

Foreword

At Old Boys' Reunions what often gives greatest pleasure is the recollection of former teachers, especially of headmasters. Some have been noted for their sense of discipline and order; some for their friendly manner; some for their scholarship; and some for their piety. But wherever Old Boys of Darlinghurst congregate, one headmaster is rarely forgotten: Brother Gerard, administrator, scholar, teacher, and Marist Brother. On the 2nd July he celebrated the Diamond Jubilee of his religious profession. To him this 1963 edition of "Blue and Blue," record of our eighty-ninth year, is respectfully dedicated.

No teacher can fail to leave something of himself in his pupils. Marist Brothers' Missions in Oceania

HIS year the Australian Province of the Marist Brothers celebrate the Silver Jubilee of the foundation of their mission in the Solomon Islands. World War II followed quickly in the wake of the new opening, in which the Brothers suffered tragic personal and material losses. As you will see as you read on three Australian Brothers lost their lives; also mentioned are the three other Brothers who were rescued when already ranged up before a firing squad.

The Marist Brothers have long been connected with the missions in the Pacific Islands. The connection dates back to the first missions in Oceania, entrusted to the Marist Fathers in 1836. With the Marist Fathers came Brothers trained by Blessed Marcellin Champagnat.


After the founding of the Australian province of the Marist Brothers, missionary activity was not lost sight of, and many Australian Brothers laboured in the island missions, chiefly Fiji. When New Zealand became a separate province these island establishments were attached to the new province, and Australia remained for over twenty years without a defined field of missionary activity.

Then in 1938 came the invitation to the Solomon Islands, made by Bishop Aubin; and in July of that year the pioneer community (Brothers John William, James and Ephrem) sailed by the "Malaita" from Sydney and arrived in Tulagi on August 2. By the end of August they had begun work at Marau on the island of Guadalcanal, with a roll-call of about 60 boys and a long waiting list.

Their early letters told of heat, rain, crocodiles, infrequency of communications, and other discomforts, but were also full of enthusiasm for the great work to be done and for the good qualities of the people among whom they were working.

Early in 1939 the Brothers at Marau had a visit from Bishop Wade of the North

Solomons, a vicariate which at that time straddled the boundary between the British Solomon Islands and the Territory of New Guinea. Impressed by what he had seen, Bishop Wade made overtures to the Australian province for Brothers, and in 1941 his request was granted. On July 16, Brothers Augustine, Ervan and Donatus set Proceeding to the Solomon Islands, they reached Tulagi on August 2, exactly three years after the first group. Brother Ervan remained at Marau. Brother John William went north with Brothers Augustine and Donatus to make the new foundation at Chabai, on Bougainville Island in the Territory of New Guinea. This establishment had originally begun at a school for catechists. The Brothers at Chabai early remarked on the eagerness of the Bougainville Natives at their lessons and on their talent for part-singing.

The two mission schools which had begun so auspiciously were soon to receive a cruel setback as the tide of Japanese invasion swept southward down the island chain. The newer establishment was the first to suffer. Kieta, where Bishop Wade had his headquarters, was bombed in February 1942, and soon the whole of Bougainville was in Japanese hands. Nothing

more was heard from the Brothers at Chabai. Over a year later, a letter from Bishop Wade announced that they had been placed under house arrest in May 1942 and had been transferred to the small island of Sohano in Buka Passage some three months later. That was the last definite word of them, in spite of the Bishop's efforts to trace them after his return to Bougainville as chaplain to the American forces. It was rumoured that they had been transferred to Rabaul, that they had been lost in the sinking of the "Montevideo Maru." In June, 1946, the Department of External Territories announced that they had been taken from Sohano on August 19, 1942 and presumed the date of their death as August 20. Among Natives and Chinese who were interned with them on Sohano and with whom I spoke, there is a suspicion that they never left the island but were killed a few days after their arrival there. Whether lost at sea or murdered on Sohano, these three generous souls gave their lives for the Faith.

Meanwhile in the Solomons the Brothers had suffered interrogation and ill-treatment at Japanese hands. But they were not imprisoned, and having been safely evacuated, reached Australia by way of New Zealand early in 1943.

