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Foreword

As 1967 draws to a close, the "Blue and Blue" School Magazine goes to the press for the second last time. Now that the Wyndham Scheme has settled down and completed its first six years, it is obvious that the decision to close Darlinghurst is a wise one. The new scheme is designed for large comprehensive High Schools offering a variety of courses, both examinable and non-examinable, so that pupils can develop their special skills to the best of their ability. This can only be done in an efficient way in a large school with many classes in each form and Darlinghurst has never been large.

Despite the intended closure, the year 1967 has been a full one for the 250 boys on the Roll. They have been stimulated by a keen and enthusiastic staff of eight Brothers and two lay teachers. The traditional spirit of Darlinghurst has been in evidence in the efforts of the pupils in the classroom, on the sports field, at the altar rails, and on the speaker's platform. The Parents and Friends' Association has spared no effort to provide equipment and library books of the best quality so that the highest standards could be maintained.

The Old Boys' Union has rallied round and organized the Union for the years ahead. The Executive undertook the mammoth task of reorganizing the mailing lists and then arranged remarkably successful functions. The Executive is convinced that this Union can continue for many a long day to come and be of service to the Marist Brothers in their task of spreading Christian Education.

This year marks the sesquicentenary of the foundation of the Marist Brothers by Blessed Marcellin Champagnat at Lavalla, France, in 1817. It is also very significant to the Brothers of the Sydney Province because this year marks the completion of negotiations for the opening of our first school in Canberra, A.C.T. So while a fine school is closing here, a new one is opening in the national capital. This new school will use the Blue and Blue colours, the motto "Servo Fidem" and the Darlinghurst crest. We extend to the Brothers and boys of this new school our best wishes for the future. May the motto "Servo Fidem" prove to be as real to them as it has been to Darlinghurst pupils over the years.

**Ninth Superior General
Institute of the Marist Brothers**

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Very Rev. Brother Basilio, F.M.S.

SUPERIOR GENERAL

On September 24, 1967, the Sixteenth General Chapter elected Reverend Brother Basilio to the office of Superior General of the Marist Brothers of the Schools. Br. Basilio was born on 16th October, 1924, in the small town of Santa Ana, in the Mexican State of Jalisco. He began his schooling in the Marist Brothers' College in Guadalajara, and some years later entered the Marist Brothers' Novitiate, where he received the religious habit in 1943. He then began his teacher training course at Queretaro.

He began his teaching career at the "Instituto Mexico" and within a few years was promoted to the important post of Master of Juniors. Here he had the task of training young men interested in joining the Institute. After this, he was appointed to the staff of "Centro Universitario Mexico" and later acquired the degree of "Master of Philosophy" at the National University of Mexico.

In 1960, he came to Italy to study under the "Better World Movement" which

specialises in advanced apostolic training. After three years there he went successively to Ecuador, Panama, Venezuela, Colombia, and Chile to organise similar pastoral structures in various dioceses. Everywhere, he made a striking impression.

During the past three years he has been Director of the Second Novitiate for Spanish-speaking Brothers in Madrid. Early this year he was elected by his confreres of the Province of Central Mexico to represent them at the Sixteenth General Chapter. Now that Chapter has elected him Superior General.

It is obvious the Marist Teaching Brothers have a keen, young and talented man to lead them through the new period of the Church—the period after Vatican Council II.

To Reverend Brother Basilio, the Brothers, pupils and Old Boys of Darlinghurst offer congratulations and pledge our sincere loyalty.

Rev. Brother Quentin, F.M.S.

VICAR GENERAL

Of special interest to all connected with Darlinghurst was the election of Rev. Brother Quentin to the position of Brother Vicar and First Counsellor of the Very Rev. Brother Superior General.

Brother Quentin was on the High School staff from 1938 to 1945. During this period he graduated in Arts from Sydney University.

After terms as Headmaster at Randwick, St. Joseph's College, and Parramatta, he was appointed Provincial of the Sydney Province (N.S.W., Queensland, and the Solomon Islands). During his six years in this capacity, Brother's very able administration laid a sound foundation for the

implementation of the Wyndham Scheme. In addition, he gave much valuable assistance to the Diocesan authorities in the re-organisation of Catholic education.

Since 1964, Brother Quentin had been in charge of the training of Marist Scholastics at Champagnat College, Dundas.

In August of this year, Brother Quentin accompanied Rev. Brothers Othmar (Provincial) and Elias to represent the Brothers of the Sydney Province at the General Chapter. It was here that he was elected unanimously to his new post.

We congratulate Brother on his appointment and wish him well in the arduous tasks that now confront him.

ROUTE CHAMPAGNAT — A Pilgrimage

Pilgrimages are very much a part of the life of Europe. In the spring and summer months, numerous pilgrimages move across Europe. Some are small, informal, private affairs involving a short walk to a nearby shrine; others are made up of large groups fully organised, travelling long distances to some shrine of international fame. All of them are concerned with prayer.

A pilgrimage familiar to the people of the industrial towns of St. Etienne and St. Chamond, in south-east France, is that which follows the path known as "Route Champagnat." It consists in visiting the shrines associated with the life of Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, S.M., and in praying for the continued success of his work. A continual stream of men, women and children call at the places where Blessed Marcellin laboured and on 6th June, his feast day, a large, official pilgrimage is organised by the Brothers.

