
Fr. Brian Fleming was ordained at St. Mary's Church, Ridge St., North Sydney, in January, 1957. Fr. Fleming was in the Leaving Class at Darlinghurst in 1941, he was particularly good at languages. In 1942 he entered the Jesuit Novitiate at Watsonia, Victoria, and later proceeded to Melbourne University where he took out his degree. After ordination this year he was sent by his superiors to Louvain University, Belgium, where he will take on even more advanced university study.

Fr. Herbert Finnane was ordained at Mary Immaculate Church, Waverley, in July, 1957. Fr. Finnane was in the 1949 Leaving Class and the Special Prize List for that year shows him as Dux of the School. Most of his studies for the priesthood were done in Melbourne. The school was fortunate in that Fr. Finnane was able to re-visit us shortly after his ordination. He celebrated Mass for us in the Sacred Heart Church,

Darlinghurst. The Mexican Boys' Choir sang at the Mass and also at the small function to welcome Fr. Finnane back to the School. Fr. Finnane addressed the boys on the need for more religious vocations.

On behalf of the boys, Denis Ryan presented Father with a stole. Father then honoured the occasion by granting the traditional holiday.

Over the years, the High School has been blessed in the number of boys who have taken up the religious life. Their names are printed on page twenty.



Fr. Fleming blesses his mother.


## Senior Boys' Retreats

Once again Darlinghurst boys climbed the hill to the Sacred Heart Monastery where they spent many hours in retreat. This year we held four sessions at the Monastery. Firstly the Senior boys (Fourth and Fifth Years) held a two-day retreat late in June; then Third Year had a two-day retreat; Second Year went out for a day of recollection and finally First Year had a day of recollection early in July. The days were spent in assistance at Holy Mass at which many boys received Holy Communion, in hearing instructions from the Sacred Heart Father in charge of the Retreat and in private prayer both in the Chapel and in the grounds of the Monastery. The majority of the boys entered well into the spirit of the exercise and received much benefit from the instructions given. We are grateful to Father Kelly and his community for their interest both in the boys and the Brothers who went out to the Monastery. In particular we would like to thank Fr. K. Graydon and Fr. D. Cox for the interesting manner in which they conducted the retreats.

# Rev. Brother Fergus, B.A.




Brother Fergus was appointed Headmaster of the High School, Darlinghurst, in January, 1955. He had previously been Director of St. Anne's, Bondi Beach, and the High School, Mosman. During Brother's two years at Darlinghurst the school achieved outstanding success. The future will record these years as a peak period in the history of Darlinghurst. The school enrolment reached 435—the highest ever; the Leaving Certificate class secured thirteen Commonwealth Scholarships—an achievement of which any school would be justly proud; and in the realm of sport successes were better than ever before.

Brothers on the staff at Darlinghurst will always be grateful to Brother Fergus for successfully securing the Loan which made it possible for much needed renovations to be made to the Brothers' residence.

All who knew Brother Fergus realised how devoted he was to the welfare of the school and the Brothers, and it was with considerable regret that they learned that a breakdown in health made it necessary for Brother to leave Darlinghurst. Brother is now taking things more quietly at our school at Lismore. About the middle of January the P. & F. Association entertained Brother at a function at the school and made a presentation to him as a mark of their gratitude and esteem.

The Brothers, boys and friends of the High School thank Brother very sincerely for the excellent work he did at Darlinghurst and wish him good health and God's blessings in the years to come.


## The Right Honourable Lord Mayor

being Alderman Patrick Hills.





# With Our Lady of Fourviere

(Written for the 'Blue and Blue' by Rev. Brother Edmundus, B.A., B.Ed., a Former Director of Darlinghurst, 1948-1950.)



The Basilica of Fourviere.

F OURVIERE is a hill. Brother Kenneth and I were conscious of this as the funicular railway pulled us up its steep slope on that morning of the 13th September, 1956. We were to become more acutely conscious of it when, some nine months later, we toiled laboriously in the same direction — this time on foot — with a group of international Second Novices from the village of St. Quentin-Fallavier.

