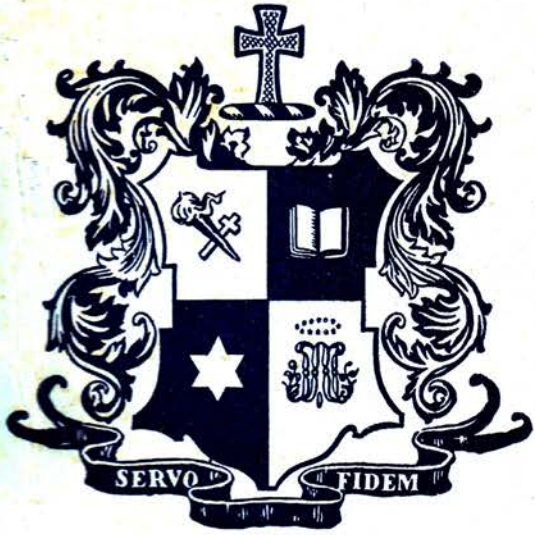

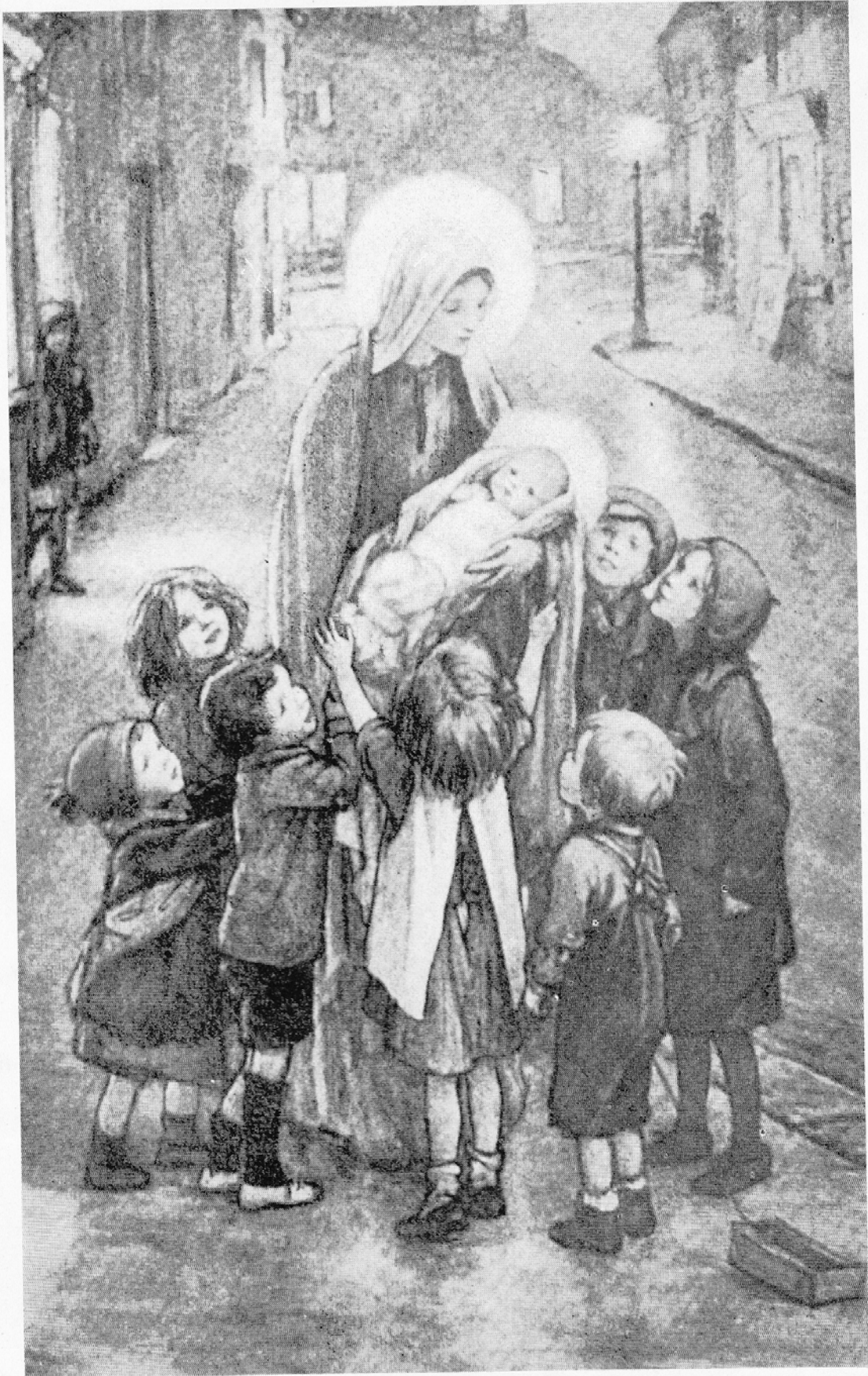

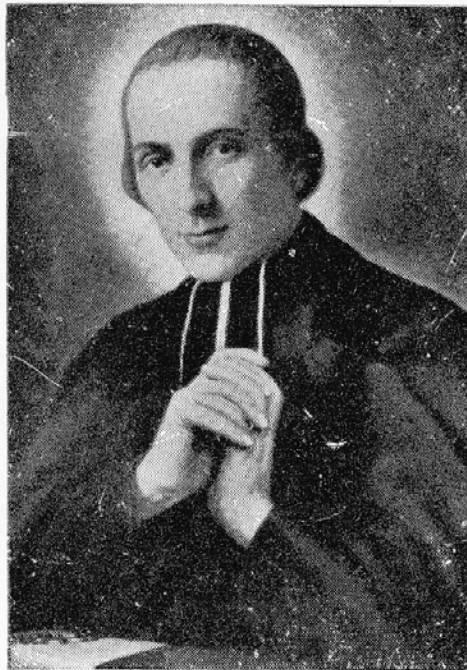

 Feet that falter on a hill; the aged hands that wait for death.