Marcellin Joseph Benedict Champagnat was the founder of the Marist Brothers and co-founder of the Marist Fathers. He was born in the little hamlet of Le Rosey in the parish of Marlihes on 20th May, 1789. He was baptised in the parish church on the following day.

LE ROSEY

Le Rosey is one of those quiet corners of Europe where nothing much has changed for hundreds of years. It is a small settlement of five or six houses all wretchedly poor by modern standards. The home of the Champagnat family still stands and is still occupied by a peasant family. The house is built of the rough stone of this mountainous district: the walls are unplastered; the roof is an uneven arrangement of old tiles. Marcellin's dingy room is much the same as it was when he laboured over his books as he studied for the priesthood. The floorboards are wide, thick planks; the desk is made of similar heavy timber.

Yet in one important respect Le Rosey has changed. A wonderful stone chapel now stands beside the house where Marcellin lived as a boy. This chapel was built from funds donated by the pupils attending Marist schools throughout the world at the time of his beatification in 1955. A fine set of stained glass windows depicts the main

features of Marcellin's life and work. Here in this chapel many people thank God for the graces they have received as a result of their education at the hands of the Marist Brothers.

After one compares the poverty of the Champagnat home with the majesty of the nearby chapel, one begins to realise Marcellin's success. To rise above the limitations of this environment Marcellin needed a tremendous trust in God, coupled with a great courage. These are the marks of a saint. The people of Marlihes recognise the saintly qualities of the man who grew up in their district. They honour him with a special shrine in their parish church. In the centre of this shrine is a powerful statue of Blessed Marcellin carved from the tough native granite. The statue suggests strength of character—a strength acquired from coping with the hard environment of the district—and strength of faith.

LA VALLA

Leaving Marlihes the pilgrim travels across the plateau until the valley of the Gier is reached. This mountain stream rises in the range known as Mount Pilat and races north towards the city of Lyons. La Valla is built on the slopes above the Gier. Much of this little town is the same as it was when Marcellin Champagnat first came there as a curate immediately after his ordination on 22nd July, 1816. The parish was one of the largest in all France and one of the most difficult to serve because of the rugged terrain. The lack of Christian education among its children was alarming. It was this fact that caused Marcellin to found the Marist Brothers.

On a ridge just above the main part of the town can be seen the original house which Marcellin bought when he established the Brothers on 2nd January, 1817. The house has been extended over the years and the first extensions were put on by Marcellin and the early Brothers. One of the original rooms has been kept intact. It is small and poorly furnished with a low ceiling and dark walls. The original wide floorboards can be clearly seen. Nearby stand the plain dining-room table and the apparatus used for making nails. In the iron-steel districts around St. Etienne and St. Chamond, nail

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making was one of the home industries carried out by the peasants in the winter months when their fields were buried in snow. The early Marist Brothers used this craft as a means of supporting themselves until they were sufficiently trained to be able to open schools.

A Marist pilgrim cannot but be moved when he looks about this room. He can see some of the everyday objects used by Marcellin and the first Brothers. He wonders how an institute of 10,000 members conducting great colleges throughout the world, could have grown up from such meagre foundations. Obviously the answer lies in the fact that Marcellin trusted in God and not in material possessions nor in the help of influential people. When we consider that he founded this Institute when he was a curate of only six months' standing, we see just how great this strength was. He often said to the early Brothers: "When God is on our side, when we rely on Him alone, nothing is impossible." His whole life was a living proof of this conviction.

THE HERMITAGE

Well down the valley of the Gier and near the outskirts of St. Chamond, one comes across a large building named: "Notre Dame de L'Hermitage." This is the building that Marcellin erected as a Novitiate seven years after he founded the institute. It is situated in a secluded spot, a perfect spot for prayer and study. The tough rock face stands tall and forbidding over the house.

The Hermitage is the place most frequented by the people of the district for here one finds a great array of relics of Blessed Marcellin. In particular, one can pray at the wonderful shrine in the chapel where the remains of Marcellin are encased in a glorious reliquary.

The part of The Hermitage built by Marcellin still stands but many other wings have been added to it. One can visit the Community Room in which he instructed the Brothers. In this same room the First General Chapter elected Brother Francis, F.M.S., as First Superior General. Here, also, Blessed Marcellin gave the Brothers his last testament. The room of relics contains many of the vestments he used; his breviary, his disciplines. His passport is also there and in it we find his description: height six feet, chestnut hair, high forehead, chestnut eyebrows, grey eyes, flat nose, round chin, long face, pale complexion, medium mouth.

Beneath the chapel of The Hermitage, one finds an historical cyclorama. It consists of a set of nine tableaux which depict the life and work of Marcellin. Special lighting effects coupled with a recorded commentary and background music make the cyclorama a wonderful survey of his Institute. After comparing the poverty of the original room at La Valla with the grandeur of the cyclorama of his world-wide Institute, one is reminded of the words of St. Augustine, which Marcellin often quoted: "The essential is not to begin well but to end well." Marcellin ended his life as a Saint but this was only the beginning of his work. At his death there were 287 Brothers working in France and Oceania but today there are 10,000 Brothers working in 56 countries on all continents.

