PROSPECTUS

THE SCHOOL, a lofty and well-built edifice, with spacious classrooms, is situated on the heights of Darlinghurst, at the corner of Liverpool and Darley Streets, overlooking City and Harbour.

It is convenient to trams and buses from the City, the Quay, Bellevue Hill, Woollahra, Maroubra, Malabar and Matraville, Mascot, Elizabeth Bay, Watson's Bay, etc.

The School is non-parochial. It accepts pupils from anywhere within the Metropolitan Area. Boys of undesirable character are not allowed to remain at the School.

The pupils are prepared for Intermediate, Leaving Certificate, and Matriculation examinations. Courses lead to the various University faculties, the Public Service, and Diploma Courses at a Technical College.

The curriculum includes a systematic study of the Catholic Religion, English, Latin, French, Mathematics, Mechanics, Physics, Chemistry, Descriptive Geometry and Drawing, History, Geography. Under the guidance of the Brothers the pupil makes a selection from these subjects.

Cadet Corps:

All boys over the age of 14 are eligible for membership. Volunteers only, but all Senior Boys are urged to join. Parade each week. Annual Camp.


Telephone:

Silence in which the Eternal Word Leapt down from heaven's throne, Silence that many secrets heard And kept them for its own;


Ark of rescue, which could contain The human race in One, To which across the deluged plain The sacred dove has flown;


FOREWORD





Alderman Hills has carried out his duties as Lord Mayor of Sydney in such a capable and intelligent way, while at all times giving a fine example of Catholic living, that his old school is indeed happy to congratulate him on the success he has achieved.

Highlights of Alderman Hills' first term as Lord Mayor have been the National Eucharistic Congress in April (a scene from the Civic Reception he gave at the Town Hall on the occasion is shown opposite), his Coronation tour to England via America, and his Chairmanship of the rally of 110,000 people at the Sydney Cricket Ground on Nov. 1st at the conclusion of Rev. Father Peyton's Rosary Crusade.

Nothing in his extensive overseas tour for the Coronation was so impressive and moving to the Lord Mayor as the private audience he and the Lady Mayoress were granted with the Holy Father, at the Vatican.



VOCATIONS


Two old boys of Darlinghurst have been ordained this year: Father James Cox, S.M., on July 25th, at St. Patrick's Church, Sydney, and Father Patrick Murphy, S.V.D., on August 22nd, at St. Mary's Mission House, Techny, Illinois, U.S.A.

Father Cox came to Darlinghurst from the Brothers at Villa Maria, and was in the 1945 L.C. Class. He returned to Darlinghurst on Monday, July 27th, and was welcomed by the assembled school, and by several Old Boys who had known him at school. He was introduced to the boys by the Brother Director, who also presented him with a copy of Davis' Moral and Pastoral Theology on behalf of the school. Fr. Cox then addressed the boys, and recalled, amongst other school days, incidents of his occasion when Fr. E. Paine had come to the school immediately after his ordination. The occasion had made a lasting impression on Fr. Cox. Fr. Cox expressed his gratitude to the Marist Brothers.

Father gave Benediction in the Parish Church, which was crowded by the school children and parishioners. The Parish Priest, Monsignor Wallace, in a short sermon, congratulated Fr. Cox on his ordination, and the Marist Brothers' High School on its outstanding record of vocations to the Priesthood. Fr. Cox then gave his blessing individually to the congregation. A half-holiday was granted to the boys.

Father Patrick Murphy, S.V.D., was in the 1944 L.C. Class at Darlinghurst. He is the first Australian to be ordained a Priest in the Society of the Divine Word. He made his Novitiate at Marburg, Queensland, and then continued his studies at the Seminary of the Divine Word Fathers in U.S.A.

The present boys of the school offered their prayers during one month for the

ordinand's intentions. The numbers of Masses, Communions and Rosaries thus offered were listed in a Spiritual Bouquet which was prepared and illuminated very tastefully by one of the Ladies of the Sacred Heart at Kincoppal Convent, Elizabeth Bay. The Spiritual Bouquet, and also a theological book, were taken to America by Mrs. Murphy, who presented them on behalf of Darlinghurst to her son on the day of his ordination.

