



The School Shield and Motto

N THE cover of the Magazine will be found a facsimile of the High School Arms, as portrayed on the main window, situated over the old entrance to the School. The shield is divided into four quadrants, two of which are deep blue, and the other two, together with the light portion of the surrounding ornament, are in gold. The school colours are not in any way connected with the colours of the shield, for the latter must be in accordance with the rules of heraldry.

The following is the heraldic description of the shield:—

The Blazon of these Arms is quarterly or (gold) and azure, charged as follows:—

1° (primo): A Blazing Torch to the Dexter over a Latin Cross saltirewise, both of the second.

2° (secundo): An Open Book ppr (proper). 3°: A Six Pointed Star of the first, and in the fourth the monogram "A.M." surrounded by twelve stars in oval order, all of the second.

CREST: A Cross or, voided Azure.

MOTTO: Servo fidem.

The Book and the Torch both signify learning, but the latter being connected with the Cross typifies religious knowledge.

The Six-Pointed Star, known as the "Commonwealth Star," is an Australian emblem, and the "A.M." (Ave Maria) is the Marist Monogram. The Crest is a Latin Cross, the emblem of our Faith. On the Scroll is the school motto, "Servo fidem" (I Keep the Faith), a motto full of thought and feeling for every Catholic, and most suitable for a Catholic high school.

Behold the Fields White for the Harvest

NE hundred years ago, an English boy had a strange presentiment. He saw himself, as he used to describe it, when up, sent to Australia to do a great work and then disappear into a blue mist. This feeling was so strong, that he secured a map of Australia to examine it. When he saw the Blue Mountains marked on it, he presumed that it was here that he was to disappear. He bore the honoured name of Vaughan.

We know him best as Archbishop Roger Bede Vaughan, the man who gave us the great Catholic Education System in Australia. Roger was the second son of thirteen children. His five sisters became nuns. Six of the eight sons were ordained priests. Three of the six priests were consecrated Bishops; one of these was the famous English Cardinal and Roger Bede became the second Archbishop of Sydney.

Mrs. Vaughan was a convert to the Catholic Faith. In thanksgiving for her conversion, she offered her entire family for the service of God. For twenty years she spent an hour each day before the Blessed Sacrament, praying for vocations for her children. She spent all those hours in prayer for this purpose! The result was dramatic.

We can all learn a solid lesson from the example of this saintly woman. God has promised that the supply of vocations will never fail. But He has made it quite clear that we must "pray the Lord of the harvest to send labourers into His vineyard." He does not need to be asked. He knows however, that it is good for us to have to ask for vocations.

Each Catholic must face his responsibility and undertake to pray frequently, even daily, for this end. God has given His Divine Guarantee that our prayers will be heard. As we sow, so shall we reap. Looking into the future, we can be assured of a sufficiency of churches and schools if now we invest our time in prayer. Parents who pray for vocations, can expect them to arise within their own families. Young people who act in a similar way, can expect to be blessed with vocations, or at the very least, to be provided with sufficient priests and teachers

to provide for their future needs and the needs of their children.

Unfortunately, the opposite is equally true. No prayers—no Priests, no Nuns, no Brothers; consequently, no churches and schools. But more than this is demanded of young people.

It is certain that God calls many to His service. So, each individual must ascertain whether God is calling him. Our Lord said to the Apostles, "You have not chosen Me, but I have chosen you." God still does the choosing. To find out exactly which individuals are called, each must look into the matter personally, without attempting to sidestep the issue.

No time limit can be placed on the formation of a vocation. Some carry the idea through from tender years; some develop the idea in the early stages of their secondary training; whilst others come to realise their vocation in the final year at school. Even if a vocation has not made its appearance then, there is no guarantee that it will not appear some years later. In some instances the idea comes much later in life.

There is no mechanical means of detecting the presence of a vocation. X-ray can detect hidden mysteries in the body, but there is no form of X-ray suitable for locating a vocation. We are forced to fall back on four principal signs, presupposing a Right Intention. We cannot count on a feeling, because to feel that one should give oneself to God, is a rarity. The main signs are simply, average health and intelligence, coupled with the necessary moral character and willingness to give one's life to God's service.