FOURVIERE

Lyons is not included in "Route Champagnat" but for those really interested in the Marists a visit to this city is essential. Here at the shrine of Our Lady of Fourviere, standing on a hill overlooking the city, they will find a chapel dear to Marist hearts. The young seminarians who conceived the idea of the Marist Fathers came to Fourviere to consecrate themselves to Our Lady. A plaque on the side of the sanctuary of the shrine reminds all that on this spot Blessed Marcellin Champagnat got the inspiration to found the Marist Brothers. He frequently called back to renew his consecration in the Society of Mary and to place the Institute of the Brothers in the hands of Our Lady. Here, also, St. Peter Chanel, S.M., Br. Marie Nizier, F.M.S., and their companions came in pilgrimage before sailing for Futuna and other isles of the Pacific. To Our Lady they dedicated their life's work.

Blessed Marcellin Champagnat honoured Our Lady with filial affection and piety. He believed her to be Mother of God and mother of men. He believed that both he and his Brothers were among the poor and humble with whom the Blessed Virgin had identified herself. He placed all his works in her hands to be given to the one and only mediator, Jesus Christ. His motto was "All for Jesus through Mary, and all to Mary for Jesus." This could well be our motto on our pilgrimage through life.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor T. O. Wallace, P. P.

After twenty-three years of zealous work as Parish Priest of Darlinghurst, Rt. Rev. Monsignor T. O. Wallace was transferred this year to St. Patrick's Parish, Bondi. As parish priest here he was well known to all the Brothers and their pupils. He went to great lengths to provide religious services for the boys of our school. Often he welcomed back to his parish Old Boys of the school who had been ordained to the priesthood. These young priests, their parents and their teachers were made to feel most welcome by Monsignor. On the feast of Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, 6th June, he provided Mass for the Brothers and their pupils and often preached the occasional

sermon in honour of the founder of the Marist Brothers.

During his years as a priest, Monsignor has worked at the Seminaries at Springwood and Manly and in the parishes of Chatswood and Annandale. He had been parish priest at Sutherland, Surry Hills and Redfern before coming to Darlinghurst.

Perhaps the feature that most impresses one about Monsignor Wallace is his concern for the poor. He was particularly interested in those pupils from his parish who were not well off and sponsored many of them through the school.

Our best wishes go to Monsignor in his work as parish priest at St. Patrick's, Bondi.

Rev. Father John Roche, P.P.

Father John Roche was appointed to replace Monsignor T. O. Wallace as Parish Priest of Darlinghurst at the beginning of 1967. Father Roche had been Parish Priest of St. Benedict's Parish, Broadway, for the past fifteen years and we had learned from our confreres at the Marist Brothers' School, St. Benedict's, Broadway, of Father's sterling qualities.

Early in the year he called at the School and addressed the pupils. He also invested

the Captains and Vice-Captains with their badges of office.

The Marist Brothers are pleased to be associated with Fr. Roche again and thank him for the wonderful help he has given to the Brothers and boys.

We all hope that he has a very happy and successful apostolate in the Sacred Heart Parish, Darlinghurst.

VOCATIONS

During the course of the year the recruiters of various religious bodies called at the School. We had visits from Fr. L. Tosi, Fr. P. Davies, O. Carm (an Old Boy of the School) and Br. Nilus, F.M.S. All found a number of boys interested in the priesthood or religious life and gave help and advice to all those seeking it.

During the long history of Darlington, over 100 boys have joined the priesthood or the brotherhood and so it is not surprising that a number of recent Old Boys are in training for the religious life and that a number of present boys are interested in the same career.

In July, three young Old Boys made their First Vows in the Institute of the Marist Brothers. They are Br. Michael Evesson, Br. Andrew Moraghan, Br. Anthony Britton. At the 'Marist Brothers' Juniorate, Mittagong, we have two students, Sam Vassallo and Geoffrey Jones, studying for their Higher School Certificate.

Training for the priesthood are Old Boys, John Andersen at St. Patrick's College, Manly; William Moore and Murray Trembath at St. Columba's College, Springwood. With the Religious Clergy we have Guy Hartcher (Vincentian Fathers) and John Worthington (Marist Fathers).

Public Speaking

While the pressure of public exams limited our opportunities of participating in much inter-school debating, interest in public speaking was nonetheless sustained throughout the year by Mr. T. Gawne's lessons on Speech and Public Speaking in 4A, 4B, 3A and 3B; and those of Brother Herbert in Sixth Class. In addition, participation in various oratory competitions — with preliminary competitions within the school to decide our representatives — served to stimulate interest. We are very grateful also to the Sisters of Mercy for the provision of debates against teams from their Holy Cross College, Woollahra.

A notable victory came our way in Term I when John Phillips won the Senior Division of the Catholic Secondary Schools Oratory Competition from a field of some forty contestants. Our other Senior representative, Jeffrey Kildea, acquitted himself well. So too did Peter Doyle and Brian Akhurst in the Junior Division.