After the cessation of hostilities the island Bishops were naturally anxious to re-build their shattered missions and get the schools going again. The South Solomons Vicariate again had the first foundation. A United States' Army hospital at Tenaru, a few miles out of Honiara on Guadalcanal, was to be the new location. On March 19, 1946, Brothers Ervan and Ephrem left Sydney for Tenaru which, as they said, was "fifty years ahead of Marau."

Almost two years later the new start was made in Bishop Wade's Vicariate. Brothers Borgia and Simeon went first to Torakina on the west coast of Bougainville where a number of Quonsett huts from an army hospital provided accommodation. This location proving unsuitable, the buildings were transferred by barge to Kieta on the other side of the island, and re-erected there by the Brothers and their charges.

During the change-over Brothers and boys had to live in tents, a sharp contrast to the relative comfort of the sturdy buildings at Tenaru.

Disaster was to strike again in the Bougainville Mission in 1952 when a tidal wave did a great amount of damage to the establishment at Kieta. But this was only a temporary setback. No lives were lost and there was little loss of property other than damage to the buildings. Instead of sweeping back and carrying all out to sea, the big wave escaped by way of the lagoon, leaving much of the school property in the branches of the mangroves.


In the early 1950's the mission schools began to supply aspirants to the life of the Brothers, and several of these are now back working among their own people at the side of their Australian conferers.

When Kieta was thoroughly launched a second foundation was made in Bougainville, this time at Tarlena, about three miles from the original location at Chabai. A Minor Seminary had been established at the latter place, and a Novitiate for the Native Sisters now stood on the old site of the Brothers' school.

It was at Tarlena that the Brothers first began the work of training Native teachers for the mission schools under the government training scheme. At the end of 1957 the teacher training section was transferred to Kieta which had more convenient arrangements for teaching practice. At Tarlena the nearest suitable school had been at Hantoa, some four miles away. With the recent transfer of the remaining section of the Tarlena establishment to Kieta, the latter has become a large educational centre with primary, secondary and teacher training departments. Tenaru too has expanded and added a training school for catechists.

Both our island schools are proving inadequate for the number of pupils offering. We want more Brothers so that we may be able to staff our Australian schools adequately and expand our work for our near neighbours in the Pacific Islands.

Sixty Years A Brother

THIS YEAR a Marist Brother who has been esteemed at Darlinghurst for almost half a century celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of his entrance into the Order at St. Joseph's College, Hunters Hill.

Beginning in 1918 as Principal of the High School at Darlinghurst, Brother Gerard returned in 1929 in the same capacity. After post graduate studies in Paris he was regarded in those days as one of the foremost leaders in educational activities in New South Wales. It is impossible to estimate the immense debt owed by the High School to the zeal and wide learning of Brother Gerard. It has been said that the foundations of Darlinghurst's successes in study and sport were laid in the early years of Brother Gerard's headmastership.

A man of general attainments Brother Gerard's leanings are to the literary side. Those who are privileged to study for the Leaving Certificate under him will always remember not only his deep and extensive knowledge of the classics and modern languages but also the keenness with which he instilled a love of good reading into his students.

Before his years at Darlinghurst, Brother Gerard had spent a long period at the Marist Brothers Training College, where today at Mittagong he continues the education of the junior Novices of the Order. Brother Gerard also numbers periods as Director of St. Joseph's College and of the pre-philosophy training courses of aspirants to the priesthood at St. Columba's College, Springwood. He also served for many years on educational Councils of the Church and State in New South Wales. We all hope that Brother Gerard will be spared for many more years to inspire the younger generation of Brothers with his keenness and fervour for true learning.



year of 1963. "Activity" was the keyword, and to his credit Br. Hugh Thomas always had something "going."



May I also express my appreciation and congratulations on behalf of the Association to Brother Norman and his Staff for the excellent work they have done to help our boys toward a higher education and I trust


their efforts will be amply rewarded when the results of the forthcoming examination become known.

REV. BROTHER GREGORY

Early this year a former headmaster of the High School passed to his eternal reward. Brother Gregory was a native of South Australia but had begun teaching as a secular at the Marist Brothers' College at New Norcia, Western Australia.
