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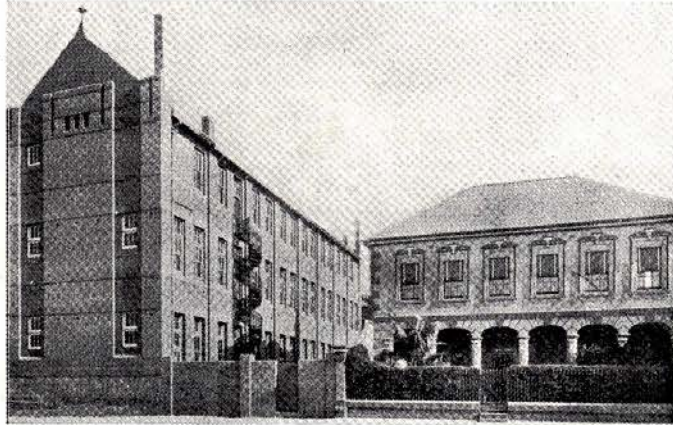

The Year at a Glance

THE scholastic year opened on Tuesday, February 2. The staff consisted of Br. Fergus (Director), Br. Cloman, Br. Cassian, Br. Antoninus, Br. Patrick, Br. Samuel, Br. Gilbert and Mr. T. J. Hogan. In July Br. Athanasius joined the Community and Mr. A. A. Morris replaced Mr. Hogan. The effective roll settled down at 370, the highest number on record since the foundation of the school in 1875. There were the usual nine classes, Third to Leaving Certificate.

Results secured in the 1954 public examinations were of a high standard:

15 out of 15 passes in the L.C., Five Commonwealth Scholarships. 29 out of 30 passes in the I.C., Seven Intermediate Bursaries, Five State Bursaries.

Including those who came from Villa Maria and Bondi Beach, there were 32 Government Bursary-holders in the school. Twenty-eight candidates were presented this year for the Intermediate, and thirty-one for the Leaving Certificate.

A cadet corps functioned vigorously and drew high praise from Brigadier Hinton at the passing-out parade on October 14. The cadet band was especially commended.

In the Metropolitan Catholic Colleges' Competition both A and B grades won cricket premiership honours, the A's being undefeated. In Football, the eight-stone team

were joint premiers, the B grade and six-stone teams were runners-up. The school was third in the aggregate points score. In Swimming and Athletics our teams had individual good performances, but did not win a championship. In M.C.C. Tennis, Darlinghurst won the Senior Championships, both Singles and Doubles. Tennis and Golf Tournaments were organised within the school, and in each case brought out some strong players.

One boy from the school entered the Seminary at Springwood, one entered the Religious Life as a lay-brother at Douglas

Park, one was ordained to the Priesthood.

Three organisations gave valuable help to the school: O.B.U., P. and F. and Ladies' Auxiliary. We are very grateful to them.

The spirit in the school was good, as also was the co-operation extended by the parents to every phase of the school's activity.

We wish to acknowledge here our deep debt of gratitude to Very Rev. Monsignor Wallace, P.P., of Darlinghurst, to Rev. Father Hatton, Chaplain to the school, and to Rev. Father Muldoon, Rev. Father Marley and Rev. Father Roberts, for their spiritual ministrations and their unflinching personal kindness.

From the point of view of the Marist Brothers' Order, the great event of the year was the Beatification of their Founder, Blessed Marcellin Champagnet. Naturally and appropriately his life and glorification receive prominence in this little book, which is respectfully dedicated to him by teachers and pupils at M.B.H.S.D.

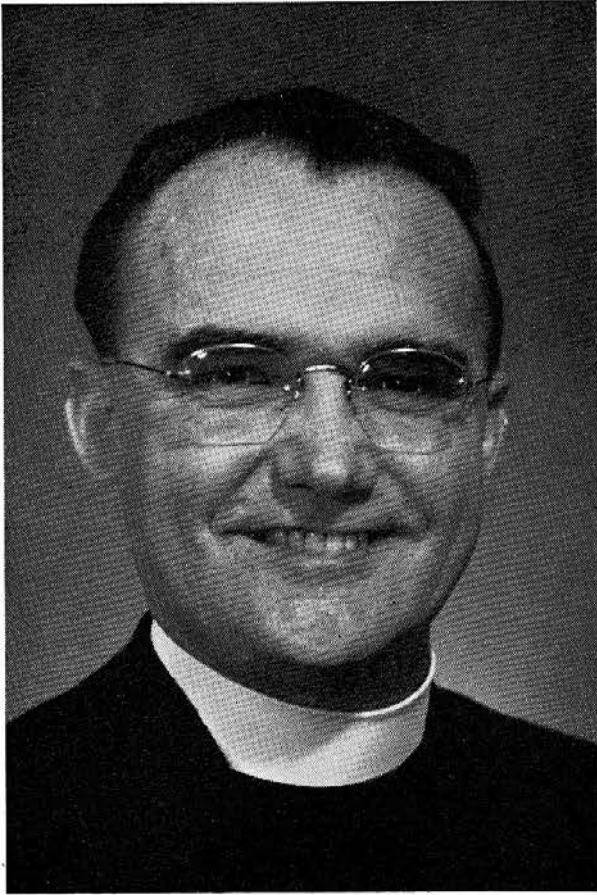

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Return of Father Joseph Egan, S.V.D.



THE Old Boys' Dinner, held at Cahill's on November 3, was a most enjoyable gathering. Guest of honour for the evening was our newest Old Boy Priest, Father Joseph Egan, S.V.D., who had just arrived by air from the United States.

Born on October 7, 1919, Joe Egan received his primary education from the Sisters of St. Joseph at Portland and Clovelly, and was at Darlinghurst from 1933 to 1936. Leaving school in his fourth year, he entered the Transport Department, trained as an electrical engineer and served as a sub-station electrician until 1947. He joined the R.A.A.F. during the war. For three years he was a student of Philosophy at the Aquinas Academy.

In 1947 he entered the Divine Word Seminary at Marburg, Queensland, and three years later was sent to the U.S.A. to continue his studies at St. Mary's Seminary, Techny, Illinois. Here he was ordained on August 15 of this year, and commenced his final year of training.

Father Egan is the fifth Australian to become a member of the Society of the Divine Word. The first was also an Old Boy of Darlinghurst, Father Patrick Murphy, who was ordained in 1953 and is now doing further studies in Rome at the Gregorian University. The other three, ordained last year, are Father Raymond Cashmere, of Carlton, N.S.W., Father Peter O'Reilly, of Haberfield, and Father Michael Morrison, of Ipswich, Queensland.

The Society of the Divine Word was founded in Holland in 1875 by Father Arnold Jonssen and now numbers more than 2,000 Priests and 2,000 Brothers, all working on the Society's far-flung mission fields.

Father Egan's mission appointment is to India, where his Order has been working since 1932. Their work is made particularly hard by the wide variety of languages, religions and castes to be found among their potential parishioners.

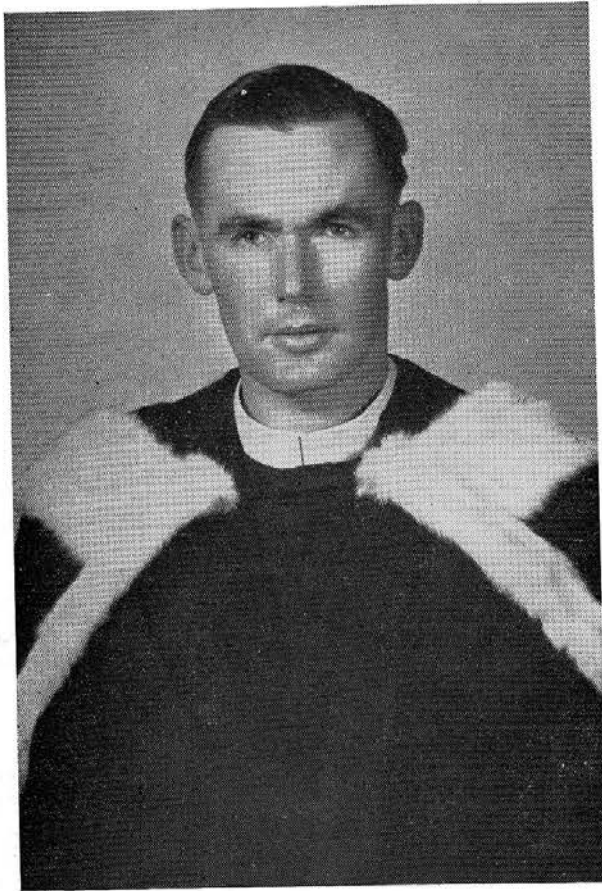
The Indian Government is averse to the entry of foreigners into India. People from the Commonwealth countries, however, are still acceptable. For how long they will continue to be acceptable is difficult to judge; the attitude of the Government is hardening. Father Egan's Superiors have therefore decided to send him without further delay. After a month's holiday with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Egan, of Clovelly Road, Randwick, he will fly to India on December 9.