The school was ably represented by Paul Chandler in the Sydney Jaycees' "Youth Speaks for Australia" contest held on 9th June. The winner of this final was the very impressive Ben Apfelbaum of Vacluse Boys' High.

As in previous years, the Lions' Club of Kings Cross afforded our boys the opportunity of representing the district in the 1967 "Lions' Youth of the Year Quest." The very pleasant function held on 28th July to select the club representative was made possible through the generosity of the Rev. Wm. Walsh, Rector of St. John's, who made the Hugh F. Middleton Memorial Auditorium available, and of Mrs. Wm. Walsh and the St. John's Ladies' Guild, who provided a most enjoyable supper. The boys selected to contest this stage of the Quest were Brian Buckley, David Jones, Jeffrey Kildea, John Phillips, Michael Potter

and Paul Roberts. In addition to being interviewed individually by the panel of three distinguished adjudicators, each of the boys delivered a prepared speech. Very careful consideration of the extensive range of desirable qualifications eventually led to David Jones being placed first, with Jeffrey Kildea a very close second. For his success in this final, David was awarded a two week's vacation at Surfers' Paradise and the right to represent the Lions' Club of Kings Cross in the Division 201 B Area Final. The three adjudicators — the Rev. Mr. Wm. Walsh, Sir John McCauley, and Alderman Mrs. Joan Pilone — deserve a very special commendation for their painstaking analysis of the six finalists and their assistance to them.

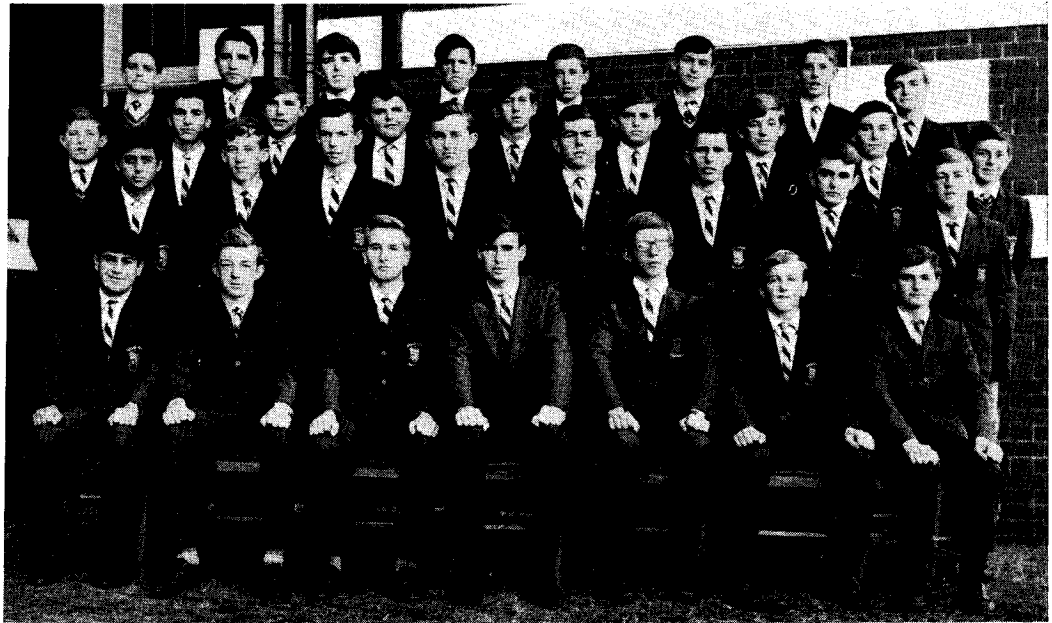

Gilmore's entrance was good and a nice study in voice and presence. This player used an eloquent vocal range . . ."

As one might have expected, Miss Wood found some faults in the production, notably with the "economy of movement and gesture on the part of other players"; even so, all who took part gained much from their experience, and can be quite proud of what they did achieve.

Jules Vandenburg and Stephen Burris, in particular, assisted greatly in the technical side of production. Most notable was their design and construction of the set depicting a precipice overlooking the sea. In this, they received valuable help from William Dudgeon, Raymond O'Connor, and Peter Hyde. We are very grateful to Mr. A. Goudie for the use of his workshop, and to Mr. H. Vandenburg for his excellent work in the sewing of the costumes.

The presentation of the play at the annual prize-giving was much appreciated by all.