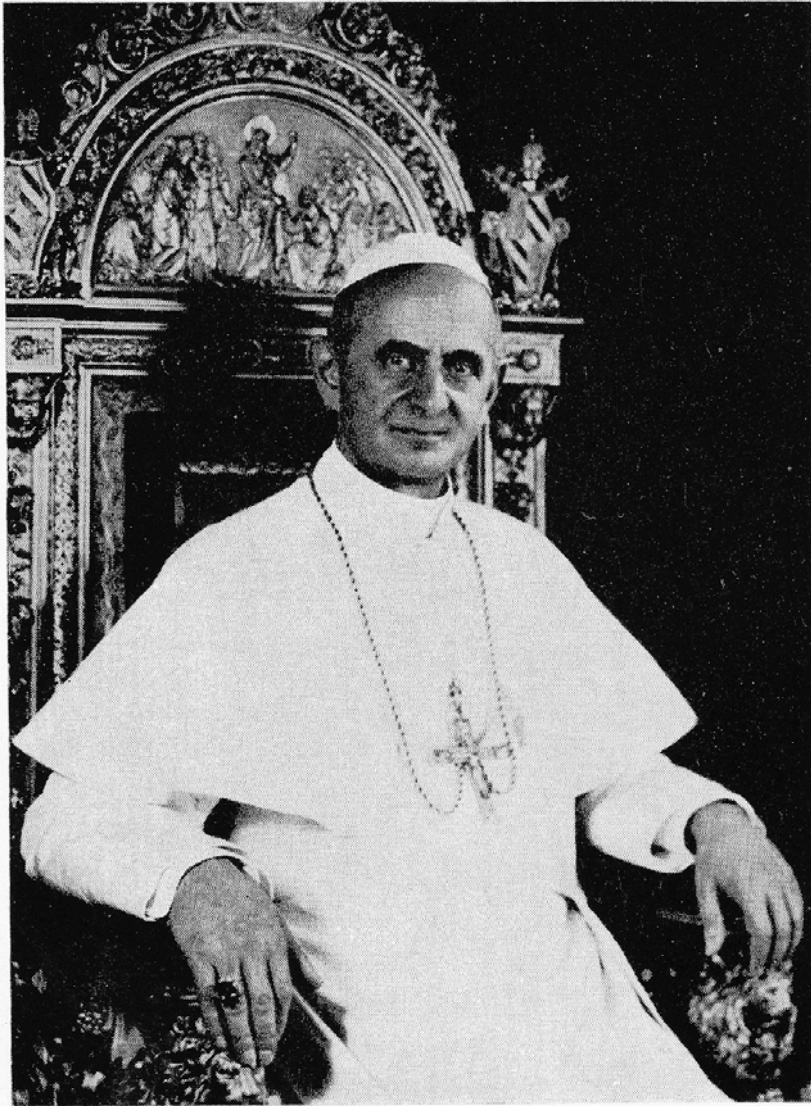

**BLESSED MARCELLIN
 CHAMPAGNAT**

FOREWORD

After the election of Pope John XVIII on 28th October, 1958, the world's press spoke in a somewhat disparaging manner of a "caretaker" Pope. Now, seven years later, the same word "caretaker" may truthfully be applied with a far different connotation. Pope John's magnificent conception, the great Second Vatican Council, has taken care of the Church in a manner undreamed of in 1958. The wheel has come full circle: a caretaker becomes the architect; his work, a triumph. In St. Paul's words: "It was for me to plant the seed, for Apollo to water it; but it was God who gave the increase. (1 Cor. 3)

Like other great Councils of the past, Trent and Vatican I, the Second Vatican Council has taken the Church to a new and revitalized awareness of her own inner nature and re-aligned her ranks to facilitate her mission to the twentieth century.

Fulfilment of these aims is clearly seen in the many remarkable documents produced by the 2,500 Council fathers and the world's greatest theologians: the Constitutions on the Church, and on the liturgy, and the various findings on divine revelation, the apostolate of the laity, the pastoral office of bishops in the Church, the adaptation and renewal of the religious life, and Christian education.

Never before has the mind of the Church been so clearly exposed to the world at large. People who formerly regarded the Church as a body forcing conformity have been surprised at the process and scope of debate and at the currents of opinion in the Church. Non-Catholic observers have been impressed by the vigour and modernity of this most ancient of families. Catholics, themselves, have understood more about the Church and have rejoiced in the sweeping away of many time-worn prejudices.

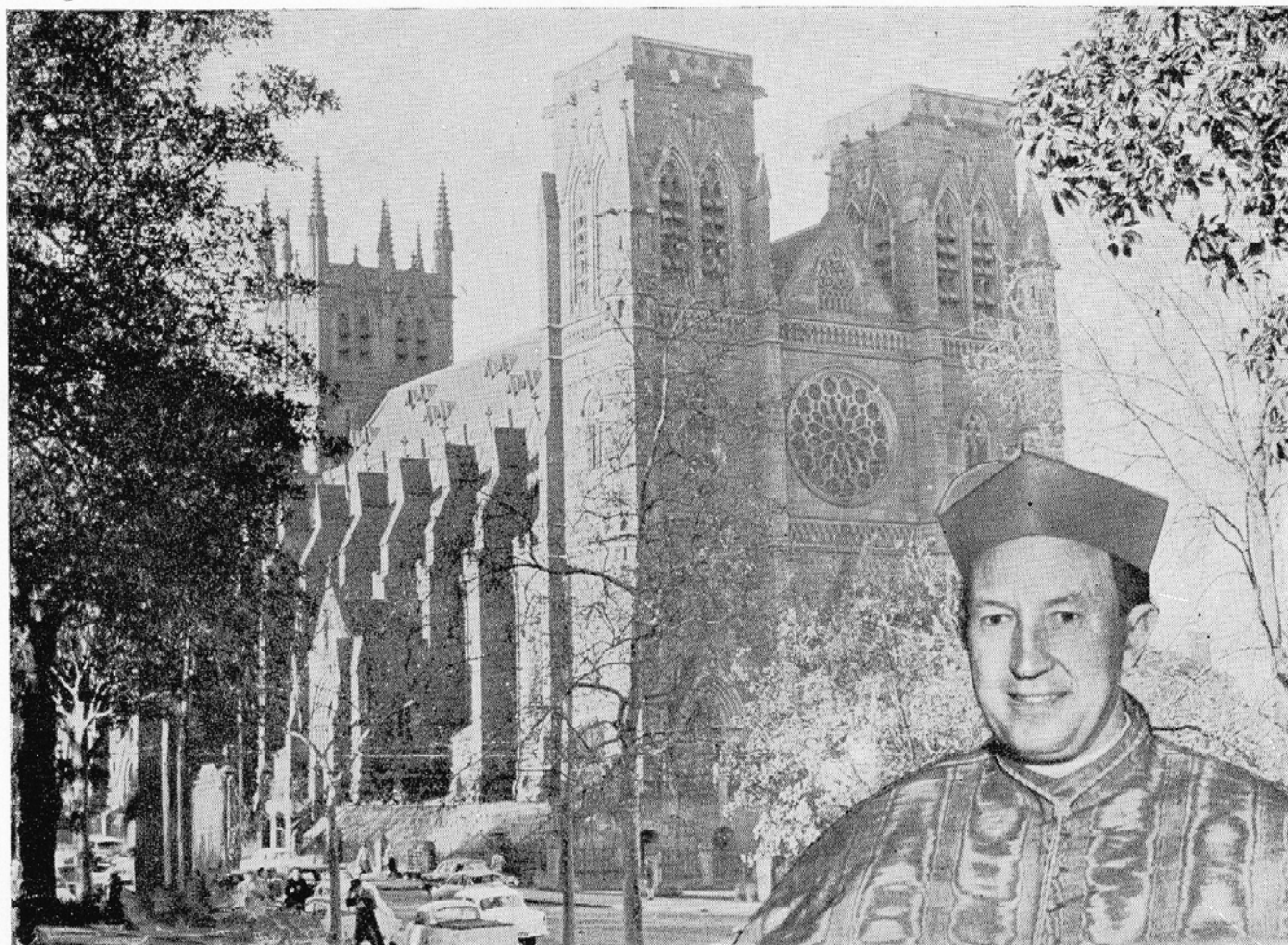
The effect is difficult to analyse: a vast awakening among Catholic people themselves especially in their attitude to the liturgy; a tide of "ecumenism" which has brought Christian people closer to unity than at any other time since the Reformation; a strengthening of papal influence in world affairs, aided by Pope Paul's history-making visits to the Holy Land, India, and New York; and, perhaps most important, a certain awareness of, and familiarity with, doctrine and religious practice generally which have caused people to think about religion and tend towards a clarification of their religious beliefs and convictions.

The prospect is exciting. Catholics are realizing that they, human beings, and not merely the buildings with attendant priests, are the Church. The common discussion among Catholics is vital, often on matters of doctrine or liturgy. This is education in a very real sense, self-education, comparable with the method practised for the first 300 years or so in the early Church when people were taught by active participation in the liturgy.

To-day on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, Pope Paul VI officially closes the Second Vatican Council in Rome. What more fitting day! For Mary's place in the redemption and as Mother of the Universal Church has been given due emphasis by this same Council.

To Mary the Virgin Mother, that she will protect and guide the Church and ensure the lasting fruitfulness of Council decrees and policies, this 1965 edition of "Blue and Blue" is dedicated.