We were carried up the slope that has been hallowed by many saints on pilgrimage, and by Blessed Marcellin Champagnat whenever he was in Lyon. We arrive eventually in front of a beautifully proportioned basilica, eighty-six metres long by twenty-five metres wide. The approach to the main doorway is by a broad sweep of stone steps, about twenty-five of them, I think, the full width of the building at the base and con-

verging gently to the porch. The principal facade consists of a broad, high portico surmounted by an open gallery supported by four fluted columns of polished granite, each about eight metres high. The gallery is decorated by eight robustly sculptured angels, while above this, is an intricately woven triangular framework containing the Vierge Protectrice seated on her throne, receiving the homage of personages who have figured in the religious history of Notre Dame de Fourviere. For Lyon is historically a city of Mary, and every 8th December, when the exterior of the basilica is illuminated, the inscription picked out in lights for the whole city to read is 'Lyon for Mary'.

The exterior of the basilica is richly sculptured with scenes and personages of the Old Testament prefiguring Mary. On the towers are depicted Mary's virtues: fortitude, with Samson destroying the lion and Jacob wrestling with the Angel; justice, with David felling Goliath and Solomon giving judgment; and so on. Aaron's sister, Miriam, and Debora, Judith, Esther, Rebecca Rachel all have their places, personifying Mary's Faith, Hope and Charity. We step into the central nave through bronze doors, six metres high and almost three metres wide. Exquisite workmanship on the panels has depicted two angels, one supporting Noah's ark, the other the ark of the covenant. From these two superbly executed symbols of Mary, our eyes stray to the frieze above the doorway, where the sculptor Belloni has made the image of Mary Immaculate come to life out of stone, with our first parents reverently kissing the folds of the robe of the new Eve. A large ribbon of relief chiselled on the external porch to the right of the bronze doors has special interest for us, for among the servants of Mary depicted there Blessed Marcellin Champagnat has a prominent place.

On entering the basilica we are astonished at the contrast with the exterior. Outside was strength and grandeur. Here is grace and sheer beauty, as the nave and choir sparkle with light and gold; mosaic glitters on walls and ceiling, and pale blue marble columns support gilded and enamelled arches. On the side wall to our left large mosaics depict the history of Mary in the universal Church, while on the corresponding wall to the right scenes portraying Mary in the history of France are shown. The first scene is of the Council of Ephesus, in 431. It shows St. Cyril of Alexandria proclaiming in the presence of the Papal legates and the Empress Pulcheria, and amid the applause of the populace, the dogma of the Divine Maternity. Next on the same wall is executed the Battle of Lepanto, while in the third place is the Proclamation of the Immaculate Conception by Pope Pius IX. The Pontiff is shown standing upright on his sedia, with hands outstretched, in the presence of a vast gathering of Cardinals and Bishops, while above in heaven the angels rejoice at the newly proclaimed dogma. Lower down angels are seen carrying the gold statue which now adorns Fourviere, and Mary is shown appearing at Lourdes as if in confirmation of the dogma.

Before coming back along the Epistle side we take in, with our eyes, the sanctuary of the church. In the centre six columns of beautiful reddish marble, tinged with white, surround a rich marble ciborium. Beneath this on a dais is the image of Mary hewn from a block of white carrara marble. In her arms is the Infant Jesus ready to bless.

The large mosaics on the Epistle side walls show the arrival of St. Pothin at Lyon, where he was subsequently martyred; the vow of St. Louis XIII, with the king offering his crown to Mary; and finally there is a marvellous series of three tableaux showing Joan of Arc: Joan hearing her voices at Domremy; Joan triumphant at Orleans; and Joan succeeding in having the Dauphin's coronation carried out at Rheims.

Next we sought out the Ancienne Chapelle which stands nearby. This chapel is the Temple of the Virgin of Fourviere. The Basilica in all its glory has been built to honour her, but the ancient chapel is her home; and there she was with only her crowned head visible and all the rest of her buried in a shapeless mass of silky stuff.