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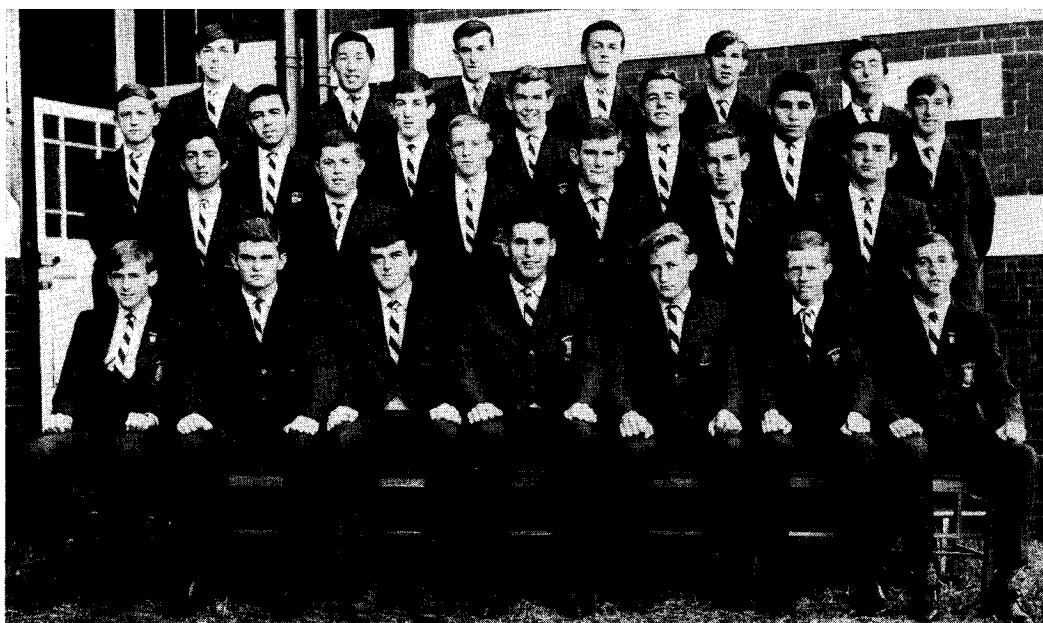

As we go to press, the Sixth Class function has not as yet been held, but it is confidently expected to prove as successful as those outlined above.

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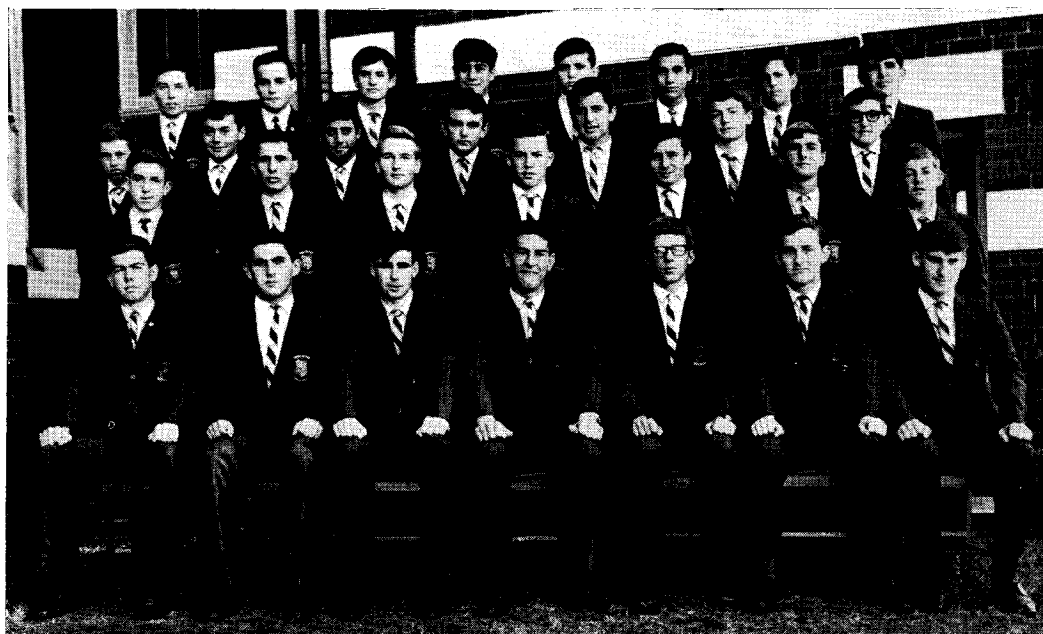
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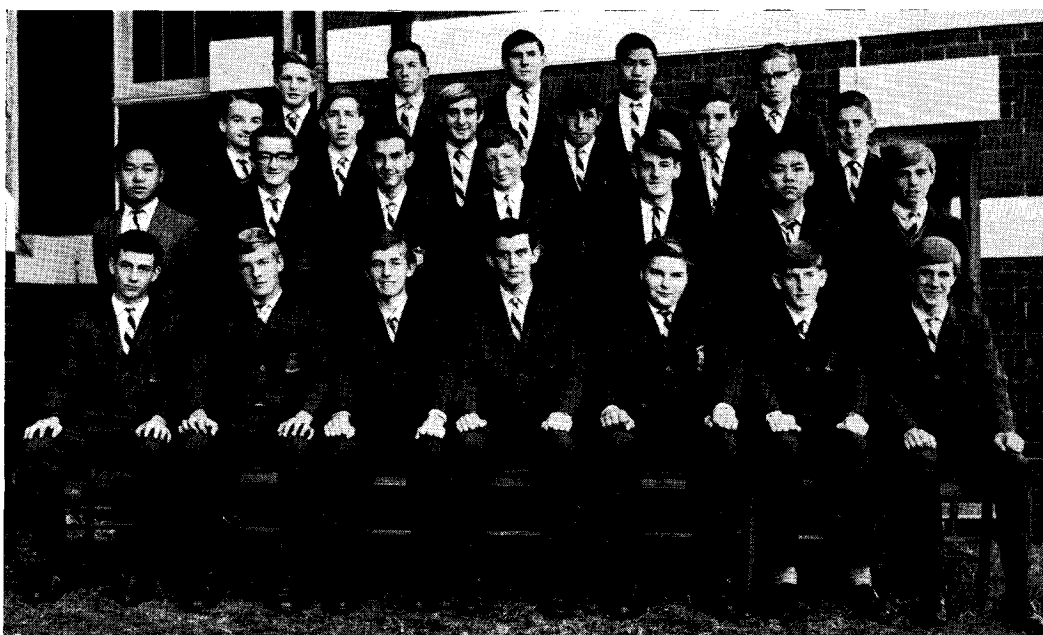
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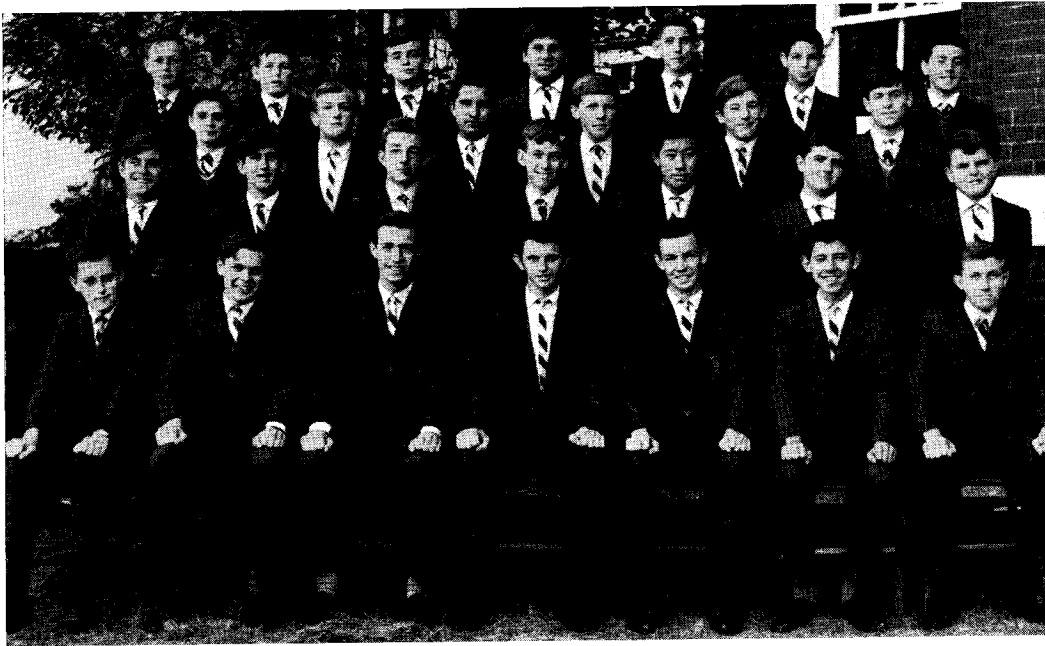