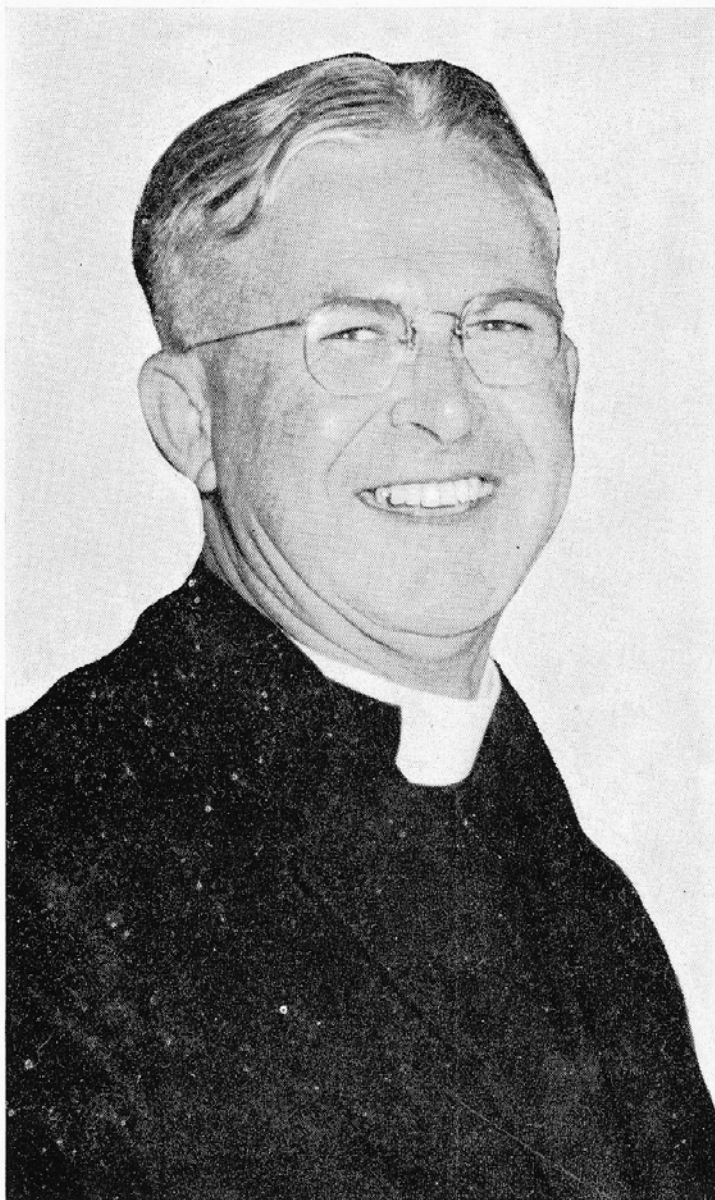

Our heartiest congratulations and earnest prayers that God would shower him with every blessing.

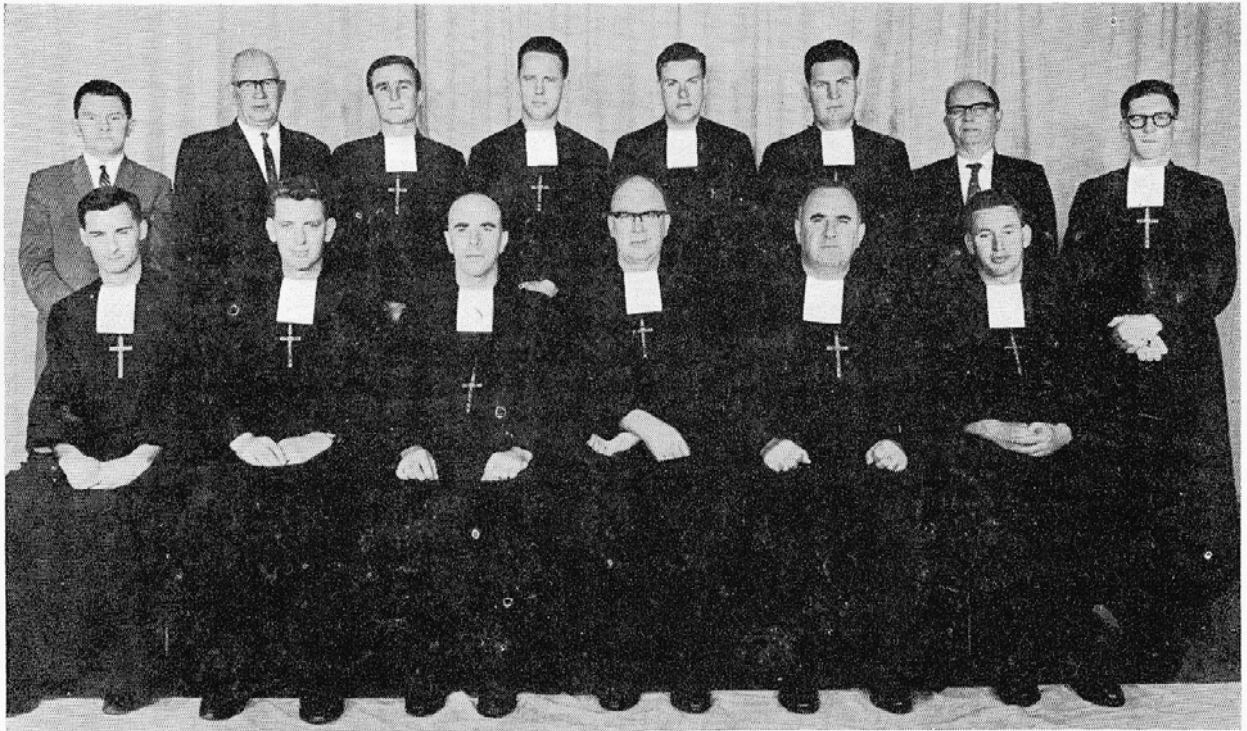
His Holiness Pope Paul VI bestowed a great honour during the year on Very Rev. Monsignor Gregory W. Madden, P.P., by raising him to the rank of Privy Chamberlain.

Ordained in 1936, Very Rev. Monsignor Madden has served in several Sydney parishes as well as at Lithgow, Lake Macquarie and Richmond. Since 1956 he has been Parish Priest of Sans Souci. He is secretary of the Catholic Church Trust and the Clerical Fund of the Archdiocese, as well as Chaplain to the Accountants' Guild.

Monsignor Madden attended the primary schools of the Sisters of St. Joseph and of the Marist Brothers at Kogarah. Upon gaining a State Bursary, he proceeded to Darlinghurst in 1925 to do his secondary schooling, much of it under Rev. Brother Gerard. Contemporaries of Monsignor Madden at the Darlinghurst of this period included Rev. Fathers H. Law, P.P., A. Jones, P.P., A. Collier, O.F.M., B. O'Donoghue, O.F.M., N. Earl, M.S.C., M. Hyland, C.M., R. Maguire, C.M., and Brothers Swithin, Alban and Peter.

While at school, Monsignor was noted for his scholastic and sporting ability, representing in the First XIII of 1929. Since leaving school, he has been equally noteworthy for his immeasurable loyalty to his Alma Mater as evidenced especially by his very active interest and participation in Old Boys' Union activities.

With the election of His Worship John Armstrong to the Chair of Lord Mayor of Sydney on Dec. 4th, there was established a record that may well stand unchallenged for many years: his accession marks an historic treble, in that his immediate predecessors in office — the Deputy Premier, P. Hills, M.L.A.; and H. J. Jensen, M.P. — are also former students of Darlinghurst.

John Armstrong was the last of six brothers to do his schooling at M.B.H.S. In his Leaving Certificate year of 1925, he gained the Honour Cap for good conduct, application to study, and proficiency in sport. Another highlight of his schooldays was his winning the Lightweight Boxing Championship of the Catholic Colleges.

Our new Lord Mayor was elected an Alderman of the City Council in 1934, and served as Commonwealth Senator from 1937 to 1964. As Commonwealth Government Minister, he held the posts of Minister for Munitions (1946), Minister for Supply and Development (1947-49), Acting Minister for Immigration (1948), and Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Senate (1952).

For the last three years he has been Chairman of the Sydney County Council. Congratulations John.

