak claim to remembrance, but the significance of Brother Augustine's work deserves more than a casual reference. Originally one of the four Brothers who left France to plant the Marist ensign in Australia, his labours at St. Patrick's Primary School give him a claim to the gratitude of all who have benefited by the work of the Brothers. The high esteem in which he was held by all who knew him and the genuine affection manifested by his pupils towards him, bore testimony to the devoted zeal which characterised his work. After spending the declining years of his fruitful life at

St. Joseph's College, he passed to his reward in 1926, the last survivor of our pioneer community.

Brother Joseph, who succeeded Brother Augustine as director of the High School, remained in office till 1879. During his directorship the destiny of the school was moulded to success and the reputation of the Marist as secondary educators began to attract the notice of the public. Critics of the new enterprise were silenced by the results already obtained and to those who promoted the work every encouragement was given by the achievements which compared favourably with anything done by schools of older standing. Brother Joseph left for Napier, New Zealand, in 1878, and in 1879 Brother Emilian, later on the first director of St. Joseph's College, took charge. He had as first assistant the famous Brother Basil. At the urgent request of parents, Brother Emilian, who was always thoroughly up-to-date, took in boarders, but it soon became evident that the house and grounds were too restricted for a boarding-school, and hence a more eligible site, that at Hunter's Hill, was selected. The boarders were removed to Hunter's Hill in 1881, Brother Emilian becoming the director of the College subsequently erected there, and Brother Basil Head Teacher. Brother Wilbred filled the vacancy thus created at Harrington Street, becoming Head Teacher of the High School under the successive directorships of Brothers Letus and Felix.

The continued expansion of St. Patrick's at length necessitated a corresponding enlargement of premises and to meet requirements the Brothers were asked to transfer the High School to the grounds of St. Mary's Cathedral—thus leaving the top floor of St. Patrick's to be used as part of the Primary School. The transfer took place on August 15th, 1887, with Brother Paul Director and Brother Wilbred, Head Teacher. The advantages of the new position, as well as the fresh energy and zeal shown by both teachers and pupils in this second start, were responsible for the great impetus given to the progress of the school. The change ushered in an era of remarkable results in public examination work and Catholic Sydney might well have been proud of its High School—a standing monument to the self-sacrifice and courage of the Catholic community—and a magnificent answer to the State's own at-

tempt to secularise our education. In other spheres of activity, besides studies, the school came prominently before the public, and the Press of the time was eloquent in its praise of the dramatic work done at St. Mary's and applauded the musical education afforded by its recently formed Brass Band.

Throughout these years the dominating personality connected with the High School was Brother Wilbred, who dated his first association with the school away back in the seventies. Combining cultured scholarship with deep religious sincerity, his whole teaching career was a continual inspiration to all who had the happiness to come under his guidance. A versatile character in many respects, he was attracted to both science and literature, achieving equal success in both branches of learning. To his care was committed the early guidance of three of our most distinguished Australian writers — Quinn, Brady and Daly, and in his discerning appreciation and fine literary taste can be traced the influence which inspired the beauty of their work.

Brother Paul's term of directorship coincided with the years 1887 to 1893, and, as we have seen, was a period of formation and achievement which laid the foundations for years of success to follow. In 1893 he was called to Europe and taught for some time in the colleges of France—later on returning to our shores as Provincial of Australia and New Zealand. The vacancy left by him at the High School in 1893 was filled by Brother Henry, who had previously been a member of the High School staff. Under his capable direction the school continued its excellent work and it was a great loss to the Australian Province when he was transferred to South Africa, where he spent the last thirty years of his life. Brother Victor succeeded Brother Henry as principal.

Brother Victor is gratefully recognised as one of the founders of the Marist Order in Australia, being later on Provincial and then Master of Novices from 1912 to April of the present year. During twenty-three years as Novice Master, he had charge of the training of all members of the Institute recruited from Australia and New Zealand, and this responsible work he discharged with a zeal and devotedness which endeared him to the hearts of all his trainees. Following Brother Victor as director, Brother Ephrem next took charge, to be succeeded soon after

by the ever-memorable Brother Osmond, who was the first Marist Brother to take out his degree at an Australian University.

For two periods in the history of the school his scholarly attainments were directed towards the maintenance of the proud reputation of its public successes. While Director of St. Mary's Brother Osmond saw the last stage of the school's work at its second location and was the anxious guardian of its destiny during the troubled period of transition from St. Mary's to the present site at Darlinghurst.

For many reasons, it proved desirable that the Brothers should find a new site for their school; for this purpose a house was bought in Darley Street, Darlinghurst, with land adjoining, and immediate steps were taken towards building a new school worthy of the traditions of St. Mary's. The Brothers, together with their pupils left St. Mary's in September, 1910, and pending the completion of the new building, teaching was continued in the very restricted quarters at the Brothers' residence and in a little Presbyterian Hall in Palmer Street, Darlinghurst, which had been hired for the emergency. Those pupils who could not be accommodated at either of these two centres or at the other Marist establishments then existing, drifted off to various public schools, most of them returning when the new building was ready. Not until Easter of 1911, with Brother Borgia as Director, was the new school thrown open to pupils. The blessing and the official opening ceremonies were performed later on 9th July, by His Grace Archbishop Kelly. Speaking on that occasion the Archbishop congratulated the Brothers on the excellence of the work they had done at their High School and prophesied years of fruitful labour for the cause of Catholic Education. He was delighted to see the work about to continue in such ideal surroundings and with a new school so well equipped in every detail for the requirements of modern secondary teaching. He emphasised what he termed the "political aspect" of the school, pointing out that the High School, founded as it was as a protest against the secularised education sponsored by the State, had not failed in this all-important trust, but had proved most worthy of the magnificent cause which it represented.

The advantages of the recent change were

reflected in the public examination results at the time and Brother Borgia's term of office stands out as a period of unusual success. After many years of fruitful work in New South Wales and New Zealand, Brother Borgia was in 1930 appointed Provincial of South Africa, where his marked organising and educational ability were placed at the service of the Marist Brothers' schools in that province.