Our good wishes go with him. His work will not be easy among a primitive and pagan people. But it is the work on which his heart is set, the work for which he was ordained. May the blessings of God attend his labours in "the land of a thousand tigers."

Brian O'Connor, a brother of Alwyn, Graham and Myles—entered the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart at the beginning of the year with the intention of becoming a lay-brother. He is in the Novitiate at Douglas Park.

Robert Grant, a member of last year's Intermediate Class, entered St. Columba's Seminary, Springwood, at the beginning of this year. He is in Fourth Year and is very fond of Seminary life.

Brother Michael



BROTHER MICHAEL came to the staff of M.B.H.S., Darlinghurst, at the beginning of 1946, and remained for nine years. For the last four of these years he was Director.

While most of the boys he taught at Darlinghurst will remember his teaching of Mathematics and Physics, it is in the field of Classics that Brother Michael achieved greatest distinction in his University course. He graduated from Sydney University with the Bachelor of Arts degree with double First Class Honours in Latin and Greek. In each year of his University Course he was awarded first places and won the Cooper Scholarship for Classics on three occasions. He also won the Wentworth Scholarship for Latin each year, and twice won the Wentworth Medal for original composition of Latin verse.

His thesis for his Honours Latin degree was on some aspects of the poetry of Lucretius. His work was highly commended

by Professor Smith, the then Professor of Latin at the Sydney University and by Professor Bailey, of Oxford University, and has been published in London in the "Classical Quarterly."

Brother Michael recently was invited to read a paper on "The Latinity of Saint Jerome" to the N.S.W. Classical Society.

Scholarship sits on him lightly. Reserved, considerate of others, always the soul of courtesy, he instilled into his students a certain refinement and urbanity which are fitting complements of the energy and virility characteristic of the Australian schoolboy.

Devoted to his duties as teacher and Director, he could turn his hand to almost any subject with the facility of genius. The remarkable successes in last year's public examinations prove the effectiveness of his guidance and the wisdom of his school policy.

At the beginning of this year, Brother Michael was transferred to the Headmastership of Marist Brothers' High School, Kogarah. The roll-call is over a thousand. He has been entrusted with no easy task. His former pupils at Darlinghurst wish him well in his new and responsible office.

Brother Venard, who was on the staff in 1954, is now Director of Marist Brothers' College, Bondi Beach. Darlinghurst was sorry to lose him, but it will receive compensation in the good quality of the Bondi Beach graduates who come here for their Fourth and Fifth Years.

Brother Gerald was transferred in January from Darlinghurst to M.B.H.S., Hamilton, where his prowess as teacher and sportsmaster and organiser is used to good effect. Hamilton has a larger secondary department than any other Marist school in the province.

Brother Alexius is at M.B.H.S., Lismore, with Brother Gregory, a former Director of this school.

Brother Elwyn is at Innisfail in Queensland, where he took Brother Gilbert's place. **Brother Wilfred**, our former Bursary teacher and Sportsmaster, is at Maitland, where not even the Hunter River floods can diminish his enthusiasm.

Brother Francis is at Lidcombe, and occasionally calls back to the scenes of his former labours and triumphs.

Brother Edmundus is still a neighbour of ours, being Director of Marcellin College Randwick.

Brother Victor Bernard is with Brother Michael at Kogarah, **Brother Gerard** at St. Columba's College, Springwood.

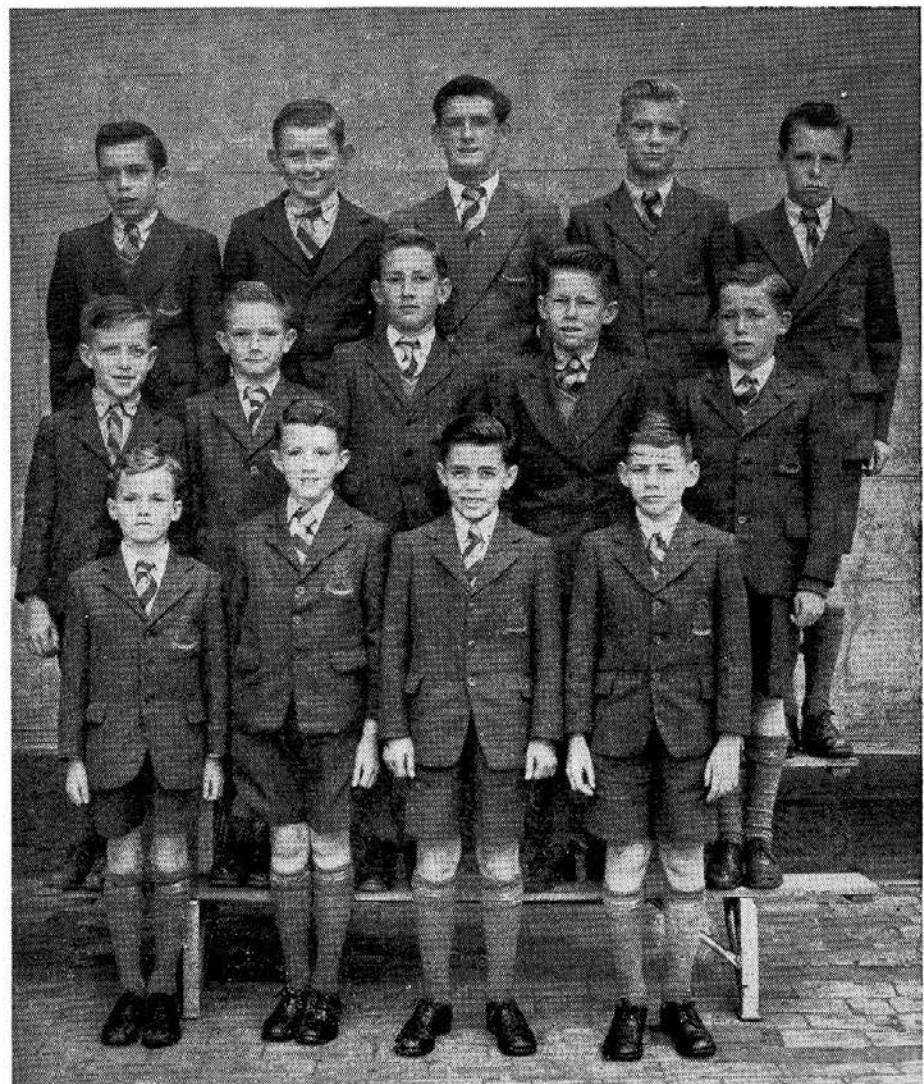

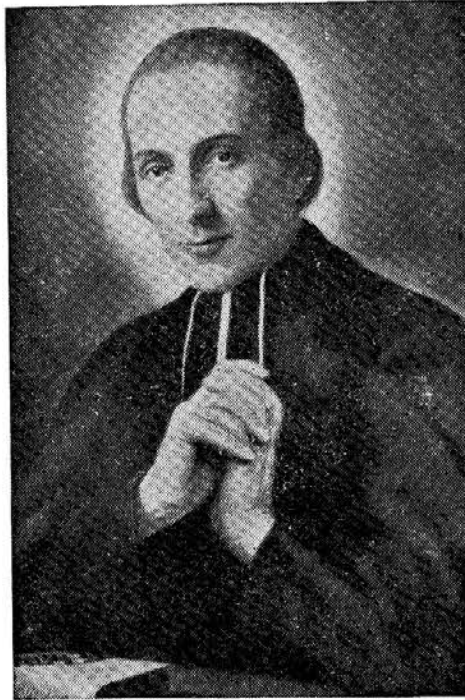

Marcellin Champagnat, Founder of the Marist Brothers

A POPULAR book in boys' libraries is one called "From Log Cabin to White House." It tells the story of James Garfield, a boy from the backwoods, who became a soldier and statesman and finally President of the United States. At the age of 50 he was assassinated by a political enemy, and thus gave his life for the cause he loved and served. A beautiful monument at Washington, the nation's capital, recalls his courageous life, and places him among the country's greatest men.