In a letter from America after his ordination, Father Murphy wrote:

"It was comforting to think that at the time of my ordination—the greatest time, in fact, of my life—the old school was remembering me. In God's Providence it was the Marist Brothers' School at Darlinghurst that laid the educational groundwork for my priesthood; it was there, too, that so many of the habits were formed essential to the vocation to which God has called me. As time goes on I realize these facts more and more, and so it is that I would fully acknowledge the part that Darlinghurst has played in my priesthood."

The Society of the Divine Word was founded by Rey. Father Arnold Janssen in 1875 at Steyl Holland, and established in Australia in 1900 at Sydney. The work of the Order is primarily that of Foreign Missions. Bishops and priests of the Society are engaged in missionary work in Eastern New Guinea and Wewak, and in many other parts of the world.

SEMINARIANS

Four Old Boys of the school began their studies for the Priesthood this year; two are from last year's L.C. Class (John Nesbitt and Peter McMaugh), and two were in the 1946 L.C. Class (John Hallinan and Paul Murray). Both the last-mentioned young men have completed successful University courses since leaving school. Paul is a Master of Agricultural Science in the University of New Zealand, and is now at Springwood. John graduated Bachelor of Science with First-class Honours and the University Medal in Geology in the University of Sydney, and has done two years' study for his doctorate. He is now in the Dominican Novitiate, Camberwell. Victoria.

John Nesbitt entered the seminary at Springwood, while Peter McMaugh went to the Novitiate of the Marist Fathers at Armidale.

On January 30th, the future seminarians (with the exception of John

Hallinan, who was not in Sydney at the time) were farewelled by the Brothers and present boys at the school, and were each presented with a crucifix.

EX-STUDENTS IN THE MARIST BROTHERS

Three former students of the school received the Habit of the Marist Brothers and their name in Religion on July 2nd this year, and are now completing their Novitiate at Mittagong. They are John Mahon (Brother Donald John); Bernard Mahon (Brother Hubert Bernard); and Michael Curnow (Brother Nicholas).

At the beginning of this year, Anthony Butler, became the most recent Darlinghurst boy to begin his training to be a Marist Brother. He is now at the Minor Juniorate at Bowral.

We hope and pray that many more boys from the school will offer their lives to the service of Jesus Christ and His Blessed Mother in the priestly and religious states.



CHRISTMAS IN THE NORTH SOLOMONS

(I feel that this account of a Christmas Midnight Mass in the Solomons will remind our readers, as the Christmas festival approaches once again, of the Christian meaning of this Holy season; it will also, I hope, reveal something of the glorious work of our missionaries amongst the natives of the Solomons.


Old Boys who were at this school six or seven years ago will also treasure the kindly references to Brother Jude in the concluding paragraphs of the article.

The article was written by Mrs. Brosgarth now living at Buka Passage, near Hahela Mission.—Ed.)

Whether we would be in time for Midnight Mass depended on Borats, the genial old tyrant who captained the Government work-boat, "MV Hazel". Hopefully we board the boat, and wait for the Great One to start the engines. Borats, as you may have gathered, is a power to be reckoned with. You may be able to command most natives to do your bidding and they will cheerfully and readily obey. However, once you step aboard the "Hazel", you are entering Borats' "sanctum sanctorum" and you fall willy–nilly under his spell. He is aged, for a native, with a noble face, an appearance of great dignity somewhat marred by his ultra-squeaky voice, and a profound disregard for the general public. It is no use telling him to start now, or to hurry up, or to put your cargo here, and will he go in close to the little island we are approaching now, for the neat little vilage on the seashore presents a fine subject for a snapshot with its beached canoes, the splashing brown bodies of the piccaninnies enjoying a dip and the men fishing off the reef? He doesn't come right out and say he won't do it; he only puffs away at his foul old cigar, fixes his gaze absently on the middle distance and observes that (a) the tide (or the moon) is unpropitious, (b) it's no use hurrying as the estimated time of arrival is governed by things other than speed, (c) you may put your cargo there and certainly you may sit there if you want to get drenched with spray-the other side is more sheltered, of course, but perhaps you prefer it that way? and (d) he wonders why the markers were put on the reefs? The one we are nearing undoubtedly shows that the tide is awfully low-still if it's O.K. to put the "Hazel" on the reef for the sake of a prize camera study . . . He shrugs

elaborately and wearily you give in, wait till he's ready to go, sit where he puts you and go the way he's already decided upon. Unexpectedly the engines throb into life, the ropes are cast off and we are away. We cross Buka Passage, while overhead the bright stars pepper the velvet blackness of the tropical sky.

