

Foreword

On July 18, 1966, the Brother Provincial of the Sydney Province of the Marist Brothers made the announcement that the famous Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst, would close its doors in December, 1968. Although this announcement came as no surprise to many people, who were aware of the great changes going on in the re-organisation of Catholic Education in this city of Sydney, nevertheless the actual announcement of the closure of this School brought feelings of sadness to the hearts of all.

When one considers the great number of Old Boy Priests and Brothers; the distinguished Judges; the three most recent Lord Mayors of Sydney; and innumerable members of all professions who have passed through the doors of the High School, one cannot but be saddened at the thought of the passing of this distinguished School. A great tradition has been built up here over the past ninety-one years and it is a pity to see it come to an end. However, we must face the realities of the situation.

When the High School was established on its present site at Darlinghurst in 1911 it was the only Catholic Boys' High School in Sydney. Since those days a tremendous number of Catholic High Schools have grown up in the outer suburbs of the metropolitan area of Sydney. The result is that only by advertising and canvassing have the numbers of students been kept up to an economic level. But this method of procedure seems dated now when one considers the great need for Brothers in the outer suburbs and in the country areas.

At the present time the High School draws boys from seventy-four different suburbs and it is not unreasonable to imagine that the vast majority of these could be placed in the Regional High Schools now being set up in the Archdiocese of Sydney. Add to this the tremendous financial strain placed on the Catholic population by the implementation of the Wyndham Scheme and one can see that it is no longer economically possible to maintain a small High School like Darlinghurst.

So we can see that the High School is closing to help in the better distribution of Brothers and schools throughout the Archdiocese. However, since the School has already existed in three different sites one would not be surprised to find it continuing its existence elsewhere.

Sesquicentenary of the Marist Family

It was most inspiring to see St. Mary's Cathedral packed on July 23rd of this year to commemorate an important decision made exactly one hundred and fifty years previously in the small church of Our Lady of Fourviere on the hill dominating the city of Lyons in Southern France. On that day in 1816, twelve earnest young men, eight of them ordained priests the preceding day, assembled at the altar of Our Lady's shrine. Here they assisted at Mass celebrated by one of their number, Father C. Courveille, and then formally committed themselves to a venture which, under the guidance and protection of Mary, was to play a great role in the extension of God's kingdom in this world. Upon her altar they placed a document testifying to their desire to consecrate themselves to the founding of "the holy congregation of Marists," a project first conceived by Father Courveille in 1814. The large number of Marist Fathers, Brothers and Sisters assembled in St. Mary's Cathedral, with pupils from their schools, was testimony enough of the degree to which God has favoured that project formally initiated in 1816.

And yet this great work, once begun, was to experience many trials before attaining that success which characterises it today, trials which played their part in strengthening the resolve of the early Marist pioneers and in consolidating the aims and spirit of the four congregations which have burgeoned from the one root.

Two of these congregations, the Marist Sisters and the Marist Brothers of the Schools, began their apostolate in 1817, the former under the guidance of Venerable Jean-Claude Colin and the latter under Blessed Marcellin Champagnat. From the outset, it was intended that the Marist Institute would be composed of four groups - Priests, Brothers, Sisters, and a third order for lay people. Circumstances favoured the early development of the Brothers and Sisters; the progress of these two groups served but to intensify the dearest desire of the first Marist priests, to unite as a religious congregation under the one Superior. In fact, paradoxically enough, the last group to be effectively organised under diocesan approval and in its own house was that of the Priests, the obvious hub of the Congregation.

And yet, fittingly, the Priests were the first to receive Papal approbation, independently of the Brothers and Sisters, in Pope Gregory XVI's Brief of April 29th, 1836 "Omnium gentium salus." By this Brief also the congregation was entrusted with the newlydeveloping mission of Western Oceania.

Although the Holy See had approved only the Marist Fathers at this stage, it would be quite wrong to see this as marking any form of severance between Priests and Brothers. In fact, the Brothers worked in very close contact with these first missionaries, three of them being numbered in the small band which set forth in 1836, just a few months after the first profession of Marist Priests in their recently constituted Society. Two of these, Brother Marie-Nizier (the companion of St. Peter Chanel on Futuna Island) and Brother Joseph-Francis-Xavier, had actually trained as teaching Brothers under Blessed Marcellin Champagnat at his establishment "The Hermitage" near Lyons. Between 1836 and 1849, Rev. Father Colin, the first Superior-General of the Marist Fathers, sent 26 Teaching Brothers and 17 Brother Associates to the Pacific Missions, along with 74 Priests.