The path to the priesthood is rather long and not without its difficulties. Anything worth having is always difficult to obtain. The Seminary is meant to be, and is, a testing ground. Sometimes parents recommend their children to spend a year or two in the world to gain some "experience," before entering the Seminary. Some parents hope secretly that the idea may vanish. They are delighted at the prospect of someone having a vocation as long as it is not their own child. No number of years spent in the world can test a vocation as surely and

effectively as the years of Seminary training. The whole purpose of a Seminary may be summed-up in a short phrase—a Seminary is a house of formation and proving.

Some individuals point to instances of fine priests who entered the Seminary some years after leaving school. But in almost every case, the priest concerned, had not developed a vocation before he left school. It appeared later.

The life of a priest carries with it many consolations. A priest can say in all truth—everybody calls me Father. It is in ministering to his spiritual children that a priest derives consolation. He belongs to every single family in his parish and really feels that he belongs. Young and old approach him with equal confidence.

Long hours spent in the Confessional give the priest an opportunity to prove himself a true father. Here above all places, he must be patient, kind, sympathetic and understanding. This is a place of refuge for sinners. It is his privilege to console the sinner in the words of the Book of Isaias, "If your sins be as scarlet, they will be made as white as snow—If they be as crimson, they will be made as white as wool."

Here he represents Our Lord, Who was branded as the friend of sinners; Who pardoned the adultress; Who showed mercy to the penitent thief and Who said, "There will be more joy in Heaven over one sinner who repents, than over ninety-nine just who need not penance."

A priest enjoys the great privilege of bringing Christ down from Heaven to the altar, every day. Thereby, Christ lives amongst us, to enable us to contend with success and adversity. The priest is Our Lord's earthly guardian and intimate friend. On visits to the sick, it is thrilling to have Christ as a travelling companion. In time of sorrow and trouble, it is comforting to have Him as our unfailing support and refuge.

The life of a priest is full of interest. His activities are varied. He comes into close contact with the people. To be a good shepherd, he has to. He is a father to the poor, a friend to the aged and lonely, a consolation to the sick, to the afflicted and the dying.

His greatest satisfaction, however, comes from the realisation that he is devoting all his time, his talents and his energy to the one thing necessary—the salvation of his own soul and the souls of others. For, "What does it profit a man, if he gain the whole world and suffer the loss of his soul."


Father Hallinan visited the School and said Mass for the students at Sacred Heart Church. Afterwards a presentation was made at the School to Father Hallinan and







on a high hill." Such is the opening of the colourful and popular story of the School and the stately home beside it.

We unearthed at the Mitchell Library an interesting account of this "stately home," "Stoneleigh" at 278 Upper Dowling Street, now No. 1 Darley Street.

Perhaps when Mr. William Northwood built his home in 1861 he did not realise that it would later serve as a tuck shop, band room, sports room and a private section for the Brothers, and now another classroom is being arranged on the ground floor.


Perhaps Mr. Northwood could have given some much needed directions for the excavations carried out by us future members of the Royal Historical Society, searching for a cellar mentioned in the history of Darlinghurst. However, probably Mr. Northwood did not see much further than his first tenant, Mr. E. B. Cornish, a wealthy squatter, the owner of fifteen sheep and cattle stations in Western New South Wales.

When Mr. Cornish died in 1871, Sir John Russell French, an Indian born inspector of the Bank of New South Wales, occupied "Stoneleigh," and from then on it was occupied by many illustrious people.

Meanwhile in 1878, the Marist Brothers founded a school at Harrington Street, Church Hill, nowadays not far from the Harbour Bridge. Later a school was opened at St. Mary's Cathedral. In 1909 the Brothers purchased "Stoneleigh" and a small property surrounding it. The new school building was erected and opened in 1911. This new school has now reverted to "the old concentration camp" and the old stone building is the scene of the many renovations mentioned above.

At the front, set in a neat square of lawn, there is being erected a life size statue of Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, the founder of the Marist Brothers. And there we must leave the popular story of one of Sydney's oldest relics that will collapse one of these days if we archaeologists make any more excavations looking for that cellar.



