# Foreword

As 1962 draws to a close, our fiftieth anniversary at Darlinghurst recedes in the past giving hope of a centenary looming closer in the future; for this was our eighty-eighth year. It has been a momentous one not only for education in general but also for Catholic education in particular.

Three significant advances have been made during the year: the implementation of First Form under the Wyndham Scheme, a rationalization of Catholic educational facilities, and a changing attitude towards public support of denominational schools.

Although it is still too soon to pass conclusive judgment on the Wyndham Scheme. some remarks appear relevant. One obvious benefit has been a remarkable surge in education both on the part of teachers and public alike, an interest shown in frequent newspaper comments and articles, in special courses for teachers, and in the painstaking work devoted to constructing new syllabuses by the various select committees representative of all groups including Catholic. All this must aid the ultimate success of the Scheme.

But, perhaps the greatest benefit has been the "new deal" for the average student. Now, his studies are no longer restricted by the narrowing demands of university matriculation despite the fact that often he had neither the intention nor the ability to pursue education at the teaching level.

On the other hand, gifted students seem to have lost in this "new deal". Courses are set at "ordinary" and "advanced" levels, the advanced level being that for the able student. In theory, the scheme is workable; in practice, it appears doubtful that a really advanced standard will actually be achieved by these "advanced" students. The syllabuses in some subjects are perhaps too broad; period allotments for mathematics and science have been reduced; and too much time is given to "core" subjects which in an age of specialization must be regarded as incidental to the main body of subjects. Extra time is, however, given to English and this is a welcome change. English is the tool of our day-to-day communication and even if measured merely from a utilitarian view, should receive first priority.

In Catholic schools the time has come for thorough reorganization ot set up central secondary schools so that better use will be made of facilities and staff. Such a change has become increasingly necessary over the past few years because of larger enrolments, increased capital costs, the need for specialist teachers, and the provision of a wider variety of courses. Though the reorganization has inconvenienced many, and though the difficulties at present appears great, it seems certain that the change will, within a few years, be shown as a significant advance for the Catholic education system.

The third question, tax support for denominational schools, has probably reached the most interesting stage in the history of this controversy in Australia. It is now not only a familiar topic of conversation but also a calm and more reasoned one, a development promoted largely through the closure of the Goulburn schools, and the petition of His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy to Mr. Heffron.


Perhaps our Catholic people should see in these events the key to their own attitude. It calls for some revision. Too often in the past Catholic advocacy of State support has been characterized by traces of bitterness which has antagonized rather than convinced. This is not our aim. Bitterness does harm. The average Australian prides himself on a sense of fair play; he is willing to be persuaded by reasoned, unbiassed discussion which it should be our aim to provoke.

In the non-Catholic community there remains a substantial majority who, if present signs are any indication, could be won over to our point of view. These are the ones who should be approached at every opportunity.

But that is not enough. We, ourselves, must be well acquainted with the facts, to be able to meet the common arguments against the proposal. In this matter, two Catholic Truth Society publications will be of great assistance. One is Bishop Carroll's "Independent Schools in a Free Society" and the other, Kathleen Woolf's "Freedom of Choice", both of which will help with the perennial arguments which the layman often finds difficulty in meeting.

Again, as in the Jubilee Year, 1961, the School has flourished. A spirit of piety and goodwill prevails among the students in their efforts not only to master lessons but also to acquit themselves worthily on the playing field. The Old Boys' Union and Parents and Friends' Association have functioned with vigour.

Readers are, therefore, invited to peruse yet another record of Darlinghurst achievement, confident that our true tradition prevails.

# A Brother in the Making

This attempts to answer a fairly common question these days when there is so much spoken and written about the Wyndham Scheme and the great call that it makes on all teachers to acquire the highest qualifications for educating young people in this jet age.


As you can see from the accompanying photos of our Mother House, the Marist Brothers have made great advances in the training of the Brothers in recent years. We built a modern Scholasticate in Sydney within the last few years.

In Australia, the training begins at our Juniorates in New South Wales and Victoria. Here aspirants begin their Fourth Year studies for the Leaving Certificate examination, coupled with an introduction to the practices of the religious life.