For some years, both the Teaching Brothers and the Brother Associates were trained together at "The Hermitage." In time, it was found more practical to establish the Marist Teaching Brothers as a congregation in its own right, and to train the Brother Associates independently as part of the Priests' Society of Mary.

In 1842, Brothers Louis-Marie and Jean-Baptiste represented the Brothers at the Marist Fathers' General Chapter in Lyons to request the Priests to maintain the Brothers under the same Superior-General as the Priests themselves, in accordance with the wishes of Blessed Marcellin, who had died in 1840. The General Chapter approved the request, but it was not ratified by the Holy See. Instead, Rome asked for the separation of all four branches — for whom Father Colin had sought official approval as early as 1833 — so that the greater autonomy afforded each would enable it to develop more rapidly.

And so it has proved. While always closely united through their common aims

and Marist spirit of humility, simplicity, and modesty, the four groups have shown remarkable progress from the day when they were constituted as independent congregations.

This is seen best of all, perhaps, in the gradual evolution of the last of the Marist religious institutes to be formed, the Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary. At first, groups of the Third Order of Mary were established as communities of women to assist the missionaries in almost all of the Marist Fathers' vicariates in the Pacific, each group subject to its own Bishop. In 1931, however, these independent groups were combined into the one religious institute of pontifical rite, the Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary. Of course, the Third Order of Mary for lay people has continued to function as well, and does sterling service in promoting devotion to our Blessed Mother.

The Australian Province of the Marist Fathers comprises seventeen houses in addition to the mission in Japan. Their activities in Australia include the administration of parishes, colleges, the Aquinas Academy of Philosophy, and home missions.

The Marist Sisters in Australia form part of the Province of Oceania. In addition to three colleges and Novitiate in Australia, this province incorporates as well seven mission stations in Fiji and six establishments in New Zealand.


The Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary conduct schools and a hospital in Australia. In addition, their Australian Province includes the administration of schools in the missions of the British Solomon Islands and Bougainville, T.N.G.

The Marist Brothers of the Schools, numbering 570 in Australia, have schools in all the mainland States, the Solomon Islands, and New Guinea. They are responsible also for the administration of St. Vincent's Orphanage at Westmead.

Throughout the world there are almost 10,000 professed Brothers, spread over forty-four provinces; the number of pupils under their care exceeds a third of a million.

These sketchy details indicating the present day vitality of the Marist family show how God has blessed the endeavours of those young men who assembled at the Fourviere shrine in 1816. For this we can look back with justifiable pride to their zeal and perseverance, and trust that under Mary's guidance we shall progress still further in the apostolate confided to us.

It is fitting that this particular milestone, our sesquicentenary, should occur at the time when we are considering intently the recommendations of Vatican II. The Council made particular reference to the characteristic spirit of Our Lady as that of "hidden holiness," the simplicity which is the very essence of the Gospel itself. We Marists rejoice that such is the spirit that our pioneers embraced so ardently and sought, above all, to be the cornerstone of the various Marist congregations. Under the patronage of Mary, may it continue to be our distinctive mark as our Marist family grows and so becomes increasingly competent in the fields "white to the harvest" which have been entrusted to us.

During the course of the year we had the privilege of welcoming Rev. Brother Hilary back to Darlinghurst. Old Boys of the 1920's will remember Br. Hilary as a keen and enthusiastic teacher who was vitally interested in the welfare of his pupils. This year he returned as the delegate of the Reverend Brother Charles Raphael, Superior General, of Rome. Br. Hilary is an Assistant to the Reverend Brother Superior and resides in Rome. He came to Australia to inspect the work of the Brothers in all the schools of the Commonwealth from Perth to Cairns and also in the Solomon Islands and in New Guinea.


While in Australia he discussed with Rev. Brother Othmar, Provincial, the question of starting missionary work in Pakistan. Later in the year, Br. Elwyn was chosen as the first Australian for this new work. Br. Elwyn was on the staff at Darlinghurst for a short time in the 1950's.