A Parent's Impression

Written by the mother of one of our trainees at the Marist Brothers' Juniorate, Mittagong.

HAD never prayed for a vocation to the religious life for any of my children. It never occurred to me to do so. I had always prayed that they would have happy lives—that they would find contentment and satisfaction in whatever they chose to do—and I had always believed that any worthy ambition should be encouraged and fostered by parents.

An ambition is a wonderful thing. A goal to reach is the most necessary thing in our lives. In the enthusiasm of youth we feel that nothing is impossible for us—the heights of fame—the glory of the world beckon us and we see no reason why we cannot achieve those heights—enjoy that glory—nothing is impossible to us.

I prayed that my children would know this desire for achievement and have the courage and energy to follow their desires—not because of the glory they would attain from their fulfilment but because of the satisfaction that comes from efforts made towards a worthwhile end. I had no thoughts of definite direction of their ambitions—that I believe is a purely individual affair—as long as they had a worthy aim and worked honestly towards it I could not see their lives being unsatisfactory for them or for others.

We watch our children—their inclinations—their particular talents—their failings—their dispositions, and wonder what place they will find in the world. We listen to the variety of occupations they decide to follow: a signalman—a pilot—a tramguard—a doctor—a milkman—a bishop—a juggler—a fireman—perhaps a new idea each week proposed with great determination and solemnly accepted as the final decision.

When at the age of 12 my son mentioned his determination to join the Marist Brothers, this notion was accepted as calmly as all his previous ideas had been, discussed a little as the others had been, and half forgotten.

When a year later he said he wished to

go to the Juniorate to begin training for the Order, this would be his 2nd Year in High School, we began to take a more serious view of the idea, but said that definitely 3rd Year would be quite soon enough to go if his ideas were the same then. He made no arguments against this decision but it was apparent that this could be more than another passing attraction.

Another difference about this ambition was the lack of the usual volume of conversation on the subject—no "Gee, Mum, it would be terrific"—no great tales of what he would do when . . . Altogether a somewhat disconcerting and adult patience—as if to wait another year would be a small difficulty which must be endured. It is not common for a child of 12 to have a stable and well-founded ambition. This calm indication that such might be the case was provoking. One day I asked him directly, "Just why do you think you would like to be a Brother?"

"Because I want to get to Heaven and to help others to get there."

I had prayed that my children would have worthy ambitions and the courage and energy to follow those ambitions—my prayer was being answered with infinite generosity, and yet I was hesitant to co-operate.

Not every child would express his motives as lucidly as he did—indeed this remark was one of rare directness for him, but perhaps the surety of the motive inspired the simplicity of the answer.

The next step was an interview with the Brother in charge of possible vocations. From his previous interviews with the boy, Brother was able to say that a true vocation was indicated. This could be fostered by his attending the Juniorate now and might or might not endure if he did not pursue it until later.

It is a greater responsibility to refuse an opportunity offered than to neglect to seek opportunities for the good of our children.

I spoke of ambition—we all have the ambition for happiness—eternal happiness. We strive for passing satisfactions—achieve them and realise the lack of satisfaction in them—we are restless just as St. Augustine: "Our hearts were made for Thee, O Lord and they cannot rest until they rest in Thee." The reality of life is in faith, hope and charity, and when our children are inspired by the desire to teach these Divine gifts of life to others, our hearts, blind with the wisdom of the world, would try to teach them the same barren wisdom.

Why is it harder to associate spiritual appreciation with young boys than to expect in them an appreciation of honesty, courage and all manly virtues? We encourage them to admire and imitate the qualities of heroes, but when they seek to imitate and follow Christ, who was all Truth and Life—Wisdom—Manliness and Godliness, it is too much for our poor hearts."

My son went to the Juniorate in 2nd Year as he wished. The night the decision was made that he would go, my husband, the

boy and I were walking through the city. They discussed happily model aeroplanes, cameras, television sets, anything that took their fancy. I stared with stupid eyes at everything—the world had come to an end. In three weeks my only son would leave home—he would be away for a year—home for a few weeks' holiday—away for the next year—so it would go on until even those few weeks at Christmas would be stopped. I did not feel at all generous, only a dull, dead ache and a silent, miserable wonder at the peculiar ways of men who walked and talked as casually as though unaware of the enormity of what was happening.