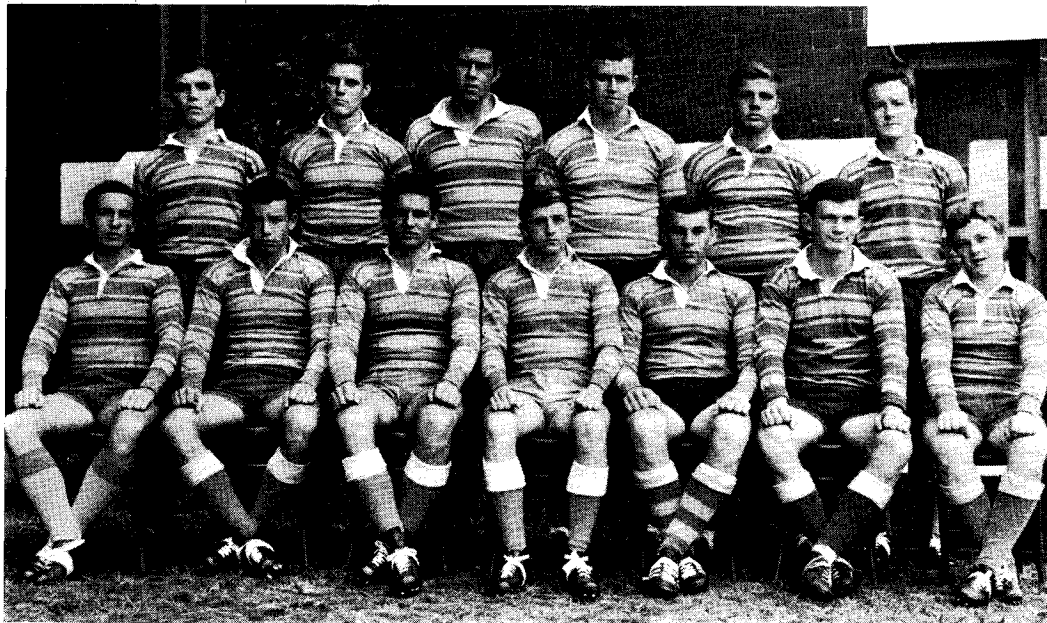

A Grade.