Next year Brother Superior General and his Assistants will prepare details for the General Chapter of the Order to be held in Rome late in 1967. Each of the Provinces of the Order will send its Provincial and two delegates elected by the professed Brothers. This means that Br. Hilary and six other Australians will meet with confreres from around the globe to decide the lines of action for the Order for the next nine years. We offer Br. Hilary our prayers and best wishes for the carrying out of this great task.

Rev. Brother Norman, B.A., A.Ed.



Brother Norman was appointed Director of the Marist Brothers' High School, Darlinghurst, in January, 1960. He had been Director of the Marist Brothers' School at Ayr in North Queensland, and before that had been on the staffs of our schools at Rosalie (Brisbane) and Auburn (Sydney). While on the staff at Rosalie, Brother gained his Bachelor of Arts degree at Queensland University and became an Associate of Education. Old boys of Brother in Brisbane still speak highly of his work as a choirmaster as well as a scholarship teacher. The Rosalie Choir was often heard on A.B.C. radio programmes under the baton of Brother Norman.

In 1960 Brother took up the task of directing St. Mary's High School, Darling-These were difficult times as the number of pupils had grown and accommodation in the main school building was stretched to breaking point. Brother set up classes in the "Old" monastery. The Wyndham Scheme came into being in 1962 and Brother had to organise classes to cope with the new techniques and the new ideas of The organising skill that this scheme. Brother had displayed in other places soon made itself evident here. The boys in the fifth and fourth forms at present are reaping the benefit of Brother's work in laying the foundation for the Wyndham Scheme.

In 1961 Brother organised the celebrations marking the Golden Jubilee of the Brothers' work on Darlinghurst Hill. To commemorate the occasion the Parents and Friends' Association, under Brother's guidance, renovated the school laboratories, thus making the instruction of our young scientists quite practical.

The young Old Boys will always remember Brother Norman as a keen and enthusiastic English teacher; as a serious Religious dedicated to the task of inspiring young lads to greater efforts for God; as a sincere friend interested in all their pursuits.

Brother Norman now has been appointed as Supervisor of the secondary schools of the Marist Brothers. His great organising ability is now directed to co-ordinating the efforts of all Marist secondary teachers as they take up the challenge of preparing students for the Higher School Certificate.

We all offer Brother our sincerest best wishes for a long and fruitful service in this new field.

Rev. Father John Murray


Father Murray, a member of 1958 Leaving Class at Darlinghurst, was ordained to the priesthood by His Eminence Cardinal N. T. Gilroy at St. Mary's Cathedral on Saturday, 16th July, 1966. Father Murray is the eighty-second priest to be educated at this school.

Father commenced at Darlinghurst in fourth class in 1951 and continued through to the Leaving Certificate. He won a Commonwealth scholarship to the University but entered St. Columba's Seminary, Springwood, in 1959. Later he transferred to St. Patrick's College, Manly, where he completed his studies for the priesthood.

On Monday, 25th July, Father returned to his old school to say Mass for the Brothers and boys. He brought back with him several young priests who had been at school with him, namely, Father E. Zondi, Father J. Grainger, Father T. Quinn and Father K. Fitzpatrick. Together they concelebrated Mass in the Sacred Heart Parish Church. It was a very pleasing sight for Brothers and boys to see five young Old Boys at the Altar offering Mass together.

At the school later in the morning, Jeffrey Kildea, Captain of the School, welcomed Father John and his mother. He gave the boys a brief outline of Father's successes in classwork, in sport and in the Cadet Corps. He congratulated Father on his ordination and made him a presentation of Spiritual books. Michael Potter, Vice-captain of the School, congratulated Mrs. Murray on seeing her son ordained a priest.

Father Murray made a very inspiring reply. He urged the boys to study the ideas of the Vatican Council on the layman's part in the Mass; the priesthood of the laity; the mission of the "people of God." Father thanked the Brothers and boys for the pleasant welcome he had received and went on to mention his personal debt of gratitude to the Brothers and especially to one of his former teachers, Brother Cloman.




The ladies of the Parents and Friends' Association entertained the guests to a tasty buffet lunch after the presentation ceremony.




Our School Chaplain

We thank Father Bayada for his zeal and the assistance he has given, and trust we can look forward to his continuing as Chaplain throughout 1967.