The year 1913 saw Brother Osmond again reinstated at the High School as Director, his term of office having been interrupted by a much deserved trip on the continent, during which time Brother Joseph replaced him as Acting Director. These two teachers, ripe scholars themselves, and particularly interested in science, did much to place the sciences taught at the school on a very high plane. It is mainly to them that we owe the well-equipped and up-to-date laboratory, which in those days of apparent prejudice against sciences, seemed a blind alley for useless expenditure. Brother Osmond left Australia at the beginning of this year to join with Brother Borgia in giving to the South African province the benefit of his wide experience in our own country.

In 1918 the position of Principal fell to the lot of the ever-popular and highly-esteemed Brother Gerard, who to-day is regarded as one of the foremost leaders in educational activities in New South Wales. It is impossible to estimate the immense debt owed by the school to his devoted zeal and wide learning. As a man of genial character and inspiring personality and a religious of genuine fervour, he exercised a deep influence over the boys who passed under his care during the recent decades of the school's history. His memory among the boys will be ever revered and loved. His first term as headmaster extended from 1918 to 1923, another period of outstanding success in studies and sport and characterised by a fine manly, moral tone among the pupils — a tribute to Brother Gerard's inspiring leadership.

Leaving Darlinghurst in December, 1923, Brother Gerard was transferred to St. Joseph's College as Master of Studies. The High School then came under the direction of Brother George, that noted Marist teacher and prominent educationist. It was to be Brother George's last work and the vacancy left by his deeply regretted and untimely

death in 1926, seems never to have been filled. At the Requiem Mass celebrated at St. Patrick's, the late Very Rev. Dr. M. J. O'Reilly, C.M., a personal friend of the deceased, paid eloquent tribute to the noble character of Brother George:—

"He was a strong, virile and thorough man, transparently sincere. There was no double dealing in him, for he was incapable of it. He saw things with a quick intuition and unfailing judgment. When he dealt with men, he dealt with them as fellow-men, and there was in his dealing a friendliness, a kindness and a spirit of broadminded humanity. Brother George went through life without an enemy, and it is no impeachment for him. It was not weakness or desertion of principle, it was not compromise but it was his special outstanding merit that no man could hate him for his heart was so big, and so pronounced were his sincerity and honesty that no one could have anything but the highest regard for Brother George."

When the early stages of his last illness began to appear early in 1926, Brother George was sent to New Zealand, where he died the same year. Brother Ambrose, who in the meantime, had been Acting-Director of the High School went to Europe at the end of 1926, and Brother Denis became Principal. Brother Denis had previously been Provincial of the newly-created province of New Zealand and had distinguished himself in many ways in the works of the Marist Order.

Always courteous and affable, he endeared himself to parents and students alike. No exertion was too great for him to make in the interests of his pupils. His wide scholastic and practical knowledge of school affairs made him an admirable Headmaster and it was with deep regret that the students saw him removed from their midst in August, 1928, to take charge of St. Joseph's College, Hunter's Hill.

For the last few months of 1928, Brother Walstan, Director of St. Patrick's, assumed control till the return of Brother Gerard from Europe, when the latter commenced his second term of office as headmaster of Darlinghurst. Reference has already been made to Brother Gerard's amiable character and devoted work and on returning once more to his old field of labour, he mani-

festated the same inspiring enthusiasm which had always been a feature of his work among boys. Looking back over the six years, 1929-1934, we again remark the distinguishing characteristics of his capable guidance—a high standard of scholastic achievements, together with a spirit of cordial co-operation between teachers and boys. At present Brother Gerard is stationed at the Marist Brothers Juniorate, Mittagong, but still takes a keen interest in the High School activities. Our best wishes follow him to his new sphere of work.

During the 1935 Jubilee Year Brother Columba was in charge of the High School. His thoroughness and devotion to duty were rewarded by the continued success of the High School. It was a period of extraordinary achievement in MCC sporting activities. This was the era when Ray Lindwall flourished at Darlinghurst as a champion cricketer and accomplished footballer and athlete. Brother Columba's life was cut short by a tragic road accident at Newcastle in 1950.

It was during Brother Columba's directorship that the Parents' and Friends' Association was inaugurated in August, 1935. This very active body grew from strength to strength and within twenty-five years was so highly organised as to be able to raise, by art unions and fetes, thousands of pounds for the renovation of the Brothers' monastery and school laboratory.

In 1941 and 1942 Brother Frederic was Director at Darlinghurst. Words fail to indicate his unique personality. Old Boys of those years still speak with enthusiasm and delight of his exhilarating teaching, his remarkably quick wit, and the profound and lasting impression made on them. His untimely death in 1943 deprived the Marist Order of one of its most valued members.

The years 1935-1950 are interrupted by the war years 1939-1945 and the progress of the school was retarded when the number of pupils in the secondary department dwindled in the late 40's. These diminished numbers were obviously a result of the depression of the 30's. In 1936 a good friend of the High School passed to his reward in the person of Father Piquet, a saintly Marist priest who in fifty-six years at Church Hill had become a household word in Sydney.

In the years before the war the High School was part of St. Mary's Cathedral parish and there was great rejoicing when an ex-student of the Brothers, Archbishop Gilroy, was appointed Coadjutor Archbishop of Sydney with right of succession to Archbishop Kelly. Another link with an earlier era was broken when Brother Denis who had directed the High School in the mid twenties died at Forbes.

In June, 1940, Darlinghurst joined the other Marist Brothers schools of Australia in celebrating the Centenary of the death of Marcellin Champagnat, Marist priest and founder of the Marist Brothers. But such celebrations were few and far between during the dark war years.

At this time we read in the annals of the School of architects being called in to advise on the building of air raid trenches in the confined space of the old school yard. Brothers and boys set about defending themselves against the ravages of a possible air raid and the Brothers volunteered as air raid wardens also.