After the Junior passes the Leaving Certificate, he proceeds to the Novitiate where he undergoes intensive training in the remonastic life; this lasts for eighteen months. quirements of the vows of religion and of

However, the longest period of the Brother's preparation begins after this preliminary work has been done. The training in these final four years is given in greater detail in the following account of our Scholasticate at Champagnat College, Dundas, N.S.W. The Master of Scholastics is a highly-qualified Marist Brother, Rev. Brother Ronald Fogarty, F.M.S., B.A., B.Ed., B.Sc., Ph.D.; he is assisted by other specially-trained Brothers.

"The teaching office is a lofty position which calls for goodness of heart, for capacity for intuition and delicacy of spirit, for adaptability and adjustment, as well as human depth capable of bearing all for love of neighbour. It further requires outstanding professional competency . . . if it is not to be unworthy of a mission which serves not merely the people and the State, but also God, the Church and souls."

These words of Pius XII set forth in bold relief the qualities of soul necessary for the true Christian educator: he is to be a saint and a scholar dedicated to youth for the greater glory of God. Such a man does not evolve naturally; his potential excellence is brought to a full maturity only through years of careful formation. So it is that the young Brother, after six months' valuable experience in the schools, comes to the Scholasticate at Dundas to complete this final stage of his formal training. The keynote of this training is a whole-hearted and disciplined application to the means put in his hands by the superiors. In a word, it is a process of "guided self-formation" by which the young Brother strives to attain responsible maturity in those areas most vital to his development as a full man and as a religious educator, namely, academic, emotional, religious, and professional.

The intellectual formation is provided by studies at the tertiary level in Arts and Science, together with courses in Thomistic philosophy. Such academic pursuits develop mental maturity and sound judgment, besides providing the specialised knowledge necessary for a teacher to be master of his subjects.

Parallel to these profane studies are his religious studies, presented at the same high level and offering a similar challenge and satisfaction. To this end, courses are provided in Theology, Sacred Scripture, and Religious Pedagogy. However, the most vital aspect of religious grounding is found in the Ascetical Theology course; for it is through a deep and prayerful study of the principles of the religious life that the Brother deepens his convictions and grows in self-knowledge. This introduces another important feature in formation: adjustment of personality, which is achieved through full co-operation with counsellor, instructors and fellow students. By this means a young man may fully realise his potential and adapt himself to the practical living of the religious life according to the needs and pressures of the present day.

Finally, professional competence is essential if a Brother is to be an effective educator, for it is mainly by a keen understanding of pedagogical principles and methods that he can impart to his students the intellectual and moral goodness which he himself possesses. The basic concept is clearly revealed in the motto of Champagnat College: "Contemplata aliis tradere"—to hand on to others those things which one has himself contemplated. The "handing

on" technique is mastered by means of pedagogical studies of a highly-specialised nature. So it is that the Brothers are divided into two groups: one completing a teacher-training course for certification as registered teachers, the other gaining the Diploma of Education in the fourth year at University.

In its short history, Champagnat College has already established some sharply-defined traditions. First of these might be the constant endeavour displayed by the Brothers in both their personal and their united efforts to measure up to the high ideals already discussed. This has led to outstanding academic successes, as evidenced by the high percentage of distinctions and first places in university class lists, and to the striking personal development which, though less easily measured, is very real. Evidence of local cultural expansion is manifested in the production of musical and dramatical pieces

and in the publication of an annual review, "Contemplata".

The atmosphere of brotherly charity which exists at Dundas is sustained by the Ascetical Theology groups. These are the "power units" that create the special environment. In carefully-chosen groups, the Brothers, by mutual help and encouragement in the discussion of religious themes, discover the reality of Christ in themselves and in their fellows. This final aspect reveals itself in the Brother's consciousness of his mission at the university, for he can silently exercise a great influence for good in the secular environment by the example of his life of external devotion to duty and by the Christimage which he projects more or less as he becomes progressively absorbed in the work of his vocation.