So we came up to Our Lady of Fourviere, walking over the stone floor slabs hallowed by the footsteps of Our Blessed Founder and




of Venerable Claude Colin and of all those ardent young students who came here in 1816 and promised Our Lady that they would found the Marist Society for the resurrection of France. And the plaque we were seeking is inside the sanctuary on the Epistle side, proclaiming that it was near this spot that Blessed Marcellin Champagnat conceived the pious plan of founding the Institute of the Little Brothers of Mary (Marist Brothers).

As we read the ex-voto marble plaques of a great variety of sizes that cover a large part of the Chapel walls, we were walking where St. John Vianney walked before he went out to do battle with the devil at Ars. and where St. Peter Chanel walked when he came to confide his Apostolate to the Queen of Apostles before setting out for Oceania and his glorious death. Blessed Peter Julian Eymard also prayed here as a Marist Father, and here three times received the command to go through Mary to Jesus in the Eucharist and went from Fourviere to found the Society of the Blessed Sacrament. Little Therese Martin (St. Therese of Lisieux) came here on pilgrimage before she entered Carmel, and numerous other saints in the course of centuries, some of them known only to God.

But for us Marists the most intimate link with this hallowed spot was that here in 1816 a group of Lyonais seminarians, Claude Colin and Marcellin Champagnat among them, pledged themselves in solemn prayer: 'We, the undersigned, wishing to labour for the glory of God and Mary, Mother of Our Lord Jesus Christ, affirm and protest that it is our sincere intention and fixed purpose to consecrate ourselves, as soon as it may be opportune, to the foundation of the most pious congregation of the Marist Fathers. Therefore, by this present act, we irrecovably consecrate ourselves and all that we have

to the Society of the Blessed Virgin Mary'.

And so it was that as two Australian Marists went down from the mountain it was already determined in our hearts that we should return. And almost a year later we did return, this time twenty-five of us, on foot, almost each one from a different province of the world-wide work that originated here in the fervour of a group of eager young levites. And Marcellin Champagnat, and Claude Colin, and Peter Chanel, and Julian Eymard, and John Baptist Vianney were not very far from us as we sang together the Salve Regina and renewed aloud for Our Lady of Fourviere, the vows that made Marists of us all.

Back: J. Grainger, M. Williams. Front: D. Cannon, W. Galgey.


## Presentation of Certificates



# Scholasticate of the Marist Brothers

N the 27th October of this year His Eminence, Cardinal Gilroy, blessed and opened the new scholasticate of the Marist Brothers at Dundas. Named "Champagnat College" in honour of the founder of the order, this new institution cost a quarter of a million pounds to build.

Why, it may be asked, in these days of crisis in Catholic education, when so many new schools are wanted, so many additional classrooms are needed, and so many more Religious required—Why should the Marist Brothers be directing their attention to a training college of such proportions?

Such an institution, it is true, will do nothing to relieve the problem of accommodation in Catholic Schools. Neither will it mean any immediate relief in the shortage of teachers. For some years, in fact, in view of the longer and more extensive training to be given, it will tend to slow down, rather than speed up, the normal flow of new teachers into the schools.

Why such an undertaking, then, at this time? The answer is simple: it is the mind of the Church.

This mind is reflected not only in the tradition of the Order but also in the pronouncements of the more recent Sovereign Pontiffs. "Perfect schools," said Pius XI, "are the result not so much of good methods as of good teachers, teachers who are thoroughly prepared and well grounded in the matters they have to teach; who possess the intellectual and moral qualifications required by their important office."

This view Pius XII corroborates. "Good teachers," he told the Fifth American Congress on Catholic education at Havana in 1954, "should have perfect human formation, intellectual and moral."

"The teaching office," the Holy Father continued, "was a lofty position which called for intellectual discernment and for goodness of heart, for capacity for intuition and delicacy of spirit, for adaptability and adjustment as well as human depth, capable of hearing all for love of neighbour. Good teachers need a professional competency, at a minimum above average and better still, outstanding on all levels of instruction and in each of the specialized fields, if it is not to be unworthy of a mission which serves not merely the people and the state, but also God, the Church, and souls."

High ideals! Yes; but capable of attainment. Hence the purpose of institutions such as this new scholasticate.