Magazines at the end of the war show an honour roll in keeping with the best traditions of Darlinghurst. Three hundred Old Boys had volunteered for active service, thirty had made the supreme sacrifice while twelve names were recorded of those who have been decorated for outstanding bravery in the face of the enemy.

Almost coinciding with the cessation of hostilities and the accompanying celebrations was the announcement that Archbishop Gilroy had been proclaimed Cardinal by Pope Pius XII. This was closely followed by the consecration of an ex-student Rev. John Toohey as Coadjutor Bishop of Maitland to which he succeeded on the death of Bishop Gleeson.

Reference has already been made to a feature of early post war years at Darlinghurst, the small number of secondary students in the School. For example there were fewer than 100 boys at the first school assembly in 1948. Plans were discussed for the closing of the High School. Brothers and Old Boys could not reconcile themselves to this and intensive canvassing of the Sydney parishes brought the numbers back to reasonable proportions. Then a general increase in the school population felt over Australia put Darlinghurst on its feet again and at the end of 1959 we find that the total enrolment had exceeded 500.

There was much renovating called for at the High School after the war, and Brother Michael made quite a notable start by rebuilding the toilet block in the corner of the yard and thus extending the playground area. Brother Fergus took an even bigger step in drawing up plans for the remodelling of the Brothers' House. However, it fell to his successor Brother Demetrius and his vigorous Parents' and Friends' Association to raise the necessary funds to implement these plans. The Old Boys' Union also played its part in shouldering this heavy financial burden. So quickly was the mammoth debt paid off that Brother Norman the present Director was able to call for further plans for remodelling the old laboratory which now as in its earlier days compares more than favourably with the modern science blocks being built in Sydney.

A feature of post war years has been the great expansion in air travel and this has brought the Brothers in closer contact with the Marist world. So it was in 1952 that Darlinghurst and the other Marist Brothers' schools of Australia welcomed to Australia the Brother Superior General, Brother Leonida, and the newly elected Brother Assistant General, Brother Justinian. In 1953 cadets and other students of the High School were conspicuous in their demonstration of faith at the National Eucharistic Congress and of loyalty to their sovereign at the time of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Finally on Pentecost Sunday, 1955, the Brothers in Australia and those fortunate enough to be able to travel to Rome rejoiced at God's special blessing on their congregation when Pope Pius XII beatified the founder of the Marist Brothers, Marcellin Champagnat. About this time the then headmaster of the High School, Brother Demetrius, was selected by his Superiors to further his studies overseas and Darlinghurst was to lose a Director who at the present day had done so much to help the High School keep up with modern requirements.

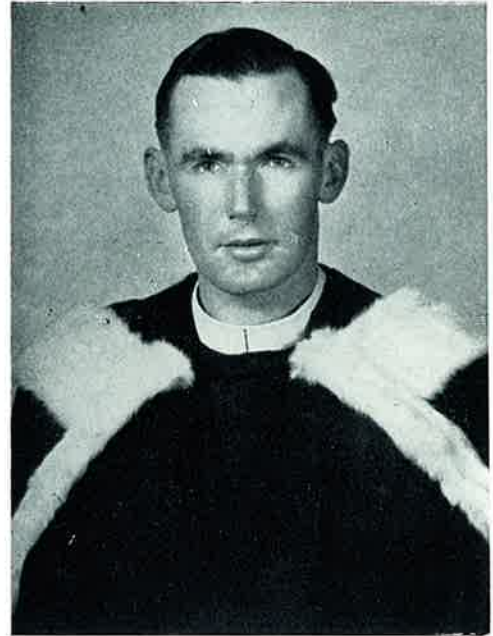
Darlinghurst is well equipped to play its part to the full in the implementation of the Wyndham report when such educational giants as Brothers Gerard, Frederic and Michael have graced the stage during a generation that has built up a fine tradition of loyalty and learning which the present boys are justly proud to uphold.

Rev. Brother Michael, Ph.D.

A name which more recent Old Boys recall with pleasure is that of Brother Michael who was on the teaching staff of the High School from 1946 to 1954, during the last four years of which he was Director. Ex-students still talk of his teaching of Mathematics and Physics, but it is in the Field of Classics that Brother Michael has achieved greater distinction in his university course.

After graduating from Sydney University with a Bachelor of Arts degree with double First Class Honours in Latin and Greek, he was invited to do a postgraduate course at Oxford University. After some delay Brother Michael accepted the invitation and returned to Australia at the beginning of this year with the degree, Ph.D.

Brother Michael has called on us a few times during the year when he has visited Sydney from the Marist Brothers' Training College at Mittagong.

*Rev. Father Fallon, M.S.C.*

As usual we celebrated our annual ordination at the School this year. The happy

occasion was the morning of a First Mass celebrated by Rev. Father Michael Fallon. Brothers and boys joined in the Dialogue Mass under the guidance of Rev. Father Grew.

After spending a short period at Darlinghurst Father Fallon entered the Apostolic School of the Sacred Heart Fathers at Douglas Park in 1950. He continued his theological studies at Croydon, Victoria, in 1955 and was ordained in Sydney at mid year.

After celebrating a First Mass at the Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst, he was invited to the School by Brother Norman when a presentation on behalf of the Brothers and students was made by Anthony Hagan. Father spoke briefly in thanks and after a vain effort to hear the old school war cry from more civilised present day boys Father with his mother and sister joined the Brothers in a luncheon to mark the happy occasion.

Father Michael is the third member of his family to join the Sacred Heart Fathers. His two brothers, Fathers E. Fallon, M.S.C. and J. Fallon, M.S.C. are away on the foreign missions. A sister is a member of the Order of the Servants of the Blessed Sacrament in Victoria.