BROTHER PETER AND BROTHER BONAVENTURE



The weekly meetings of the Sodality and special meetings of its executive proved beneficial in sustaining the zeal of the Sodality members and in promoting a deeper personal devotion to Our Lady. Where possible, individual Sodalists undertook to attend Mass on Saturday mornings and major feast days of Our Lady, several boys combining in the one group on occasion for this purpose. Devotion to Our Lady was fostered by the maintenance of altars within the School, the recitation of the Rosary in the chapel during recreation time in October, the organisation of an Art Competition featuring Our Lady, and the sale of Rosary beads.

In a more general way, the Sodality supported worthwhile causes such as "Project Compassion" and the Missions through fund-raising schemes and the sale of stamps. Individual members prepared some very attractive posters on occasions to advertise these ventures.

While it is relatively easy to assess effectiveness when it is a question of how much was raised to help the Missions or how many sets of Rosary beads were distributed through the School, it is admittedly much harder to evaluate the degree to which the Sodality has achieved its essential aim, that of enriching and sustaining the spiritual life of each of its members. Public Speaking

Interest in Public Speaking was sustained throughout the year by the provision of a weekly lesson in almost all classes from Fifth Class through to Fourth Form, as well as by participation in Oratory Competitions and in some very successful debates arranged with teams from other schools. Mr. T. Gawne, in particular, provided much valuable guidance, founded on his own experience as an active member of "Rostrum." Of their own initiative, and fired mainly by the enthusiasm of Jeffrey Kildea, a group of boys from various classes organised a Public Speaking Club early in First Term.

We are grateful to the Sisters of Mercy at Holy Cross College, Woollahra, the Brigidine Sisters of Randwick, and the Marist Brothers at North Shore for the debates that they contested with us and are happy to report a very equable sharing of honours.

In the Senior division of the Oratory Competition organised for Catholic Schools by Mr. W. Shiel, B.Ec., of M.B.H.S., Parramatta, we were ably represented by Jeffrey Kildea and Brian Buckley. Gregory Bull and Peter Doyle acquitted themselves well as our Junior representatives. Jeffrey Kildea competed also in the Competition arranged by the Junior Chamber of Commerce—the division in which Jeffrey was entered was won by Peter Christie of Trinity Grammar School, to whom Jeffrey was runner-up in last year's "Lions' Youth of the Year Ouest."

Once again, the Lions' Club of Kings Cross (under whose auspices Jeffrey reached the final in 1965) offered our boys the opportunity of representing the district in this year's quest. Following a preliminary competition within the School, six finalists

were selected: Paul Chandler, David Hare, David Jones, Timothy Martin, John Phillips and Michael Potter. At a very enjoyable function held at the Chevron Hotel on July 29th, all six delivered prepared speeches and were then interviewed by a panel of distinguished personages. Careful scrutiny of the wide range of desirable qualifications led the panel eventually to choosing Timothy Martin to represent the Kings Cross Lions' Club in the Division 201 B Area Final. at Sacred Heart Church, Darlinghurst.



Annual Dinner.

In proposing the toast "to the Alma Mater and the Brothers" at the annual dinner held at the Catholic Club on Thursday, 29th September, His Worship Alderman John Armstrong, Lord Mayor of Sydney, spoke gratefully of the work done by the Brothers over the years, and expressed his regret that circumstances were obliging the closure of the school in December, 1968.

Rev. Brother Cloman, in reply, thanked the Lord Mayor for his words of appreciation, and exhorted the Old Boys to maintain their characteristic spirit of loyalty and cohesion throughout the years to come, despite the closing of the school.

Rev. Brother Demetrius, representing Rev. Brother Othmar (Provincial), referred also in some detail to the impending closure. He outlined the reasons which have made such a step inevitable, in view of the radical changes brought about by the Wynham Scheme. He stressed the new emphasis on classes catering for individual differences and requiring the subdivision of each form into various groupings to permit the teaching of subjects at advanced, credit and ordinary levels. Brother pointed out that, apart from the need for many more rooms than the present buildings can accommodate, it is necessary to have a large secondary enrolment to enable the scheme to work satisfactorily. With the development of regional schools, it is becoming more and more impractical to maintain the high school.

Official guests at the dinner included Very Rev. Monsignor G. Madden, P.P., P.C.; Rev. Fr. T. O'Reilly, C.M.; Rev. Brother Norman and Mr. G. Davey, C.B.E. Mr. D. McCallum welcomed the guests and presided at the dinner.