A parallel on an elevated plane may be seen in the life of Marcellin Champagnat, a country lad who espoused a cause greater even than Garfield's, fought for it with supreme courage, wore out his life in promoting it, and has now been acclaimed by the Church herself as one of the truly great. His statue in St. Peter's Basilica (the centre of the Christian world) does honour to his high achievement in the cause of Christian education, while his simple tomb in the village of Isieux has become a place of pilgrimage, attracting his disciples and admirers from the ends of the earth.

Born near the village of Marlies, in France, in 1789, Marcellin Champagnat spent his boyhood on his father's small farm, entered the seminary as a young man, completed his studies very successfully against great odds, was ordained to the priesthood and sent as curate to the mountain parish of Lavalla. The ignorance and indifference of those careless Catholics made his task a hard one, so hard that it could be accomplished by no ordinary means.

His hope lay in the children. He instructed them with admirable zeal, and founded an order of Teaching Brothers to continue and extend his work for them. He cherished a strong devotion to the Mother of God and instilled it into his disciples. Their name of "Marist" Brothers recalls

his wish that she should be a guiding influence in their lives, an ideal to be kept ever before their minds.

Substantial numbers of country lads joined the new congregation. Their training demanded most of the young priest's time. Released from Parish duties, he devoted his life to the religious and pedagogical formation of the Brothers, to building, organising, inspecting, negotiating.

A man of prayer and rigorous self-denial, he was hard on himself but kind to others. No wonder he wore out his life be-

fore the time. He died on June 6, 1840. He had led a life of heroic virtue. He had attempted and achieved things that to ordinary men would have seemed impossible. The secret of his success lay in his spirit of prayer, his devotion to the Blessed Virgin, his unlimited confidence in God.

When he was dead people thought of him as a saint. They prayed for the repose of his soul, as the Church recommends us to do for our beloved dead, but they also asked his intercession in their needs and difficulties. Such prayers were personal and private of course, but his clients made no secret of the fact that again and again their prayers were answered in wondrous ways.

The cause of beatification was introduced in the course of time, and in this very year we have seen it reach a glorious end.

Blessed Marcellin lived at a time when the educational system of his country had broken down. With other men of like mind, he helped to build it up again. We also live in a time of crisis. Our system of Catholic education is in danger of breaking down for want of personnel. If we read His life-story, it will give us ideas on how to meet the crisis; if we pray to Him, He will help us to meet it.

Modern Miracles that Hastened the Beatification of Marcellin Champagnat

ON October 27th, 1941, John Rainavo, a pupil of the Marist Brother's School at Befato, Madagascar, contracted cerebro-spinal meningitis. He was taken to hospital at Antsirabe, the chief town in that part of the island, but his condition grew steadily worse. The doctor declared the case beyond medical help. A priest was called and administered the last sacraments. Death seemed imminent.

Meanwhile the Brothers and their students in training, the boys at the school, the Sisters and their pupils, the Parish Priest and his parishioners had been praying earn-

estly for the boy's recovery. They asked for a miracle of healing through the intercession of Father Champagnat, for a miracle which would bring nearer the day of the Founder's beatification.

When the priest left, the patient was in a state of coma, and the end seemed near. That afternoon his temperature fell from 102.2 to 98.2. Consciousness returned. He began to feel well again. All traces of the dread disease disappeared. He had been completely cured, through the intercession of the Venerable Marcellin Champagnat. He is still hale and hearty, and has had no recurrence of illness.

Mrs. William Grondin lived in a town called Winslow in the state of Maine, U.S.A. In 1938, she fell seriously ill. The doctors diagnosed advanced cancer and ordered an operation. The operating surgeon found the cancerous condition so deepseated and widespread that its removal would have caused the death of the patient. He closed the incision and advised that she be removed to her home so as to have the consolation of dying in the midst of her family.

From the beginning of her illness she had called on Marcellin Champagnat for help. Now she called on him with renewed intensity, and kept his relic by her night and day.

Her confidence was rewarded. From the time of her return home she grew steadily better. The pain left her. She regained weight. She got up and resumed her onerous household duties. The doctors could find no trace of the disease and declared her completely cured. She is still in excellent health.

Numerous favours have been granted through the intercession of Father Champagnat. The two here related were accepted by the Church as proof of the power of his intercession in Heaven. He was beatified by Pope Pius XII on May 29th of this year. St. Peter's Basilica was brilliantly illuminated in honour of the Beatus, while paintings

representing his glory in Heaven and the miracles wrought through his intercession were hung in the sanctuary.

Mrs. W. Grondin and John Rainavo were both present at the ceremonies. Delegates from every province of the Order were invited to Rome for the great occasion. The province of Sydney was represented by Brother Hilary (Provincial), Brother Andrew (Former Provincial), Brother Raymond of St. Joseph's College, Hunter's Hill, and Brother Avellino of St. Benedict's, Broadway.

Celebrations in honour of the beatification were held in Sydney from October 11 to 16. To coincide with these celebrations, an Exhibition of the work of the Marist Brothers in the World was held in the Australian Hall, Elizabeth Street. Brother Leopold, Director of M.B.S., Penshurst, and Brother Demetrius, Director of St. Patrick's, Church Hill, were responsible for the organisation of the celebrations and of the exhibition. They are to be congratulated on the efficiency of their work and the eminent success that crowned it.

Blessed Marcellin led a hard life. He died from overwork at the early age of 51. Among the results of his work to be seen in the world today are 8,500 Brothers teaching a quarter of a million pupils in 660 schools. And it is still true that the harvest is great while the labourers are few.

The miracles accepted by the Sacred Congregation concerned the cure of cancer victim, Mrs. W. Grondin, of Maine, U.S.A., and of a Madagascan, John Rainavo, cured of cerebro-spinal meningitis. Both attended the ceremony.