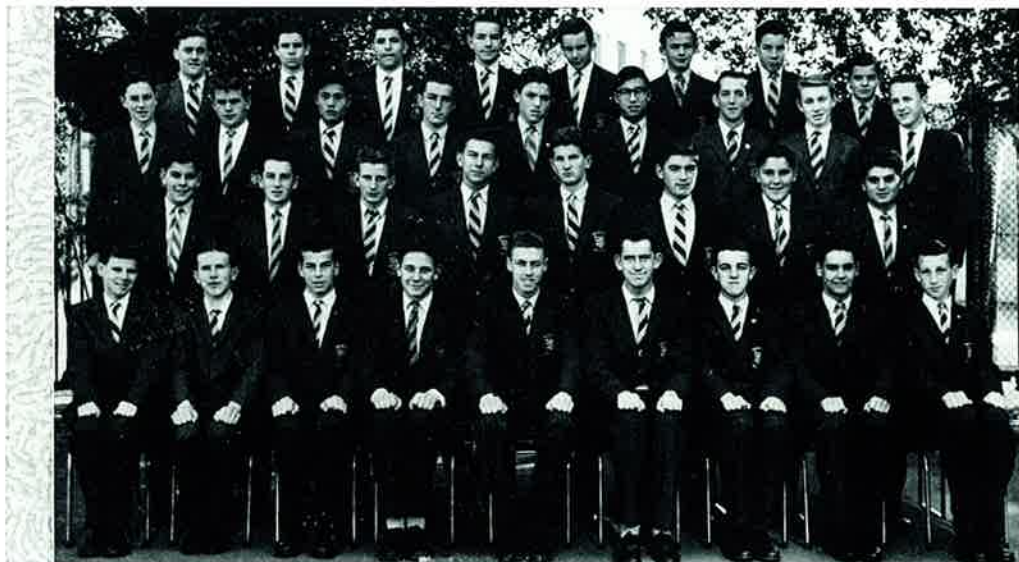

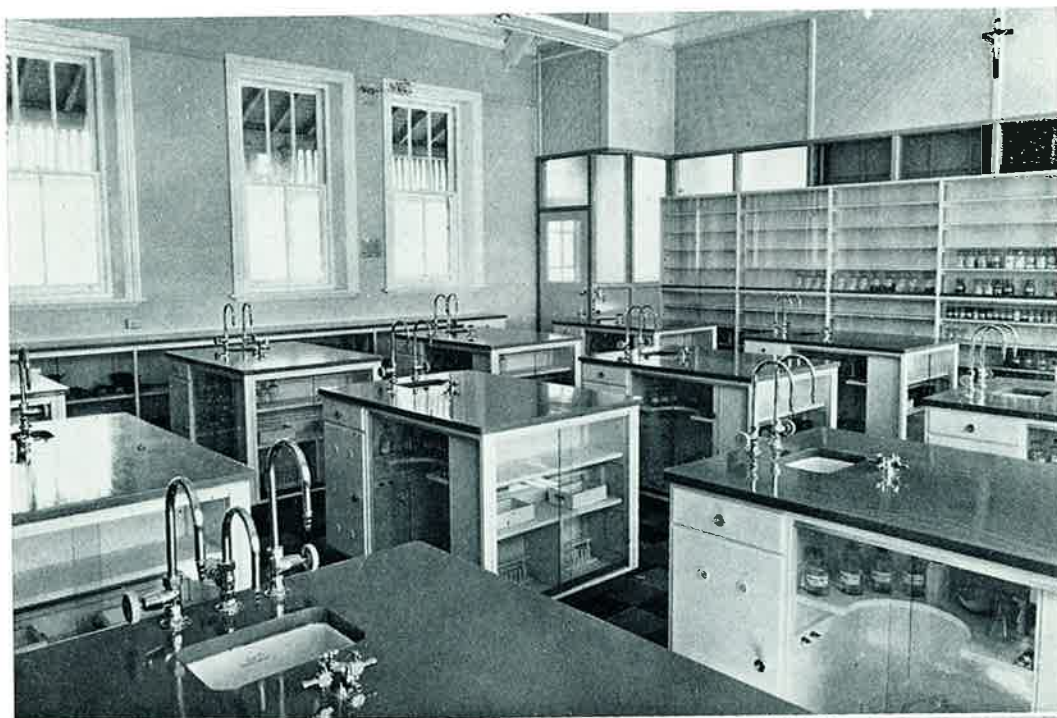

New Laboratory

ON THE WALL of the renovated laboratory is a plaque to commemorate the splendid effort of the Parents and Friends' Association in raising the necessary funds in our year of jubilee. In a "Blue and Blue" of fifty years ago we read the following account of scientific research at Darlington—

"The chemistry and physics rooms which have been splendidly equipped with most up to date apparatus, including a wireless plant, occupy the second floor."

Even now we may not have a rocket range at the top of the school, but the words above have become true again, half a century later.

The years had taken their toll; the tall benches in keeping with the spacious room bore a written record of fifty years of service. Our forefathers had truly left their mark. But all traces were swept away in the early weeks of 1961 and piles of rubble from the dismembered laboratory waited in the school yard for the City Council trucks to arrive.

As the year progressed the science rooms, still on the top floor, began to take on a "new look" for the local pavement foremen as they took time out of school and went

on their periodical tours of inspection. The walls had been tastily painted in pastel colours to cover up the stains of many years. Rows of shining glassware filled the modern presses along the walls and the physics apparatus, once crowded into a corner of a small annexe, was now at hand.

Neat island benches had replaced their unwieldy prototypes. Perhaps a glance at the photos elsewhere in the "Blue and Blue" will save many words and give a picture of a work bench complete with water, filter pump, gas and electricity.

Today after a year's use the laboratory is the envy of all the Brothers who inspect it. The well cared for desks and benches invite the respect with which the present boys treat them. Modern equipment has replaced the time worn pieces that graced the first laboratory fifty years ago. The new laboratory will give even better service than its original.