A Guide to Christian Education

One of the many notable documents of the Second Vatican Council is its **Declaration on Christian Education**. It is, perhaps, the expression of the basic Council theme, the mission of the Church in a pluralist society, applied to education.

Prior to the Council the most authoritative guide for Christian educators has been the 1929 encyclical of Pope Pius XI, **Divini Illius Magistri**. Both documents are products of their times. In 1929 the concept of universal education, particularly secondary, was not widely accepted and the Pontiff aimed at establishing certain basic principles: education is the concern primarily of the family with the aid of Church and State; the whole man, body and soul, is to be educated; education which excludes Christian formation is faulty; and its aims are broadly to form true Christians and

useful citizens. The emphasis in the encyclical was clearly to define education and to apply that definition in practice.

Emphasis in the Council Declaration is otherwise: it states the Church's position in education in relation to the pluralist society of our times. Catholic schools are important as centres from which graduates may enter all levels of society to exercise an apostolic influence. The vital role of parents and the position of Catholics in non-Catholic schools are stressed. In other words, the Church does not tend to set herself apart from society but identifies herself with it and defines her educational mission in that society.

Such an approach is clearly opportune because of the vast numbers who seek advanced secondary and tertiary education.

The position in New South Wales is typical of the world situation. We now have three universities with a fourth, Macquarie, to open in 1967. Leaving Certificate entries provide a similar picture: 1,468 students in 1925; 8,120 in 1956; 12,000 in 1960; and 31,000 in 1965.

The Council approach is especially timely for the Archdiocese in its efforts to cope with the Wyndham Scheme. Some Catholics question the worth of their schools not so much, I think, on principle but more as an expedient. They consider that the huge financial burden exhausts the effort of the Church in its other activities. The answer to these opinions is clearly set forth in the Council Declaration. The directive has been approved by the Pope himself and it is up to Sydney Catholics to plan accordingly.

In the Declaration parents are called the "primary and principal educators" because they have given life to, and are responsible before God and society, for their children. But responsibility is always accompanied by rights and privileges. To educate is, therefore, the right of parents prior to any right of the State.

They educate mainly by providing a family atmosphere "animated by respect for God and man" and demonstrating by their own example how children should act in society. But parents need help from the State in their complex task and this help should be given by the provision of schools and institutions which cater for parents' wishes. The Church's attitude to parental rights and responsibility can be gauged by her attitude to schools. In the Declaration these are called "aids to education" and should exist because parents wish them to exist. In the words of the Declaration: "The Church esteems highly and seeks to penetrate and ennoble with her own spirit other aids which belong to the general heritage of man and which are of great influence in forming souls and moulding men, such as the media of communication, various groups for mental and physical development, youth associations, and, in particular, schools." Thus in the Council's view, and this reiterates the view expressed in **Divini Illius Magistri**, it is that parents have the

right and responsibility to educate, that their rights precede those of the State, and that they fulfil their task by seeking the co-operation of schools.

Certain logical deductions may obviously be made: "book" learning or formal schooling is not education in the full sense but merely a part of the whole; the term "education" really applies to the whole of man's life, body and soul; and parents do not give adequate moral education to their children by relying solely, or even mainly, on the religious instruction in Catholic, or still much less, in State schools.

This last point calls for some comment. Nowadays, many parents have tended to rely on the schools for instruction which should be given at home. So we find ourselves having to train boys in such areas as politeness, neatness in dress, and good speech habits, and even to undertake sex education. It is not uncommon for parents to threaten to "ring Brother" or to ask the Brothers to deal with boys who have offended in some way at home. Such attitudes reveal in parents a lack of understanding in their basic duty. Any attempt to transfer authority in this way can only lead to loss of authority, for parents are thereby endeavouring to compensate for their own inadequacy.

Incidentally, the Declaration also reaffirms the principle that tax money should be used in education according to parental wishes and in such a way that parents are, in fact, free economically to send their children to non-State schools. A citizen is not really free if the financial burden created by this action becomes severe.

Where they cannot find Catholic schools for their children, as in some areas of Sydney and in many countries of the world, parents are faced with a far more difficult task. As well as religious and doctrinal instruction often they must counteract false impressions and ideas, promulgated by teachers and others who are irreligious or, worse, by those who are indifferent to religion. The Council Declaration details means by which Christian formation can be aided under such circumstances: the

apostolic action of fellow students, the example of teachers, and especially the instruction and spiritual aid of priests and apostolic lay people. Generally, however, teachers, and even some Catholic teachers in State schools, would not consider the above as part of their duties, and, besides, the infrequent instruction permitted and the lack of contact with pupils are hardly sufficient to inculcate a religious spirit. That is why Catholic parents are duty-bound, as they are reminded by the Declaration, to entrust their children to Catholic schools wherever and whenever possible.

The importance of Catholic schools is given a strong emphasis but one different from that in *Divini Illius Magistri*. The Church's mission is now, more than ever, to be exercised in a pluralist society. The Catholic school's task is, therefore, to train pupils in an apostolic spirit to go into society at all levels and influence their fellow man to adopt Christian principles. In the words of the Declaration graduates of Catholic schools are to "become, as it were, a saving leaven in the human community." So it is mainly from pupils in Catholic schools that priestly and religious vocations are to be fostered.

These goals are idealistic in outlook but they are goals which Catholic schools should aim at, and indeed, come close to achieving. Achievement will result from careful teacher-preparation both in secular and religious knowledge in keeping with the needs of the contemporary world, and from improvement in buildings and general class conditions even at the cost of turning more pupils away.

The Declaration further emphasizes that the Church should participate in advanced and tertiary education, again with stress on excellence. Advanced students will normally become leaders of the future. It is through them that sound Christian principles will be adopted in the leadership of society. The task of Christian education is, therefore, seen as accomplishing "a public, enduring, and pervasive influence of the Christian mind in the furtherance of culture, and the students of these institutions are moulded into men truly outstanding in their training, ready to undertake weighty responsibilities in society and witness to the faith in the world." The directive is quite clear and unambiguous. Here is our reason for building Sixth Form Schools at great cost and sacrifice, for the destiny of the Church and the leadership of society in New South Wales is closely linked with these.