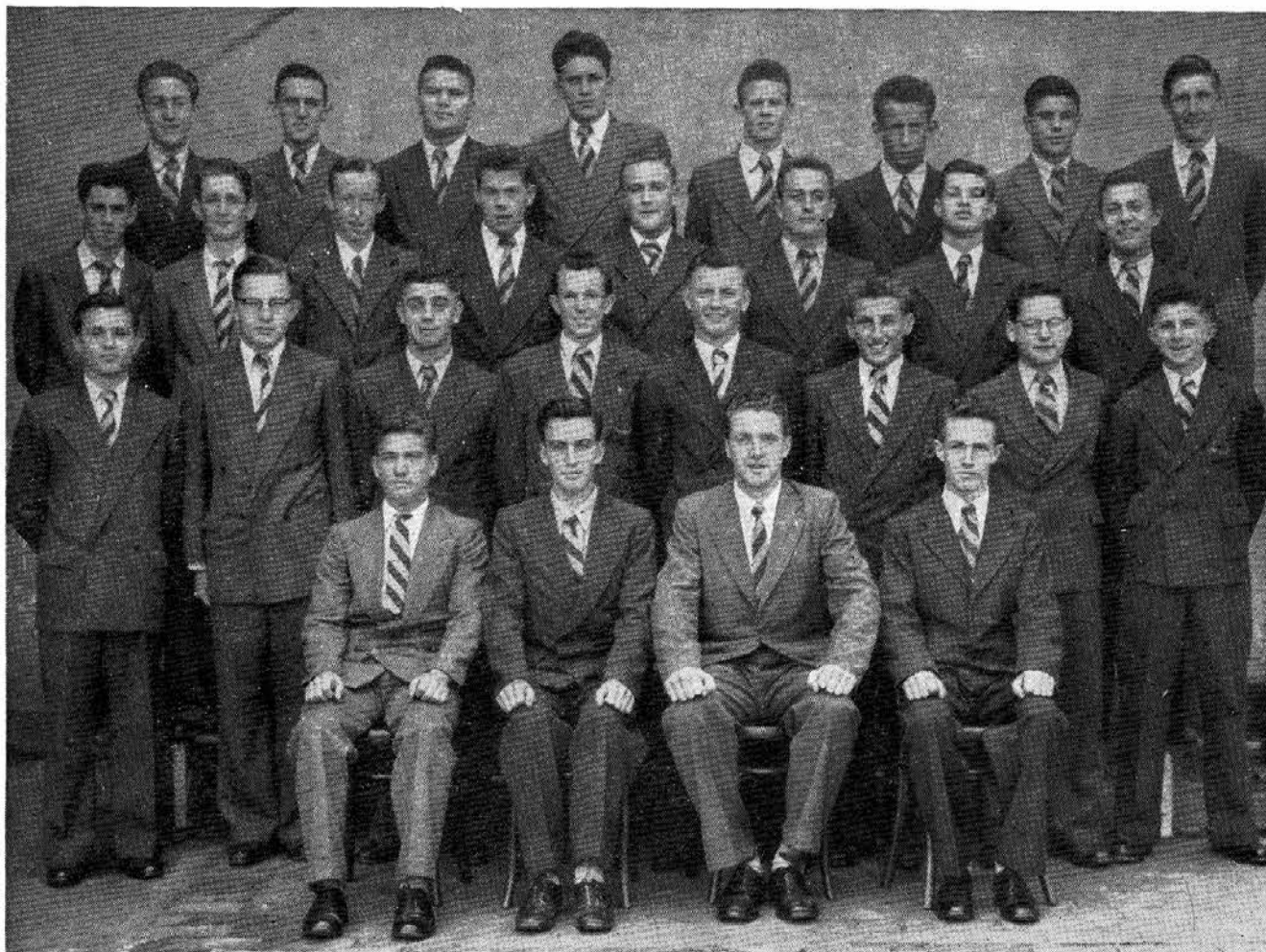

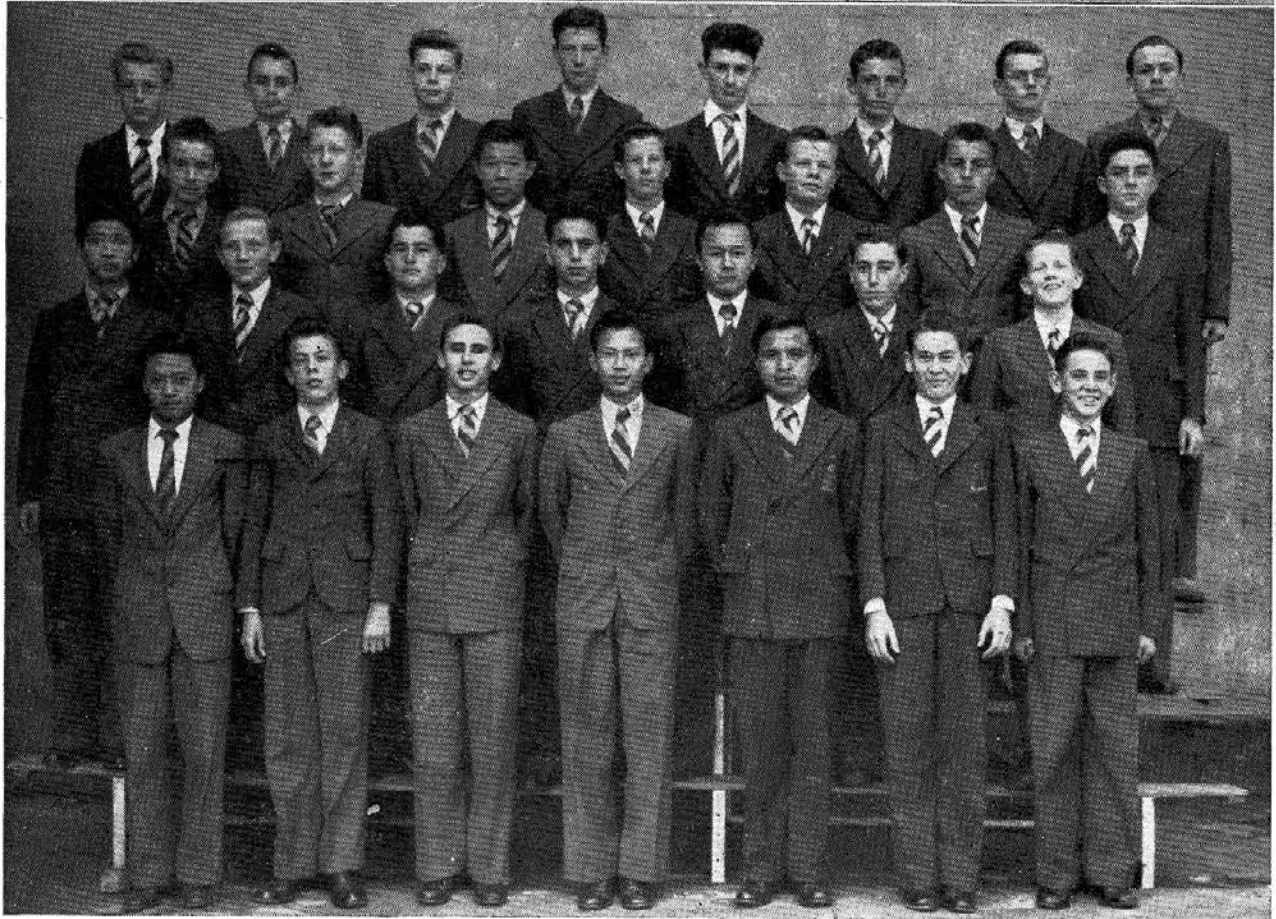
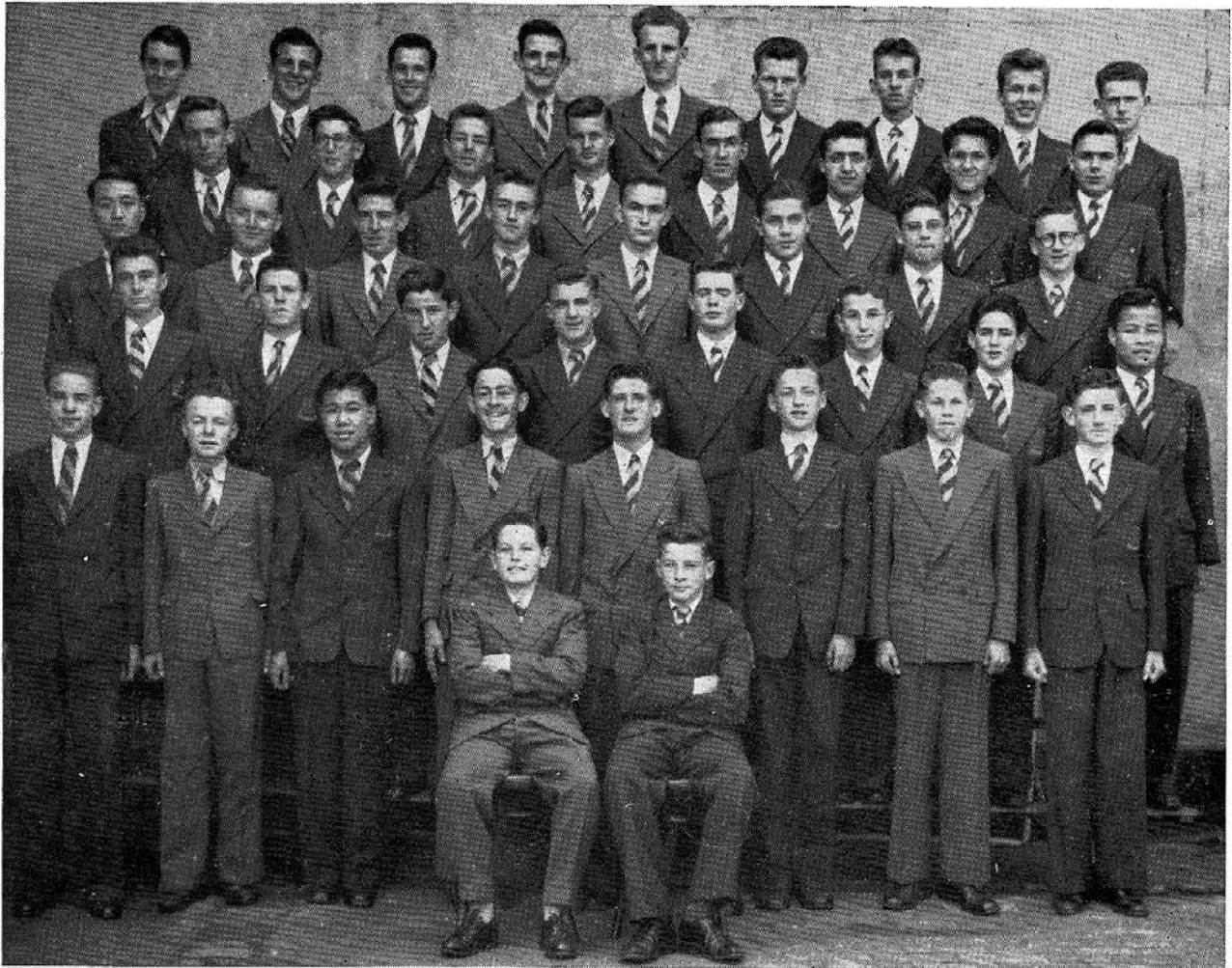