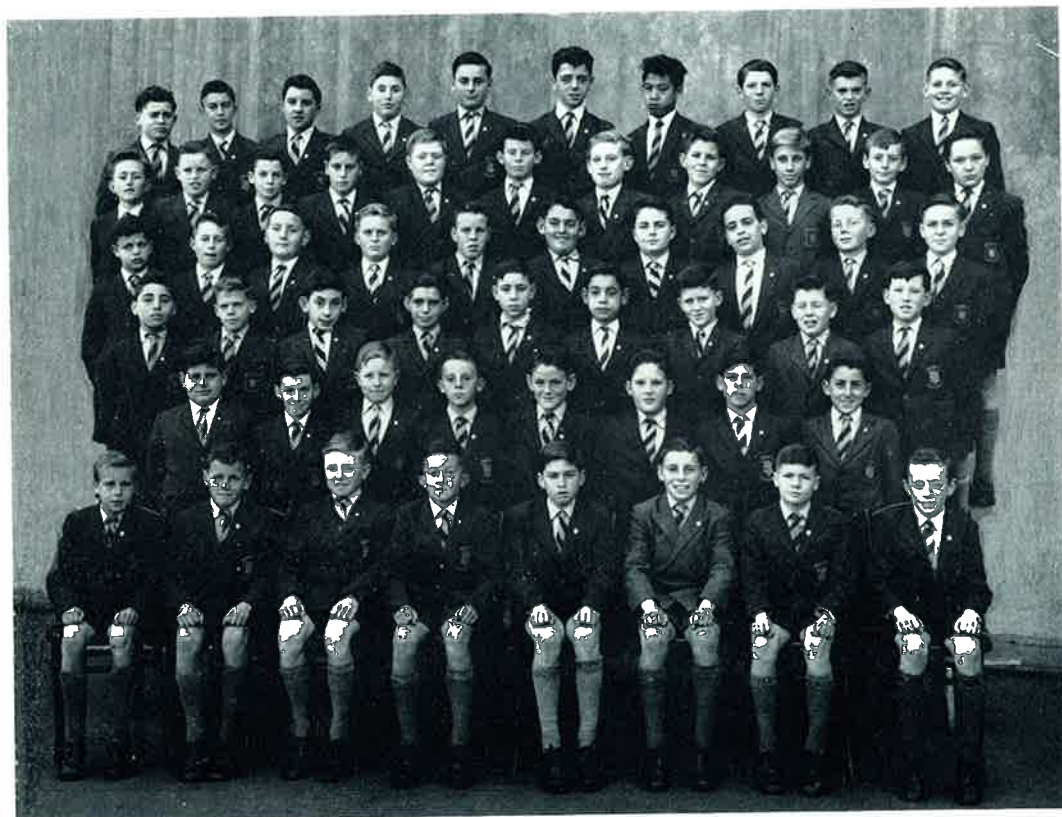

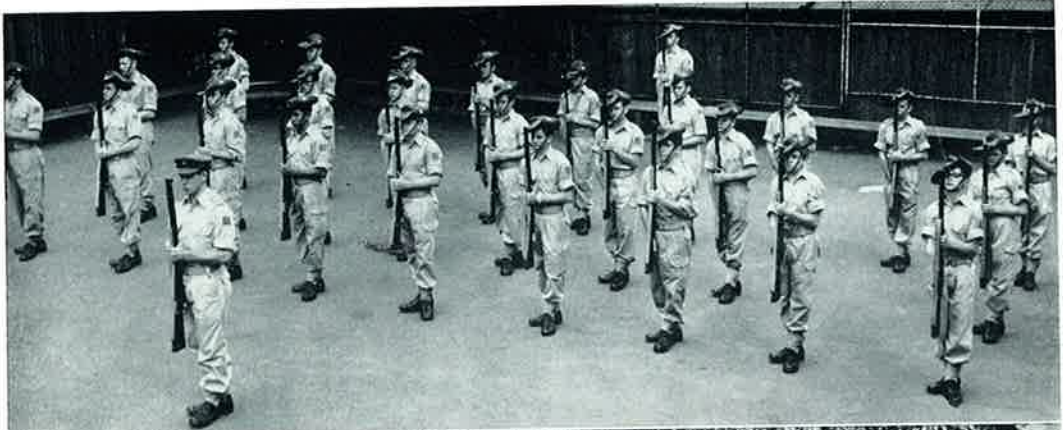

Realising that it was our Jubilee Year, Brother Ambrose, claiming to be the only survivor of the Marist Brothers who taught at St. Mary's Cathedral School penned the following letter to Brother Norman.

Institution N-D de Valbenoite,
10, Place de l'Abbaye,
Saint Etienne (Loire)
France.

1st January, 1961.

Dear Brother Director,

Just a short note from the sole survivor of the old St. Mary's School, the only one who remains of the Brothers who first lived in Stoneleigh, the Darley St., House, the last of those who went to Palmer St. Presbyterian chapel to teach catechism. Brother Osmond, the Director, who was attending the University of Sydney, was living at St. Benedict's. Brothers Hubert, Luke, Dionysius and myself saw every brick laid in the new school. Poor old Brother Septimus, our cook, pointing his beard over the fence during breaks and Mr. Ready in the parour with the L.C. Class.

This must be about the Golden Jubilee of Darlinghurst High School. I shall be at your celebration, at least in spirit. I spent many happy years at St. Mary's with Brothers Ephrem, Borgia and Michael. This makes me feel old but thank God I am still in good health, able to do my day's teaching, giving a hand with prefect work and in the infirmary.

I shall not try to recall the names of the Old Boys; the list would be too long, but I should be grateful if you remember me to the very old ones of 1905-1912 and 1926 assuring them that I remember their intentions.

I have been for the last fourteen years at Saint Etienne a big school with 230 boarders and 530 day boys fully equipped for secondary work up to Leaving Honours. Our schools in France are overcrowded; no sooner have we finished building them than they are too small. I suppose you have the same situation in Australia.

With best wishes to yourself, Brother Director, and to the Community.