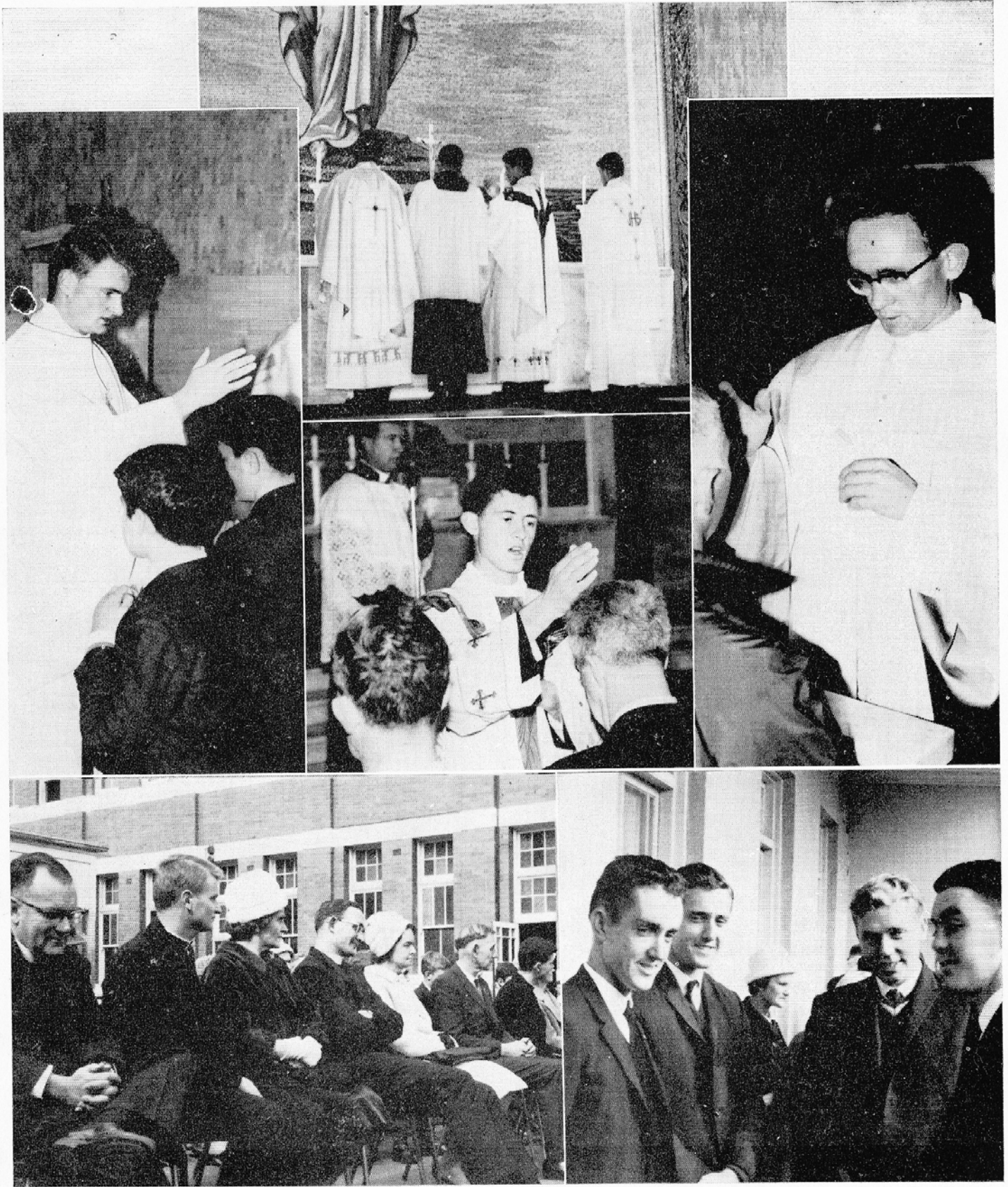
The Declaration on Christian Education of the Second Vatican Council is a milestone in the history of Catholic educational thought. It is a blueprint for education in keeping with the forward-looking and ecumenical approach of our times and drawn up to recognise the special needs of our times. May its effects be as enduring and widespread in the future as those of *Divini Illius Magistri* in the past.

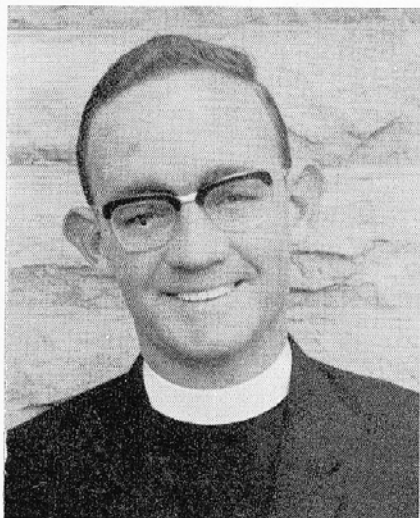

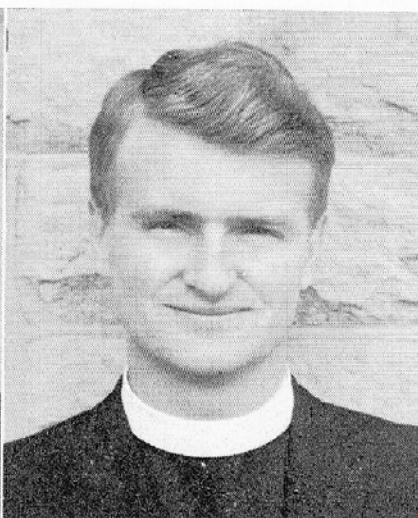

FAMOUS OLD BOY HONOURED

On 25th September, 1965, there was unveiled at Narrabeen a memorial to the amazing foresight and courage of the late George Augustine Taylor, an ex-student of the School. It was he who, on 5th December, 1909, made history by being the first in Australia to fly, in a machine built by himself.

"The Sydney Morning Herald" of 7th December, 1909, carried this report:

"On Sunday last, Mr. George Taylor, secretary of the Aerial League, took a biplane 18 ft. long with 4 ft. planes and box kite tail balance, to Narrabeen, where trials at gliding were held, Mr. Taylor himself acting as demonstrator.

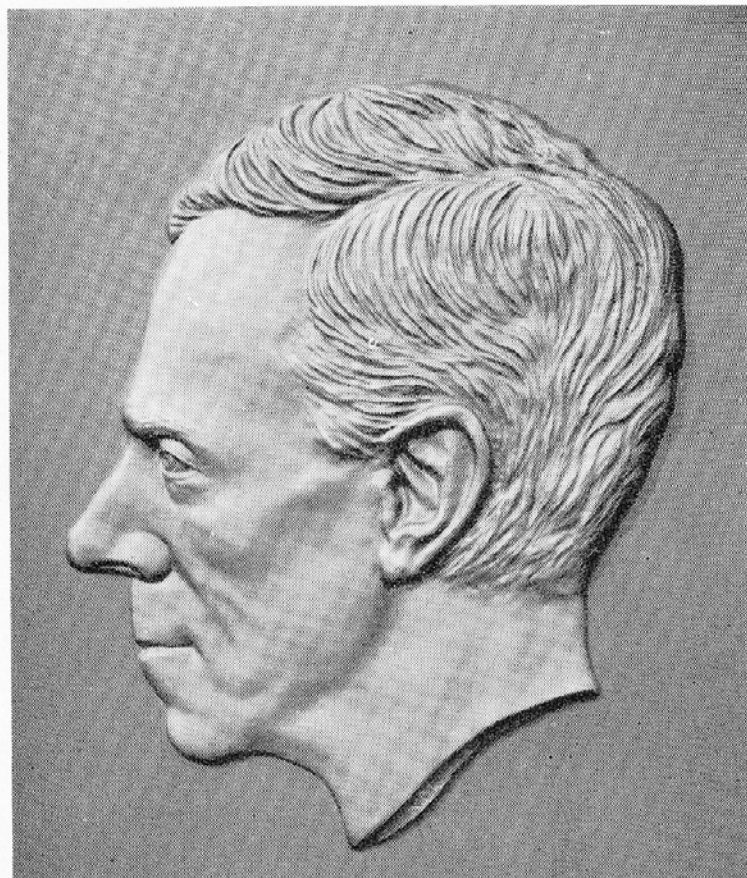
"The scene of the flights was at Narrabeen Heads, in the presence of about 100 visitors, the wide stretch of sand rendering any possible fall a matter of some safety.

"At the beginning of the experiments, the wind came from the east at 10 miles an hour.

"The machine was carried to a sand knoll and brought face to the wind.

"For the preliminary flights, the corners were held by guide ropes, 15 ft. in length, to prevent the machine getting out of control before the experimenter was properly tuned to automatic balancing. At the signal to 'let go,' the machine was well lifted by the wind, and by careful manipulation on the part of Mr. Taylor it shot towards the ocean, dragging its guides, who, however, pulled it to the ground at the water's edge.

"As the afternoon wore on, the flights improved, on account of the wind freshening to 15 miles an hour, coming directly from the east, so much so that

the last flight of the day was notable. At 'Let Go,' the wind immediately lifted the machine to full length of the guide ropes and dragged the operators so fast to the ocean that two let go; the machine now soared towards the ocean, and, at the water's edge, the remaining ropes were loosened, the machine making a leap upwards. Mr. Taylor, by careful manoeuvring, kept the machine well under control and dived it into the sea some little distance from The Heads."