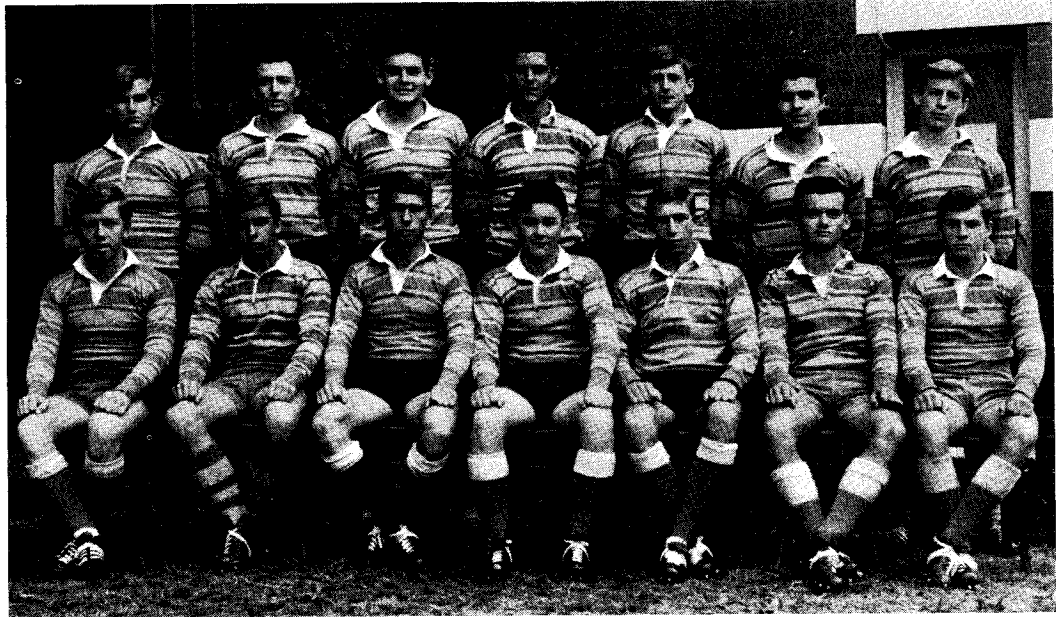

THE LATE REV. BROTHER ANDREW, F.M.S.

We were saddened to learn of the death of Rev. Brother Andrew on 28th October, at the age of 81. One of Australia's best-known Marist Brothers, the late Brother Andrew spent a very active and successful sixty-six years in the religious life.

Brother's connection with Darlinghurst, in fact, extends back to the turn of the century, when the school was situated near St. Mary's Cathedral. His first teaching appointment was to the staff of this school; after a short term at St. Benedict's, Brother was re-appointed to the St. Mary's Cathedral School in 1905. He remained there until 1909 when he was transferred to Western Australia.

Brother Andrew, in more recent times, had occasion to visit the High School frequently in his capacity as Provincial (1931 — 1941 and 1948 — 1953), as Vice-Provincial (1942 — 1947), and as Vocations Recruiter (1953 — 1959).

While we mourn his passing, we also take consolation in the knowledge that Brother's life was well spent in God's service; and, like so many others who were privileged to know him during his life, we derive inspiration from the noble virtues that characterised him.

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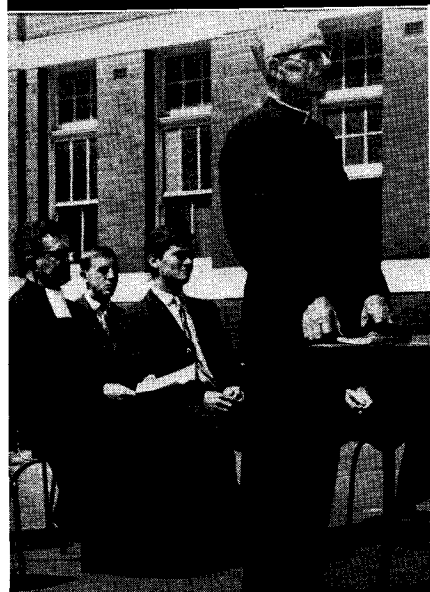