All of these remained in office for the full year. Attendance at executive meetings was almost invariably complete.

The Association met on the Second Friday of each month. There were generally fifty to sixty people present, sometimes considerably more. The standard of discussion was good, speakers giving their views clearly and vigorously and without apology. Work done for the school was practical in kind and large in amount.

The chief events of the year were: P. and F. Ball, two film evenings run by Mr. and Mrs. C. Renaud, Guessing Competition, Boys' Night, Annual Fete, run in conjunction with the Ladies' Auxiliary, and a number of small family functions. Each of these events was well planned and organised, and proved highly successful both socially and financially.

At the end of the year the Association paid off the debt of £900 that remained on the recent building project, and paid £100 for the reconditioning of three rooms in the old residence. They had already spent £80 on drums for the cadet band and £20 on other amenities for the school. The Parents and Friends thus accomplished what was asked of them at the beginning of the year (the shifting of the debt) and a good deal besides. The school is very grateful to them.

Plans are well in hand for 1956. The Ball

is to be held in Paddington Town Hall on Wednesday, April 18. The "Boys' Night" was a new idea to us this year. It was suggested by Mr. Ken Laffan and run under his direction and supervision. He has very kindly promised to run it again next year, early in the year on a larger and more ambitious scale. The major functions will be more widely spaced than they were this year, and family functions will again be encouraged. If each family were able to run a function, no matter how small, vast new possibilities would be opened up to the Association.

Even this year the idea was used to good effect. Many families organised a little "get together," ran a few games, played housie or euchre or some such thing, took a chance or two, and marked the money they won and lost as "P. and F." In place of organising such an "evening," some families held a guessing competition within their own circle of friends, while others made a direct donation. And their combined efforts amounted to a considerable sum. Sincere thanks to them, one and all.

Attendance at a monthly meeting may sometimes cause inconvenience. But there are considerations which make it seem worthwhile, as Mr. McKenna points out in the little article that follows. And there are advantages even to the individual. No one joins such an organisation for the sake of personal advantage, yet it is generally found that the mind is richer for the experience, the understanding of human nature deeper, the breadth of sympathy greater. What Ulysses said of himself ages ago can be said of all of us. "I am part of all that I have met."

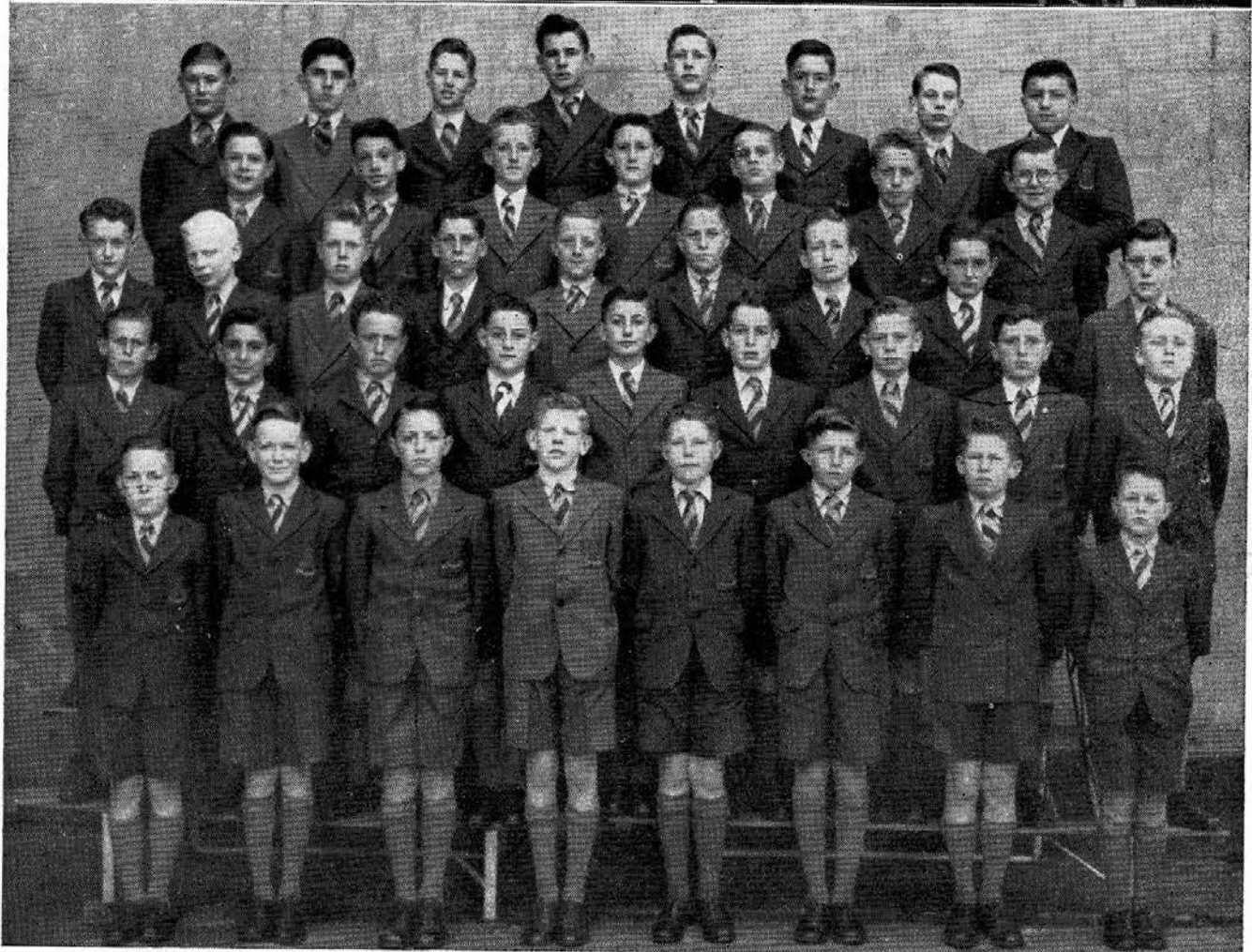
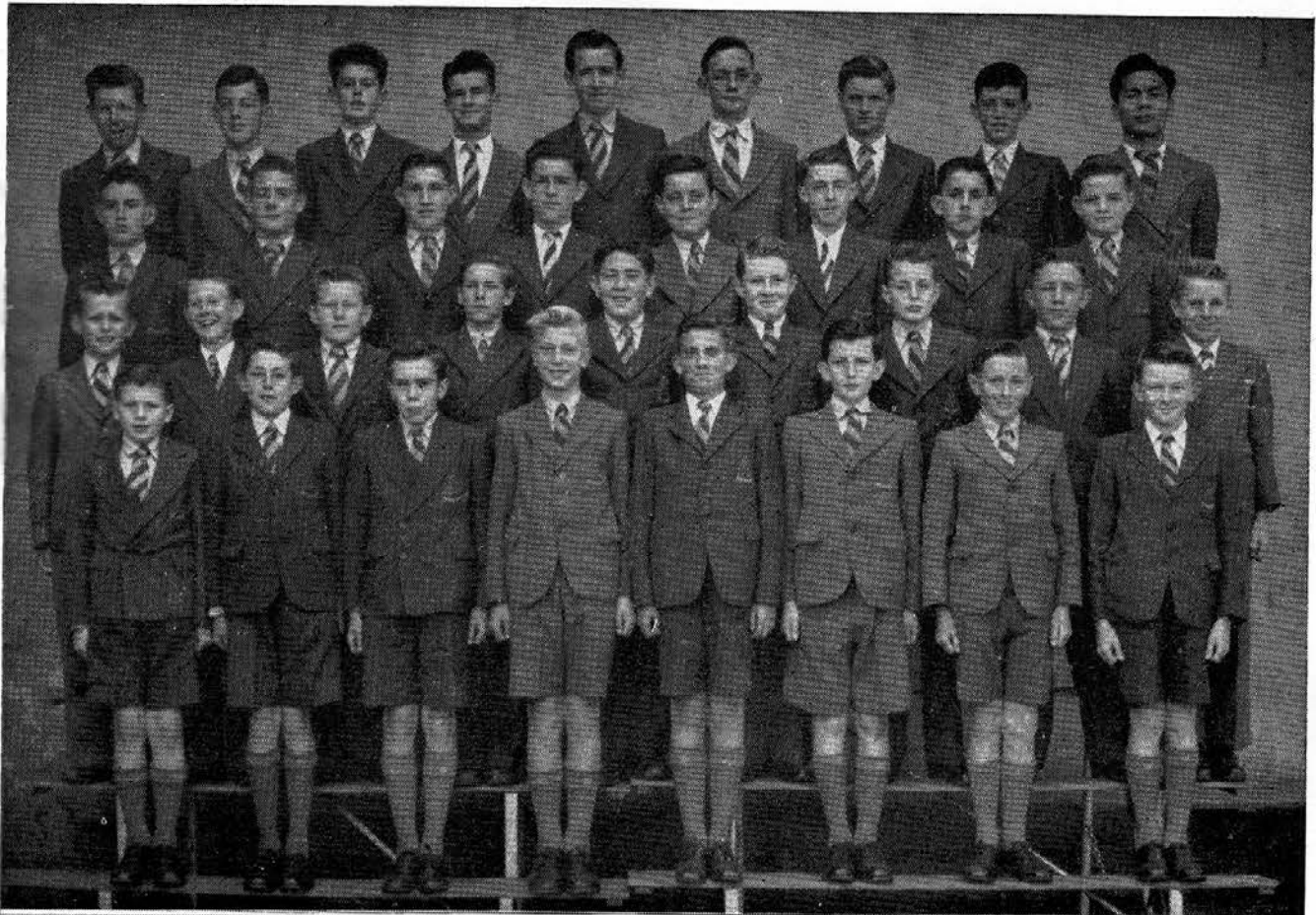