His versatile talent was not confined to one profession. Apprenticed originally as an architect, he blossomed into one of Australia's top cartoonists, being the first ever from this country to get his drawings into London "Punch." Always interested in the development of engineering in Australia, George Taylor founded the Local Government Engineers' Association. He died in 1928. On his passing, Sir John Sulman, F.R.I.B.A., said: "His was an example of whole-hearted service that this generation sadly needs. . . . George Taylor was one of the most talented men I ever met."

In his early days, Taylor gave many public displays of his skill and originality. On many occasions they described him, when aeroplanes were thought to be just "toys," as "that adventurous airman," a sort of scoffing "tag," which afterwards made his critics look silly.

In the Sydney "Evening News" of 16th May, 1912, is an account of a demonstration given in the Lyceum Theatre, Sydney, by George Taylor and Alban Roberts when a ten-foot model Zeppelin was controlled. The report read:

"The big oil-silk, elongated balloon, with its undercarriage of motors, whirling propellers and little lights, was very obedient to all the flashes sent out from the apparatus on the platform. It set sail by itself, discharging a bomb in the stalls, cruised round the upper gallery, and obediently returned to the stage. The Lord

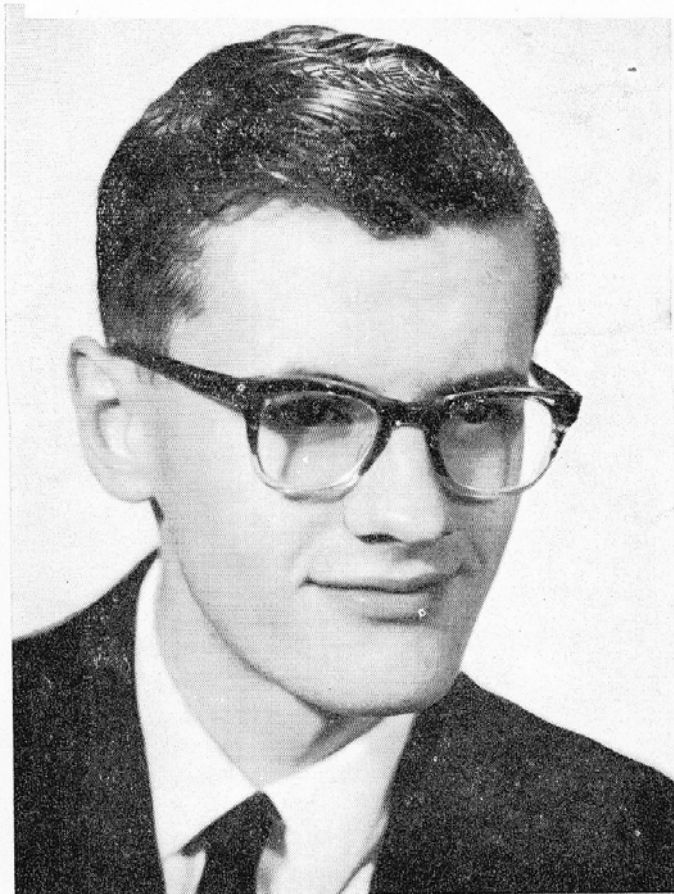
Mayor of Sydney (Alderman Clark) made a eulogistic speech, and expressed the hope that Australia would afford assistance to its inventive sons."

George Taylor fought unsuccessfully to have Lawrence Hargrave's original models accepted by the Australian Government for preservation in the archives. But his cause was lost and the precious models were soon in the 'Deutsches Museum' in Munich. The museum was bombed in 1940 and some of the survivors of Hargrave's models, through the initiative of Qantas, are now back in Australia. As far back as 1909, the year of his first flight, Taylor demonstrated that pictures could be transmitted by wireless.

We at Darlinghurst acclaim with pride the marvellous achievements of this pioneer in aviation. It is pleasing to recall that George Augustine Taylor remained a loyal Old Boy, who always found time to keep in touch with his Alma Mater in the midst of his many and varied activities. He took a prominent part in the School's Golden Jubilee celebrations of 1925 and was a regular contributor to the "Blue and Blue" until his death in 1928. His article, "The Air Age and Australia's Necessity," in the 1911 issue, is of particular interest this year when his great contribution to flight in Australia is being commemorated.

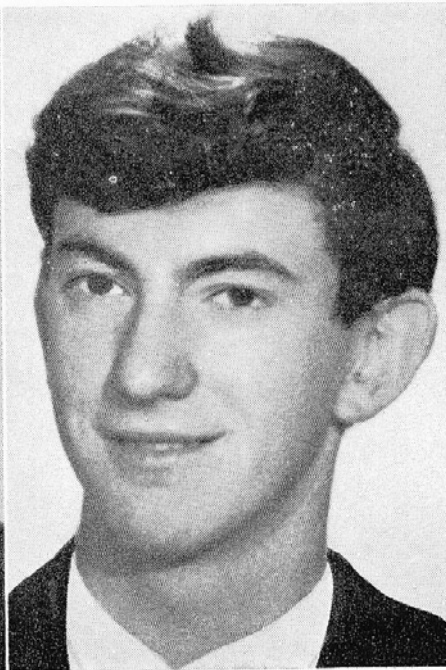

TRIP TO THE JENOLAN CAVES

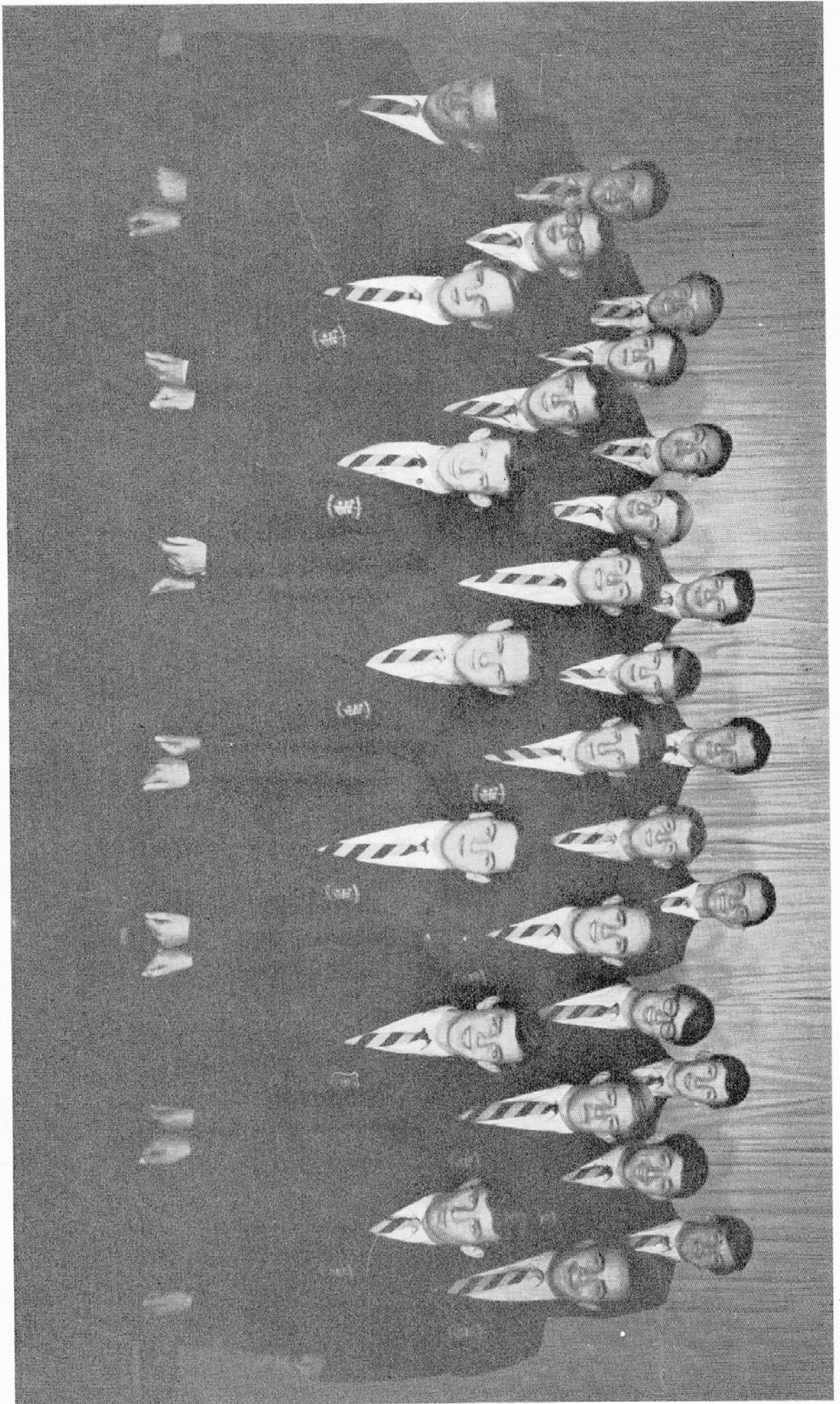
Late in November another shorter excursion was arranged, this time primarily for the 1B Class, which had excelled in school activities during the year.