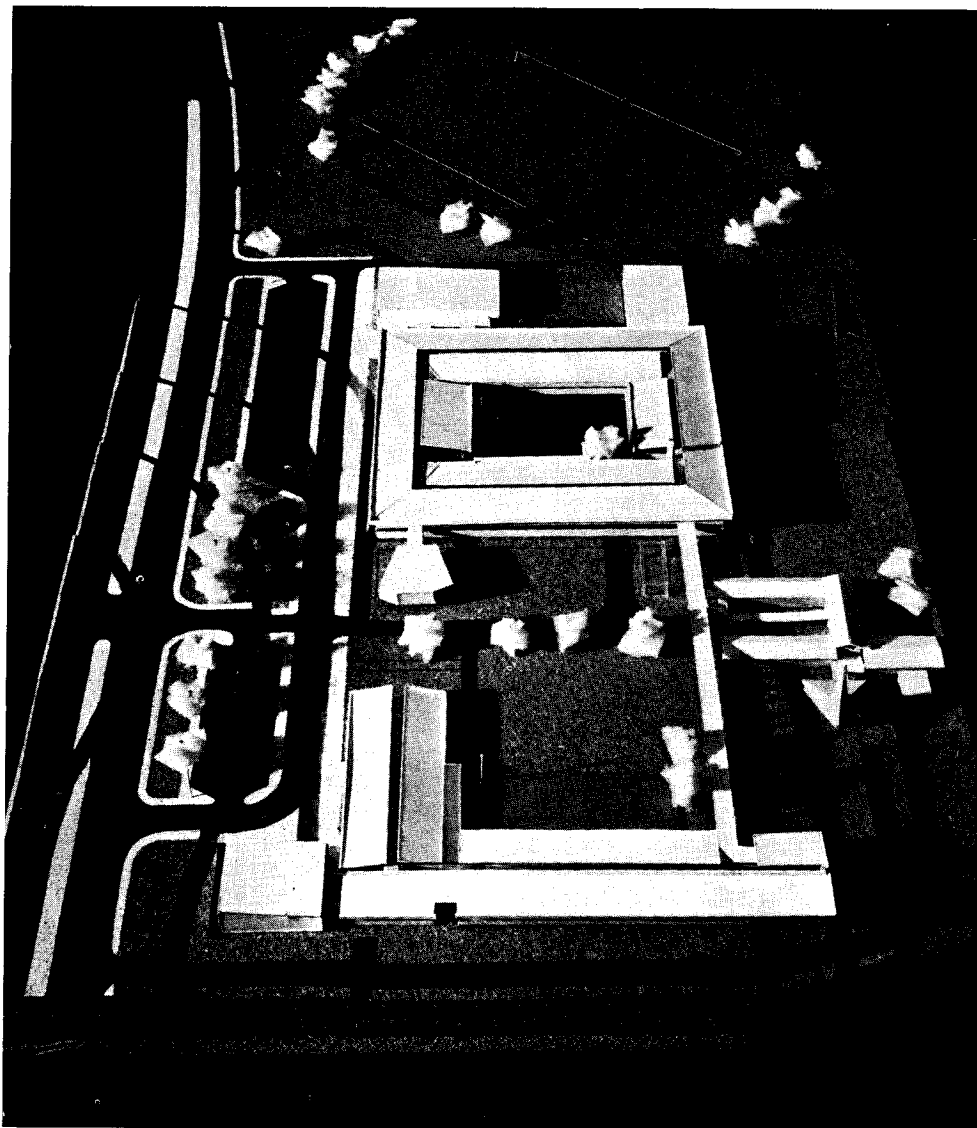


Centre : Rev. Fr. Roche addresses the assembled students.

THE HON. SIR JOHN CLANCY

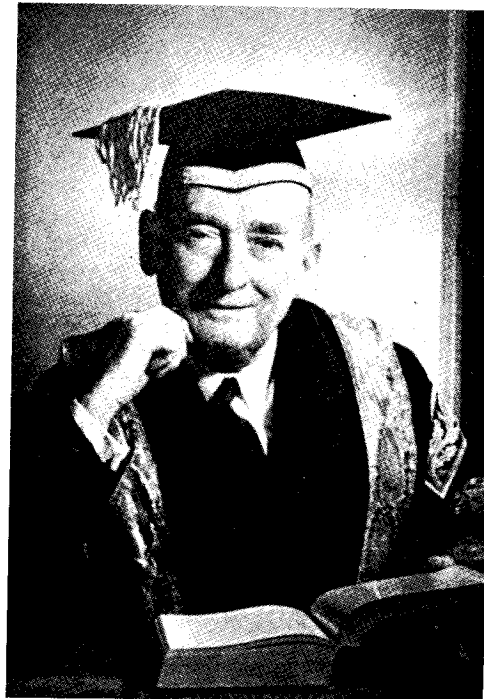
K.B.E., C.M.G., LL.B Syd., Hon. D. Litt. (N.E.), Chancellor, University of N.S.W.

Sir John was honoured by the Queen at the New Year, 1967, by being appointed Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire. The award was made in recognition of his many services to the community in the profession of law, in the judiciary, and in the University of New South Wales.

Sir John attended the Marist Brothers' High School when it was situated at St. Mary's Cathedral.

He joined the Education Department in 1913; enlisted in the infantry and fought in New Guinea and France in World War I; was admitted to the bar in 1925; appointed a District Court Judge in 1931; appointed as a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court in 1947. He began his association with the University of New South Wales when, in 1949, he was appointed to its first Council; in 1953 he became Deputy Chancellor and in 1960 he was elected to the position of Chancellor of the University.

Sir John is renowned for his dignity coupled with a manner that makes him easily approachable; for his integrity,



loyalty, and compassion; for his love and respect for the traditions of the law.

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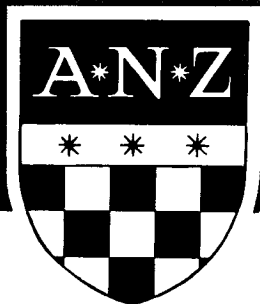
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