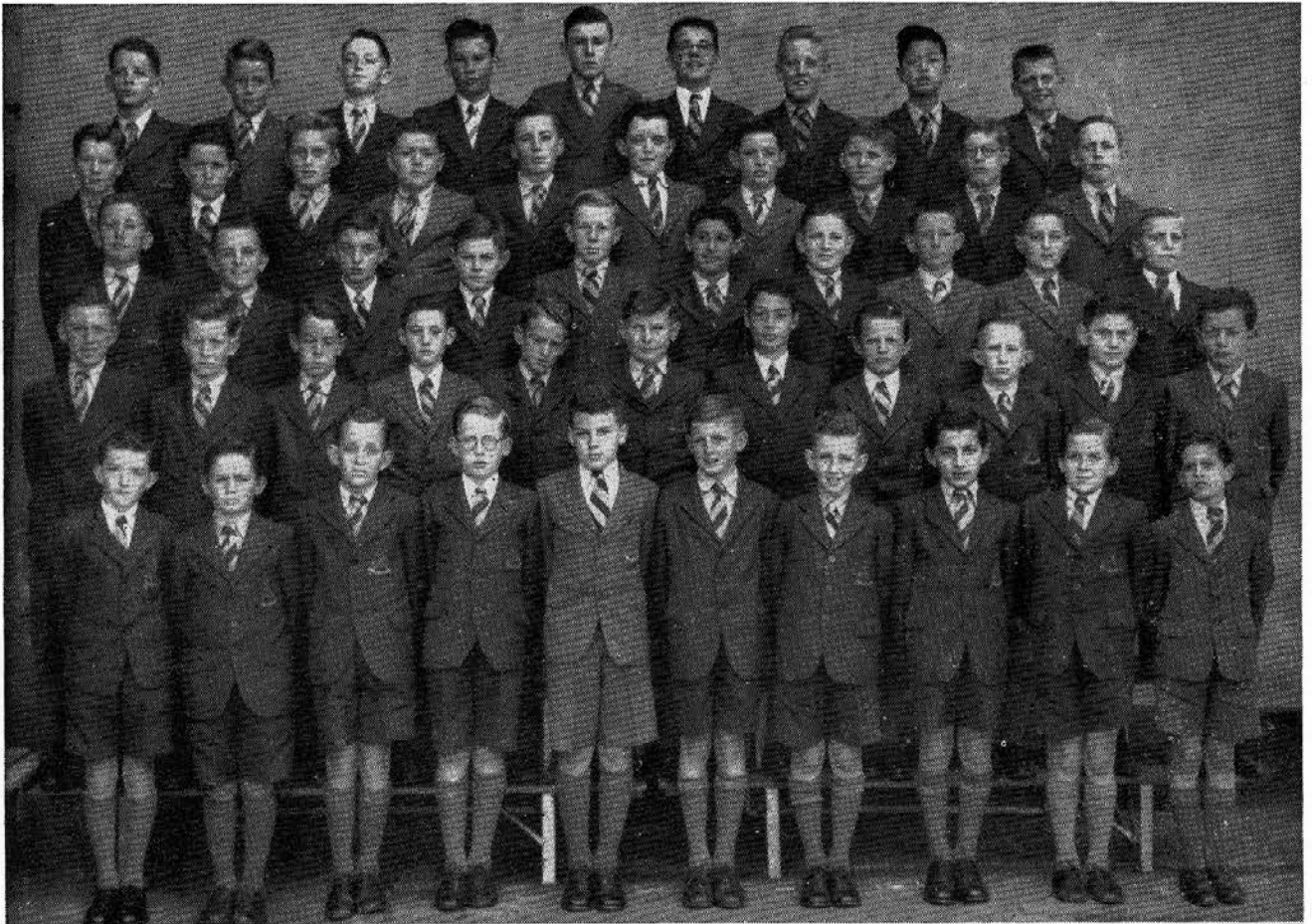

A Father Looks at the P. & F.

At the beginning of the year the Association set itself several objectives. By the grace of God and a bit of work here and there, it achieved its aims, and the members are modestly proud of their effort. With twice as many members, we shall be able to do twice as much for the school, and so many more parents will have the benefits of membership.

There are benefits, you know, such as becoming acquainted with the parents who have a boy in the same class as your own lad — people who therefore have problems similar to your own. You would get to know how these people deal with their problems, and you would discover, perhaps, that you don't have a problem after all. You would get to know the men who teach your boy. You would learn about the policy of the school. You could find out the reasons for things which may at present seem difficult to follow. You would be amused to observe what a different complexion an incident can wear when reported by a teacher or a disinterested witness. Prejudices (and which of us if entirely free from them?) will often-times disappear through personal contact and knowledge of facts. Genuine grievances, if they exist, can be stated in the right place and the causes of complaint removed. Narrow views (and again most of us harbour an odd one) will be broadened out under the

influence of liberal minds. You will probably have experience of some of these advantages, and if you are lucky, as I have been, you will make some wonderful friends.

You can further the cause, because each of us can do **something**, such as typing an article, baking a cake, bringing friends to a function, occasionally donating goods or cash, repairing a window or chair or desk, painting a wall, or putting up a good practical idea at a meeting.