From there we proceeded to the Jenolan Caves in time to inspect two complete sets of caves.

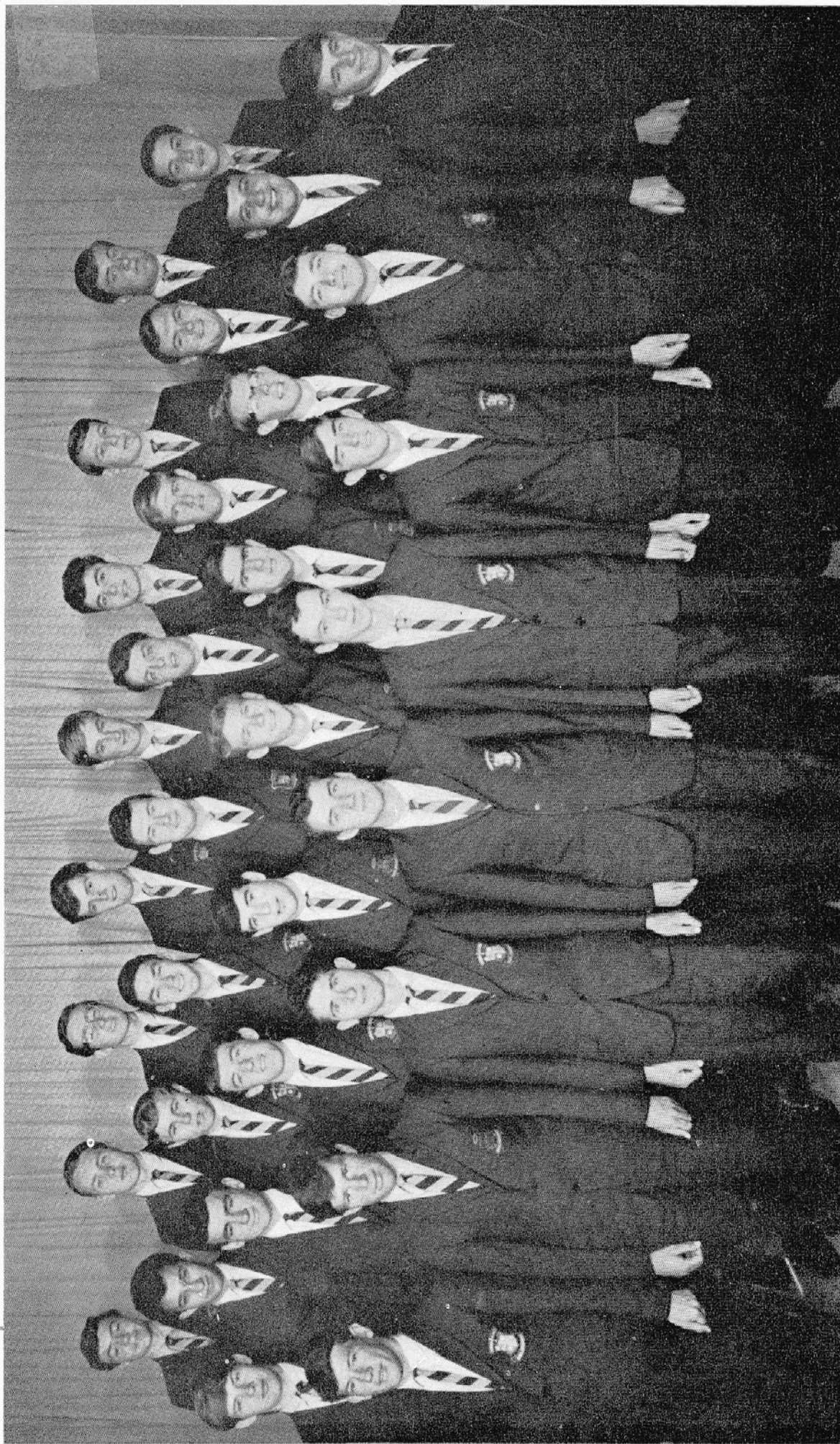
Boisterous cheers announced our return to a startled Darlinghurst at nine o'clock the same evening.

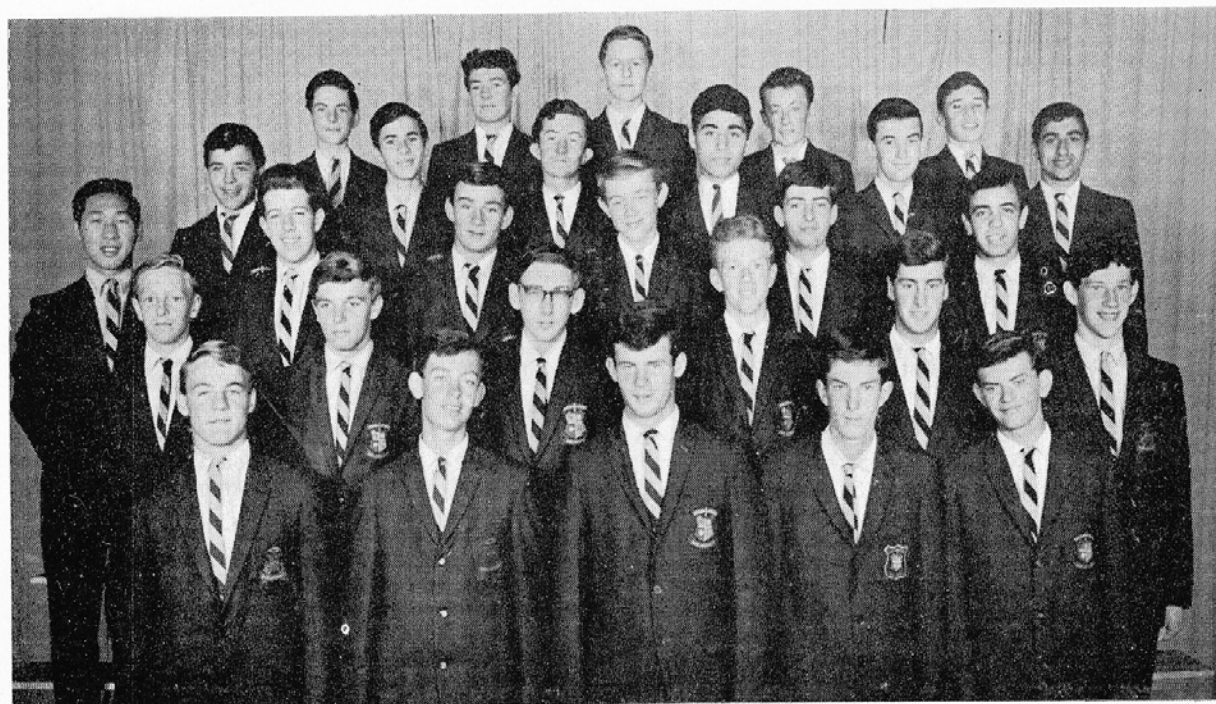

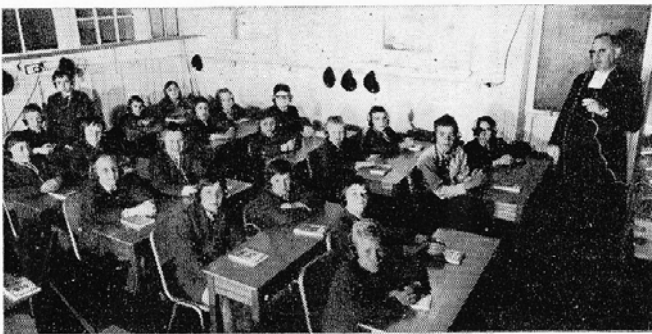

**PROGRESSIVE EDUCATION
 THROUGH SOUND**



Brother Herbert with his charges

For more than ten years Brother Herbert has devoted himself with great success to a unique system of primary school teaching. He uses tape recorders and individual earphones.