P.S. There must have been chaos during the change over from St. Mary's to Darlinghurst. In the archives at St. Mary's Cathedral we learn that one class was at St. Patrick's, Church Hill, two were in makeshift rooms in St. Mary's Primary School, while four classes rented at low rate the old Presbyterian Hall in Palmer Street, East Sydney. (Ed.).

Brother Quentin, Provincial, sent his best wishes at the Jubilee Communion Breakfast. Brother Quentin wrote: "May I ask you to convey to all present my best wishes for this occasion. To look back over fifty years is a salutary experience. It puts in perspective our present efforts and sets them up against a glorious history. But it is more important to look ahead — to regard the present as a challenge in order that we may carry the work of the school into the future. We can do this with confidence when we consider all those who have done so well in the past. We honour those Brothers, boys and ex-students who have set high the standards of the School at Darlinghurst and we must endeavour to live up to their standards. Few schools have a record as proud as that of Darlinghurst and we should be failing in a sacred trust if we did not do all in our power to maintain and improve those standards."

A familiar face at most Old Boys' functions even at the present day is that of Bert Quoye. Bert attended St. Mary's before the High School at Darlinghurst was built. When the Old Boys' Union was inaugurated in 1912 he was elected to the Committee and filled all positions to be president in the years 1928-1929. When the School Bursary Board was founded Bert was a member and is one of the trustees.

Old Boys of his time remember Bert in his grocery business and more especially as manager of the Brighton Theatre. He now lives in retirement with his wife and family at Bellevue Hill.

When later ex-students read of Bert Quoye they immediately recall Morton Quoye, his nephew, who was president of the O.B.U. in the late fifties and was as enthusiastic as his uncle before him.

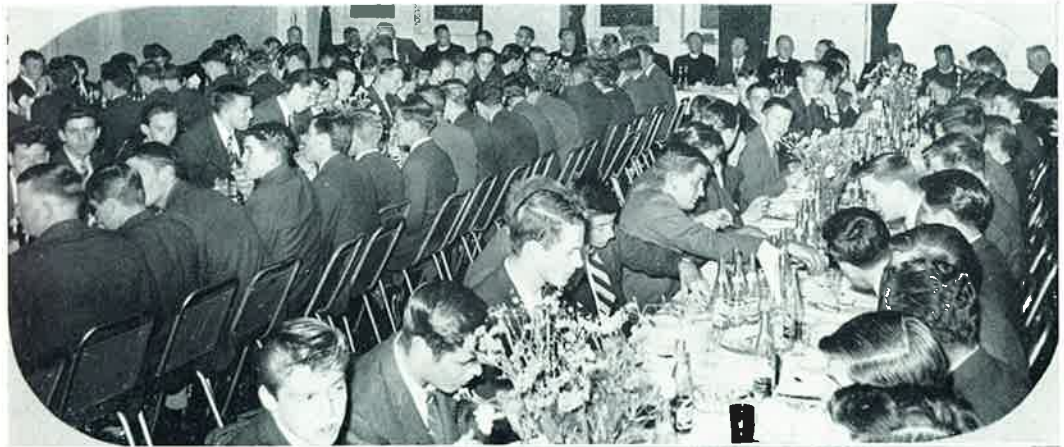

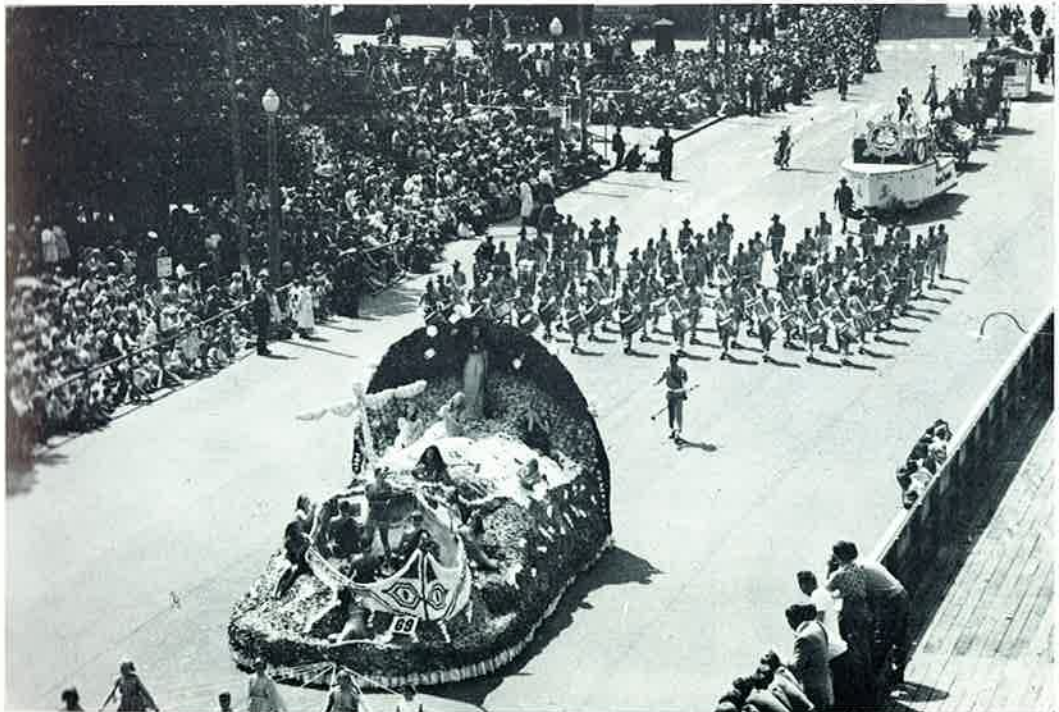
country boys who had yet to be initiated into this modern sport. Although neither the city nor the country found any champions, a most novel and enjoyable evening was spent by all.