You might ask if the P. & F. is necessary, and the answer is yes. The financing of a school calls for a lot more money than will ever be provided by fees. Both Catholic and Non-Catholic private schools find this. In many of the old-established Protestant schools, the gap is filled by large bequests from affluent and generous alumni. In the monastic schools of former days, the products of the farm entered largely into the finances. In the private schools of this country, organisations like our own help to fill the inevitable financial gap. We thus fit into a healthy Australian tradition, a tradition that holds in honour, education, culture, freedom to follow conscience and the persons and places that foster these things of the spirit. There is much to be said for belonging to the P. and F.

functioned with accuracy and precision. The exhibition of the 3-inch mortar and the changing of the guard were warmly applauded.

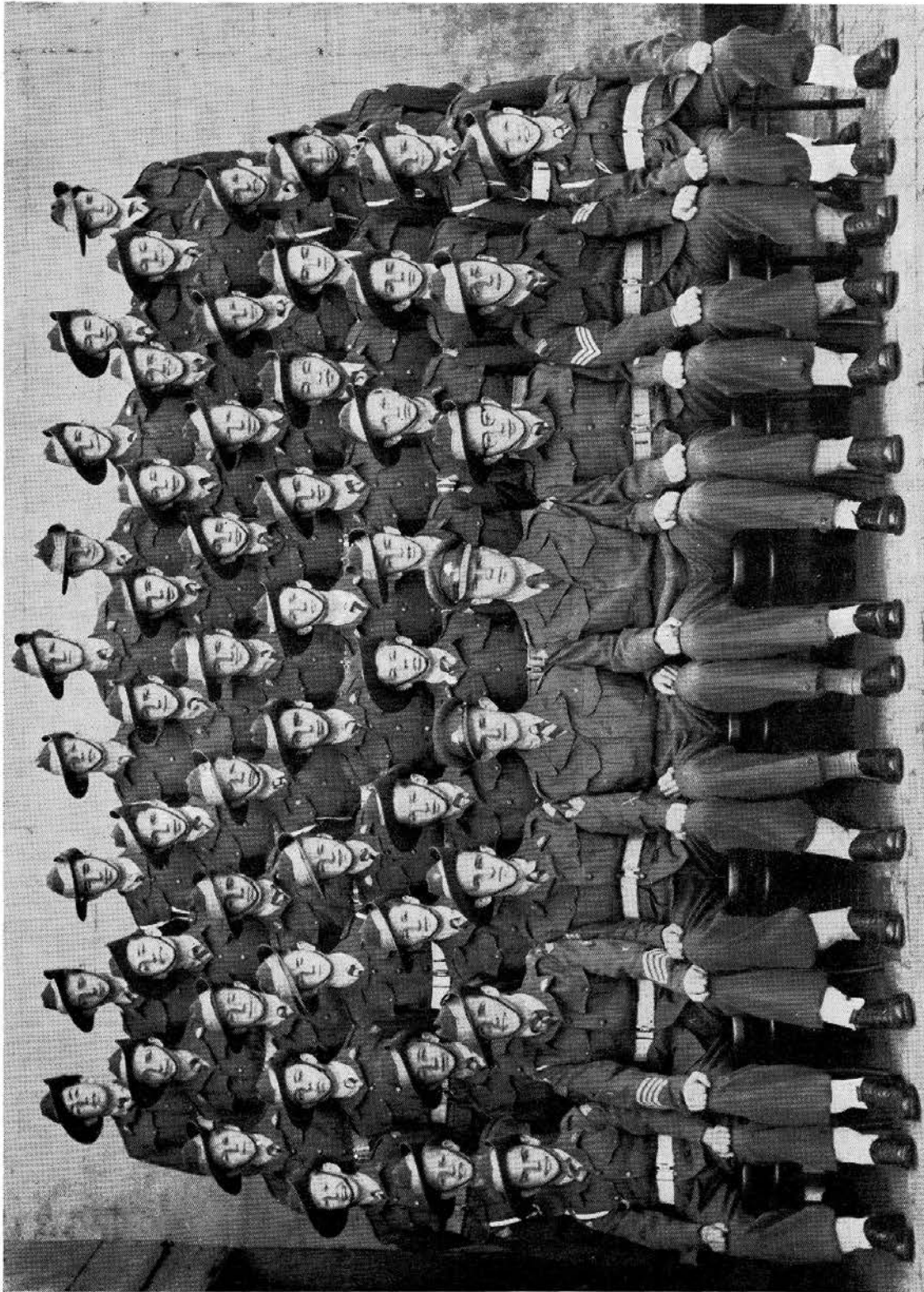

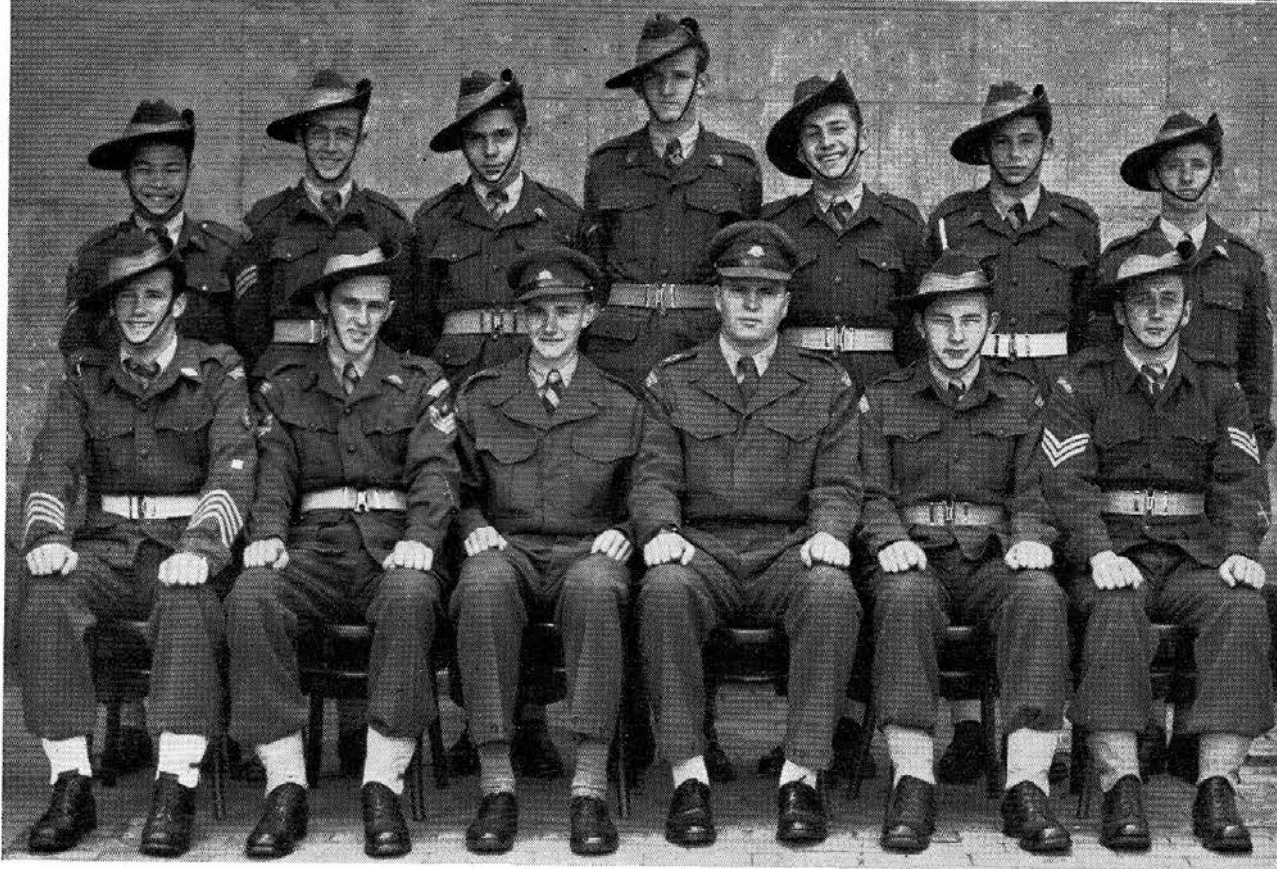

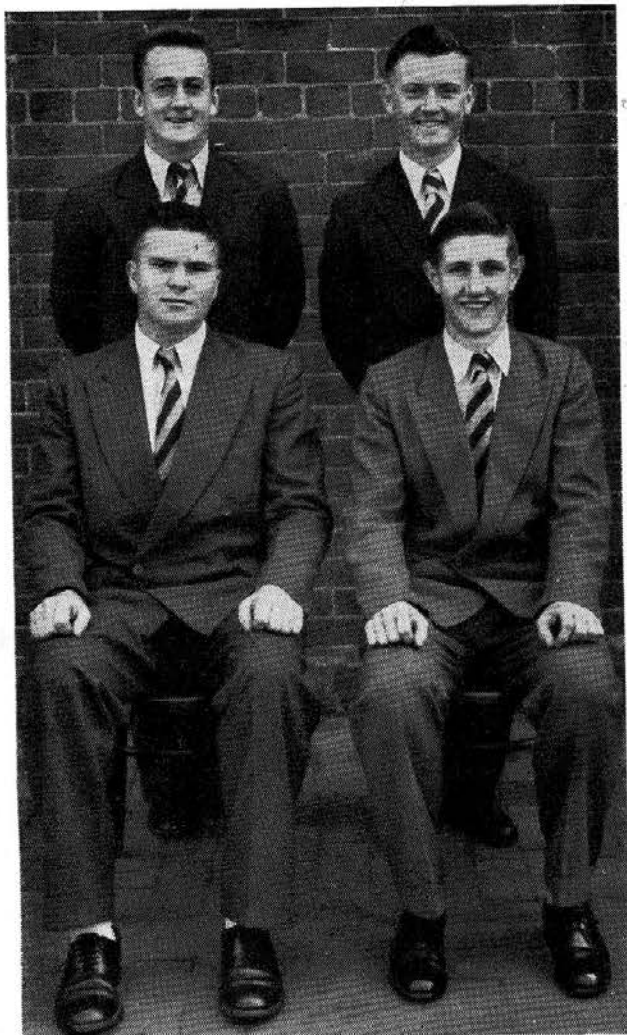

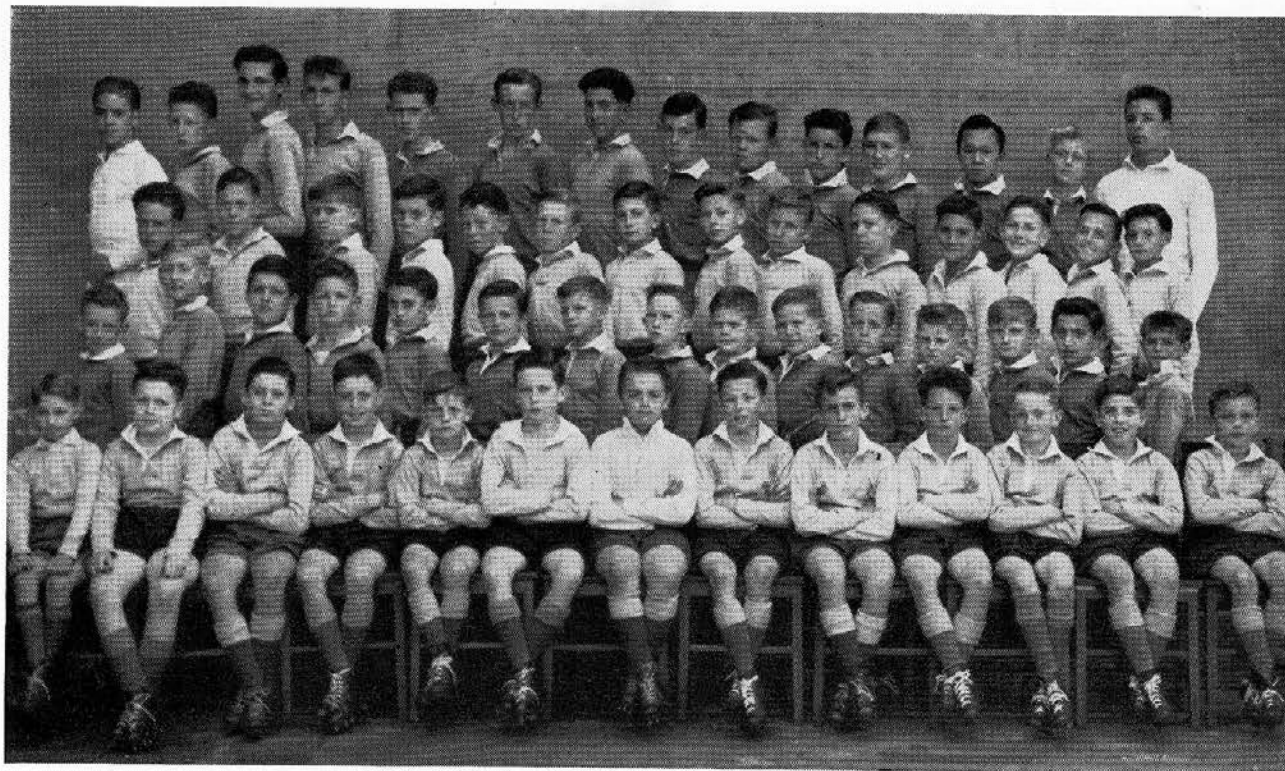
All teams had their share of success. As the competition progressed, it became apparent that spasmodic brilliance was less effective in the winning of points than consistent effort. Consistency told.

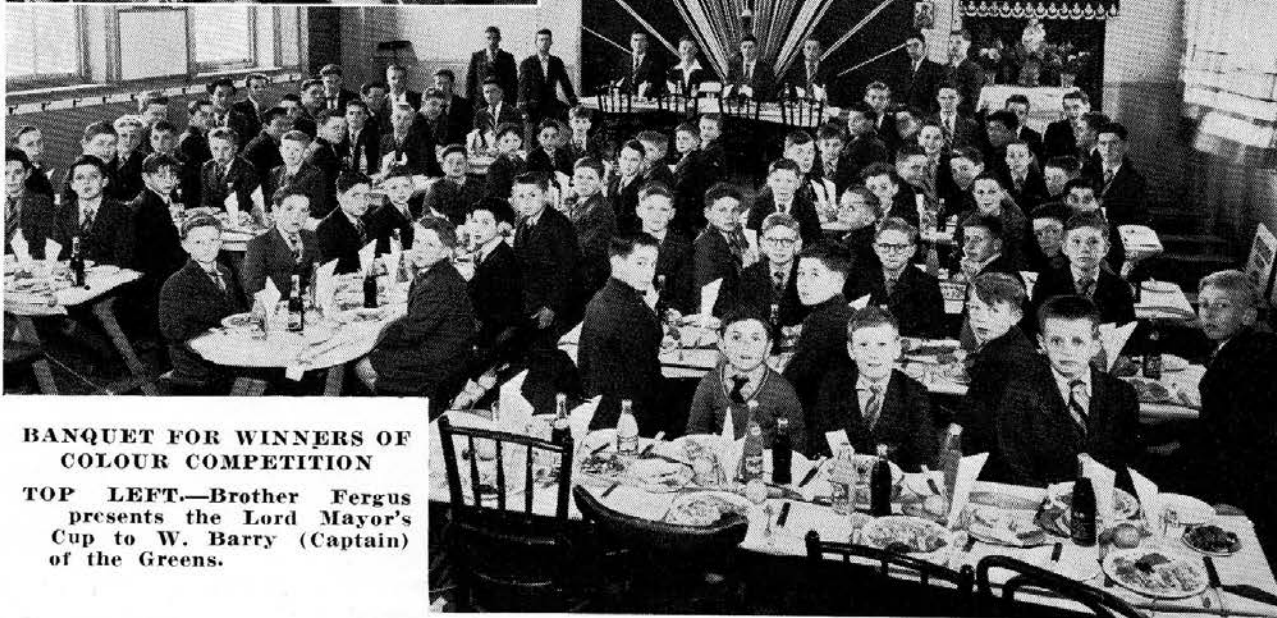