The main purpose of the system is to gain the maximum individual effort and, at the same time, allow the teacher more time for slow learners. Advanced pupils are stimulated by forays even into science and foreign languages like French and

German; timid and slow children are wonderfully encouraged.

Brother Herbert is pictured before a bank of five tape-recorders by which any one tape can be played to each child who has personal access at his desk to five channels.

The system has marked advantages especially in the teaching of reading, tables, and spelling, all of which are done on specially-prepared tapes while the teacher is devoting himself to the slow learners. Testing for understanding and skill in spelling is done by the teacher himself and on work sheets adapted to the tape material.

A great deal of work can be covered by these methods. A daily period of ten minutes is given to poetry reading and speech-training. All pupils take turns in public speaking, weekly debates, poetry and drama reading.

The whole method has proved highly successful, particularly because only cultivated voices are used for recording on the tapes, because listening and speaking skills are stressed, and especially because of the children's enthusiasm and interest evident even in the photograph.

CADETS

With the transfer of Brother Hugh Thomas and Brother Theodore, Brother Lionel capably assumed the position of O.C., with Brother Romuald (of Marist Brothers' High School, Pagewood) as Second-in-Command.

The bivouac held in April for Second Year Cadets was again interrupted by rain. The enthusiasm of the troops, however, was undiminished, as shown by the final attack on "Akhurst's Angels" on "Reilly's Raiders" camp, capturing the entire headquarters section soon after the commencement of activities. Tony Hannon, an ex-student, who was helping as instructor, now realises that he cannot outrun Darlinghurst sentries.

Anzac Day was commemorated by a Requiem Mass at the Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst.

The August Camp was relatively short. Activities centred on bivouac and "Operation Holdfast." All Darlinghurst sections acquitted themselves well in "Holdfast," even when lost for several hours in the bush. Thanks to the efforts of Sgt. T.

Brignell, the platoon was kept on its toes for the whole of the operation. On bivouac, the work of Sgt. M. Attard and C.U.O. L. Reilly was particularly praiseworthy. In camp, the efforts of the Training Co-ordinators, D./Mjr. A. Everett, Sgt. P. McMahon, and C.S.M. P. Harris, contributed greatly to its success.

In Education Week, the Band, led the march, in which the rest of the unit, led by C.U.O. L. Reilly, figured prominently. The Band reached a very high standard during 1965, thanks to the efforts of Mr. Verey and D./Mjr. A. Everett. It played on several other occasions for different schools.

Rev. Brother John Thompson seems to have had an enjoyable year at St. Augustine's M.B.H.S., Cairns, in North Queensland.

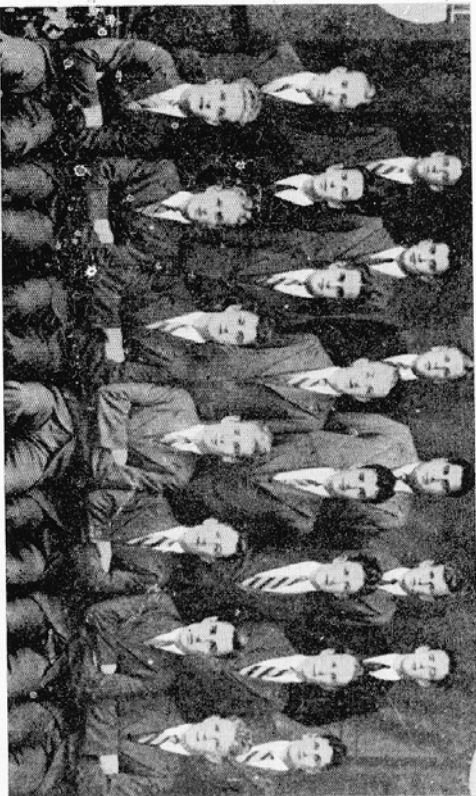

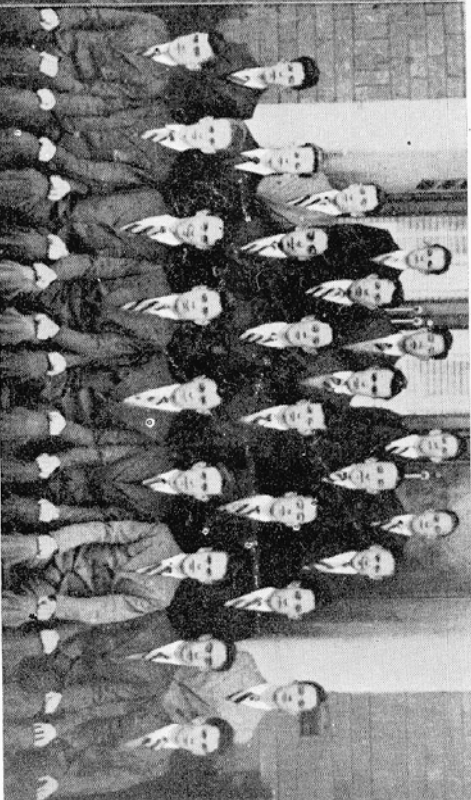

Tom Passaro: Has become a regular 007 at Kensington Campus.

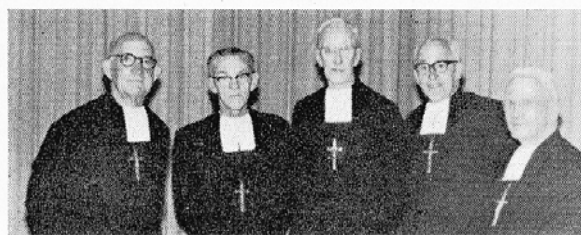
Syd Robinson: Hopes to be future editor of the "Mirror."

FORMER TEACHERS

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1915 — 1965

With 1965 marking the fiftieth anniversary of the tragedy and the glory of Gallipoli, it is fitting that we should pause and reflect on the untimely death in war of so many former students of the school. While we regret their passing with a very natural sorrow and offer our prayers that they may rest in peace, we take pride as well in the bravery and generosity which have characterised the premature sacrifice of their lives.

The 1919 "Blue and Blue" carries the report of the unveiling of the School Roll of Honour commemorating the Old Boys who served in the 1914-18 war. One particular excerpt, from the speech delivered

on that occasion by Rev. Brother Gerard, Principal, recommends itself for the depth of thought which it contains:

"In the courage and self-sacrifice shown by these, their predecessors," said Brother Gerard, "the present pupils and those of all the years to come have, and will have, a powerful stimulus to patriotism and noble endeavour. Nor should they imagine that it is in war alone that the highest civic virtues can be cultivated. Far from this being the case, they should realise that Milton did not understate the truth when he wrote, 'Peace hath her victories no less renowned than war.' And a greater than Milton has said, 'He that ruleth his spirit is better than he that taketh cities.'"