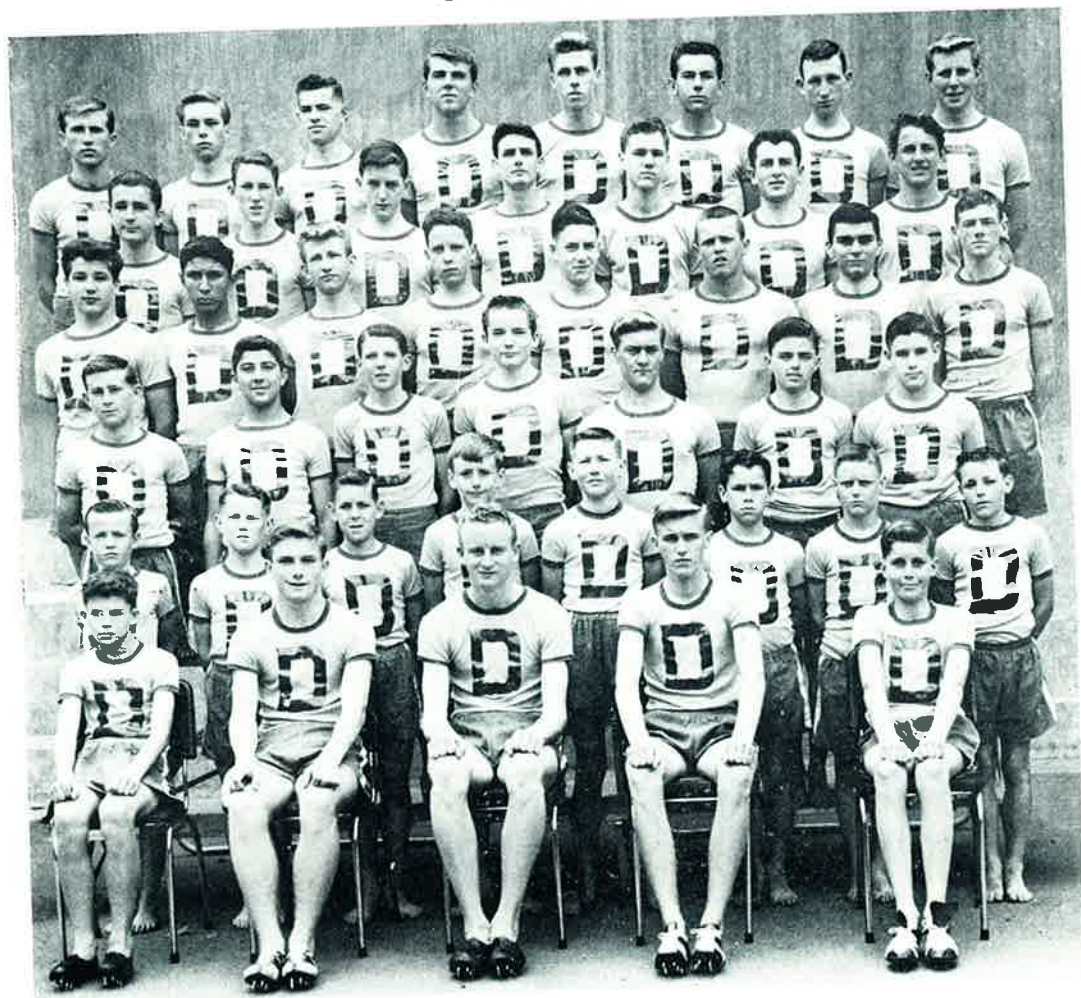

DEATH OF MR. CYRIL LYNCH

Brilliant scholar and well-known barrister, who had completed his Bar Admission Board course in the record time of 15 months, Mr. Cyril Bartholomew Lynch, who died recently in Sydney, had served in both World Wars and later became a member of the Superior Council of Australia of the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

Outstandig pupil of the Marist Brothers' School, Darlinghurst, Mr. Lynch gained five A's and a medal for Greek in the 1912 Junior public examinations, being second in aggregate marks for the University prize for general proficiency, awarded to Basil Helmore, now a leading Newcastle solicitor.

As a Senior in 1914 he was equal first in Greek, third in Latin and with two other first class passes. He matriculated with honors, gaining a University exhibition, and after a special examination in 1915 on completion of his first year studies, left for France where he served three years. He later gained his Arts degree as an evening student in 1923.

Changi Prisoner

For a time he taught at Albury, Newcastle and Mosman before being called to the Bar in May, 1938.

In World War II he was for four years a prisoner in Changi, Singapore.

He is survived by his wife Dorothy, two sons, Joseph (New Guinea), and Michael, and two daughters, Patricia and Helen. One son, Maurice, predeceased him. Joseph, now an officer of the Commonwealth Crown Law Office, was shot down over the Dortmund-Ems canal in World War II and arrived home on the same day as his father, neither knowing the other's fate through the years of captivity.

Intellectually gifted as was Frederick Ozanam, Cyril Lynch took part in St. Vincent de Paul work after the war, as a Westmead Boys' Home committee member, and was first president of the Maternal Heart of Mary Conference, also taking a leading part in initiating the re-organising of the Particular Council of Sydney by decentralisation.—R.I.P.

Tony Musso (L.C. 1936), like all his brothers, is now a doctor practising in the Bankstown area.