During the days that followed I alternated almost hourly between happy acceptance of the great grace which was offered my son and a quiet cry now and then as I went about my housework.

Advice and opinions were freely offered by relatives and friends—understanding came from the most unexpected quarters, many non-Catholics showing a far greater appreciation of the value of the religious life than some Catholics.

All this conflict took place eighteen months ago now. It is difficult to explain the atmosphere at the Juniorate—quite inadequate to say the boys are different. They are ordinary boys who do all the things that boys at school do, but who do everything perhaps a little better than other boys because of the spirit behind their efforts. Their manners are different, marked by a courtesy and poise which stems from true charity. These are boys from all types of homes, whose common aims unite them in a life of prayer, study, work, and recreation. They realise that the extent to which they apply themselves to this time of training affects the measure of the training they will give to the children who will come under their care. The outdoor activities offered appeal to the adventurous natures of boys—all sports, country life, garden workvisits to places of interest around the district. It is a full and happy life.

The visiting days every six weeks reassure parents of the contentment of the boys in their life and the realisation that even if the will of God later directs them elsewhere, He has shown them a great favour in selecting them to spend any time in this company—that they will be better men for the lessons and spirit they have acquired here.

If our sons have the generosity which Our Lord loves, should we not be humbly grateful for the privilege of being their parents, of offering back our children—not with the idea of sacrifice, but happy in the knowledge that they are truly fulfilling the purpose of their being "to know, love and serve God here on earth and to see and enjoy Him in Heaven?"



Obituary

FUNERAL OF THE LATE PREMIER, MR. J. CAHILL

As we go to print our State is mourning the death of its Premier. The following extract is from the panegyric preached by His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy at the Funeral Mass:—

"People in this State regret and mourn the passing of a great leader of whom they were justifiably proud. They placed him in supreme command of the Government for which he planned, laboured, and prayed. He was determined to do everything in his power to justify the confidence placed in him. He has been held up to the citizens of this State and the Commonwealth as a citizen whom the noblest of men would be proud to imitate. By his death the Church has lost a devoted son."

In conclusion, the Cardinal said: "Mr. Cahill not only never neglected his Parliamentary and social engagements, but never allowed these to impair the harmony of his family life. The family's consolation will be his happy death. To Catholics this is the prayer of a lifetime. Mr. Cahill was privileged to receive the Last Sacraments while in possession of his faculties and just three hours before he left this vale of tears to present himself to his Eternal Judge."

REV. BROTHER HYACINTH

Rev. Brother Hyacinth, who died suddenly at Eagle Heights, Queensland, in July, was well known as a teacher in Marist Brothers schools in Sydney.

He entered the Marist Brothers' Novitiate, Mittagong, as a boy, being received into the Order on the 2nd January, 1917.

Brother Hyacinth taught in Queensland, South Australia, and New South Wales. He sest remembered in Sydney at Mosman, Parramatta, and especially at St. Vincent's Home, Westmead, where he laboured for many years.

Only those who knew him intimately realised that he had, for many years, an illness that caused him serious inconvenience. The brightness of his character and the cheerfulness with which he bore his ailment concealed it from most who knew him.

A keen sportsmaster, he was still at his work when death came to him on the 19th

July. During a boxing tournament at the College at Eagle Heights, Brother Hyacinth suffered a heart attack and died on the way to hospital.

BERNARD McMAUGH

The untimely deaths of Bernard McMaugh and his wife overtook them in a road accident while returning from morning Mass early this year.

Bernard McMaugh attended the High School from 1944-1948. In his final year he was Dux of the Leaving Certificate class and Captain of the School. He graduated B.Sc. at Sydney University and later completed a brilliant course in electronics at the University of New South Wales. At the time of his death he was engaged in research work for A.W.A.

A fine tribute was paid to the late Bernard McMaugh by Brother Michael, a Director of the High School in Bernard's time: "Bernie was an outstanding boy amongst all those I have taught, and I always remember him for his transparent goodness, his splendid character, his enthusiasm in everything as well as for his brilliant intellectual gifts."