Although most of the Europeans are non-Catholics, all of them have turned out for Midnight Mass, and, as we pile into the waiting jeeps and begin to drive from Chinatown to Hahela, the night is suddenly full of bobbing lanterns, and shadowy figures like dim pilgrims are crowding the road and ascending the hill ahead. It reminds me of the final scene in Walt Disney's wonderful "Fantasia"; perhaps you remember, in it, the second last musical presentation -Moussorgsky's macabre "Night on Bare Mountain", horrifying in its picturization of massed evil? It begins at midnight with the spirits of damned souls returning to earth to glorify Tchernobog, the God of Darkness. appears amidst a subterranean din of supernatural voices, and is hailed with hideous joy by his grisly acolytes. The sacrilegious Black Mass and the savage

ferocity of the Witches' Sabbath follow, but at the height of this pagan orgy dawn begins to break. The golden start of the day fingers the pale hills, and the spirits of darkness know that it presages the end of their unholy revels and their return to their uneasy graves. Far off sounds the bell of the little village church, and, as the sun touches the spire, the shadow of the cross falls across the ground. Cringing with fear and shrieking with hatred at the one sign that can foil them, the spectres vanish and are vanguished. The discordant cacophony is stilled, and we hear in its stead the lovely day-break theme of this symphonic tone poem. Imperceptibly it blends with and merges into Schubert's "Ave Maria," the interlaced branches of the forest trees form the arches and cloisters of a sylvan cathedral, and, out of the morning mist, lines of reverent pilgrims emerge, carrying lighted candles, their voices swelling into the glorious cadences of this most beautiful hymn.

All this comes back to my mind as I see the natives with their hurricane lamps wending their way up the hill to Hahela for Midnight Mass. Maybe it is not so fanciful a thought after all. Perhaps, not so very long ago, they lit their torches and stamped their feet and yelled their heathen chants at ceremonies as unclean as Moussorgsky's legendary rites. Not so very long ago Christmas was unknown to them. Now the lamps stand for the light of Faith and Christmas means it is the little Jesus' birthday and here we all are at Hahela, and we are early, and the procession is ready to begin!

The piccaninnies' shrill treble joins with the harsher voices of the village elders as the Christmas carols begin, and the figure of the Divine Babe is carried to its lowly place of honour in the manger of the crib that has been prepared at the side of the altar. Everyone is hushed in their places. We are all gathered on the site of the partially-erected new Church, which only lack of funds and building materials prevented from being completed by Christmas, and so the

ceremony is to be held in the open air.

It is a soft balmy night, and the perfume of the incense steals sweetly to our nostrils as High Mass proceeds. The untrained singing we heard at the beginning gives place to the pure head voices of the school boys and girls. The light from the pressure lamp falls on Sister Isabelle's face as she bends over the organ and draws from it the singing notes, and on little Sister Marian as she conducts a choir of which even the most fastidious teacher could be justly proud. and I know that, in their pre-dieus beside the children, Sister Hedda and Sister Bertha silently thank God for the glory of the night and add their own voices to all the voices of praise around them.

It is the Offertory and Father Lebel faces a congregation he can feel rather than see, for the lamps are not enough to illuminate the sea of faces that crowd to hear his words. He speaks first to the Europeans in English. "My dear friends, I cannot tell you how happy I am to see you all here to-night, and let me be the first to wish you a happy and holy Christmas. In the modern world where everything has now become commercialized to a degree the word Christmas has lost it true meaning. But you and I know what it really stands for CHRIST'S MASS . . ."

The Christmas message, simple in its eloquence and staggering in its implications, flowed on, and I shut my eyes and I was at home, kneeling beside my mother and father in the pro-cathedral at Maitland and Bishop Gleeson or Father Flatley or whoever the celebrant might be was saying the same words in another way. "And this is what it means," I thought, "when you learn from the penny Catechism in Third Grade that the Church is one, because it is but one fold under one shepherd, all its members believing the same truths and having the same sacraments and sacrifice."