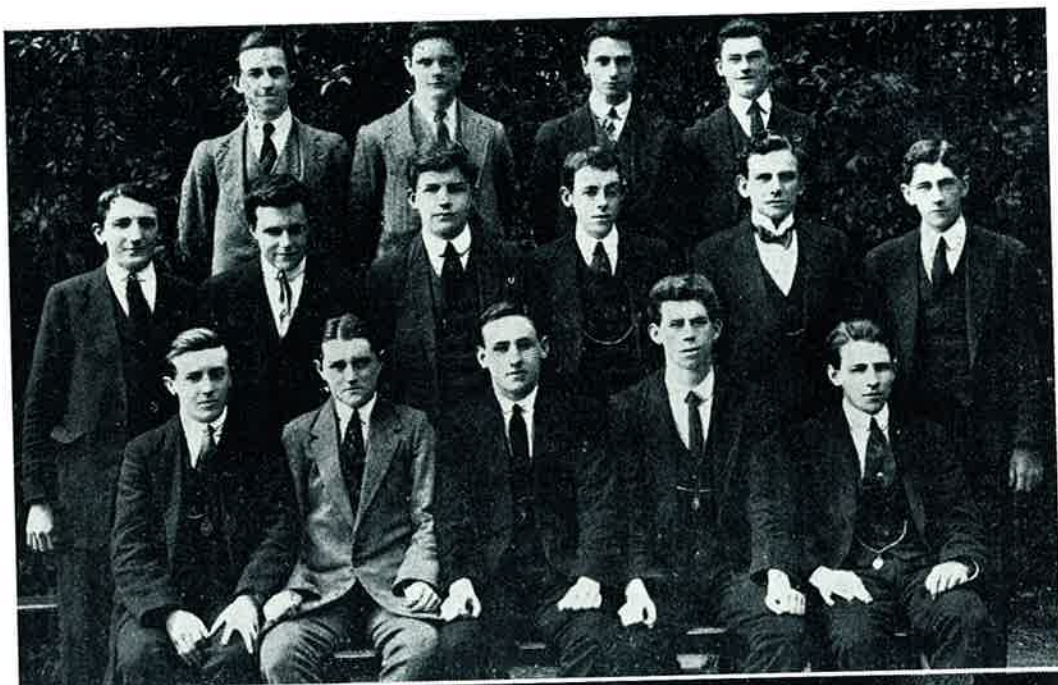
Tom Sullivan (L.C. 1937) is a Surveyor; unfortunately we see very little of him at O.B.U. functions.

Roger Ford spent four years in accountancy but found the work too dull. Recently he joined the Police Force.

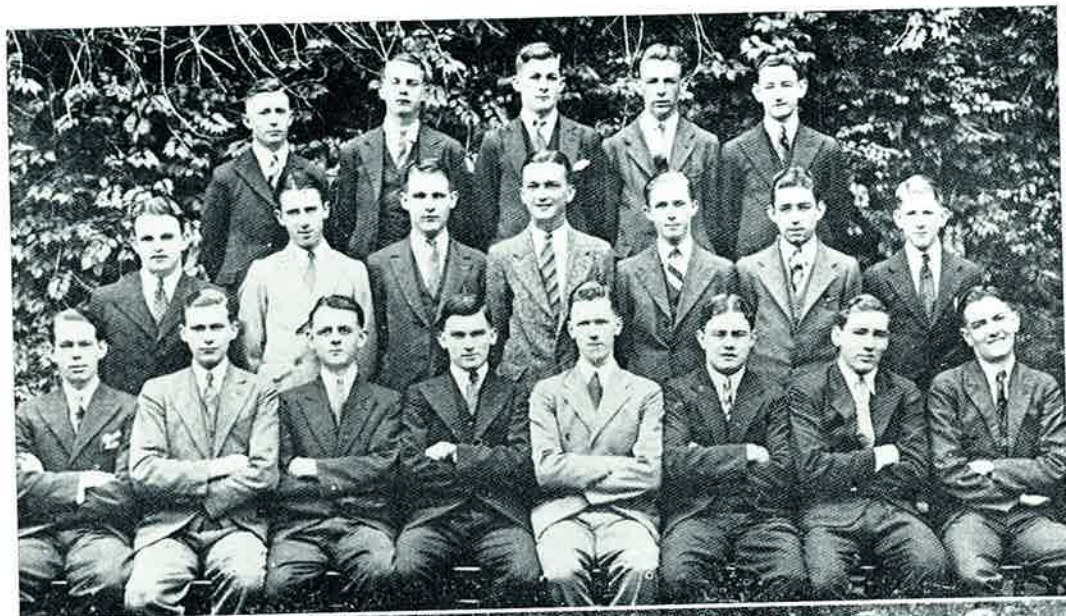

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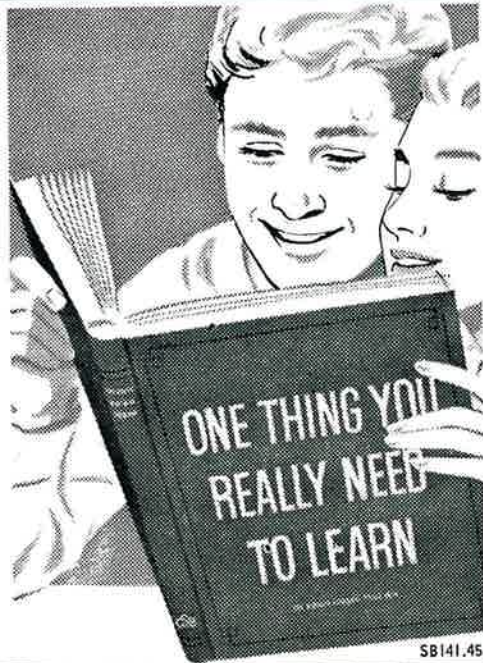
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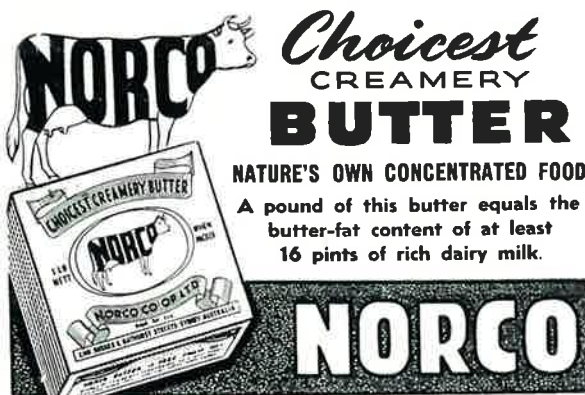
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