#### THE SCHOLASTICATE

"Scholasticate" is the name given to the place where the young Religious, having finished his preliminary studies in the novitiate, comes to complete his higher academic studies. His special task in this new stage is to equip himself as a teacher, and generally adapt himself to the practical living of his religious life and the workaday needs of his profession.

This stage is of paramount importance. On it depends not only the full and proper development of his own life but also the fruitfulness of his later apostolate with youth and ultimate contribution of the glory he will bring to God. Small wonder that the religious orders are coming to place such enormous stress on this work! No room for narrowness of outlook here. "Take a broad and generous view" of this phase of your work the Holy Father told religious superiors; and "let there be no parsimony".

#### **STANDARDS**

By their Rules the Marist Brothers are urged to "obtain those qualifications which are necessary for the success of their mission". Generally speaking, those "qualifications" follow the pattern of the particular country in which they happen to be working. But whatever they are, standards must be maintained. And what goes for Marist Brothers goes for other orders as well.

The Church never puts any great store on merely average results, nor tolerates low standards in the natural realm just because her true mission lies in the supernatural sphere. What is naturally good, or beautiful, or true, the Church honours and defends as in some way an image of God Himself. Those who defend mediocrity in the natural order, on the plea that their real interests are the supernatural, neither speak nor act the mind of the Church.

#### LIBERAL EDUCATION

Nor would they reflect the mind of the Church who tend to think, as is too frequently the case, of the scholasticate as a mere "training college". The modern bias towards methods that detract from content finds no endorsement in a religious institute. Technical training in the skills of the profession are regarded as essential for those engaged in teaching and is envisaged in the mind of the Church.

But it represents only one aspect of the formation of a Religious; for the other aspect no suitable satisfactory substitute for an all-round liberal education has yet been suggested.

## CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER INSTITUTES OF LEARNING

Not all this formation can be given to the young Religious in his own scholasticate. Nor is it any disadvantage that it cannot. Many advantages other than the purely academic are to be derived from the frequenting of other institutions of higher learning, be they University, University of Technology, or other specialized schools. From none of these advantages should the young scholastic be debarred. These other institutions, after all, constitute a part of the world he will make better by his presence. It is the same world, moreover, in which he will later train boys to live. Not to know it well would deprive him of half his effectiveness.

## SPIRITUAL AND INTELLECTUAL FORMATION


Parallel with these profane studies will go a course in religious studies—philosophy, theology, scripture, and religious pedagogy—all presented at the same scientific level as the profane studies, and offering an equally high degree of intellectual challenge and satisfaction. This balance of the profane and the religious is essential. Without it there would be a dwarfing of one or the other that would be disastrous.

This last point is cardinal. It would be an easy matter to show in every one of the recent utterances of the Holy Father on this point, this constant stressing of the fact that intellectual and spiritual development must go hand in hand. One is to stimulate the other, sustaining it, enriching it—until is achieved the full realization of what St. Paul has called the "perfect manhood . . . the mature measure of the fullness of Christ". (Eph., 4:13; Gal. 4:19.)

## DONATIONS TO THE SCHOLASTICATE CHAPEL, DUNDAS



# Death of Brother Clement



ON Saturday, September 1, there occured the death of Rev. Brother Clement, former Assistant-General. He died at the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, aged 90 years.

Born in Maitland, Brother Clement came of a stirling family which has given two sons and four daughters to the services of the Church. After joining the Brothers he began his teaching career at St. Patrick's, Church Hill. During his long life as a Brother, he was Director of several schools, including St. Joseph's College, Hunters Hill and Sacred Heart College, Auckland. Other posts he occupied included Master of Novices; Provincial of the Australian Province; and Assistant-General for the Provinces within the British Commonwealth. His great-

est work for the Institute was done as Assistant to the Reverend Brother Superior-General. He occupied this post in the order from 1928 till 1952. The good name that the Marist Brothers have in Australia is due in large measure to the way in which Brother Clement inspired the Brothers to live.

The Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated at St. Benedict's, Broadway, by Fr. Roche and the funeral left for Mittagong later in the morning. A second requiem was celebrated by Dom. David, O.S.B., at the Juniorate and the funeral took place at the Brothers' cemetery.

Old Boys' Appeal