And so on to Hahela's Christmas Communion. After the few Europeans and Asiatics had received, the natives began to approach the altar.

So many natives had come to receive their Lord that we thought they would never cease. Like Wordsworth's daffodils, "they stretched in never-ending line." Again and again Father Lebel passed up and down the impromptu altar rails, with the faithful Brother Jude carrying a pressure lamp beside him, and wiping dry his face as it became dewed with perspiration so that he could hardly see. It was well over an hour and a half before the ranks began to thin out, and, as the last communicants went back to their grassy seats, Father Lebel's brow had been wiped many times and Brother Jude's arm (I hope) mercifully mortified from the elbow downwards. Over a steaming cup of cocoa which the good Sisters had left in the presbytery for us to enjoy after Mass, we guessed at the probable number of communicants. Between four and five thousand was the general consensus of opinion. We were wholly astonished when we learnt from Father Lebel that the actual number was 1,035.

So, whether you heard Midnight Mass in the hallowed vastness of St. Peter's, Rome, the glittering splendour of St. Patrick's, New York, the carved beauty of Notre Dame, Paris, or in St. Mary's, Sydney, be assured that your fervour, your love and your devotion were matched in places you never even heard of, amongst poor savages but lately reclaimed for God from ignorance and superstition . . . yes, even in Hahela. Small Buka, North Solomons, and for them, too, the powerful words rang as thrillingly true as they did for you . . . "et propter nostram salutem descendit de coelis."

ANNUAL SPEECH NIGHT

Particular interest was felt in the Annual Speech Night on December 10th, 1952, in the Maccabean Hall, because of the distinguished guests who honoured the school and the Brothers by their presence. His Eminence the Cardinal Archbishop of Sydney had graciously accepted the invitation to preside at the function and to present the prizes. We were deeply grateful to His Eminence for having obliged us in this way at personal inconvenience: Eminence's departure from Australia to India was to take place the very next morning, and we were doubly appreciative therefore of the generosity with which our beloved Cardinal favoured us with his presence throughout the evening.

To the delight of all associated with the school, the newly-elected Lord Mayor of Sydney, Alderman P. D. Hills, who had on that very day commenced his official duties as First Citizen of the City of Sydney, attended the Speech Night of the School of which he is a distinguished ex-student.

Before reading the Annual Report, the Director of the High School, Rev. Brother Michael, B.A., welcomed His Eminence the Cardinal and the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor, and the other official guests, including the Provincial of the Marist Brothers, Rev. Brother Andrew, B.A. Dip.Ed., and two ex-students conspicuous for their loyalty to the school, the Hon. Sir Edward McTiernan, K.B.E., Justice of the High Court of Australia, and Senator the Hon. John Armstrong.

The Parish Priest of Darlinghurst, Monsignor T. O. Wallace, was unable to remain throughout the evening; he was represented by Rev. Father J. Weaver.



nation and yet the Holy Father has seen fit to send one of us to that ancient land, India, whose culture dates back thousands of years and where, tradition tells us, one of the twelve Apostles of our Divine Master, St. Thomas, first preached the Gospel. For one reason or another the Catholic Faith was not established throughout the land in those early days nor later at the time of St. Francis Xavier, the fourth centenary of whose death we shall soon be commemorating. Thus it came about that our lovely morning land, in God's providence, has been given the opportunity to send further missionaries to preach His Gospel. Like St. Thomas and St. Francis Xavier they will soon spread His message of peace to all men, that we must love one another, even those whom we formerly hated. They will take Christ Himself to the teeming millions to the North of Australia, for though He died for us on the Cross, He made arrangements to remain always with His Faithful in the Blessed Sacrament."

His Eminence then offered his congratulations and best wishes to Alderman Hills on his election as Lord Mayor of Sydney.

His Eminence went on to say that it gave him great joy and consolation to see the marvellous contribution Catholic education was making to the spiritual and temporal good of Australia.

"How splendidly equipped our boys and girls are when they go out to become citizens of the nation and future citizens of Heaven," His Eminence continued. "Catholic Brothers and Nuns have made almost unbelievable sacrifices in the work of educating the youth of Australia, and among all the teaching orders the Marist Brothers hold a justly honourable place. It was recently my pleasure to meet the visiting Superior General of the Marist Brothers, the Very Rev. Brother Leonida, and he expressed delight at the great work the Order is doing for the glory of God and the welfare of souls in this country. May God continue to bless the Marist Brothers and may He grant a continuance of their marvellous work."



A vote of thanks to His Eminence was moved by the Hon. Sir Edward Mc-Tiernan, and seconded by Senator the Hon. John Armstrong.



SODALITY OF OUR LADY

It is interesting to note that the Sodality of the Children of Mary has been treasured by the Marist Brothers in their work for boys from the very beginning of the Brothers' labours in Australia. The Marist Brothers arrived in Sydney in 1872, and we find that in the very same year the Confraternity of the Children of Mary was established at the Brothers' first school in Australia-St. Patrick's, Harrington Street. In 1875 the Marist Brothers' High School was opened, and now, nearly eighty years later, the Sodality of the Children of Mary still flourishes in that High School. Surely Our Blessed Mother has looked with especial favour on those many generations of schoolboys who during those eighty years have offered their "praises and prayers" in her honour; may the Sodality continue to be a source of piety and goodness and devotion to the Blessed Virgin amongst the boys in the school



CORONATION PARADE.




















In the Handicap, first place was divided between John Pass and Anthony Hynes with scores of 81, with Barry Power third with 85.

OBITUARY

REV. BROTHER OSMOND, M.A., B.Sc., Dip.Ed.

Former Director of M.B.H.S., Darlinghurst.



REV. BROTHER OSMOND, M.A. B.Sc., Dip. Ed.

Brother Osmond died on the 21st June, in his 82nd year, in the 64th year of his religious life. A solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated in St. Joseph's College Chapel on June 23, and Brother Osmond was buried late the same morning in the Marist Brothers' portion of the Field of Mars Cemetery. There he rests after more than sixty years of devoted labour as a Marist Brother in the furtherance of Catholic education. Of those sixty years, nearly twenty were spent at the Marist Brothers' High School, both before and after its transfer to its present site at Darlinghurst. He was Director of the High School at Darlinghurst from 1913 to 1917; on his capable shoulders fell most of the work of establishing the High School at its new site, and of laying the foundations of its future greatness.

Old Boys of Brother Osmond speak of him with the greatest admiration and esteem. One wrote of him and his worl at Darlinghurst in the following terms: "His appointment to the High School was hailed with delight by those who knew his sterling worth as a religious teacher and as a man. His ability and energy were directed towards placing the High School in a proud position as an educational establishment. A ripe scholar himself, and an experienced and expert pedagogue, he eagerly analysed all innovations in the art of teaching. and his sound judgment enabled him to discriminate between the substantial and the ephemeral. Whatever proadvantage mised and increased efficiency to the school was immediadopted, the remainder heartily rejected. His predilection for Science was gratified when he passed his final examination for the B.Sc. degree. It is characteristic of the superabundant energy of the man that the minimum course of three years was sufficient for him to accomplish this. Considering that at the most critical period of his university course he was encumbered by the onerous and responsible task of directing a large school and attending to the multiplicity of detail involved, and that his time was further occupied in discharging his duties as a teacher, one begins to realise the titanic nature of this feat."

It is interesting to note that Brother Osmond was the first Marist Brother to attend lectures at Sydney University and obtain a degree. He was not able to attend the university in clerical clothing. He later added an Arts Degree and a Diploma of Education to his Science Degree. His mind was extraordinarily keen and agile. He was

in the forefront of educational theory and practice in his day.

Brother Osmond had travelled considerably. He entered the Marist Brothers' Juniorate in Sydney in 1886. As a young Brother he went to New Caledonia for six months to perfect his knowledge of French. Later he travelled in Europe and spent some time at the Mother House of the Marist Brothers, then situated near Turin in He taught in several Sydney schools, and after his long period at Darlinghurst was Director of St. Joseph's College, Hunter's Hill. He directed schools in New Zealand, and opened the first Marist Brothers' School in Queensland. Later he was appointed Provincial of the Marist Brothers in South Africa, where he laboured for six years with untiring energy. Towards the end of his appointment he met with a serious motor accident, from which he never fully recovered. On his return to Australia some five years ago he lived a retired life. He was pleased to spend several months at Darlinghurst again, for those early years of this century when he did such sterling work here were always his most happy recollections.

Old Boys of the School should not forget Brother Osmond in their prayers.

REV. BROTHER MATTHEW.

Brother Matthew was on the staff of M.B.H.S., Darlinghurst, for some years in his early teaching career, but he is better known for his work elsewhere, especially as Director of St. Vincent's Boys' Home, Westmead. Brother Matthew died at the Marist Brothers' Monastery at Bondi Beach on September 13th, after a long illness. People who knew him thought highly of his administrative gifts and cherished him for his kindly disposition. Your prayers are asked for the repose of his soul.

REV. BROTHER MALACHY.

Brother Malachy had also been Director of St. Vincent's Boys' Home, Westmead, during a very active life for nearly forty years as a Marist Brother. Death came to him on October 25th.

Mr. E B. CAHALAN, O.B.E., Q.C. President of the O.B.U., 1922.

Mr. Edward Bernard Cahalan died at his home in Rose Bay on June 22nd this year. He was a Queen's Counsel and had been N.S.W. Parliamentary Draftsman since 1935. He was awarded the Order of the British Empire in 1941 for his services to the State.

Such an outstanding public career did not prevent the late Mr. Cahalan from possessing a quiet, unassuming disposition. He was a most devoted member of the Rose Bay parish.

He had taken a great interest in the Old Boys' Union, and was President of the Union in 1922.

Mr. Cahalan was unmarried; he was a brother of the late Joseph and Dominic Cahalan.

Dr. Edward Brooks, Medical Superintendent at Lidcombe State Hospital, passed away on 23rd March. As witness to the esteem in which the doctor was held, more than 200 cars followed the cortege to Rookwood Cemetery. RAY LINDWALL

The most prominent sportsman amongst the Old Boys of the School at present is undoubtedly Ray Lindwall. Australians have become accustomed by now to hearing of his Test cricket achievements, yet it is fitting that mention be made here of his triumphs in the Test series played in England this year. In the Fifth Test, at the Oval, he became one of the select band of all-rounders who have made 1,000 runs and taken 100 wickets in Tests. Some extracts from the "Sydney Morning Herald" accounts of the Tests will show how he deserves to be congratulated by the School and the Old Boys' Union, and to be imitated by the many promising cricketers amongst the present, and recent, boys of the School.

In the First Test:

"The Australians are forced to make a tremendous call on Lindwall, who took 5 for 75 in England's first innings."

Lindwall was at his best for the Second Test at Lord's.

"Fast bowler Ray Lindwall in a furious burst of speed took three wickets for eight runs off 20 balls. He finished with 5 for 66 in one of the most determined efforts of his great career and on a pitch that did not help him."

"Lindwall to-day wrecked England's hopes of a Second Test win. He scored 50 in 45 minutes in Australia's second innings of 368, when runs were badly needed, and followed this up by taking the wickets of England's openers, Hutton and Kenyon."

If as a schoolboy at Darlinghurst Lindwall dreamed, as do so many schoolboys, of success at the 'hallowed ground' of Lord's, his dreams have indeed come true. In the **Third Test** rain permitted little play.

For the Fourth Test, Lindwall was again in fine bowling form.

"Lindwall had yorked Hutton with the second ball of the game. Lindwall jumped in the

The Fifth Test at the Oval brought defeat to Australia, although a front-page headline read:

LINDWALL COMES TO RESCUE AFTER AUSTRALIA COLLAPSE.

"Ray Lindwall saved the side from disgrace in the vital Fifth Test at the Oval to-day. Lindwall top-scored with 62 in a vigorous but splendidly controlled innings."

Lindwall headed the Australian bowling averages for the Tests, having taken 26 wickets for 490 runs, with an average of 18.85.

While at M.B.H.S. Darlinghurst, Lindwall was in the premiership A grade cricket and football teams in 1937, 1938 and 1939. He captained both the cricket and football teams in 1938 and 1939, and was a member of the athletic team which won the Senior Division at the M.C.C. meeting. At least two of his records still stand for the school — his score of 207 not out in the M.C.C. competition, and his phenomenal individual score of 230 points in the football competition in 1939, when the school team scored 571 points with 20 points scored against them.
